stance and flee before the four stance and flee before the four
companions arrived to rescue
the queen's faithful servant. Continuing their pursuit of Lady

death by the public executioner of Lille, who had branded her for her crimes, many years before.

New graduation test material explained The Texas Education Agency
recently sent the Winters Inrecently sent the Winters In-
dependent School District a detailed explanation of a new test which high school students
must pass, beginning in 1987, in order to receive a diploma. The test, which will include
mathematics and English mathematics and English
language arts, will be administered to eleventh grade students in October 1985. Those who do not perform satisfactorily on both the math and English
sections of the test will have opsections of the test will have op-
portunities in May 1986 and in portunities in May 1986 and in
October and May of their October and May of their
twelfth grade year to pass both sections of the exam.
Beginning in 1987, high school
diplomas must be withheld from diplomas must be withheld from
those students who have not those students who have not
demonstrated satisfactory performance by the end of their twelfth grade year. However,
they may-return and take the they may return and take the
test at a later date and will be issued a diploma when the
both parts of the test. High school students taken the exit level of the Texas
Assessment of Basic Skills for Assessment of Basic Skills for
several years, but passing it was not required before receiving a
diploma. diploma.
The local school received a be the basis for exit level testing for 1986-1990, and copies were provided to students in grades eight, nine, and ten.
Most questions on Most questions on the test
will be multiple choice, with four possible answers from which to
choose. A brief overview of the nine-page list of objectives in in cluded below.
Mathematics

Among math concepts to be
tested are these: putting
tested are these: putting
numbers in order from least to greatest, including decimals and integers, negative and positive numbers; rounding of numbers; changing fractions to decimals exponential notation.
Also, problems with fractions,
mixed numbers, decimals, and integers must be solved. Pro-
btems will invotve addition sub traction, multiplication, and Wivision.
Word problems will require mulase of seportions, percents or units of measure. Some word problems will require the stuprobability, and use charts and graphs.
Geometric concepts will be
tested, including the calculation of area, perimeter, circumfer ence, and volume of a given
figure. The Pythagorean figure. The Pythagorean
theorem, sum of angles of a theorem, sum of angles of a
triangle, bisected lines, and
right angles will be eligible for right angles will be eligible for testing.
