

To get the water from Spence, down the river only requires officials Colorado River Municipal Water District to open the gates in the dam at lake Spence. To get the water from the river to the new lake bed would require two 8-inch irrigation pipes, 2,400 feet long. Irrigation pumps would be used to lift the water from the river to the lake.

Darby also said that, if necessary, a canal would be dredged in the old lake to allow the water to flow from other areas of the lake to the area where the water is piped to the treatment facility. He said that a canal is already there - that several years ago Ballinger experienced a similar problem and dredged the



Poe's corner by Charlsie Poe

#### One Man's Courage

There is another story in connection with the Poe's Chapel School which should be told. It concerns the tragic accident that changed the life of John J. Bugg, mincipal, and placed him in the field of education.

John was the son of a pioneer couple who established afarm home at Coleman soon after their marriage in 1878. But in 1885 they pulled up stakes and homesteaded on the North Concho River, 35 miles northwest of San Angelo. Then it was Tom Green County but in 1890, the year John J. was born, the county was divided and Sterling County was created which took in their home.

The Buggs traveled the 125 miles to the homestead in a wagon holding all their earthly possessions, and



buckboard and after spending the night at the ranch, he was given a horse and saddle and pointed towards the peaks of the Davis Mountains. He made the 55 miles by night. He found a place to board for \$10 a month and opened school two days later in an old adobe building with dirt floor. The 36 pupils were a mixture of Anglos and Mexicans. John was 17 and all he knew about running a school was to keep order. But his most thrilling experience came when he went to Pecos, the county seat, and took a two-day examination in 12 subjects to receive his teaching certificate. He saved \$173.50, after teaching 6 months for \$65.00 a month. With this money he attended Southwest Texas Normal School at San Marcos for

nine months. The following year he taught at a rural school in Mitchell County. This was followed by a two months summer school at Toyah. In the fall of 1910 he enrolled at West Texas College in Canyon as a junior. A bachelors' organization was set up for six boys; they rented a three room house with a kitchen and batched. John was the bookkeeper and purchasing agent for the house and they managed on about \$7.00 per month each. This method of economizing was followed by many students. For financial reasons John left school in February and taught at Swan's Chapel School in Jones County. He returned to college in the summer and taught in Jones County the following year. He then taught at Cone, a two-teacher school, north of Ralls. The winters were cold on the plains and this is where he got experience with the blue

In 1915 he bid the plains farewell and came to Runnels County to be principal of the Poe School. This is where he met the one who became his wife. Ozella Poe was then a junior in Winters High School. She and her brother, Andrew, drove a buggy and horse six miles into school every day. John boarded with one of the Poe tenants. This was an interesting year in his life.

#### Ranchers to study management

"Holistic Ranch Management-Putting It All Together" will be the theme of the 1984 International Ranchers Roundup (IRR) scheduled in San Angelo's Convention Center, July 30-August 3.

Livestock owners from some two dozen states and several countries other than the U.S. are expected in San Angelo for the fiveday educational event designed to assist ranchers with practical solutions to improve their operations, said Dr. Zerle L. Carpenter, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. The Extension Service is the conference organizer.

Ranchers who attend will expect to become quite familiar with the word "holistic," which implies that all aspects of the ranching operation are to be considered in the planning process, since each is an integral part of the whole, the director said.

Carpenter noted that IRR coordinators are placing emphasis on meeting the specific needs of ranchers of North America's semi-arid rangeland, but added that many of the ranching principles addressed during the conference are applicable to ranches throughout the range, wildlife, livestock world.





#### Implement sales to rise in 1984

Agricultural equipment dealers are banking on farmers to do a little more buying in 1984. There is a pent-up demand in the market, and the purchasing cycle for farm equipment is overdue, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Thus the sales of all categories of farm equipment should improve, with a 10 percent increase expected for com-

bines, cornheads, tractors of more than 100 horsepower and four-wheel drive tractors. Prices also should increase 5 to 10 percent, depending on local demand, the season of the year and marketing strategy. Some factors that could dampen new equipment sales are the availability of good used equipment, the prospect for lower farm prices later this year, and more selective loan making by lenders.



#### Social Security number explained

Since 1936 when the first Social Security number was assigned, almost 300 million have been issued and about 5 million additional numbers are issued each year. There is no concern, however, that the Social Security Administration will soon exhaust its supply of numbers; the nine digits that comprise the Social Security number (000-00-0000) provide approximately 1 billion possible combinations.

Until 1972, the first three digits of the Social Security number identified the local office that issued it. Since then, the numbers have been assigned from the headquarters complex in Baltimore, Maryland. Now, the first three digits denote the State of the mailing address used on

no special meaning.

Today, the Social Security number is being used for purposes that were not even considered when the Social Security Act became law. However, the need for a common identifier caused it to be adopted by other governmental and nongovernmental agencies.

The Internal Revenue Service began using the Social Security number for taxpayer identification in 1961. Their lead was followed by the military, the Treasury Department, and other agencies that administered programs supported by Federal funds.

States and their local subdivisions are permitted to use the Social Security number to administer any tax, public assistance, driver's license, or the initial application; the automobile registration remaining six digits have law. However, Federal,

**New Medicare provisions** outlined

The 1983 Amendments to the Social Security Act changed the provisions for Medicare payments to hospitals. Beginning October 1, 1983, Medicare hospital reimbursements will be based on a predetermined fixed rate for each type treatment. Hospitals are prohibited from beneficiaries more than this fixed amount plus the Medicare deductible. This standardized prospective payment provision replaces the computation of Medicare payments bas-



### CAPITOL **UPDATE**

U.S. SENATOR for TEXAS WASHINGTON, D.C. 20510

The South African government's Apartheid policies which deny basic rights to the non-white majority are deplorable and inexcusable. Amercian government and industry have properly attempted using their influence to try to change these policies. But the House of Representatives has passed sweeping punitive legislation which not only would impose unreasonable restraints on American businesses and individuals, but also threaten to hurt the very South African blacks they are intended to help.

In its version of the Export Administration Act, the House included measures to require U.S. companies operating in South Africa to comply with a stringent -- and quite possibly illegal under South African law -- code of employment practices; ban the import into the U.S. of kruggerands; prohibit banks from making loans for most purposes to the South African government or organizations controlled by it, and prohibit investment by U.S. individuals or companies in South African businesses.

Voluntary action by U.S. companies has resulted in a great deal of progress in reducing racial discrimination in employment practices and improving economic and social conditions of non-white South African employees outside the workplace. The Sullivan Principles, a voluntary employment practices code put forth by the Rev. Leon Sullivan, now cover about 70 percent of all employees of U.S.controlled firms in South Africa.

The Rev. Sullivan said in November, "Considering where we started, we have made almost unbelievable progress in advancing the well-being of the black people of South Africa." Because of their voluntary nature, the South African government has not interfered with implementation

To impose an even more stringent code -- one which is far more demanding than any U.S. law -- and make it mandatory, would invite problems from the South African government and have a dampening effect on the creativity of U.S. firms striving to find ways to implement these

Further, the prohibition on investment, even the reinvestment of money earned by South African operations, would be a blow to the economy of that nation. The biggest losers would be non-white workers. The steady, upward movement of these workers into skilled positions, many of them in American-owned companies following the Sullivan principles, would be severely hampered if investment were

Finally, the quiet pressure U.S. government and businesses have applied to South Africa regarding its racist policies during the past years has shown some success. If we were to impose strict, coercive sanctions, the probability is that the South African government would respond by becoming less flexible. The measures would have had a negative effect instead of a positive one.


In short, no one wins if the House bill becomes law. It must be viewed as a political gesture, and a short-sighted

The Senate version of the Export Administration Act does not include these provisions. The House-Senate Conference Committee, of which I am a member has begun meeting to iron out differences between the two bills. I will do everything in my power to see that these coercive and counter-productive restrictions do not become part of the



### Tick danger

Texas veterinarians are reporting an increasing number of cases of Canine Ehrlichiosis (pronounced early-ki-o'sis), a potentially fatal dog disease.

Originally introduced to the U.S. from Vietnam, the disease is transmitted by ticks and aggravated by stress, according to an article published recently in the Texas Veterinary Medical Journal.

Veterinary internal medicine specialists say early symptoms may include listlessness, fever, poor appetite and weight loss, followed by depletion of red and/or white blood cells and decreased blood platelets. If not properly diagnosed and treated during the early phase, some dogs may be subject to a severe chronic phase of the disease 50-100 days after infection. This stage of the disease is frequently fatal,


