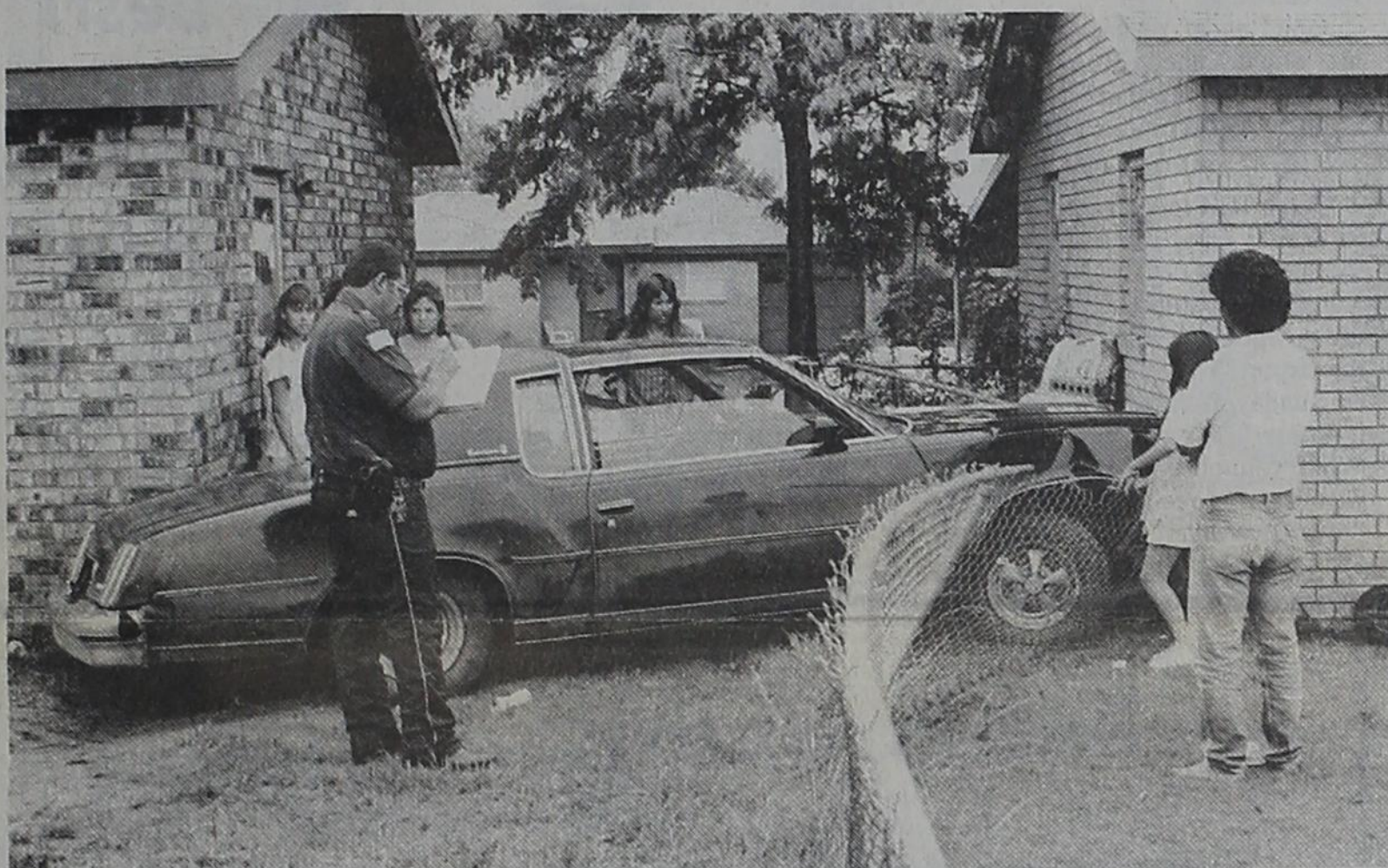

County okays AC bid and jail usage study

The County Commissioners' Court awarded a bid for air-conditioning the Expo Building, decided to study the possibility of remodeling the jail facilities, and balked at another proposal by the Texas Dept. of Human Services at its Monday meeting.

Bryant Sales & Service won the contract to install an evaporative cooling system in the Expo Building. The system will include five 21,000-cfm coolers along the main arena and a 5,500-cfm cooler for the kitchen.

Bryant's bid was \$14,654.50, based on single-phase, 230-volt specifications on the five main units. But the court opted for three-phase motors with higher-capacity coolers when Bryant noted that they would save about \$1,000 in initial cost and be easier and cheaper to repair in the future. So the final cost is expected to be under \$14,000.

Bryant said his company should have the system installed by Aug. 1.

Bryant's and Newton Electric both had submitted bids originally, but the court tabled action and drew new specifications at the original bid opening. Newton submitted no bid Monday.

Commissioners heard a presentation by William Farnum of A&S Steel Buildings, an Amarillo "design/build" firm that includes jail remodeling among its services, and agreed to have the company make a study of feasibility and cost of expanding the county's jail facilities.

The county abandoned the courthouse's original jail in 1971 when the courthouse was expanded, with new jail facilities. But the jail, rated for 12 prisoners, often must hold 20 or more, and county officials are worried that it could lose its certification.

Sheriff Lonny Rhynes said this week that he hopes the old jail, new jail and a second-floor lockup for women inmates can all be redesigned and remodeled to hold up to 30 prisoners.

Farnum said his firm would do its "scope study" at no charge and would report back at the commissioners' Aug. 8 meeting.

For the third meeting in a row, commissioners argued with representatives of the Texas Dept. of Human Services over cost-sharing and rental of county space for the state agency.

In discussing the possible county-state sharing of the salary for the TDHS's new child protective services worker here, Wilma Manning of the TDHS said her agency would prefer that the county contribute \$750 per month "toward the budget" but that it be in the form of building rental instead of salary.

The county has refused to provide free space for the state agency in the building which the TDHS shares with the County Appraisal District.

Precinct 2 Commissioner Jeff Roberts commented, "I don't think the county should have to pay either the rent or part of the child

protective service salary" because "our taxpayers are broke, and you can better afford to pay these costs."

Members of the hospital board were on hand to argue the TDHS's case. They told the commissioners that they were worried over the possible loss of the TDHS office here, which they said brings \$60,000 or more per year into the county, including many hospital benefits.

"We don't want them to leave—that never was the point," County Judge Polly Simpson said.

Precinct 4 Commissioner Vincent Guggemos explained that when the county built the new building five years ago, the TDHS agreed to pay for the interior construction of its office space in return for five years' free rent, with the understanding that the county would charge rent after the contract period to pay for the building.

The court asked the TDHS to have its regional representatives bring specific figures and proposals to its next meeting July 25.

In other action, the commissioners:

—Approved the purchase of a John Deere 770B motor grader for Precinct 2 from Yellowhouse Machinery, the only bidder. The new grader replaces one that was destroyed in a recent accident, for which the county collected \$79,800 in insurance.

—Approved judges and alternates for the November general election.

DISD board hears drug abuse report

"Drug and alcohol problems are increasing at a faster rate in rural areas and among white populations according to recent statistics," Dr. Paul Mackenzie, director of clinical services for the Central Plains Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center in Plainview, told the Dimmitt School Board last Thursday.

He told the board that curriculum materials are available for classroom use in schools, and informed them of programs available in Dimmitt for students who may need special referral for drug or alcohol problems.

Of the nine counties served by the CPMH/MR Center, only four had been selected to participate last school year in a grant program set up under the Texas Commission on Alcohol and Drug Abuse.

"We selected the four that we felt had the most severe problem with adolescent alcohol and drug abuse," Dr. Mackenzie told the board. "Castro County was one of the four, along with Hale, Lamb and Parmer."

He noted that more referrals come from Castro County than any of the others, but attributed the higher rate to problems in imple-

menting the program in the other counties. He also reported that the grant has been expanded to all nine counties for next year.

"About one-fourth of the students we see are in our prevention programs. Students who are labeled high risk, perhaps because of parents who are abusers of drugs or alcohol, or because of various life situations that might incline them to turn to drug use, are included," Dr. Mackenzie said. "Students do not have to be users to benefit from our programs."

He noted that another one-fourth of those in the program were only involved in experimentation with substance abuse, and had not really become problem users yet.

Family therapy is an important part of the program for students who are referred to the center, according to Dr. Mackenzie.

"It surprises me how many adults provide alcohol for their kids. There is almost an acceptance (of substance abuse) in some cases, so educating the parents is a step in the right direction, too," he said.

Education for program participants is also included, along with alternative activity groups, which stress developing a more positive

self-image and generating positive peer pressure to not use drugs.

Trustee David Schaeffer said that DISD might be interested in a workshop for teacher in-service, and a parent seminar, along with educational materials for students.

In other business, the trustees selected United Group Insurance Co. of Irving to provide student insurance coverage for the 1988-89 school year.

For 24-hour coverage, students will pay \$50, and at-school coverage will cost \$25.

The board approved the blanket coverage of students in grades 7-12 participating in any UIL event, as well as vocational agriculture and industrial arts contests, at a premium of \$9,400.

Two pickups will be purchased from Wallace Motor Co. of Dimmitt at a price of \$7,508.72 each, which includes a \$300 rebate. The only other bidder was Street Toyota-Mazda of Amarillo.

Board members voted to get rid of a 1969 pickup and a 1978 van in the district's fleet of vehicles.

The following personnel were hired subject to assignment: Allison Davis, Ruth Bennett, Doug Seltiff and Karen Baggett.

One man's gain . . .

The good crops and high prices are great for local farmers—but not so great for those who have to buy the corn or think about seed for next year.

In local feedlots, the high price of corn "translates into higher costs of gain, not only in the grain price but also in the related crops and products, such as silage, corn bran and steepwater bran," said George Bagley, manager of Dimmitt Feed Yards.

"Our ration cost has increased about \$20 per ton in the last 30 days," Bagley said. "Our top ration right now is costing us \$129 per ton. I think we're looking at around 60 cents per pound cost of gain if the grain prices hold in this area."

Current market price for finished cattle is about 68 cents per pound.

"Many of our customers have backed off," Bagley said. "Our numbers are down about 20% from this time last year. Our customers just don't see how they can project a profit at these prices."

"Since corn is our only raw material, it takes us out of the bottom line on production cost because it's so high, but the syrup price is not necessarily following along," said Bill Ballentine, general

manager of Dimmitt's American Fructose Corp. plant.

He explained that corn syrup prices are based on the sugar market rather than the corn market.

Could higher syrup prices cost the local plant its customers in the soft-drink industry, who use most of its 40 million pounds-per-month output?

Not likely, Ballentine feels.

"The price of corn syrup is still considerably below sugar," he said. "The higher corn prices don't pose a life-or-death threat; they only have to do with profitability," Ballentine said. "And profitability is what the game is all about."

"I personally feel that you'll see the price of seed corn go up by \$5 or more per bag next year," said Garner Ball, local Horizon Seeds representative.

"I'm afraid we're going to run short on some varieties for next year," J. R. Brown of Flagg Grain Co. said.

Most seed corn for local crops comes from Iowa and Illinois, which are experiencing their worst drought of this century.

Brown and Ball both said they were told this week by seed company representatives in Iowa that the corn in that state looks good in the

field, but isn't producing any grain.

Although most local seed dealers have already sold their 1988 carryover stocks, they look to their supplying companies to have pretty good reserves.

A spokesperson for Pioneer Hi-Bred International in Des Moines said that company has 57% of a normal year's supply in cold storage, and that it hopes to meet the rest of its needs through its irrigated seed fields (24% of its total number) and winter production in South America, South Texas and Florida this year.

SPS reaches rate decrease agreement

Customers in Texas cities served by Southwestern Public Service should receive their second electric rate decrease of the year soon. SPS's rural customers should also have their rates lowered to match rates within city limits, officials with the company announced Tuesday.

The decreases in effect and proposed total \$20.6 million, or 4.3%, and reflect lower SPS expenses resulting primarily from federal tax

reform, said Sam Hunter, SPS vice president of rates and economic research.

The proposed decreases were agreed to Friday by SPS, the staff of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, the state's Office of Public Utility Counsel, the Texas Industrial Energy Consumers and the US Dept. of Energy.

Details of the agreement are being worked out, and once approved,

the reduction would be considered effective as of July 8, Hunter said. Approval from the city and state regulators is expected within 35 to 60 days. A customer's first bill on which the reduction is calculated would include a credit recognizing the effect of the lower rate since July 8.

"This timing allows our customers to receive lower rates even before the regulatory process is complete," Hunter said. "We worked out this arrangement in order to extend lower rates to all of our customers as soon as possible."

"These rate reductions represent a cooperative effort among all parties," Hunter said. "We believe these rate decreases can help stimulate economic development and enhance opportunities for growth in our service territory."

The final day to request measurement service and/or certify your spring seeded crops and ACR and CU is Friday. We are sending out reminder cards of your scheduled time to come in and certify or request measurement service. Failure to make your scheduled appointment could result in having to pay a late-filed certification fee.

Castro County has been authorized to approve requests to hay and graze 1988 ACR and CU for payment acreage. If you are interested in haying or grazing your 1988 ACR and CU acreage for payment for 1988, you need to come to this office and make a request to hay or graze before any haying or grazing occurs from June to October 31.

The ACR and CU for payment acreage may be:

1. Grazed by your own livestock or another producer's livestock;
2. Hayed for your own use or for another producer's use.

You can also sell the hay removed from the ACR or CU or payment acreage. You may also charge for grazing the ACR or CU for payment acreage.

To remain eligible for program benefits, if you request emergency haying or grazing of approved cover on 1988 ACR and CU for payment acreage you must not remove cover to the extent that the land is not adequately protected from wind and water erosion or permit haying or grazing of wildlife food plots or wildlife habitat.

Only approved covers may be hayed or grazed. Weeds are not approved cover and must be controlled throughout the calendar year.

Castro County will have a seventh CRP program sign-up beginning Monday and continuing through Aug. 5 for those who are interested in placing highly erodible land into the 10-year program.

If you are interested in placing a bid for the CRP program, you will

need to come to the ASCS office to have eligibility determined by ASCS and SCS and to place a bid.

If you have a CRP contract, you are not eligible to hay the cover established on the CRP acreage. If you wish to hay your CRP acreage you must do the following:

1. Come to the ASCS office and make a request in writing by Aug. 4;
2. Sign an agreement that if the cover is damaged or destroyed by haying, you will re-establish the cover at your own expense;
3. Agree not to sell the hay to hay traders;
4. Agree to forego 25% of your next annual rental payment;
5. Not hay the acreage until you receive written approval from the County Committee;
6. Have the acreage windrowed by Aug. 4;
7. Leave at least three inches of stubble;
8. Agree to leave at least 10% of the CRP acreage in each field uncut;
9. Do not remove cover to the extent that the land is not adequately protected from wind and water erosion;
10. Do not permit haying of wildlife food plots or wildlife habitat;
11. Do not allow this acreage to be grazed;
12. Do not harvest any seed or grain crop from this acreage.

If you have acreage of a crop that is affected by adverse weather, you will need to file a failed acreage report in the office prior to destroying evidence of the crop. The ACR acreage must be maintained on the failed crop if you are participating in the program for the crop. The acreage that is failed will be released to you for other uses after the failed acreage report is filed.

Because of an earlier agreement between SPS and the Texas cities it serves, customers within city limits received a 3.1% decrease effective March 28. Upon approval from the cities, these customers will receive an additional 1.2% decrease to match the rural deduction of 4.3%

In Texas, cities have original jurisdiction over rates within its city limits. The PUCT regulates rates in rural areas. SPS will file with the PUCT for approval of the rural rate decrease and with 74 Texas cities it serves for approval of the rate decrease within city limits.

The percentage of rate decrease varies slightly among types of electric customers. Residential customers will receive a net 5.2% decrease compared to rates in effect at the first of the year.

A monthly electric bill for a rural residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt hours would drop \$4.09, from \$73.51 to \$69.42. The bill for a customer within the city limits using 1,000 kilowatt hours dropped \$3 on March 28 and should decline another \$1.09, resulting in a bill of

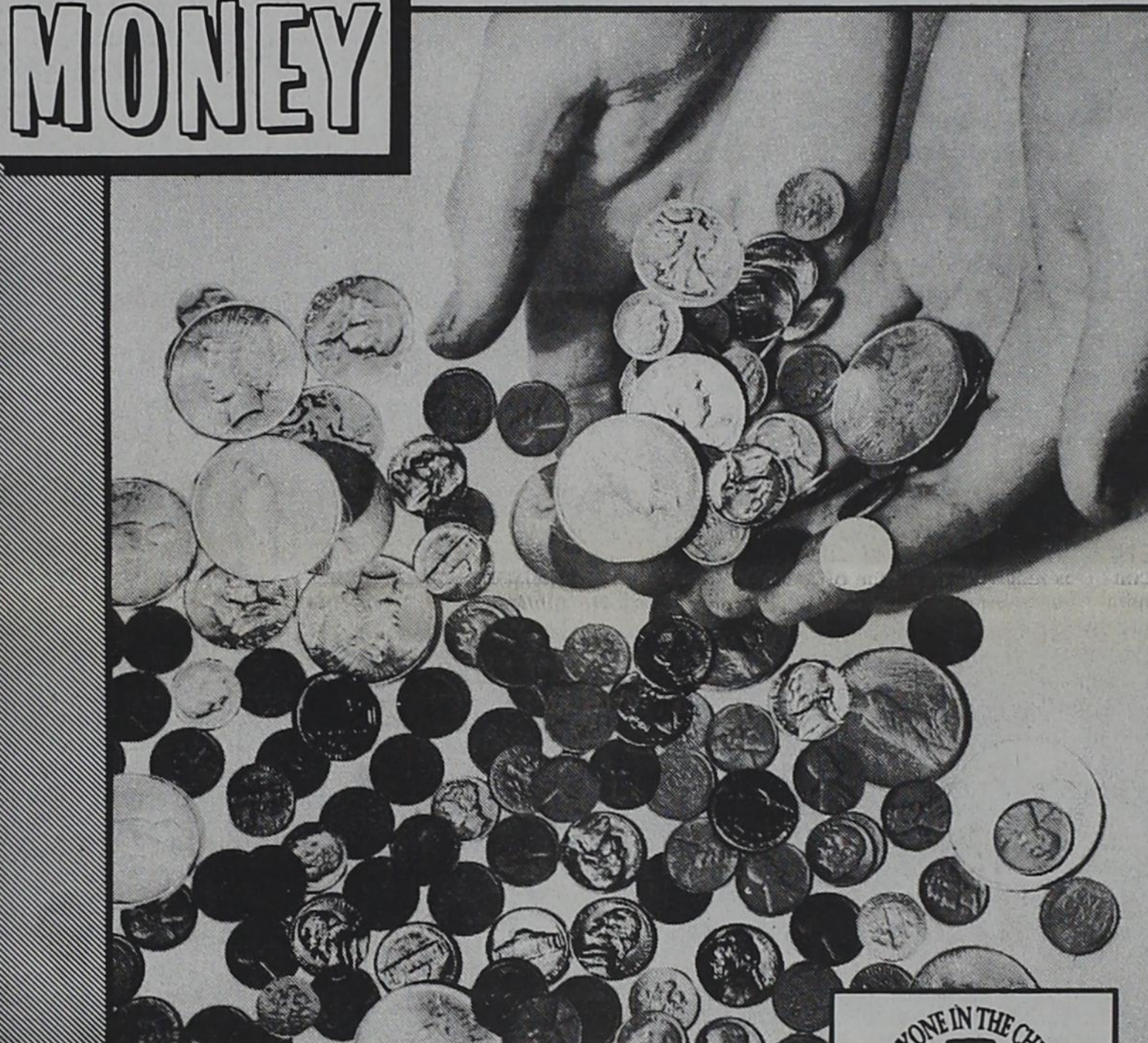

Muniz was cited for failure to control speed, following too closely, and DWI. He was booked into the county jail following an intoxilyzer test, police said.

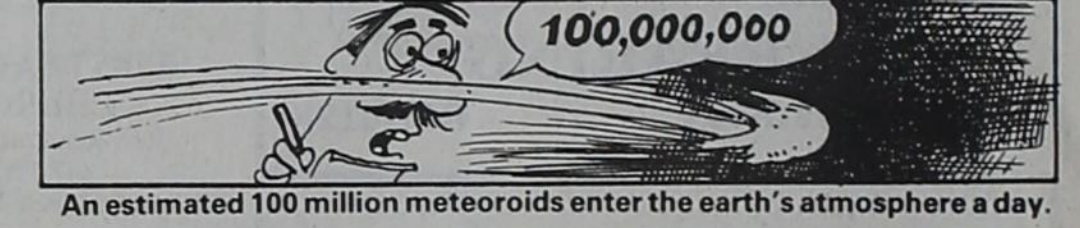
