The faculty has been increased from 16 members to 22. This increase has practically eliminated the individual child a chance for better instruction.

With the many physical improve. ments which have been made to the school plant, Dimmir Schools are taking the lead with schools of its class in the Texas Panhandle. The modern swimming pool makes Dimmitt the only school in this section of Texas with such an addition. The new Lunch Room at the Elementary School is almost ready for use. And the lighting of the athletic field is in progress. Let us say hats off to these men who are responsible for these improvements in our local educational






