when it landed. Department of Public Safety narcotic officers said the investigation into the suspected drug operation began almost a year ago and the investigation is continuing after the

arrests over the week-end. Officers said that several other persons thought to be involved in the marijuana smuggeling operation escaped officers at the airport friday along with what officers think was about 500 pounds of the illegal weed.

The raid got underway about 6:15 p.m. Friday when U.S. Customs air support officers and state narcotic officers followed an airplane to the local airport. About 15 other officers converged on the landing strip along with Runnels County Judge Bill Stultz who issued search warrants for buildings owned or controlled by Brooks Flying Service.

When officers executed the search warrants, about 5 pounds of a substance thought to be marijuana was found. One brick of the weed was found in an old refrigerator being used for storage and another was found behind the spare tire in a vintage '56 Chevrolet parked in the hangar building. Officers also discovered a number of rubber fuel bladders and necessary connections to install the bladders in an airplane to greatly extend it's flying range

ficers said the sides of the covered trailer had been covered and that the trailer was partially loaded with hay that they theorize was used to cover up the illegal cargo.

Radio monitoring equipment capable of receiving state and local police frequencies was also discovered during the search.

Two airplanes, both twin-engine Beechcrafts, were also confiscated by the law enforcement agencies in the raid. Officers said that on one of the planes traces of what was thought to be marijuana were found along with an electronic device to locate "bugs" or electronic surveillance devices.

Commissioners have routine meeting


This week's meeting of the Runnels County Commissioner's Court was mostly routine with the approval of bonds for new county employees and approving con-

Bonds for new sheriff's deputies Hal Jones and Bobby Salinas were approved by the commissioners as was the bond for Loraine Halfmann, a new deputy in the Tax Assessor-Collecter's office.

A request from Highway Patrol Troopers Scott Warren and Tom Barkley for a new radar unit was tabled by the court until after the first of the new year. The commissioners also deferred until next

A supplemental contract with the Area Agency on Aging was approved by the county. The Agency on Aging is administered through Governments based in Abilene.

Before handling routine items, the commissioners approved the county's method of payment to the Runnels County Tax Appraisal District. The county will pay it's \$66,577.53 on a quarterly basis.

refrigerator, a microwave oven, and smaller appliances and radios. Customs agents said the merchandise was very likely being purchased in the United States and then taken to Mexico where it would be traded for marijuana. Both airplanes had the necessary connections to enable them to use the fuel bladders that were found dur-

ing the search. U.S. Customs agents said that they had followed the aircraft by both radar and airplane from Laredo where they crossed the Mexican border to Winters where they theorize the planes would be pulled into a hangar while the contraband was loaded onto vehicles to haul the weed to other locations or points of distribution.

Officers said that both aircraft had been recently repainted and on one of the planes the registration number had been altered. The officers also said that both planes had been repaired during the past year for damages that could have been received from brush or trees on the short, dirt airstrips in Mex-

that more arrests would be made Ballinger stores lose \$8,000 in hot check spree


A number of Ballinger merchants apparently were swindled out of almost \$8,000 in merchandise and cash last week by a man writing worthless checks according to sheriff's deputy Odell Denton.

The checks, which began appearing Wednesday were allegedly written by a man who had opened an account at a Ballinger bank December 2 with just a small amount of money. Deputy Denton said that felony theft by check warrants had been issued for a man identified as Max Reynolds. The deputy said that Reynolds was about 50 years old and was thought to be from Brownwood.

Among the items purchased by the man were a 1980 Chevrolet station wagon, several pieces of luggage, a rifle and ammunition, groceries from two stores, a television set, camera, saddle, and

The merchants involved included Wright's Motors, Black's, Gate No. 1 Western Wear, Western Auto, Super Duper, Higginbotham's, Keel Drug, Dallinger Hardware, Piggly Wiggly, and Broadway Texaco, all in Ballinger.

Deputy Denton said that a description of the man along with warrant information had been entered into both the state and national law enforcement computers and that Brown County authorities also are interested in finding the man to face similar charges there.

Path of Faith

Fred Thomas, pastor of the First Baptist Church. was honored recently by the membership, in recognition of his 40 years in the ministry.

At an after church fellowship, he was presented a watch, and a special cake was baked for the occasion. The icing depicted a road lined with trees, flowers, and a few rocks, with the caption, "Path of Faith."

The decision to become a minister was made one Sunday night at his home church in Bonham, when he was seventeen years old, sid Brother Thomas. "No one expected me to be a preacher, no one in our family had heen in the ministry. I was too shy to speak in public, and I had an inferiority complex."

His father said, "Fred, if you are going to be a preacher, be a good one." And, he has tried to follow his father's admonition.

The first church he pastored was the Philidelphia Baptist, a rural church, southeast of Bonham. It was a one room auditorium with curtains dividing the class rooms. They had open assembly and Fred led the singing. He had announced a hymn when a lady came down to about the third row. She had made the turn into the pew, when her underwear fell down. She kept her eyes glued on the preacher, but very quietly picked up the fallen garment and put it in her purse.

Fred entered the Decater Baptist Church in the fall of 1942, and was married to Effie Hawkins of Decater, in September of 1943. The following March, he enlisted in the Navy as a signalman 2nd class, and served until January, 1946. He was aboard a troop transport ship on the Pacific Ocean and saw many of the Marshall Islands.

He was at Okinawa and Iwo Jima, and saw some of the bloodiest fighting. On September 2, 1945, he was in Tokyo with the first ships that went in at the close of the war to liberate some of the POWs.

Following his term in the Navy, Fred went back to Decater College for a year, transferred to Austin College at Shuman, and received his degree at East Texas University at Commerce. He worked on his Masters there. He also attended Southwestern Seminary at Ft. Worth.

Returning from the service, Fred pastored a church at Trenton in East Texas, and it was there that the most unusual experiences of his ministry occured. He pastored this church twice. He had accepted a call to Newelton, LA., and had been gone a week, when the church at Trenton burned. The people asked him to come back and help them in a building program.

The night the church voted to recall him there were 140 Baptists present and two Methodists, they also asked for the privilege of voting and Fred Thomas received 142 votes for recall. He says this is the first time in history, to his knowledge, that the Baptists let the Methodists help them call a preacher.


While the men were digging the foundation they unearthed many worms, about a foot long and thick as your finger. They pitched these worms in a can and planned to use them for fish bait. A reporter came out from the city and put his story in a conspicious place in the newspaper. The Associated Press and the United Press picked it up and because of the publicity the church heard from 38 states. They got some donations and also advice about what to do with the worms. A man from Kansas wrote an open letter to the newspaper. He suggested the pastor let the members have the worms to go fishing, with the first fish being given to the church and 10% thereafter.

One member of the church was a kleptomaniac. Bro. THomas had been helpful during her husband's illness and death. During a revival she invited him and the evangelist to have dinner with her. For dessert she served "cornbread pie", her husband's favorit. It was a beautifulpie, mush topped with meringue, and out of courtesy Fred ate some and complimented it. The next day she brought a pie to the house. He and Effie didn't know what to do. They couldn't put it in the garbage, for it wasn't in covered cans at that time, and with her habits they were afraid she would find it. So, in the dead of night he buried that pie.

From East Texas the Thomases went to the Plains where he pastored churches at Whitharral, and Lovington, N.M., before going to Morton. He stayed there for 91/2 years and the church gave him a trip to the Holy Land in 1961. He traveled with a group, they were gone 34 days and covered 13 countries. With this and his naval travels, Bro. Thomas has been almost around the world. From all his experiences he is grateful to be an American.

From Morton the Thomases went to Asperment, then Rotan and to Winters in 1977. They have a son, Freddy of Lubbock and a daughter, Mrs. Ronnie Floyd of Palacios, and one grandson, Joshua Thomas Floyd.

Brother Thomas has seen many changes through his years in the pastorate, but Christ has been sufficient and will always remain so. The hope of the world lies in the strength of the Church of Jesus Christ. It will have to be the church, God's only instrument.



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



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Jerry Lackey's Country Folk

I zipped around the block from my office the other day and selected a pretty little Christmas tree for the lobby of Lackey Communications. Secretary Phyllis Harrison, decorated the Scotch pine and the spirit of the holiday season began to take effect on the office

My tree search took all of five minutes, certainly much different from the old days when we climbed all over hills and valleys for the right shaped cedar tree. As a boy, I usually spotted the ideal tree from horseback riding on some draw, several months before. But when it came time to ax the tree, I forgot where the tree was growing.

One year, when I remembered the perfect tree, I got there to cut it down and it was all brown and appeared to be dying. It has taken 30 years to find a reason for

Roger O. (Jake) Landers, Jr. a range specialist for Texas A & M University System, and a native of Menard, was visiting in my office and we were talking about trees.


"This time of year, or a bit earlier, some of the cedar trees turn rusty brown, sometimes it looks like they are dying," explained Jake. "This is the male tree with millions of tiny cones which are releasing billions of microspores (pollen) which are pollinating female trees for next year's berries."

"Hit a male cedar branch and it will pollinate all over you," continued Landers. "Some people are very allergic to breathing cedar pollen. The cones fall off by Christmas and the plants are bright green again."

We have two species of cedar, Juniperus pinchtree and Juniperus ashei. The first is usually called redberry juniper. The berries are rusty brown and so abundant this year that some female trees look brown from a distance. Jake says he has also heard it called white cedar because of the light color of its wood. It is not as good for fence posts or stays, as heartwood cedar...Bob Nickel at Twin Mountain Supply in San Angelo can give you details on that fact.

Redberry will sprout when cut off at ground level, but blueberry won't. Redberry is more sensitive to picloran than blueberry. Seedlings of both species are easily controlled by prescribed burning.

Well, we sort of got away from finding the right tree, but I learned a lot from my chat with Jake. May you find the perfect tree to make your home a perfect Christmas this year!

resident dies in accident

A. R. Wetsel, 73, a retired Abilene barber, was killed Wednesday night in a three-vehicle accident in Early.

The accident occurred about 9:40 p.m. at the intersection of Early boulevard and U.S. 67-183, with Wetsel suffering massive head and chest injuries when his westbound car collided head-on with another ve-

Wetsel's car apparently jumped a traffic median and veered into the eastbound lane.

Services for Wetsel were at 3:30 p.m. Friday at North's Funeral Home in Abilene with Larry Wishard, Church of Christ minister, officiating. Burial was in Elmwood Memorial Park in Abilene.

Former Wingate Safety precautions for **Christmas decorations**

Stockings should be hung by the chimney with care - and so should a lot of other things at Christmas to avoid a holiday tragedy.

'In homes with fireplaces, don't hang decorations of tinsel, Christmas cards or tree branches from the mantel where they could become ignited," warns Harold Ray, Director of the Product Safety Division of the Texas Department of Health.

"And once those presents under the tree are opened, gather up all the wrappings and remove them from the home. Many colored gift wrapping papers contain lead and sometimes chromium, copper and zinc. These materials can cause toxic fumes if burned in the fireplace and can be harmful to children if they

chew on them.' Ray has other holiday safety tips. In selecting a natural tree, he says, the needles should be hard to pull from the branches, and they shouldn't break

when bent. "Bounce the tree hard against the ground and you won't get a shower of needles if the tree is

fresh," he said. Christmas trees should be placed in a base which holds water and this should be checked regularly. Before mounting the tree, cut about two inches off the trunk to allow it to better absorb the water.

In selecting lights, check for the Underwriters' Laboratories "UL" label. On strings of lights, make certain all the connections are tight and that there are no frayed or bare wires that could short circuit and cause a

When away from home, or when you go to bed, turn off all the Christmas lights. Never use ordinary Christmas lights on a metal tree, because

of a shock. If you have little children who pop things in their mouths, avoid trimming the tree with small or shiny ornaments like tinsel, icicles or tiny lights that may look good enough to eat.




