Band Accepts Festival Bid at San Antonio

The Dimmitt High School Band has been chosen for appearance in one of the most exclusive multi-band performances in the state.

According to an announcement made last week by Ralph Smith, director, the Dimmitt band will appear in the famous Battle of Flowers festival in San Antonio on the evening of April 21, 1960.

This is reportedly a step up from the every year or so appearance of the band at the Enid, Oklahoma Band Festival.

Only five bands from over the state have been invited to the Battle of Flowers festival, which, in Southwest Texas, is like the Mardi Gras in the central Gulf states.

Smith said the band was ready to start working now to make expenses for their marching demonstration at San Antonio. "Right now, our biggest problem is uniforms," Smith said. "These uniforms are passed from player to player every year and right now they are approaching eight years of age, the normal life expectancy for band uniforms." Smith went on to explain that each uniform costs \$67.50, complete. This averages out to a uniform cost of about \$8.50 per year not counting cleaning and maintenance.

The Dimmitt Bobcat Band has, in the past few years, won dozens of trophies and other prizes and has consistently been judged in area competitions as either the best or one of the best in the Pan-

Local Option Liquor Election to be Held Saturday In Justice Precinct 4

Precinct 4's local option election will be held Saturday in Arney Jumbo, Nazareth and Northeast Dimmitt and it will decide whether or not the county's northeast precinct will be the scene of package store liquor sales.

This is the first such election in the county since alcoholic beverage sale move was defeated in the 1936 general election.

Polls will close at 7 o'clock and within an hour election judges should know the outcome of the election. Should the measure pass, liquor store sales could begin shortly, possibly as soon as permits could be secured. Package stores would be legal within the Dimmitt city limits, at any point east and north of the traffic light at the intersections of Highways 86 and 385. Naturally they would also be legal anywhere in Justice of the Peace Precinct 4.

Apparently there is some doubt about whether the issue will carry, since some of the signers of the original petition have reportedly indicated they would vote against the proposition. However this is more rumor than fact and there is probably no more way of telling how this election is going than any other.

116 qualified voters signed the petition calling for "the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premise consumption only." There are 244 qualified voters in the precinct.

The election is based on a recent state supreme court ruling that the smallest unit of government could decide its own local option issue. Since there are no incorporated towns in Precinct 4, the precinct itself was chosen as the place for the election.

Forged \$1500 Check Lands Man in Jail

One of the boldest and most ambitious alleged check forgeries to be pulled off in Castro County occurred in Hart on Saturday, September 19th, when Antonio Garcia, 32-year-old field crew foreman, cashed a \$1,500 check at the Farmer's State Bank.

Garcia, a 5' 8", 268-pound Mexican, walked out of the bank with the money and had no problem until the first of this month when Harold Smith of Hill & Smith Produce Company found the forged check in the firm's bank statement.

Garcia had worked for some time for the produce firm. During the past year he had cashed \$25,000 or more in pay checks at the Hart Bank for his field crew members. Being well-known in the bank, he had little trouble cashing the forged check.

Upon investigating, the produce firm found three checks were missing from the company checkbook. One of these was the forged check and the other two have not been recovered.

Garcia said he was innocent, but he was indicted by a grand jury this week. Garcia is from New Deal and has a wife and two children.

Cotton Bowl Lanes to Open For Bowling Saturday Noon

Cotton Bowl Lanes will be open for business at noon Saturday.

The announcement by manager Frank Thornton came late this week after all equipment was accounted for, either installed or due to arrive Friday.

This will be Dimmitt's first regulation, full-size bowling alley. It will be completely equipped with AMF automatic pinsetters permitting the entire 8-lane alley to be operated by two men.

Located at the corner of East Second and Lee Streets, the new alley will be owned and operated by Glenn Batson, E. M. Lowe, and A. C. Bridwell, all of Littlefield. This is the first experience these men have had with bowling alleys.

The solid-front building is of concrete block construction and is completely modern, measuring 50x140 feet. There is a 100x150 foot parking area alongside the building. During the summer months the building will be cooled by a dehydrated air conditioning system.

Shoe rentals and bowling ball sales will be available and standard charges will be made for these and bowling fees.

Batson operates the Batson Motor Company, Littlefield DeSota and Plymouth agency. He has farming interests also in Castro County. Lowe operates Lowe & Co. wholesale distributor of cigarettes and other confections in Littlefield. Bridwell owns Littlefield Butane, Crescent Park Motel and Crescent Park Swimming Pool in Littlefield and Sudan Butane in Sudan. The three partners also own Citadel Finance Company in Littlefield. They plan to open a branch of this company in Dimmitt in the near future.

Cotton Bowl Lanes will be equipped with machinery and other equipment that has only recently been placed in production. Batson said when construction first started that the local lanes would be one of the most modern in West Texas.

Frank Thornton, the manager, is fresh from a special school for bowling alley operators. He and his assistant, Bobby Cunningham, will give as much instruction as possible to fledgling bowlers. Thornton comes to Dimmitt from Littlefield where he was employed by Hall Motor Company.

Six English Grainmen Plan Visit To First State Bank October 13

Six feedgrain representatives from the United Kingdom will be in Dimmitt as guests of Grain Sorghum Producers at the First State Bank on Tuesday, October 13 from 2 to 3 p.m. Ed McLeroy and Hugo Byers will be hosts for the occasion.

The group is headed by Walter Greenwood of Greenwood & Nichols, Ltd, Liverpool, England. Other members of the group are E. B. Stevenson, Managing Director, Crossfields & Calthrop, Ltd, Liverpool; Dr. Clare Burgett, Director, Carr's Mills, Ltd, Cañal, W. W. C. Gibson, Chief Technical Advisor, R & W Paul, Ltd, Ipswich; R. J. Paul, R&W Paul, Ltd, Suffolk; and Ian Hughes, Chairman, Ministry of Agriculture Poultry Committee.

The six-man party will study the harvesting, transportation, merchandising and processing of grain sorghum and consider increased imports of it and other United States feedgrains.

As a result of their visit, grain sorghum may be piled deeper in the feed troughs of British livestock and poultry in the next several months.

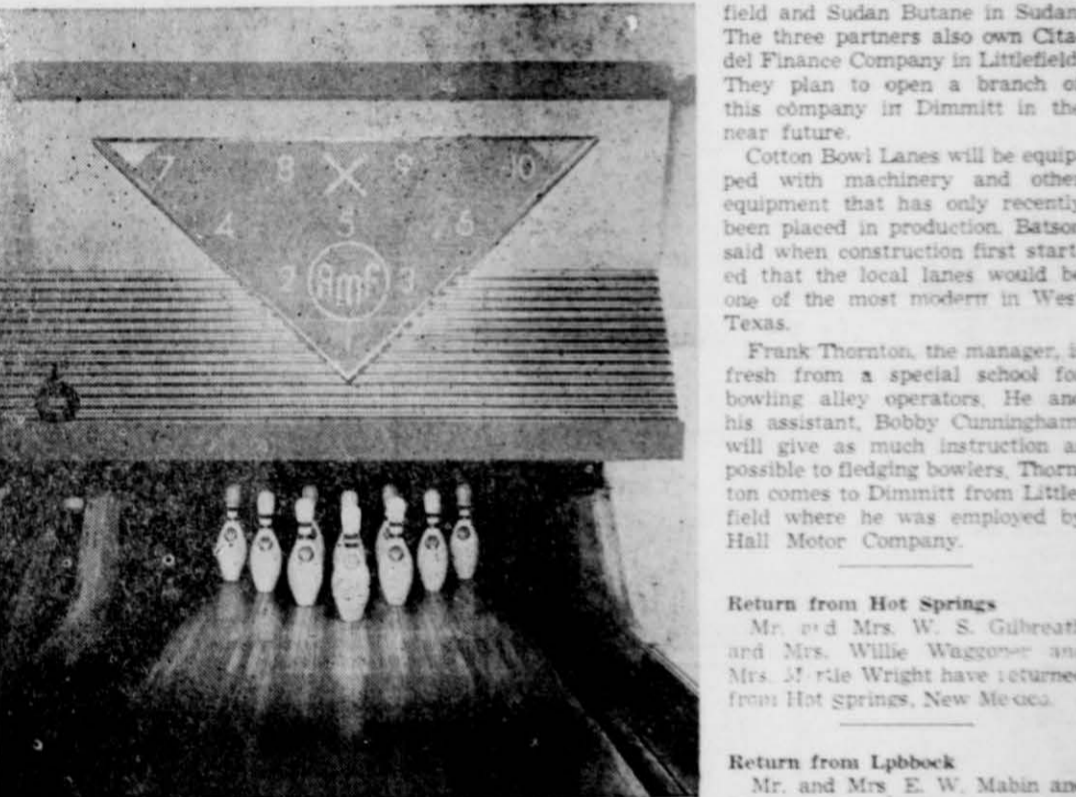
The visitors arrived in Houston October 2nd and are touring the port grain export facilities. This week will be spent at Texas A&M College where they will visit with agricultural staff members and attend the Texas Nutrition Conference, which will also be attended by grain and feed representatives from several other states.

The week of October 12th will be spent in the High Plains grain sorghum production and feeding area. Opportunity will be provided for a visit to a ranch near Dumas, feed lots near Lubbock as well as smaller "on the farm" feeding operations within the area. Several conferences have been scheduled with agricultural and grain industry leaders to discuss the value of grain sorghum in balanced feeding programs.

Other points to be visited by the Englishmen will be points between here and the East Coast, ending with government trade and agricultural agencies in Washington. This visit was arranged as a part of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association's foreign market development program being carried out under Public Law No. 480.

Fire Prevention Week Is Occasion for Study of National and Local Figures

"More than 95 percent of all fires are the direct result of human carelessness," Dimmitt fire chief Willie John Word told audiences in special fire prevention week talks here this week.

"Most of these can be wrapped up under the labels of smoking, misuse of electricity, poor housekeeping in permitting rubbish and other combustibles to collect; and kitchen carelessness," Word said.

"We have gone to fires here in Dimmitt caused by electricity and have found pemmies behind fuses, breaker switches tied open and circuits overfused. That's just asking for trouble and it won't be long before it strikes."

Word went on to say before the JayCees Thursday that Dimmitt and Castro County fires followed national trends so far as causes are concerned.

He demonstrated how gasoline fumes spread by placing two lighted candles outside a pan in which he sprayed some gasoline from an oil can. Several moments later fumes reached the candles and a puff of fire resulted which ignited the gasoline in the pan. He also demonstrated the best way to put out a skillet fire by placing a lid over the pan.

From July 1, 1958 to July 1, 1959, the Dimmitt Volunteer Fire Department answered 56 fire alarms, or an average of more than one a week. One of these was a false alarm. They also held 54 practice sessions, which, when combined with actual fire calls, accounted for 137 hours of the fire-

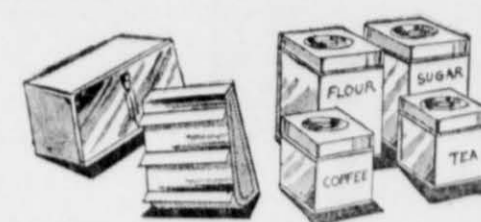

"Sparky Sez"

Your fire department was not called on to answer an alarm for the second week in succession. This is a very good sign that people are becoming more fire conscious and more careful, especially with the LP gas tractors. That one thing has been the big item as far as farm fire is concerned for the past three months. Remember the most hazardous months as far as fire is concerned are coming up so each of us should be all the more careful. We met last Thursday for our regular practice session. There were twenty-one members present including one new member. Mr. Jack Tidmore who is employed by the Dimmitt Motor Company was introduced to the other members and is on the department for his six months probationary period. Jack has been employed by the above mentioned firm for over a year but has just recently moved to Dimmitt with his family. He is manager of the body shop. Jack has taken a real interest in the department and I think he is going to make us a real good fireman.

Since this is the hazardous season for fires, I understand that there has been an intensified effort to see automatic fire extinguisher systems in the rural areas. I am glad to see this. I know of a number of rural homes in Castro County that have been saved by these devices. There is one thing which I would like to mention and recommend in connection with your purchase of these systems. Some of them contain carbon tetrachloride which is very toxic and when it comes in contact with fire has a chemical reaction which manufactures fogs gas which is very deadly. Some of these systems have retardant chemicals added to them to reduce the gaseous effect but they are not completely safe by any means. On the other hand, there are some on the market which contain no carbon tetrachloride and are non-toxic and I understand that they will give a greater coverage for less money because of the greater area which they cover. I very highly recommend these systems for the protection of the rural homes even if they do contain the carbon tetrachloride, but it stands to reason that some of them would be more effective and not have the poisonous effect of the others. Do not misunderstand, any time that you have a fire, there will be poisonous fumes and gases created by the burning of almost any material but there is no reason to increase the hazard any more than is necessary.

While we are on the subject of fire extinguishers, I would venture to say that fully fifty percent of the rural homes in this county haven't a fire extinguisher and that some of the ones that do contain Most of you spend money for the automobiles, pickup, TV's etc. but you haven't thought to spend one penny in the way of fire protection for your home (which in itself is probably the greatest investment you have) or the lives of your family. Each family should have a fire evacuation plan worked out and rehearsed also. Even children four and five years old can be taught what to do in the event of a fire. This may sound a little silly to some of you that you should have fire drills in the home, but I had rather feel a little silly sometimes than feel dead, hadn't you? To support my statement that the smaller children can be taught, I was told of a child in this city who is five years old who had observed a Highway Patrolman and an employee of the Texas Highway Department who had tossed lighted cigarettes from the windows of their automobiles and his remarks was "Those men haven't been watching Smokey the Bear on television." So you see they are a lot more observant than we give them credit for being.

We received a check for \$100.00 from the Dimmitt Wheat Growers presented to us by Mr. Austin Isaacs, General Manager. This is an annual donation which the growers saw fit to present and for which we are very grateful. Every donation of this type is used to purchase more equipment to make this department a more efficient department and a better fire fighting team. Thanks from all of us. Kinkadee's definition of an accident goes like this: "An accident is something that, five minutes after it happens, anyone can see how it could have been avoided." Here are some more home fire facts and fire safety questions to think about. Asphyxiation by fire fumes is responsible for a majority of fire deaths, and this fact makes

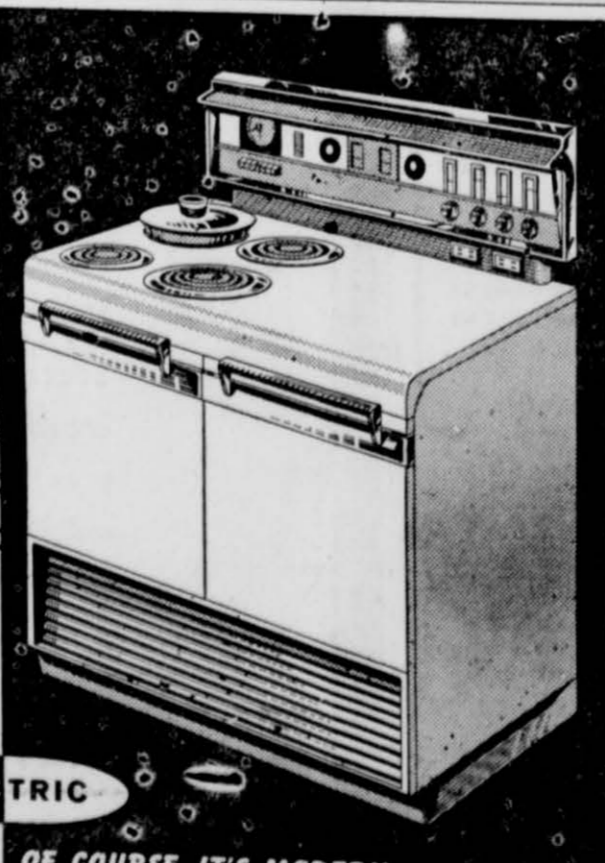
