City accepts bids for fuel, park

The Winters City Council, in a called meeting last week, approved the bid submitted by the Strain Construction Company for the work on a proposed park to be built at the new lake and accepted a bid from Bob Loyd LP Gas for the bulk purchase of fuel for city vehicles.

City Administrator Glenn Brown said that the bid submitted by Strain for the park totalled \$48,362 and included the construction of the boat ramp that is also planned for the lake.

Of the total cost of \$48,362, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will fund \$16,100 through grant money. The remainder of the cost, \$32,262, will come from city funds.

Brown said that because the contractor is already on the site constructing the dam for the new lake and will not have to move in equipment the cost is considerably less.

The plans for the park have been prepared by the engineering of HDR of Austin, who also took care of the planning for the new lake, and have already been submitted to the state and approved.

The city administrator said that the contract for the park does not include tables or cement pads for tables. Those will be built later at additional expense to the city.

In other action the council approved an agreement with Bob Loyd, the Shell distributor, for the bulk purchase of fuel for the city vehicles. The purchasing program was begun about one year ago and has saved the city over \$3,000.

As an information item, the council was told that the Winters School District had withdrawn its request for the Community Center for classroom space next fall. School officials said that an agreement has been reached with the Mt. Carmel Catholic Church for the use of space at that church. The space was needed by the schools to house classes while the renovation program is being completed after the start of school next fall.

School to dismiss classes early Thursday

Classes will be dismissed at 2:30 p.m., Thursday, May 27 for the summer at Winters Independent Schools. Buses will run at that time, according to spokesmen from the school.

Positive rabies cases diagnosed in Ballinger

Two positive cases of rabid animals, one fox and one skunk, have been diagnosed in South Ballinger this past week. All Runnels County citizens are encouraged to be on the look out for any wild or domestic animals that are reacting in an abnormal manner. Any wild animal which acts "tame" is especially suspicious. Parents should warn children not to approach any animal, and certainly not to come in contact with them.

All pets, especially cats and dogs, should be vaccinated, and all vaccinations kept up-to-date. Anyone having questions should get in touch with a local veterinarian.

Texas Family Land Heritage registration open May 15-Aug. 15

"This year we're hoping to surpass the 1,500 mark in the total number of Texas properties registered in our Family Land Heritage Program," Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown said recently.

"And we certainly hope individuals interested in history or agriculture in Runnels County will help us by bringing as many qualified applicants into the program as possible."

"Rankin Pace, Runnels County Historical Commission chairperson and Runnels County Judge Bill Stultz, will be working with us on the program," Brown said.

Since 1974, the program has honored 1,443 Texas properties.

The Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) is entering its eighth year in sponsoring the program which honors "those families that have persevered for a century or more in the cultivation and production of food and fiber," Brown said. "Undoubtedly, these families, with their unflinching determination have been the backbone of Texas agriculture."

The registration period will extend from May 15 to August 15.

Those who qualify are honored in state ceremonies and receive a certificate and a copy of the Family Land Heritage Registry. The publication has a brief history of each farm or ranch and includes old photographs of the families and homes.

Basic requirements include the following: Continuous agricultural production on the farm/ranch for 100 years, land ownership within the family, complete operation or supervision of the farm/ranch production by family members who are Texas residents and a size of 10

acres or more with agricultural sales of \$50 or more a year, or if

less than 10 acres, sales of at least \$250 a year. County judges must approve all applications.

Persons who meet the basic qualifications and wish to enter can obtain an application from the county judge, county Historical Commission chairperson, the nearest TDA district office, or by writing to Commissioner Reagan V. Brown, Texas Department of Agriculture, P.O. Box 12847, Austin, Texas 78711.

Two held in El Paso car theft

Two men, both thought to be from El Paso, are being held in the Runnels County Jail in connection with the recovery of a stolen vehicle.

Deputy Sheriff Odell Denton and Highway Patrol Trooper Tom Barkley took Ronald Rodola and

Walter Everman into custody at a Ballinger truck stop after learning the car the men were in was reported to be stolen.

Denton said that he was first notified about two men attempting to sell some women's clothes, a gun, and other expensive articles to a man just leaving the jail following visiting hours. The two were located at the truck stop and were placed under arrest.

Denton said that both men are facing charges of unauthorized use of a motor vehicle and Rodola is facing additional charges of no driver license. The two were charged before Peace Justice Wilburn Davis and are being held in lieu of bond.

Petition to legalize bingo completed in Runnels County

Runnels County Clerk Linda Bruchmiller said Tuesday that a petition calling for special election to legalize bingo was presented to her office for certification Tuesday morning.

The county clerk said the area requesting the bingo election was around Miles.

After the petition is certified by the clerks office it will be presented to the Commissioners Court who in turn will call an election for August 14, the last date this year that such an election can be held.

Miss Bruchmiller said that if persons in other areas of Runnels County are considering such a petition, they should contact her office as soon as possible. She said that in order for any other local option bingo elections to be called in the county this year the completed petitions should be in her office no later than the end of June.

The county clerk emphasized that unless an election is called and the bingo issue is approved by the

voters, any bingo game is illegal. State Comptroller Bob Bullock has vowed to enforce the state laws concerning the operation of bingo games for charitable or non-profit organizations.

Swimming pool to open Memorial day

The Winters Municipal Swimming Pool will open on Memorial Day, May 31, according to City Administrator Glenn Brown.

Brown said that work has been underway for several weeks getting the pool ready for the summer season. The pool has received a new coat of paint and new parts for one of the pumps were ordered recently.

Brown said that Tom Roach, a Junior High School coach will manage the pool this summer.

The hours of operation for the pool and rules and regulations governing the pool operation will be about the same as last year according to the city administrator.

Winters High School Principal, Mike Grantham will make the presentation of special awards and Superintendent T.D. Lancaster

will certify the candidates for graduation.

Gene Wheat, President of the Board of Education will make the presentation of Diplomas to officially finalize the completion of years of study by the graduates.

The ceremonies will be closed with the Benediction by Blizzard Band President Donnie Daily.

Special music for the graduation exercises will be furnished by the Blizzard Band.

School officials say that in the event of rain or inclement weather the ceremonies will be moved to the High School Auditorium due to both gymnasiums being renovated.

Seating in the auditorium will be restricted and the graduates will be given six tickets for seats that will be reserved for families.

Winters rodeo, parade slated for June 25-26

The annual Winters Rodeo will this year be produced by the Terry Walls Rodeo Company of Stephenville, and is planned for Friday, June 25 and Saturday, June 26. The rodeo will be held at the Winters Rodeo Grounds north of Winters. In conjunction with the rodeo, a parade will be held at 5 p.m. Saturday.

The Terry Walls Rodeo Company is headquartered out of Stephenville, and has been producing rodeos in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico for the past 11 years. The rodeo company was formed when Terry and Delia Walls built an indoor arena in Stephenville with the primary idea of having ropings, barrel races, cuttings, etc.; but, with Tarleton College located there, the need soon arose for bucking stock. Terry is a former collegiate champion himself in calf roping and steer wrestling, but was unfamiliar with bucking horses and bulls. As he acquired more stock, it became so challenging that in 1973, they sold the arena and went into producing rodeos for other cities on a full-time basis.

Terry is one of a few rodeo producers involved in a scientific breeding program to raise and develop his own bucking stock. Many of the outstanding bucking horses are the result of careful selection of the best bucking mares crossed on the herd sire, Rattler, a massive draft-horse type who is the son of the famous bucking horse, Custer. Many of the bulls got their start as roping calves.

The Walls Rodeo Company is a family business. Terry is the pick-up man, Delia is the secretary/bookkeeper, and Schelli, 11, and Trent, 9, can be seen in the arena and behind the chutes helping out. Terry usually enters the team roping and steer wrestling; Schelli, the barrel race; and Trent

ropes at the junior rodeos. Their main goal is to produce a fast-paced colorful rodeo that contestants and spectators can understand and enjoy while promoting the nation's number one sport - Rodeo!

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Poe's Corner

Cactus Jack & Others

The seventh poster in the exhibit of Texas Heroes at the Winters State Bank portrayed one of our favorite Texans well-known all over the United States: John Nance Garner.

Called "Cactus Jack" by Nicholas Longworth, "Mr. Common Sense" by President Franklin Roosevelt, "The Sage of Uvalde" by fellow Texans, and a "labor-baiting, whiskey-drinking, poker-playing, evil old man" by John L. Lewis, Garner was a controversial, colorful and influential politician.

In Washington for 39 years, he presided in Congress for 10 consecutive years, two years as Speaker of the House and eight as U.S. Vice President. From 1895 until 1941, he held public office continuously, undefeated at the polls.

Blunt, plain-spoken Garner was influential as no vice president has been since Jefferson. And as Speaker of the House dexterous as Henry Clay. A friend of President Theodore Roosevelt and Nicholas Longworth and confidential liaison between the House and President Wilson, he was Franklin Roosevelt's vice president for two terms. Fighting income tax preference for the rich and extravagance in Congress, he said, "To my knowledge, I have not deceived a man or woman in my life and never made a promise I didn't think I could keep."

Garner State Park and Garner Memorial Museum commemorates his memory.

It was my pleasure to visit the Garner Museum in Uvalde in October of 1978. The former vice president gave the two-story red brick home in its setting of stately Texas live-oak trees to the city for a library and museum as a memorial of his wife who was his constant advisor until her death in 1948.

He lived the balance of his life in the small cottage directly behind the building where he continued greeting friends from over the world until his death in 1967, when he was almost 99 years old.

The museum is filled with mementoes of happy associations. A display of more than one hundred gavels presented to Garner are arranged in one room.

Born in Clarksville in 1868, Garner moved to Uvalde when 22 years of age because of ill health. He formed a law partnership with Tully Fuller in an unpainted office. Four years later he was chosen Judge of Uvalde County.

In 1895, Garner met and married Mariette Rheiner, daughter of a rancher. They had one son, Tully, named for the law partner. Tully died the year after his father. His wife continues to live in Amarillo.

When John Nance Garner left Washington in 1941, he was the acknowledged foremost parliamentary authority of the nation. He held an international record of presiding over a parliamentary body for ten consecutive years, a record that is still unequalled.

Back in Texas, Garner gave attention to his banks, ranches and built additional property. His heart had always been in Texas: he had never owned a home in Washington, living in hotels during sessions of Congress. He refused to give formal interviews and said, "Too many people give too many interviews on too many subjects."

Senator John Hill Reagan

A native of Tennessee, Reagan reached Texas in 1839 where he surveyed Texas' public lands, studied law, was admitted to the bar and served in Congress from 1857 to 1861 as Postmaster General of the Confederacy, he, along with President Jefferson Davis, was made a war prisoner by the United States for several months. When released, he returned to his farm near Palestine and in 1875 was again sent to Congress. Elected U.S. Senator in 1873, Reagan resigned to become the first chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission for a lesser salary. He proved his patriotism by sacrificing personal pleasure to the call of his state.

Because Reagan was unaffected, plain, modest, of strong character and noble purpose and accepted the results of the right whatever they might be, Texans called him "The Great Commoner." He died at his country home in 1905 and was buried at Palestine with every civil and military honor. Reagan County Texas established in 1903, was named for Senator John H. Reagan.

Norris Wright Cuney

The leader of the Texas Republican Party after the Civil War and the most influential negro in Texas, Norris Cuney used his influence for the cause of human rights. Studying law in Galveston, he became a party worker, was made sergeant at arms for the Texas House of Representatives in 1870, appointed to the Galveston School Board in 1871, and designated a federal customs inspector in 1872.

Cuney served as first Grand Master of the Prince Hall Masonic Grand Lodge in 1874, and later became secretary of the Republican State Executive Committee. Defeated for Mayor in 1875 and for the legislature a year later, Cuney was elected a City Commissioner in 1882. He was chosen as Republican National Committeeman from Texas in 1884 and in 1888 was appointed customs-collector at Galveston, then the highest federal post in the state.

Successful in private business, he established a stevedoring firm that gave jobs to black men in a field previously monopolized by whites, and spent his last years in a valiant fight against the legislature's attempts to preserve segregation as a way of life.

"Los Amigos" mariachi band will be one of the featured musical entertainers at Eden's "Festival 100" centennial birthday celebration on June 12. In the finest Latin American tradition, Los Amigos are an all stringed instrument group, musica rondalla.

Eden's three-day celebration will actually start the night of June 11 with the crowning of Eden royalty in a queens' pageant and over-the-years fashion show moderated by San Angelo TV personality Pat Attebery and Edenite Mike Riley. Saturday, June 12, begins

with a parade at 11 a.m., continuous musical entertainment beginning at noon (including Los Amigos) and contests of skill and cunning such as armadillo racing, cowchip tossing, tobacco spitting, lying, beard growing, horseshoe and washer pitching. A country fair, plus food and craft booths will wind-down as the sun sets on the Sahawe Indian Dancers' village and the lights come on for the barbecue supper, cake sale and street dance.

Sunday afternoon, June 13, there will be a Play Day at the park with barrel racing, poles, flags, and goat hair-pulling for kids age 18 and under.

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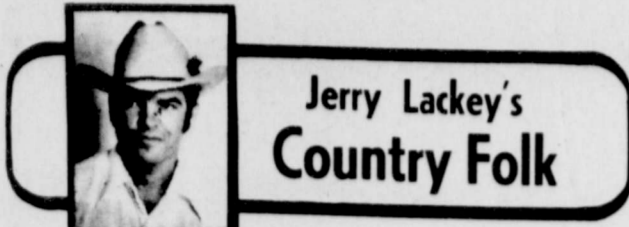
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Jerry Lackey's Country Folk

After a number of tries, moisture in one form or another has finally arrived at just about every point in West Texas but Stiles in Reagan County.

Boze Hartgrove, who ranches in the Stiles country, believes if Noah had constructed his boat there, it would never have seen water! "During the drought of the 1950s, we couldn't tell the difference," said Hartgrove.

Well, it's not quite that bad. At least most parts of that West Texas terrain are broken up with pump-jacks every few yards or miles, which give good shade to a number of livestock.

Someone in Ballinger the other night told another unusually heavy broomweed crop in the making in parts where it has rained. My first instinct was to check on my friends in Sterling County. In the past 15 or 20 years when there was an outcrop of broomweeds in Concho County or the Hill Country, they would be as tall and thick as the South Texas bush in Sterling.

Back eight or 10 years ago, Dow Chemical's public relations department called me with the assignment to photograph the weeds in Sterling County. They had plans to develop some kind of eradication for broomweeds. My pictures indicated the weeds were as tall as mesquite trees.

Thinking I had doctored the pictures, Dow sent some folks down from the head office in Michigan to have a look at the broomweeds on the Clinton Hodges ranch and others. The delegation quickly discovered my camera does not lie. I never heard if Dow came up with a chemical either.

Over the years, natives have found there is little that can be done to hold down broomweeds. It seems they are much more prominent in years where the moisture falls at just the right time. This appears to be one of those years. So maybe Stiles will come out the winner after all.

Skipper Duncan, who ranches west of San Angelo, commented the other morning that the weeds this season are most prolific in his well kept conservation pastures. That brings up another subject, somewhat related.

Many of us have watched over the years the transition of Duncan's ranch from miles of condensed mesquite thick to a ranch which could now accidentally be mistaken for a national park. Duncan has practiced good soil conservation management with the clearing of some brush and planting different varieties of grasses.

He has left strips of for game and wildlife. Matter of fact, I can remember when deer and turkey would not be seen further north than the South Concho River at Christoval. Because of Duncan's and others like the Turners at Water Valley and Angelo State University, wildlife is now plentiful all over Tom Green County.

Something else I couldn't help but be delighted about on the Duncan Ranch was the constant observation of electric fencing and fiberglass rod post. He has developed the Savory type high intensity rotational grazing system to beautiful results.

For more than a year, I have worked with Mike Sheehan and Robert Nickel of Twin Mountain Supply Co. here in San Angelo to promote the use of the new electric fencing systems. I remember my days with the sheep and wool growers when the fencing alone would have turned hundreds of coyotes.

Skipper has used electric fencing and sound conservation practices to the utmost degree to not only turn ranching into a profitable profession but protecting and caring for the land and saving it for generations to come. To me, to take something and improve it and leave it better than when you took over is what the good Lord challenges us to do in whatever our assignment is in life.

Pecan nut casebearer moths begin egg-laying in Runnels

It's that time of year again for pecan producers, as the pecan nut casebearer moths start their egg-laying in Runnels County. Since the activities of these moths are erratic, it is best to pick a spray date that will control the most of the casebearer larva. The optimum date for Runnels County appears to be between May 30 and June 4.

Producers need to keep in mind that a rain shower following the spray application will greatly reduce the effectiveness of the spray material. Producers are also encouraged to include zinc in their spray formula to help control rosette problems.

Several insecticides may be used to control these pests. Among the homeowner's casebearer control measures include: Malathion, (4 teaspoons of

Open House planned to show Building Trades Class skills

An Open House is planned Sunday, May 30, from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. at the Robert (Boots) Kraatz home, at 614 N. Fannin. The home, which was built by the Building Trades Class of Winters High School, under the direction of their teacher, James Jones, is a 3 bedroom, 2 bath frame house with a large living room, kitchen-dining room combination, and utility room. The class began construction in early September at the beginning of the 1981-82 school year, and were putting final touches on the home this week.

"Hormone-type Herbicide" regulations for Runnels Co.

Farmers and ranchers in the north and northwestern portion of Runnels County will be in a restricted area in regards to the use of hormone-

type herbicides in 1982. The boundaries of the restricted area have been re-defined for 1982 by the Runnels County Commissioner's Court, and approved by the Texas Department of Agriculture effective January 1, 1982 and read as follows:

That portion of Runnels County beginning on the west county line at the point of intersection with Colorado River, east-southeasterly along the Colorado River to its intersection with U.S. Highway 83, thence north along U.S. Highway 83 to its intersection with FM 382, thence northeasterly along FM 382 to its intersection with FM2647, thence northerly along FM 2647 with its intersection with FM 1770, thence westerly along FM 1770 to the intersection with U.S. 83, thence northerly along U.S. 83 to its intersection with the north county line, thence westerly along the north Runnels County line to the Northwest corner of the county, thence southerly along the west county line to the Colorado River, the point of beginning, is regulated by the Texas Herbicide Law. Persons within the above described regulated area may use regulated herbicides without permit fees between the dates of October 1 and May 24 each year. And further, all spraying of regulated "Hormone-type herbicides" is prohibited between the dates of May 24 and October 1 each year in the regulated portion of the county.

The law continues by stating that these regulations will be in effect until changed by proper hearing.

All Runnels County producers are urged to familiarize themselves with these regulations and abide by them. Persons desiring additional information may contact the County Judge's office or the County Extension office where the map of the restricted areas and copies of the official regulations are available.

The Texas Department of Agriculture is the regulatory authority and any complaint should be directed to this Agency.

Rodeo coming

The annual Winters Rodeo, sponsored by the Winters Rodeo Assn. is scheduled for June 25-26 at the Winters rodeo arena. It will have bucking bulls, horses, clowns, and will feature a parade on Saturday, June 26.

Time to control cattle grubs

The time to control cattle grubs is once again upon us, according to Eddie M. Beene, assistant county extension agent in Runnels County.

In this area, chemicals to control grubs should be applied between May 15 and July 15 with the best control usually resulting from May treatments. Grubs, often called "warbles" or "wolves", cost livestock producers millions of dollars annually. Losses occur due to damaging meat and hides and also by reducing the general efficiency of the animals.

Cattle grubs can be effectively controlled with systemic insecticides — insecticides which when applied to the animal is absorbed into the blood system to provide control of grubs migrating through the animal tissues. These can be applied as spot-ons, pour-ons, sprays or dips.

"If producers are having problems with body ticks on cattle, a spray or dip with Co-Ral or GX-118 (prolate) would be a good choice because control of the ticks, hornflies and grubs could be obtained by a single insecticide, says Beene. If ticks are not a problem, a pour-on like Co-Ral, Warbex, Tiguvon, Prolate or Neguvon or a spot-on formulation like Spotton would be an excellent choice. These will usually give some control of hornflies and lice, also.

The synthetic pyrethroid eartags (Ectrin, Atroban, Guardstar), which are highly effective for hornfly control, can be applied at the same time as grub treatments since these are not systemic in activity.

Confirmed screwworm cases bring warnings by TAHC

Confirmation of additional screwworm cases along the Hidalgo-Starr county line brings this warning from Dr. John W. Holcombe, executive director, Texas Animal Health Commission: Livestock producers in that area should delay, if at all possible, dehorning, branding, or castrating animals. "This is a precautionary measure to prevent the possibility of any undetected screwworms from finding a place on which to lay eggs. Screwworms lay their eggs on open wounds," he explained. If surgery is necessary, treat the wound.

Three confirmed screwworm cases were reported this week within a four-mile area, about 35 miles north of Mission along the Hidalgo-Starr county line. These are the first cases reported in Texas this year.

Two persons arrested in Miles burglary

Meanwhile, down-the-road surveys of ranches in Hidalgo, Starr, Jim Hogg and Brooks counties are being conducted by TAHC field personnel. Producers in Hidalgo, Starr, Jim Hogg or Brooks counties may give screwworm samples to TAHC field personnel who in turn will submit them to the Mission fly lab.

"There is a need for increased submission of samples. Records indicate that screwworm sample submission is running about 60 percent of last year. It is understandable for the let-up, but the confirmed cases in Texas emphasize the need for more suspected cases to be submitted," Dr. Holcombe explained.

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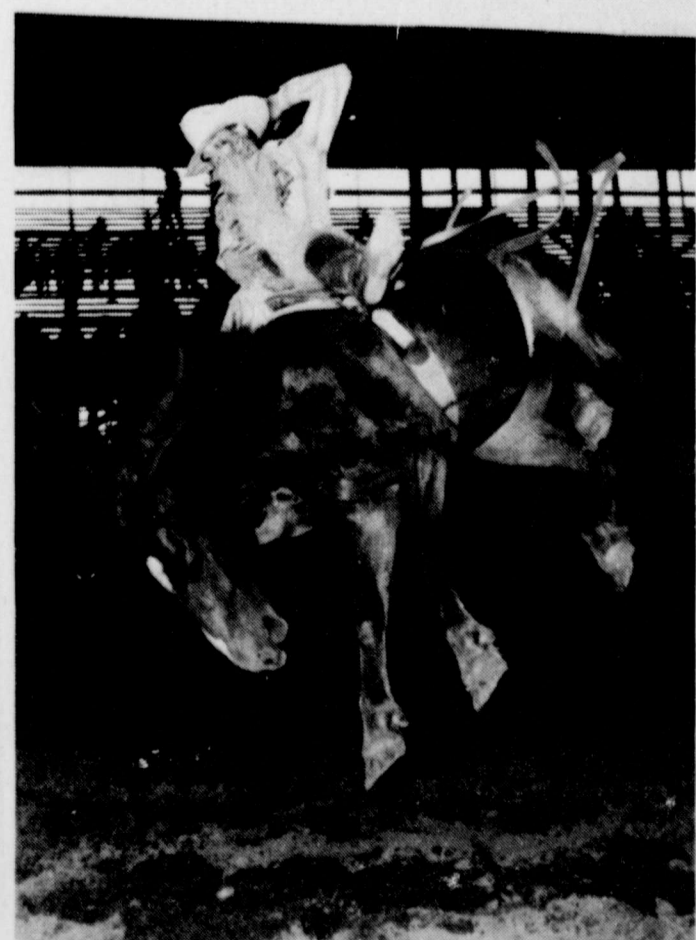
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
