Lake annexation tabled by City Council

The Winters City Council tabled until their next meeting the first step in annexing the new lake. City Administrator Glenn Brown told the council that the legal descriptions of the property involved was still being prepared by the city attorney and asked that the item be tabled until the next regular session.

The proposal to annex the new lake into the city limits would involve annexing the highway right-of-way on State Highway 53 from the east edge of the city limits to include the lake and park.

Brown said that the Department of Highways and Public Transportation had given their approval to the project and with the completion of the property descriptions, the first step can be made.

Such annexation would give the city control of the lake and park

and would allow the enforcement of ordinances at the lake.

Representatives of HDR and Associates met with the council concerning a change order on the lake project and to make a progress report on the project.

Ken Choffal, of the HDR engineering firm, told the council that there is a surplus of funds from the project totaling \$30,000 to \$35,000 and that if the funds were not used on the project would revert back to FmHA.

He recommended the money be used to make some badly needed improvements to the water treatment facility. The improvements suggested included a chemical feed system, a new liquid alum metering pump, electric indicating recorder, and a new fabricated control panel for the plant. Choffal said that all these items could be funded with

the surplus money and would fall within the guidelines for use.

The engineers told the council that the total lake project was 99 percent complete and that the cement had been poured for the transfer pump at the dam on the old lake. They said that the total project would be 100 percent complete by April of this year.

After hearing a report on the proposal on the new wastewater plant, the council gave the go-ahead to get the project ready for bids.

In other action, the council set the date for a public hearing for the requested annexation of property on South Main street. That hearing date will be February 7.

Also approved was the request by the city administrator to advertise for bids for a new pick up to be used by the street department.

The new truck, which will be paid for with revenue sharing funds, will replace a 1976 model pick up. The older truck will not be traded but, will continue in use in the street department.

The council tabled until its next regular meeting a request for a water tap outside the city limits. A request had been made for the water meter to be installed in the Reeves Addition by a resident there.

The council noted that several months ago, a resolution had been passed prohibiting any new water taps outside the city limits. City Administrator Glenn Brown told the council that discussions were

underway with the person who requested the water service and with other persons who live in that addition concerning the need for water and the possibility of annexation. No action was taken on the item other than to table it.

A request for the purchase of a walkie-talkie radio for use by the Winters Fire Department met with no opposition from the council. Brown noted that although the item was not on the agenda for the meeting and the council could not take formal action on the request, he wanted to find if there might be any objection to the purchase. The radio equipment was due to be ordered this week.

City names lake advisory committee

The Winters City Council, meeting in regular session Monday appointed eight persons to serve on a lake regulation advisory committee.

The purpose of the committee will be to present proposed regulations and ordinances to the council concern activities on the new lake.

Named to the committee were Danny Killough, James West, Randall Boles, Jerry Hood, Richard Lett, James Spill, Clay Miller, and Billie Alderman. These committee

members were nominated by members of the city council.

Mayor Lee Colburn said that the first order of business for the committee would be an orientation session to provide the members with necessary background on the lake and other basic information needed to draw up recommendations for rules, regulations, and ordinances for the new lake.

Some suggestions made by the council involved user fees and some type of concession business at the lake.

The first meeting of the committee will coincide with the first council meeting in March.

Commissioners set called meeting

The Runnels County Commissioners Court were to meet in a special called session Thursday at 10 a.m. according to Runnels County Judge Michael Murchison.

Only two items appear on the agenda for the meeting. First to be discussed is the salary for the secretary in the County Attorney's office and second is a discussion of the Sheriff's Department and personnel.

The item of the salary amount for the county attorney's secretary involves a routine plan for the secretary to serve as legal secretary for the county attorney and as legal secretary for the county attorney.

In the past the secretary's salary has been paid jointly by the county and the county attorney's private law practice.

Judge Murchison said the item concerning the Sheriff's Department would most likely be discussed in executive session and that the commissioners are not expected to take any action on the matter.

New animal control officer for city

Winters City Administrator Glenn Brown said Monday that a new animal control officer had been employed by the city.

The new officer is Richard Hawkins. He replaces James Staggs, who has accepted employment with an outside firm.

Hawkins, along with Brown and Police Chief L.C. Foster said that the city's animal control ordinances will be rigidly enforced.

Winters Fire Department elects new officers

New officers were elected for the Winters Volunteer Fire Department in their meeting last week.

The officers included F.J. Malicoat, president; Jack Davis Sr., vice-president; Marvin Bedford, secretary-treasurer; and Mike Meyer, recording secretary.

Other new officers elected in the department were: Johnny Merrill, Fire Chief; Leonard Bowden, first assistant chief; Jack Davis Jr., second assistant chief; Richard Hamilton, captain company 1; Arnold Thormeyer assistant captain company 1; Bob Webb, captain company 2; Ralph Whittenberg assistant captain company 2.

Teresa Davis was named senior sponsor for the department and Melissa Hatler was chosen junior sponsor.

The mascot for the fire department is Eric Joeris, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Joeris.

The fire department sweetheart honors went to Virginia Jones and

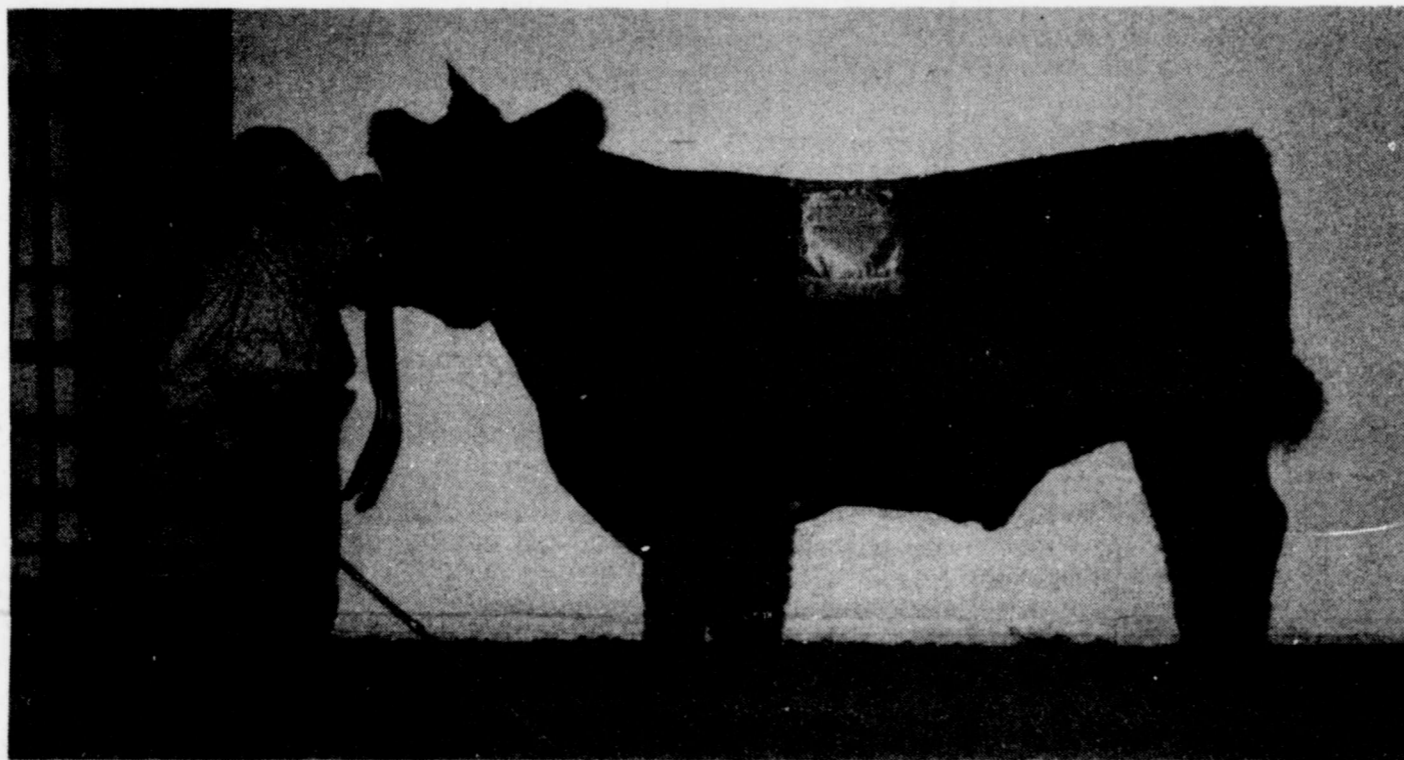

WISD \$2 million lawsuit dropped by irate developer

Members of the Board of Trustees of the Winters Independent School District learned Monday that the law suit filed by an unsuccessful bidder in the school refurbishing project has been dismissed.

The suit seeking almost \$2 million was filed by B & B Developers of Moody, Texas after the school district, acting on advice from their architect, accepted the bid from another construction firm.

School district officials said that

they had not received the official paperwork, but that word of a verbal agreement between attorneys for the school district and those representing the developer was received two days before Christmas.

B & B Developers sought \$200,000 from the Winters School District and \$1.6 million from architect Atmar Atkins after the school board reject the lowest bid in the \$2.2 million refurbishing program here.

The low bid was rejected after board members heard an unfavorable report from Atkins concerning work done by the low bidder.

In accepting a bid other than the lowest, the school board consulted with its legal counsel and followed the steps necessary in selecting the bid deemed most advantageous to the school district. The low bidder was given an opportunity to appear before the board to explain the unfavorable recommendations from other jobs before any bid was accepted.

Only days after the next higher bid was accepted, B & B Developers filed the suit seeking a total of \$1.8 million dollars.

In other business before the school board, Mike Milligan appeared before the trustees to explain that the school district is eligible to participate in the Manpower Program which is funded through the CETA program.

Representatives of General Telephone of the Southwest met with the school board concerning the de-regulation of telephone ser-

vices. In the future, the school will be required to buy, rather than lease, the telephone equipment used in the school plant.

The board took some routine steps on both the old and new gymnasiums and the work being done on the gyms. Even though the work is not complete, both buildings are being used by the school.

The trustees extended the contract of Superintendent Tommy Lancaster for three years, with no changes in the terms of the contract.

In rounding out the routine meeting, the board accepted a bid of \$757 from Charles Grenwelle for a tax lot. Only two bids were received by the board for the property which is described as Lot no. 4, Block 18, of the Southside Addition.

Even though there were fewer entries than in previous years, the participation and quality was better than ever for the Winters Junior Livestock Show.

Show officials noted declines in the number of cattle, swine, and rabbits. The number of sheep shown this year was considerably greater than last year, enough so to prompt a change in the judging schedules.

Taking top honors in the Cattle judging was John Andrae with the Champion heifer, Marie Pritchard with the Champion lightweight steer, Ronnie Gann with the Champion heavy steer. Gann also won the Grand Champion ribbon and Marie Pritchard took Reserve Champion honors with her steer.

The weather, which is traditionally unpleasant for stock shows, was very cooperative and helped to draw a rather large crowd for the annual show.

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Poe's corner

A Twenty Year Milestone

The 20th anniversary of the Runnels County Historical Commission included several outstanding accomplishments for the year and was climaxed with a luncheon at the Texas Grill in Ballinger on Sept. 25th. Mrs. Edgar Boelsche, charter member and vice president, gave a brief resume of the historical highlights from the beginning up to the present. From its organization by Judge W.H. Rampy and first meeting on August 26, 1962, with nine members, the commission has grown to 27 active members and one associate member. A total of 48 historic markers have been placed in the county, and many tours and programs have been sponsored. Rankin Pace has been chairman since 1966 and continues to serve in that capacity. Other charter members still active are Mrs. J. Dexter Eoff, Mrs. Loyd Roberson and Mrs. George Poe.

Members attending were treated to a slide presentation by Neuman Smith. Pictures included early day Ballinger and Hatchel; also, historic homes, barns and ranches in the county.

Tribute was paid to Judge and Mrs. Bill Stultz for their cooperation and encouragement. They were presented an engraved silver serving tray in appreciation from the group.

The first meeting of the year at the courthouse on January 13, was designated to honor history teachers in the county in accordance to the proclamation of Governor Clements designating the birthday of Mirabeau B. Lamar, Jan. 26, as Father of Education Day in Texas.

M.R. Williams spoke on "Teaching Texas History: A Sacred Trust." Mrs. George Poe, Heritage Project Chairman, presented certificates to the teachers present. A separate ceremony was held in the high school principal's office in Winters for five teachers unable to attend. A total of 16 teachers was honored.

On March 2, Judge Stultz spoke to the Ballinger Rotary Club and Williams addressed the Winters Lions Club in honor of the Texas Flag, part of Texas Week designated by the legislature. The observance also included Texas Heroes, the first 100 years, a traveling exhibit. The set of eight pictures was shown at the Winters State Bank the first week of March and the following week at the Ballinger Farmers and Merchants Bank. The exhibit which was well received at both towns covered several different periods of history: Founders of Texas, Battle of Independence, The Republic, Historic Accomplishment, and Military Heroes.

In cooperation with the Texas Heritage Project of publishing a booklet of restaurants, hotels and theatres located in historical structures, at least 50 years old, the Runnels group nominated four buildings, all of which are still in use and in good repair.

These nominations were accepted and when published, the state directory will include the Miles Opera

House, the Wingate Cafe, Texas Grill at Ballinger and the Rock Hotel in Winters.

The Opera House was built of native stone in 1904. The lower floor housed the bank and post office. The second floor was for public gatherings and theatrical performances. The building has been under restoration by the Miles Preservation Authority for the past seven years and is almost completed. The upstairs auditorium will again be open to the public for all sorts of entertainment.

Erected in 1910, the Texas Grill is the last native stone structure to be built in downtown Ballinger. It was a saloon until 1911, and has since been a cafe. It remains in its original state. Many visitors inquire about the Noyes Monument across the street.

The Wingate Cafe in a building erected sometime before 1931, was originally a post office for about 15 years. It was then used as a grocery store and later for storage. In 1972 it was renovated and became a cafe.

When the Abilene and Southern Railroad was built to Winters in 1909 the two story Rock Hotel was built to accommodate visitors by the J.L. Heaths who owned a block of land nearby. They sold in 1912 and the hotel has had many owners since then.

In March the Commission met at the Lowake Steak House for a luncheon followed by a visit to the Earnest and Dorothy Barrow Foundation Museum in Eola, housed in three metal buildings at the rear of their home. The lawyer who set up the foundation told them they had really set a precedence. "With the money and the contents, but no building." Having no children, the couple desired that their souvenirs be kept for future generations. They have created a museum to which others have added collections. Barrow is a Hardin-Simmons University director and Mrs. Barrow began the white horse endowment at HSU.

Two new members, Mrs. Stultz and Robert L. Wright were welcomed at the March meeting, and Wright was appointed to the marker committee in May. Those appointed to the oral history committee were Neuman Smith, Poe, Mary Margaret Leathers, Johnnie Barr and Marie Lee. Reports were given by the members attending the State Preservation Conference, April 15-17 in Brenham; Mr. and Mrs. Neuman Smith, Rankin Pace and Dr. and Mrs. Boelsche. A Distinguished Service Award plaque was presented to Pace at Brenham and certificates were given to the members at the meeting. Smith was appointed, with members assisting, to compile a book on "The Cotton World."

At the July meeting held at the Neuman Smith picnic grounds near Hatchel, a full report was given of historic picture collections in the county. This was requested by the state office. Four sets of historic picture collections have been collected and duplicated for the Z.I. Hale Museum. Placed on 36 by 36 inch mats with glass covers that open, these pictures can be adjusted as needed. Sets include the beginning of Runnels County, Winters Grows - 1905-1908. It was 1909, and Pioneer Doctors. Pictures of other prominent people and the community brass band have also been assembled.

Two people have collected slides of historical sites and buildings to illustrate lectures.

Two long term projects on which commission members have been cooperating were culminated with the formal opening of the Z.I. Hale Museum in Winters August 1, and the dedication of the Interpretive plate for the building of the Carnegie Library in Ballinger, October 31, with Senator Grant Jones as principal speaker for the occasion. John L. Leslie of Rockport, son of Rev. J.D. Leslie, Presbyterian minister who served as supervising architect, was present.

The opening of the Lazy N Stables, recently completed horse drawn vehicle museum, owned by John W. Norman, was also held on August 1. Another attraction was the display of several miniature Shetland pony stables. Both museums attracted a total of more than 750 visitors. Dean Smith of Ballinger paid tribute to Dr. Z.I. Hale's family, who presented his office, a two-story structure, to the City of Winters for a museum.

The Quilt division of the Arts and Crafts show was held at the Z.I. Hale Museum for a two-day show, Nov. 12-13, and drew a crowd of 128 people to view the 42 quilts displayed.

Memorabilia of the late Judge W.H. Rampy has been presented to the museum as a permanent gift by Mrs. Rampy.

The museum is open once a month on the second Sunday, from 2 to 4 p.m., and to schools and other groups by appointment. Last year a total of 1,296 visitors registered.

Another friendship began when Virginia Heath Draper, whose parents built the Rock Hotel, sent money to purchase a building medallion for the hotel which was approved. Mrs. Draper is a successful businesswoman in California.

An archeological exhibit of the Texas Archeological and Texas Historical Foundation was sponsored by the Ballinger Carnegie Library Restoration Committee from Nov. 15-Dec. 4. Dr. J. Dexter Eoff lectured on Archeology in Runnels County.

Four members under the age of 40 have been appointed to the commission: Alton O'Neal, John Key, Robert Wright and Alton Lange. Regular publicity is carried in the newspapers and one member serves on the tourism committee of the Chamber of Commerce. We have taken part in tours, festivals, parades and assisted with a printed brochure.

The final meeting of the year was held at the Nancy Parker Cabin near Content with the customary cook-out. Mr. and Mrs. Buck Coleman of Ballinger were guests and she brought with her a picture of her great-grandmother who was a sister to Nancy Parker. She also had a letter of historical interest.

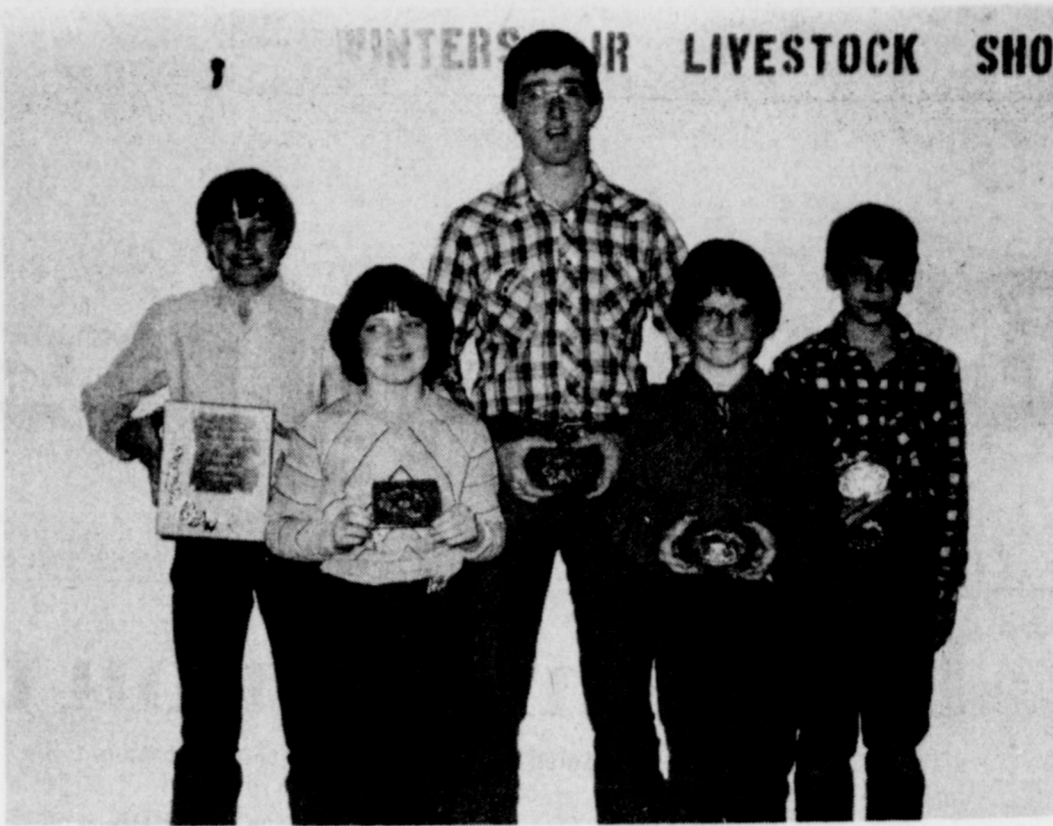

Country Folk

For years cattlemen have made their morning feed rounds, called up cattle at the same spot and threw out cottonseed cake and gone on to the next stop. After a winter season of feeding, the packed earth at the feeding grounds would leave bare ground come spring... and for the next year, too.

Bill Freitag of Eldorado has solved the problem! He has invented a feed trough on wheels. He pulls the 42-foot trailer behind his pickup, stops at different spots in the pasture each day and feeds the hungry mothers. He has no waste of expensive cake and no packed earth in the pastures. Come spring, grass grows in all his pastures and roads.

This editor spent a half day with Bill and wife Mabel on their Schleicher County Ranch last week. We went on the feed rounds and I observed first hand this unique contraption.

With half barrels and some 2 3/8" tubing and wheels from an old trailer, Bill has constructed a tool for his operations which saves considerable loss of feed... feed formerly trampled underground by cattle or buried under rocks and packed ground which looked like Patton's army had been there.

Speaking of supplemental feeding, some ranchmen have been able to cut back on daily runs to the back pasture. Good moisture falling generally in West Texas back in December and early January has put the terrain in good shape. Also, a not so cold winter has allowed some green weeds and grass to spring forth.

Buck Owens of Barnhart says, "The year has a good start out our way. There is some green stuff coming up in the pastures."

Herbert Brown of Sanderson adds that big country is in pretty good shape again. With deer hunting season just over, Herbert was telling me about a 20-point buck killed on his place this year. "It was the largest rack seen in our country in many years."

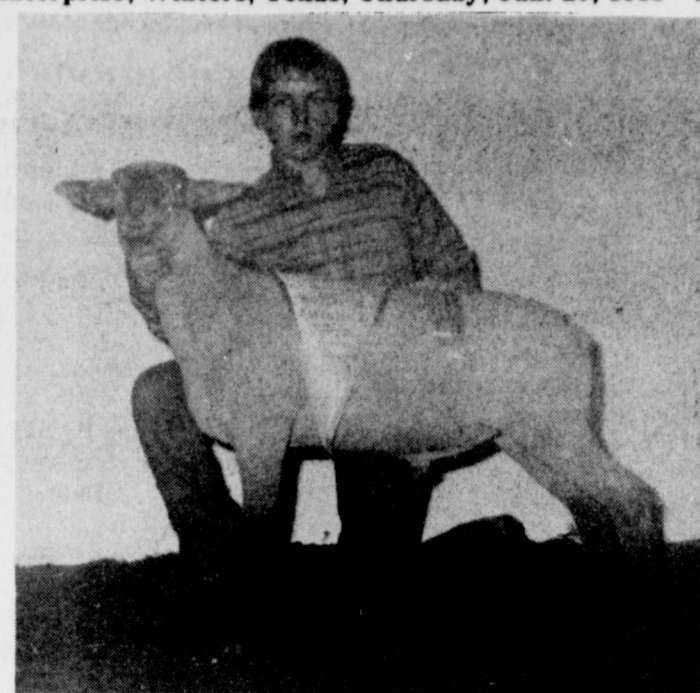

Generally, folks are looking forward to a good year. For me that is the best part of January... the opportunity to start a new slate.



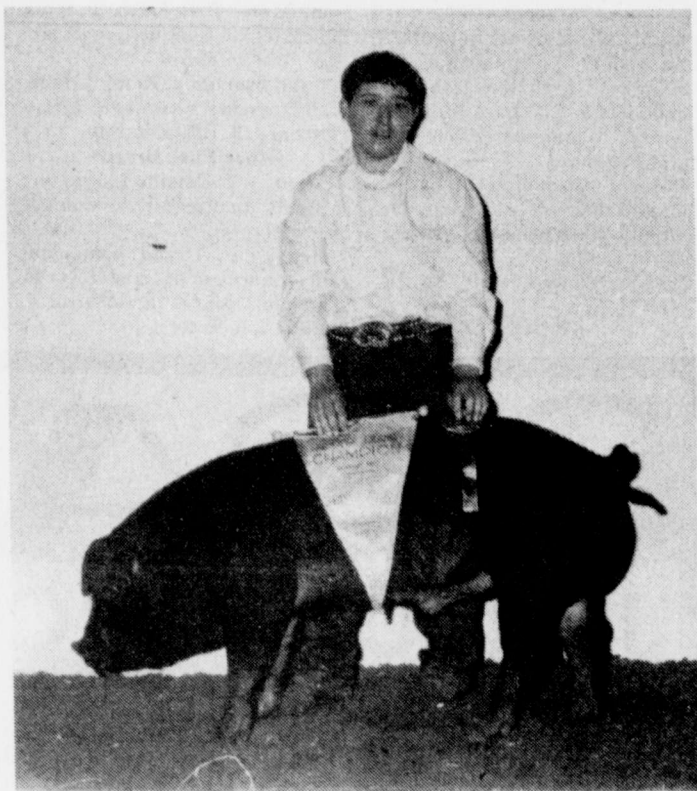
Tests in on tractors

Five new John Deere tractors pass tests

"John Deere's new 50 Series 100 to 190 horsepower tractors really rang the bell in official tests," said G.W. Sneed of Mansell Bros.

"One or another of these tractors set records for PTO fuel efficiency, drawbar pull and low sound level," Sneed noted.

As a John Deere dealer, Mansell Bros. has just received a set of official test results performed at the University of Nebraska Test Station in Lincoln. The five new tractors were announced in August, but test results were only recently made public.

Comparison of test results shows that the 190 hp 4850 is the most fuel-efficient tractor available in the over-100-hp category. "In fact, it's the most fuel-efficient tractor over 65 hp," Sneed continued, referring to PTO fuel consumption tests performed at rated engine speed. In official test language, the 4850 produced 17.47 horsepower hours per

gallon of fuel.

Both the 4850 and the 165-hp 4650 broke all existing records for drawbar pull measured on a 2-wheel-drive tractor. The 4650 pulled 18,794 pounds and the 4850 pulled 20,810 pounds. "I never expected to see any 2-wheel-drive pull over 20,000 pounds at Nebraska," Sneed said.

The 100-hp 4050 set a completely different kind of record. It's the quietest tractor ever tested at rated speed and maximum power. Sound level measured at the operator's ear was only 73.5 dBA.

"All of these tractors were really quiet," G.W. continued. "At full load the 4250 was only 74.5 dBA, the 4450 was 74.0 dBA, the 4650 was 76.5 dBA and the 4850 only 75.5 dBA. Everybody knows that Sound-Gard body is quiet, but these numbers are really impressive."

Sneed said he has the complete tests on all five tractors. He invites all interested farmers to stop in and see the results.

Pallbearers will be Henry Thames, Doc Tindol, James Norwood, Bud Norwood, Shorty Grantham and John Palmer.

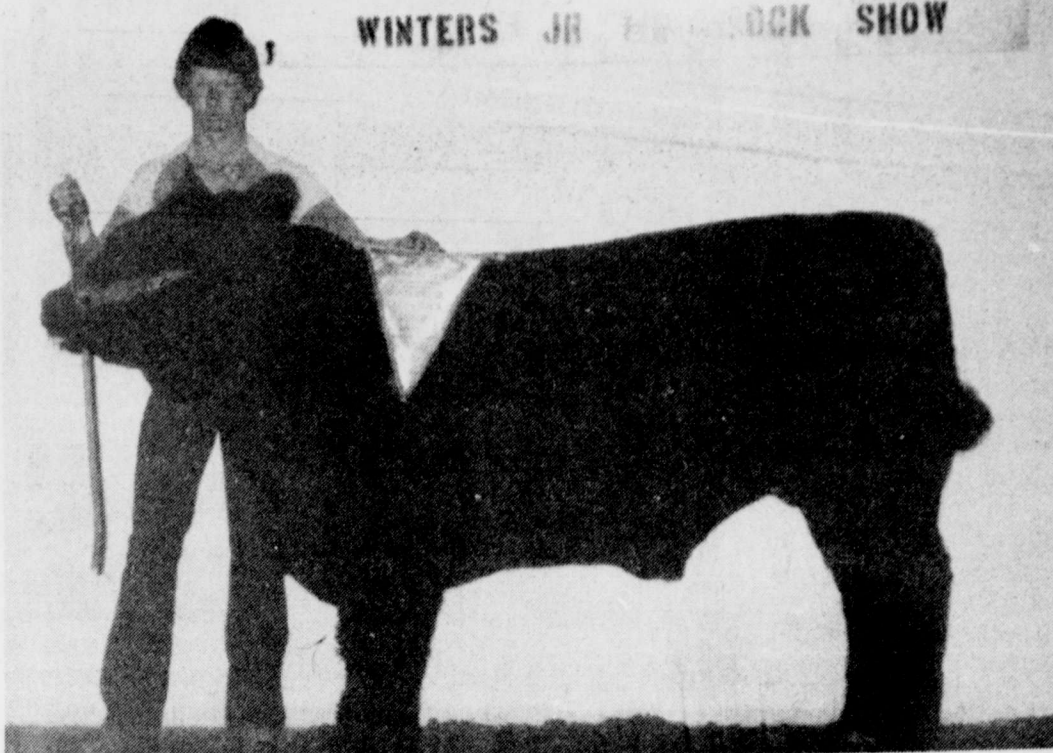
Michalewicz services held in Ballinger
