The Stacy Dam project in Run week of the 3rd Court of Appeals, though opponents are expected to take the case to the Texas Supreme Court.
In 1979, the Texas Water Commission granted the Colorado River Municipal Water District a permit to build the dam on the up. per Colorado River. The project, near Ballinger, was to have been ompleted in 1984.

## General Telephone Company's $\$ 110.6$ million rate-hike request

 sillwill be cut to $\$ 49.1$ million if a hearings examiner's report is adopted
next month by the Public Utility Commission.
Released last Wednesday, the eport recommends rates for most cities that are within a few cents of
those that went into effect June 4 as part of GenTel's socalled bond ed rates.
A utility is allowed to institute new rates under bond if the PUC has not reached a final decision on
its rate request within four mon

 is expected to come from customers served by Extended nearby Service-the ability to phone without paying long-distance rates. Currently, the additional cost ofsuch services is figured into one such services is figured into one
monthly charge and spread among all rat
said.
The phone company, however, wants to begin charging separately only those customers who use Ex-
tended Area Service, and commission hearings examiner Jacqueline Holmes has agreed with that con cept.
"Extended Area Service (EAS) costs more to provide and it is
reasonable that those exchanges which do not have EAS should not be required to subsidize those which do," Ms. Holmes wrote in her recommendation.
Depending on the size of the
customer's city, customer's city, residential one-
party rates under the recommendation would range from $\$ 7.60$ to $\$ 8.10$ a month, while one-party business rates would range from $\$ 20.20$ to $\$ 21.40$ a month
On top of that, those cities with Extended Area Service would have from $\$ 1.25$ to $\$ 8.80$ a month for residential customers and $\$ 3.25$ to $\$ 23.25$ per month for businesses. The more phones in nearby cities
or communities that can be reached with a long distance charge, the higher the monthly fee for the Ex-

For some cities that have the Ex ended Area Service and are near large metropolitan areas such as
Houston, the monthly phone line rate could go as high as $\$ 16.90$ for residential customers

## The Texas Supreme Court last week upheld a 1980 decision by the

 Public Utility Commission by the General Telephone Company's rate of return from 14 to 12.72 percent.The PUC justified the change by using an accounting principle com monly called "double leveraging." Double leveraging, essentially,
an accounting theory used by the an accounting theory used by the
commission to reduce a company's rate of return to reflect actual cost of obtaining working capital from a parent company.
In its appeal, General Telephone
claimed the 3rd Court of Appeals made 13 errors in upholding made 13 errors in upholding an
Austin District Court decision and the commission's ruling.
The Supreme Court made no
comment on the phone company comment on the phone company's arguments, but merely noted that it could find no reversib
During the drawn-out legal ba tle, PUC attorneys argued that if General Telephone had been in the position of having to sell stock to the general public, the commission would have allowed the full 14 pe cent rate of return.

## Emergency rules

 concerning LP-ga vehicles adopted by RRCThe Texas Railroad Commission
this week adopted emergency rules to insure that vehicles converted to use LP-gas as fuel are safe. Ex-
isting rules regulating conversions sting rules regulating conversions
were repealed. The new rules become effective immediately. The popularity of LP-gas
vehicles has increased the number of conversions taking place in Texas. Technological advances in
the LP-gas industry made existing rules inadequate to protect the public, according to Hugh Keepers, director of the Liquefied
Petroleum Gas Division. Twenty four independent school districts, for instance, converted their buses to use LP-gas before the emergen-
cy rules were adopted. Existing rules did not take school bus conversions into consideration. According to Keepers, the new rules equal or exceed standards set by the National Fire Protection
Association. In many cases the new Association. In many cases the new
minimum standards for equipment are higher than standards under the old rules.
Emergency rules are effective for 1220 days. During that time, the Commission will publish the rules
in the Texas Register for public in the Texas Register for public
comment so that they can be con comment so that they can be con-
sidered for permanent adoption.

The heart of our foreign policy has always been easy to state.
We ere for peace, first, , oast and always for very simple ereans.
Only in a peeaceful atmoshere - with justice and confidence can America prosper as we have in the past.
But more than a hundred disputes have disturbed the peace
among nations since the end of World War II and today the threa among gations since the end of World War II and today the threat
of nuclear confrotation is ever present. So far, peace has eluded this generation of mankind.
This nation condemns aggession, yet the tide of belligerence

ambitions. We occupy no countries and we have built no walls to lock our. people in. Our commitment to oselfudtetermination,
freedom and peace is the very soul of America. That commitment is as strong today as it ever was.
One of the historical essons of this century is that tyranny cannot be stopped with words alone. That is why we have sought
to renew our strength as a nation while we search for peaceful
solutions to today's problems. We know that men andems. wom of every race and creed can and
must work together for peace. And this nation stands ready to must work together for peace. And this nation stands ready to
take the next steps toward cooperation through verifiale arms
reduction. Arms control agreements are useful in reinforcing peace, but they are not magical. Likewise, we should not confuse
the signing of agreements with hes eoving of probles. Peace will
not come simply by collecting agreements among various nations. Only when they are kept do agreements reitinorcec peace.
Since the end of World War II the United States has been the
leader in esirious disarmament and arms control proposals. We reader in serious disarmament and arms control proposals. We depply commited to those proposals today and to
strengithening the nonproliferation framework. This is essential to international security.
In the early 1970 s. at United States urging, agreements were reached between the United States and the Soviet Union pro-
viding for ceilings on some categories of weapons. They could
