Potato Harvest Ready to Start

Pacific Fruit and Produce Company is preparing for its potato run at their plant several miles north of Dimmitt with some 150 to 200 acres in prospect.

The shed will be able to process the potatoes from eight to ten acres per day. The crew is already assembled and the run is expected to get underway Monday morning.

Potato prices are holding fair; with Red Lasodas bringing \$2.50 per hundred.

Pacific Fruit and Produce will process cantaloupes this year for the first time, beginning about August 1. They will begin hiring crew members about that time for both cantaloupe and carrot processing. Virtually all of the cantaloupes and carrots will come from Castro County. Potatoes will all be here also except for a few from Deaf Smith County. Plant manager Paul Williams could make no prediction about the coming prices for carrots and cantaloupes.

Gus Hawkins and Bobby Slaba Plane Crash Victims Saturday Night

Two Amarillo men—one of them a native of Hart—were killed instantly about 10:30 o'clock Saturday night in a plane crash about eleven miles south of Dimmitt on the Dimmitt-Hart highway.

Killed were Augustus (Gus) Longstreet Hawkins, 33, of 3118 West 15th St. in Amarillo and Bobby G. Slabaugh, 27, of 4604 Hughes.

Cause of the crash is still undetermined. The Federal Aviation Agency in Amarillo was planning to dismantle the engine of the plane Thursday to see if anything could have been wrong with it.

The two men were on a cross-country flight from Amarillo to Lubbock. Shortly before the crash the plane had landed at the Dimmitt airport where Hawkins made a telephone call to local radio. The airplane was moving at a high rate of speed when it struck a powerline tower pole next to the Pigg home. The left wing struck the tower and the fuselage was sheared off next to the fuselage when it struck the tower. The plane, a Cessna 182, began disintegrating, scattering in a 75-foot wide path for a quarter of a mile before twisted fuselage finally came to rest.

St. Charles, Minn. June 30, 1961.

Dear Everybody,

I have now been away from Dimmitt for about a week, and I already miss everybody there so much. I have gone through Oklahoma, Kansas, and Iowa and I am now in Minnesota. On my way I have seen many beautiful places, maybe more beautiful than the Texas Panhandle, but I have nowhere met any people as nice as the people around Dimmitt. All you people in Dimmitt can never imagine how much I loved every one of you. I left a part of my heart in Texas, and will always think of Texas as my second home. Some people up here think I have a little bit of a Texas accent and that always makes me happy and proud. We are fourteen kids from the Panhandle on the bus, we have what we call our little "Texas Clan". There are five from New Mexico, one from Colorado, and nine from Oklahoma, but we "Texans" are of course, the ones most proud of "our" state. From Minnesota we are going to Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Washington, D.C., New York, Connecticut and New York City. So I still have more than half of the trip in front of me.

Oil Drilling West Of Dimmitt Now 7600 Feet Deep

Forster Drilling Company working for the Austra Oil Company of Houston has been drilling on the Ware Farm five miles west and three miles south of Dimmitt for twenty-nine days as of July 3. According to Mr. J. B. Koonce, tool pusher, the drilling will continue to a depth of 9800 feet. The depth of the hole is over 7,600 feet. If there is any oil the first signs could show up at around 8,100 feet, according to Koonce.

A.S.C. Advises Procedure For Diverted Acreage

Diverted acreage under the 1961 feed grain program should be devoted to permanent or rotation cover of grasses and legumes, summer cover crops, winter cover crops or protected summer fallow, according to Charlie Hill, manager of the A.S.C. office. Producers wishing to summer fallow should fill out an application blank such as those mailed by the A.S.C. office several weeks ago.

Grazing of the diverted acreage is not permitted and no crops may be harvested from it.

If one receives an overplanted notice and needs to make an adjustment, it should be done no later than 15 days from the date of the notice.

County Wheat Yields Over 4 Million Bushels

Average wheat production per acre for the county this year is about 45 bushels. Average moisture content has been low for the County this year. Although hail damaged the cotton crops badly, the wheat crops, as a general rule, did not suffer much, as most of it had been cut when the hail struck. There was an estimated eight to ten percent damage to wheat over the county. Out of the 103,409.6 acres of wheat planted this year the county got about 4,653,432 bushels of wheat.

Valuable Quarter Horse Killed July 4th

Here Are Some of the Main Highlights of the First Half of 1961

As a sideline feature to the weekly news of the county, the Castro County News begins this week a two-part series covering events of the past six months. This will be a bi-yearly feature instead of annually as in the past and is designed to let interested readers keep up with the current history of the county and area.

During the week of January 5, 1961, Junior Coffey was named to the Class AA All-State Football team, and the city government moved into its brand new City Hall Building; four men, among them Don Tabor of Dimmitt were killed in a plane crash; the Dimmitt Bobcats and Bobbies swung into another season of basketball; a 4-point Soil Fertility Program designed to increase net income was introduced to a meeting of farmers; and Mr. 1961 himself did not arrive quite on time but waited until 12:55 a.m. on January 1. He was the first born of Mr. and Mrs. Donald McGuire and the first child to be born in Castro County in 1961. The Bobcat Band returned from participating in the Cotton Bowl halftime activities in Dallas.

Castro County's future ranked first with its civic minded citizens as January 12th rolled around. Young farmers were getting ready for their Junior Fat Stock Show to be held in February. The Chamber of Commerce called an organizational meeting for the purpose of forming a county Sugar Beet Growers' Association to secure an allotment for the county. Action got underway for the changeover of State Highway 85 in the Dakotas to US Highway 385 which would mean that Dimmitt would be located on a highway that stretches from the northern to the southern boundary of the United States. The annual Chamber of Commerce banquet was held. J. R. Brown was installed as president of the organization and Jim Hays vice-president. A young farmers organization was formed. Charles Hottel, agricultural agent, discussed the value of the 4-point Soil Fertility Program more extensively, emphasizing the value of soil testing. Hubcap stealing was a problem and W. W. Jones, city marshal, requested citizens to have their names stamped inside the hubcaps to prevent resale and aid in recovering them.

January 19, 1961—Organization of a Castro County Sugar Beet Growers Association was completed, officers selected and affiliation with the state

organization secured. Rev. M. D. Durham announced a Baptist revival at Sunnyside. J. R. Brown began his duties as president of the Chamber of Commerce expressing his hope of securing a commercial local feed lot to utilize more grain and of promoting more diversified farming. A Farm Management Workshop was announced by the agricultural agent. Junior Coffey was named to National All-American Football Team for 1960.

Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Bagwell, Sr., of the Bethel Community celebrated their 69th wedding anniversary during the week of January 26. In that same week City Marshal Jones issued warnings to illegal parkers at ballgames and a two-hour limit on parking was announced for the business section of town. Charles Hottel called attention to the fact more yields, and more good from irrigating can be had by spreading cotton burrs on land; they add nutrients and open up soil allowing water to penetrate further rather than running off as tail water. Hunter Gin was sold to Jack and Shellie Tomlin and K. M. Fleming. Nazareth 4-H Clubs set out 112 pecan trees expected to bear fruit in 2 to 3 years. Castro County Library received more than 90 new books.

In the week of February 2, more than 100 boys and girls entered the Junior Fat Stock and Project Show. Dimmitt and Tulia were tied in district basketball competition. The Dimmitt JayCees featured rides and parachute jumps at their "Farmers Air-Day" at the Dimmitt Airport. The deadline to apply for an exchange student in Dimmitt for 1961-62 was announced. S. R. Hutto explained how he raises quality pork for a profit even though affected adversely by the slippery economies of feeds and markets. Russel Moran, local lawyer, came close to bringing theft charges when a local garageman got Moran's car confused with that of Gene Mickey's. The key worked and he drove it to his garage, repaired and cleaned the radiator as Mickey had instructed him to do to his own car. In this same week of February 2 another freakish accident occurred when Chesley Johnston received a severe injury to his eye when a hard-packed snowball glanced off a pickup cab and hit him in the eye.

February 9, 1961, marked the week when the Dimmitt JayCees finally were successful in having a "Farmers' Air Day" having had to postpone it pre-

viously because of snow. Members of the Northside Baptist Church brought their new building close to completion during this week. B. M. Nelson resigned as manager of the Chamber of Commerce. Jerry Felder of Hart and Gerald Witkowski of Nazareth showed champion calves in the Junior Stock Show. Election for three school board members at Hart and Dimmitt and two at Nazareth was announced.

Dimmitt's Bobcats shut out Tulia in a two-game series earning them the District Championship, in the week of February 16. A local family that week volunteered to keep a foreign student. Names were not disclosed immediately. Annual Soils Fertility Day was announced for February 28. Last rites were held for Edgar N. Womble, a former resident and Clarence Preston, a resident of Dimmitt for 15 years.

More progress was marked during the week of February 23 when the city's water supply became state approved, the new City Hall was opened for public inspection, the Bobcats won bi-district and regional games. In that same week Mr. and Mrs. J. O. Kessler celebrated their golden wedding anniversary; 4-H awards were made to ten Castro County boys; Mrs. W. B. Beach of Hereford, an early settler of Castro County, died midway of her 100th year.

Week of March 2 saw the Dimmitt Bobcats on their way to Austin to play in the state basketball finals where they managed to Needville Bluejays handily but bowed to the Buna Cougars. Judge H. M. LaFont resigned as judge of the 64th Judicial District. Junior Coffey was named to the all-state basketball team. Decision on federal aid through the Hill-Burton Act was still pending. Farmers were urged to fill out feed grain reports as the first step in possibly making grain sorghum an allotted crop. Dimmitt Schools held open house in connection with their science fair and public school week. Last rites for Benito Reyes and Otis Rogers were held.

March 9 saw the appointment of Ernest Davis as the new acting postmaster; absentee voting began in the election to replace Lyndon Johnson as U. S. Senator. The city commission went to Austin on behalf of the town regarding proposed laws affecting municipalities. Taylor-Harrison income tax records showed an increase in taxes from 4 percent to 20 percent since 1937 on the average farmer. George Bradford filed for mayor.

In the week of March 16 the community of Sunside announced the completion of their new church finished less than a year from the time it was demolished by a tornado. Fred Bruegel and Tom Day displayed their mule-footed hogs at the VFW Community Sale. John Nichols announced a plan by which nearly all income brackets can afford to own a home. This year's fair dates were set up for September 7-8. Old-timers enjoyed a possum and eon dinner. Sesame growers met to discuss sesame acreage in Castro County. According to city records building in Dimmitt showed a definite upswing. Mrs. Alice Cowen was elected district executive committeewoman for District Nine.

A spring snowstorm blanketed the area the week of March 26 and as a result of the weather conditions four Latin American boys drove into the side of a Posta Liquor Store on the Hereford highway. Awards were made to Junior Coffey, Zandra Barnes and Don McDermitt at the annual Athletic Banquet. Nolan Craft Shop was damaged by fire. Local teachers, M. Inez Robinson and Mrs. Laura Nell Hamilton receive scholarships to Texas Women's University and Eastern New Mexico University. Gary Wyatt of Dimmitt and a junior student at West Texas directed the night run of "Duet For Two Hands." Lanny Tucker of Hart was named "Teacher of the Year." Last rites were held for C. A. Jordan, Otto Miller, James Robert Riley and Linda Kay Norris.

With Easter around the corner the Dimmitt JayCees announced the week of March 30 that they would stage their annual Easter Egg Hunt in the city park on Easter Sunday for all the town's children. A youth group from the Methodist Church also planned sunrise services in the park for that day. According to report from "Texas Town and City" it was learned that same week that Dimmitt had risen from 371st to 280th in size in an overall survey of towns in Texas. Six cows and calves were reported stolen from a pasture in Sunnyside. The Parent-Teachers Association District Spring Conference was held that week in the Methodist Church of Dimmitt. Amarillo Weather Bureau reported a new system of alerting people to the approach of tornadoes and severe weather. New water lines to the Castro Memorial Gardens were laid that week and Mrs. C. J. Mapes wrote a brief history of the Cemetery which the News published.

Dimitrio I. D. Ivanoff languished comfortably in our living room one evening last week and tossed off with cool precision each one of our barrage of questions about his home country of Brazil.

"Your schools are simple," he said with all the assurance of a 17-year-old, "they're not nearly so hard as ours. They are ridiculously easy." Dimitrio is speaking of schools in Los Angeles, one of the nation's hotbeds of "progressive" education, but his general sentiments were an indictment of U.S. high school education as a whole.

Dimitrio was from Sao Paulo, Brazil, one of the world's most diversified industrial cities and he was a guest in our home for two nights while he and the rest of his busload of foreign exchange students stopped over here for a tour and a rest. We were delighted to find we had been assigned a Brazilian boy in view of the current economic and political turmoil that seems to be fermenting in South and Latin America.

We weren't disappointed either. He was apparently a sensitive, cultured youth from an upper class family, and we found in him an unexpected source of information for a 17-year-old. Although he was quick to defend his country's grading fifteen-courses-a-year school clip, he was evasive about answering our query concerning the effectiveness of a system that left over half the population illiterate, and permitted high school entrance to only one in six children. With a quick patriotism that is characteristic of most Brazilians, Dimitrio said "We're raising our educational standards quickly without lowering the quality of our education. Everyone who wants to can go to school... whether they can stay in or not is something else again."

When we prodded him with the American premise that a Democracy can work only with a literate people, he disagreed. "Governing oneself is something people must learn," he maintained. "Castro established himself in Cuba because the Cubans didn't know how to govern themselves. They were accustomed to many years of Batista where he took over all the chores of government. No one concerned themselves with government because what they thought made no difference. They lived under a dictatorship. If there had been a decade or so of democracy Castro and communism wouldn't have had a chance. Our people learned to govern themselves. Under President Quadros we are reaching a high plane of democratic government and the communists will never have a chance in our country." What about the other South American countries like Peru, Bolivia, Chile, Colombia, etc.?

"The dangers there are in dictator countries. It may be easy for the communists to take over in those, but never where Democracy has been working for any period of time. South American countries have found the democratic system to be the best where they've been able to try it, despite the high rate of illiteracy."

In short, even a sofry official concerned with the attitudes and needs of his constituents is a better government administrator than one concerned chiefly with the desires of himself or the head of his dictatorial government.

Demetrio, the son of a Bulgarian father and Italian mother, seemed to enjoy talking and telling us in many things we didn't know about Brazil and even some things about California.

"California," he said, "has the best of everything—schools, income, people, everything." We told him he had been hooked by the California Chamber of Commerce, that Texas was the best state in most categories. About that time Penny said supper, (oops!) I mean dinner, was ready and we didn't get to pursue the fascinating foreign climes of Brazil and California.

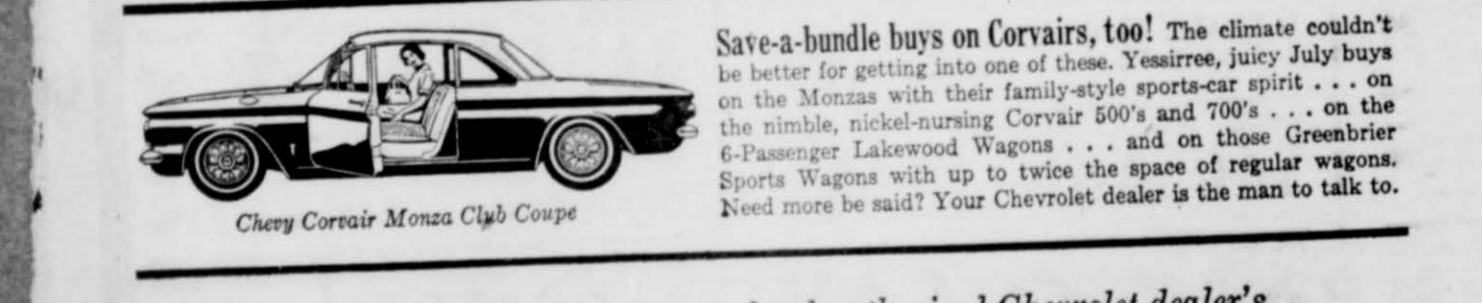
