County schools gain in state funds

The State Board of Education gave quick support to a school funding plan that would provide additional money for school districts in Texas with higher than average costs.

PRICE 25 CENTS PLUS TAX

The plan, as approved, will mean more money for school districts in the county. The Winters Independent School District funds will increase from \$1,416.84 per weighted student to \$1,430.03. With a total of 990.29 weighted students, the Winters School District will receive \$1,416,144.40 in state funds.

Ballinger ISD will increase from \$1,290 to \$1,431.12 for 1,268.23 weighted student; Wingate from \$1,343.70 to \$1,361.48 for 74.22 weighted

It is anticipated the plan will equalize the purchasing power among the state's 1,100 school districts by increasing state aid to offset the higher costs for salaries and supplies.

The method for allocating the school funds was a part of the massive school reform law pass ed this past summer in a special session of the Texas Legislature.

The system involves the use of a total number of weighted students. This is the average daily attendance, adjusted by pupil weights representing the higher cost needs of certain students.

An example is the pupil who spends full time in the regular classroom, would be counted as 1.0, and the student who spends: some time in a special education program would have a higher number.

VCR taken in burglary

Winters Police Officer Tim Dexter said that a video tape recorder was reported stolen from a north-side residence last week.

In the burglary report, Dex ter said that the recorder and two video tapes were taken from the Benny Castillo residence at 607 N. Magnolia sometime bet ween 6:30 p.m. and 12:15 a.m. The machine and tapes belonged to Mrs. Linda Benitez. The officer said that there were no signs of forced entry in the burglary and that the resident said that the house was locked.

Now this may be a bit technical but, here it is. These folks actually began emergency treatment at the scene of the accident rather than loading their patient and dashing for the hospital emergency room.

Utilizing what they termed "protocol" and "standing orders" our Paramedics initiated treatment at the accident scene.

The first for the area involved the initiation of intra-venous therapy.

By way of translation this means that using a procedure approved and established by the local hospital and doctors and operating under standing orders issued by doctors these highly trained, skilled paramedics began initial treatment of the victim's injuries and began an "IV" to help stabilize the injured man.

Talk about up-town, that is what we just hear about happening in the big cities. Now we have the same quality and the same level of service here.

Now, if the city moms and dads will help straighten out the communications thing we will be in top shape.

Heard that one of the items to be scheduled for the next council meeting will deal with communications with the emergency medics.

One would hope the council will look closely at this item. It would seem that it would be in the best interest of all for the council to advise the city to do what ever is necessary to assist the emergency medical service.

In many places, an ambulance service is provided, in one way or another, by a particular city. In our case, the service is provided by the county.

In this community, we are assured of advanced emergency ambulance care, at little, if any cost to the city.

The city, it would seem, would want to work with this service. Not meet it head-on at almost every turn.

All of the council members can be contacted by phone or in person by the citizens of this community, and should be on this issue.



Children in their first years of life require constant watching. This is particularly true when the child is eating. Between 60 and 70 children

under five years of age die from choking on food in this country each year, according to the Texas Medical Association. This is comparable to the number of deaths from poisoning.

A recent report in the Journal of the American Medical Association states that the largest number of choking deaths from food occurs in one vear-olds.







1985 Sign-Up Continues

Sign-up under the 1985 Farm Program will continue through March 1, 1985. Just like last year, contracts signed as of March 1st will be considered binding and liquidated damages will apply in cases of failure to fully comply with program require ments. At the time of sign-up you may request advance payments at 50 percent of the deficiency and or diversion rates. Withdrawal from the program contract before March 1. 1985 will result in a refund of the advance payments plus interest.

ACP Sign-Up

The first ACP sign-up for fiscal year 1985 will continue through December 14. Applica tions for all types of practices will be taken at this time. As of yet, we have not received our ACP allocation of funds from the state office. Hopefully, money will be here by the end of our first sign-up. If no money has been received by the December COC meeting we will hold the applications until money becomes available.

EFAP Changes

All corn has been exhausted except for a small amount of bad corn at Swisher County. We do not, at this time, anticipate any more corn becoming available. Secretary of Agriculture John Block last week did not release low grade barley, oats, wheat and milo. In Texas, we have on ly wheat and milo available. There are oats, barley and corn but it's all out of state. The milo that is in Texas is in small Wesley Don Calcote amounts and very scattered. To

go to two or more counties. Also the largest amounts are in east Texas and along the coast.

For more details you will need to stop by the office as prices and amounts vary.

Mentioned most often was a wish that their principal, Mike Grantham, come back soon. [He has been hospitalized recently. but is home now.]





Sales tax checks sent to area cities

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday sent checks totaling \$57.4 million in local tax payments to the 997 cities that levy the one percent local sales tax. The checks represented taxes collected on sales made in October and reported to the Comptroller by November 20.

Winters received \$7,953.85, up from last year's \$6,543.26. Ballinger's check was for \$18,356.17. Last year at this time, they received a check for \$10,095.46. Miles did not receive a check this month.

For the year, sales are running 4.48 percent ahead in Ballinger, 1.90 percent behind in Winters, and 33.28 percent behind in Miles.

Thus far in 1984, Winters has received \$121,208.25 in returns of sales tax.

Sales increased this October over last year in Santa Anna, Abilene, Buffalo Gap, and San Angelo. Sales were down in Coleman and Brownwood.

For the year, sales are up in Coleman, Santa Anna, Brownwood, Abilene, Buffalo Gap. Tuscola, and San Angelo.

"The border economy is look ing better than it has in three years. Local sales tax collections in the border area are up 13.2 percent in 1984 compared to last year, and we're hoping this improvement will continue," Bullock said.

This month's checks are the first to reflect the taxes on new goods and services collected for the first time beginning October 2. Bullock stated.

Sure enough, when the door was opened there was a tired, wet, cold huddle of tan dog. Shorty had come home.


