Tax refund checks showing interest

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Monday mailed the state's first tax refund checks paying taxpayers

the same rate of interest as the state charges for delinquent taxes.

"For the first time, the state and the taxpayer get the same interest on overpayments and delinquent taxes-10 per cent," Bullock said.

Before the Legislature set the 10 per cent rate last year, taxpayers were charged seven per cent on delinquent taxes but received only

six per cent on protestes payments and no interest on overpayments, Bullock explained.

The higher interest rate on overpayments will cause an estimated

\$28 million to be paid taxpayers over the next four fiscal years, Bullock said. Estimates attached to Senate Bill 196, which raised both delinquent and overpayment interest rates, projected \$694,000

will be paid taxpayers in interest during the current state fiscal year; \$3.8 million in fiscal 1983; \$6.3 million in 1984; \$8.3 million in 1985 and \$9.4 million in 1986.

Future refund payments will be processed and mailed daily by the Comptroller.

Samuel Joseph Dela Rosa of Coleman in both legs and occurred at the A-1 Motel just south of Winters. Wilson said the shooting was apparently the result of a

domestic disturbance.

Dela Rosa was wounded only slightly in the left leg by a bullet fired apparently from a .22 cal. magnum derringer. After the bullet passed through Dela Rosa's left leg, it entered his right leg, below the knee, and lodged in his

Dela Rosa was treated at North Runnels Hospital for the gunshot

Sheriff's officers said that the aggravated assault charge against Cantwell would be presented to the next session of the Grand Jury.

Head-on south of Winters injures eight

Driving while intoxicated charges were filed over the weekend against a Winters man in connection with a two car head-on collision about 10:30 p.m. Friday between Winters and Ballinger on U.S. Highway 83.

Eight persons, all passengers in one of the cars involved, escaped serious injuries in the crash and the driver and lone occupant of the other vehicle received serious injuries.

According to investigating Highway Patrol Trooper Scott Warren, a 1980 Chevrolet Monza drived by Ronald Wade Cavanaugh of Winters, ran a stop sign before turning north-bound in the southbound lane on U.S. 83 and crashed into a 1976 Oldsmobile driven by Johnny Edward Kraatz of Winters.


All the injured were taken to Ballinger Memorial Hospital by ambulance. The injured were identified by Trooper Warren as Cavanaugh and Kraatz, drivers of the two cars involved, and passengers James Tinney, Sereda Tinney, and Gregory Wilkerson all of Ballinger and Dorothy Plumley, Kathy Plumley, Edward Horton and Theresa Willey of Winters.

With the exception of Cavanaugh, Warren said, all the injuries were mostly minor.

The highway patrol trooper said that charges of driving while intoxicated were filed against Ronald Wade Cavanaugh in connection with the accident.

Volunteer Fire Department were called to the crash scene to use the "Jaws of Life" equipment to free one of the drivers from his vehicle. The accident was investigated by Trooper Warren who was assisted by Runnels County Sheriff's officers, Winters Police officers, and Ballinger Police officers.

Five Winters residents were charged in Ballinger over the week end in connection with a stabbing incident at a Ballinger truck stop.

Sheriff's officers said the knifing climaxed a disturbance that occurred on the truck stop parking lot and left a 19 year old Ballinger youth hospitalized with knife wounds to the abdomen. The injured youth was identified as Keith Fisher.

Those arrested were charged with aggravated assault and their bonds were set at \$5,000 each. Named in the charges were: Joe Dela Rosa; Andrea Dela Rosa; Richard Cavanaugh; Margarito Rocha; and Edward Alejandro, all of Winters.

By late Tuesday all five persons charged in the incident had been released on bonds.

A 21-year-old Ballinger man was arrested late Monday in connection with a hit and run accident early Sunday on Highway 83 about five miles north of Winters.

Officers said that Remundo Luna, of Ballinger, was taken into custody after Ballinger officers received a tip from a resident of that city that a vehicle had been seen in Ballinger that was being sought in connection with the acci-

dent. Highway Patrol Trooper Scott Warren said that a family travelling through the county about 1:45 a.m Sunday met a vehicle travelling on the wrong side of the highway. Warren said that Nancy Casey was driving a 1979 Chevrolet LUV pickup following her husband toward Abilene from Winters when they met the hit and

run auto. Trooper Warren said the woman's husband narrowly avoided colliding with the car and Mrs. Casey only sideswiped the car. Mrs. Casey, who is in her seventh month of pregnancy, was accompanied by four children who were riding in a camper on the pickup. Warren credited the woman's alertness and prompt evasive driving for avoiding injury or even death in the accident.

Remundo Luna was taken into custody late Monday by Highway Patrol Troopers and was charged with driving on the wrong side of the roadway and with failure to report an accident in Justice of the Peace J.C. Hodnett's court. Luna was released from custody Tuesday after posting bonds and paying

Poe's Corner

County Structures in State Directory The top priority of the Texas Heritage Project this year is to publish a booklet of restaurants, hotels and theatres located in historical structures, at least 50

When published, this state directory will include four Runnels County buildings that are still in use and in good repair. They include the Miles Opera House, the Texas Grill at Ballinger, the Wingate Cafe and the Rock Hotel in Winters.

The Opera House on 2nd and Robinson Street in Miles will be listed as a theatre. It was built by Joe Thiele in 1904. The lower floor provided space for the bank, post office and telephone exchange. The second floor served for public, political and social gatherings, and theatrical performances were staged here.

The native stone building has been under restoration for the past seven years by the Miles Preservation Authority. Mrs. A. T. Granzin directs this work and says that the refurbishing of the lower floor has been completed and this year the second story will be finish-

The upstairs auditorium, which holds 200 people, will be open to the public for all sorts of entertainment. Velvet curtains for the stage have been acquired and old fashioned window shades have been ordered, lace panels and carpets will be added. There will also be a museum room, conference stand and concession stand in the upstairs space.

The existing bank on the lower floor is being restored to its original furnishings. The Senior Citizens occupy part of the building and they receive special rates on the twice a week meals that are served for everyone. The remaining outside work to be done includes cleaning the stone, painted silver by someone, and adding an awning.

This building had many visitors last year and has already revitalized Miles.

The Texas Grill

The Texas Grill on Hutchings Avenue in Ballinger is also on Highways 83 and 67, and receives many inquiries from visitors about the Noyes Monument across the street. This cafe is in a very strategic loca-

The building, erected in 1910, is the last native stone structure to be built downtown - It remains in its original state and was the A. J. Zappe saloon until 1911. It has been a cafe since.

Wingate Cafe The Wingate Cafe is in a building that was erected sometime before 1930 by T. R. Rowland, and was originally a post office for about 10 to 15 years. It was then used as a grocery store run by Tom Ferguson and J. B. Moore for a time, and became a storage room for several years.

In 1972, Mr. Galloway put in the original cafe. The large cement building was repainted and restored. John Ibarra has been operating the cafe for about the last year and has converted it into a Mexican style with and her mother-and Spanish dancers and other scenes painted on the walls. father-in-law, Mr. and There is an old vault in the northwest corner of the building taken out of a bank that burned in 1914. The post office was originally in a bank.

Mr. Ibarra serves good Mexican food as well as hamburgers and other fare. He already has many visitors from other towns.

The Rock Hotel

With the recent purchase of the Rock Hotel by Bob Wadsworth of Ballinger who plans to continue running it as a hotel, Winters is assured of having a historic building listed in the state directory.

The Abilene and Southern Railroad Company built a railroad to Winters in 1909. And the station was a block from the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Heath who had moved from East Texas to Winters in 1905. Here Heath ran a general merchandise store with Ira Beard.

Mrs. Heath was an industrious woman and since they owned a block of land near the railroad, she conceived the idea of building and operating a hotel on the

The hotel was two stories high and because it was built of native stone it was called the Rock Hotel. It was built in front of the Heath home so that the house could be used for overflow guests. Due to Mrs. Heath's wonderful cooking there was usually a full house, with the extra guests staying in the home.

In 1912, the Heath's sold their hotel and store and moved to Ballinger. H. L. Alexander bought the hotel. He died in 1918, but the family retained possession until it was sold to Mr. and Mrs. Marvin Pumphrey in 1944. They sold to Beatrice Collins in 1973, who in turn sold to Mrs. Frazier. The present owner stayed only a few months, and then sold to Mr. Wadsworth.





Good general rains over West Central Texas last week and weekend postponed a drought that appeared almost inevitable by mid-May.

From San Angelo's 2 inches to 3 inches recorded in the Abilene area, good moisture fell in a general way in between. John Scott Lanford said up to 3 inches fell in and around Abilene.

The 1.80 inches at Paint Rock stopped shearing operations on Edgar Hutcheson's ranch. "We would gladly delay shearing a few days for a rain," he smiled.

T. A. Jarrett of Del Rio commented the rains came "just in time to save us a drought going into summer and just in time to keep from going back to supplemental feeding."

Hawley Pfluger of Eden recorded 2.70 inches of rain. "The rainfall increased from the hills and was heavier toward town," he said. "And that was good because of all the small grain crops in the valley." Many of the stock farmers have planted maize and the timing of the moisture was just what was needed to put the seed.

In Southwest Texas, Pat Rose ranches measured good moisture. Three inches fell in the Brackettville area. At least an inch was recorded south of Brackettville. From 1 inch to 11/2 inches fell throughout the Sanderson country.

Frank Weed says the rains spread right into Uvalde. "It was just great," he smiled. "Now, we need some warm weather to grow some grass and another good rain in about a week!"

Toots Hutto said good rains graced the Carta Valley region south of Sonora. In the 25 years this writer has been writing a column, I can't remember when Carta Valley didn't get a rain!

Clinton Hodges remarked: "All is well now around Sterling City." He agrees with Frank Weed, "need another good rain in a week or so."

That kind of scheduling would probably satisfy just about every rancher or farmer in West Texas.






