## Extensive damage from Sunday tornado

Winters recorded the first tor
nado of the 1982 season in th nado of the 1982 season in the ing when a twister blazed a trail stretching from just west of Nor ton to northeast of Goldsboro in Coleman County. The tornado left at least seven persons injured and many millions of dollars in damage along it's trail of more than 4
miles.

Winters just before 2 a.m. Sunday destroying the Alvin Nitsch home just south of the city, two shop
buildings and the office build in buildings and the office building
owned by Winters Welding and the new building owned by Winter Oilfield Supply before moving nor theasterly to the Albert Brown home east of Winters and the Bud Davis home a bit further east. Before finally lifting back into
the clouds, the twister left its mark in Callahan County near Olin and in Eastland County near Pioneer. In Winters, the first indication of the storm was a call for an am bulance to respond to a reported major auto accident on Highway 83

A Hero of the Alamo The second subject of the Texas Heroes exhibit at
the Winters State Bank recently was the Battle for In dependence. James Bowie is chosen by the artist as the
sole representative of this period as he was the only sole representative of this period as he was the only
one among the heroes of the Alamo who had spent more than half a dozen years in Texas.
Having killed his opponent in a duel with his knife when his pistol failed him, James Bowie established
the legend of the Bowie knife. the legend of the Bowie knife.
Rangers in 1830, during the following 5 years he commanded a group of volunteers who skirmished with the Indians and in 1835 he helped drive the Mexicans
under General Cos from San Antonio. under General Cos from San Antonio elected him their commander, Bowie brought Sam Houston's orders to demolish the Alamo and abandon it, but Bowie wrote, "Colonel Neill and myself have come to a solemn resolution that we will die in these
ditches rather than give it up to the enemy ditches rather than give it up to the enemy," and
Travis agreed with this resolution when he took com-
mand.
Helpless from illness, with his command turned over to Travis, Bowie was carried into a small room adjoin-
ing the Chapel of the Alamo, where he perished with other defenders of the Alamo. His courage and bravery were unquestioped, and when she was told of his death. Bowie's mother said, ' $I l l$ wager no wounds were found in his back."

Bowie had his father's build, 6 feet and 180 pounds, his grandfather's reddish-brown hair, and his mother's fair complexion and inteligence. He was striking in

Born May 19, 1795, Bowie moved to the family's

he learned to rope and ride alligators with his young Cajun friends. He spoke French, Spanish and English, and was at home in any of the three. Brave, generous, scornful of deceit, and altogether daring, he was

Pest management $\mathbf{p}$
outlined for pecans

| Producing a good pecan crop depends a lot on the type of pest management program that you follow, says Allen E. Turner, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A\&M University System. <br> The key point is to spray only when you need to, but there are a number of critical times during the season when spraying is important. <br> Turner lists nine oppor tunities for spraying during the season, depending on the area of the state: <br> 1. Dormant stage - apply dormant oil for scale insects. <br> 2. Bud break - apply a fungicide in areas of 30 or more inches of rainfall and include zinc. <br> 3. Pre-pollination - apply an inseticide plus zinc. <br> 4. Casebearers - apply an insecticide plus zinc. <br> 5. Second first genera tion casebearers - apply <br> 6. Second generation casebearers - apply an <br> ban areas. <br> Though Reye's Syndrome has no single method of treatment, constant attention to the ner vous, blood and respiratory systems is essential. Survival rates now exceed 80 percent with early diagnosis, although up to 10 percent of the survivors suffer brain damage. In infants under 1 year old, 40 to 50 percent receive brain damage. | insecticide plus zinc. <br> 7. Water stage - apply a fungicide in areas of 30 or more inches of rainfall. <br> 8. Shuckworms and weevils - apply an insec ticide 14 days after the water stage. <br> 9. Shuckworms and weevils - make a second insecticide application if these pests are heavy. <br> It's important to apply zinc at least three times between the bud-break stage and before the water stage, says the agent. Zinc is critical to the growth of the pecan tree and the crop it supports. <br> Since the 1982 pecan crop will likely be light because it's the alternate or "off" year, pest management is even more critical to protect this light crop, emphasizes Turner. <br> If you do cut back on spray treatments, monitor your pest situa tion closely so that you know what's happening, adds Turner. You may be able to skip a spray or two, but sooner or later you're going to suffer a pest problem unless you monitor your crop and spray when needed. <br> Of course, it's better not to spray if you can avoid it. Cutting back on pesticides saves you money, reduces your exposure to various chemicals, and cuts down on overuse which could eventually lead to pest resistance. |
