Investigations continue into sonic booms

Officials of the Federal Aviation Administration and the U. S. Air Force said Monday that an investigation is underway into the recent reports of sonic booms that have rattled Runnels County over the past several weeks.

The most recent sonic boom was reported by businesses and residents in Ballinger last Friday afternoon. That boom, according to Ballinger Police Chief Paul Boggess, was a "double boom" that rattled a number of plate glass windows.

Lt. Col. William Wihelmie, an Air Force liasion officer in Ft. Worth assigned to the F.A.A. said that by early this week his office had been unable to determine what type of aircraft was responsible for the booms, which are created when an aircraft exceeds the speed of sound.

Wihelmie's office is responsible for flight operations in a fivestate region. The officer said

that there are a number of super sonic airplanes in the military and that all flights in his area of responsibility are coordinated through his office.

The officer confirmed that military aircraft, capable of super-sonic speeds, were used in an area over Brownwood and Lake Brownwood but super sonic flight was prohibited.

He also said that there were two photo-recons routes that crossed Runnels County. These routes are flown by the RF-4, a plane capable of such speed, but not at the extremely low altitude specified on the training route-below 1,500 feet.

One of the routes crosses U. S. 83 just south of Hatchell and the other curves around south of Ballinger.

Gold In Your Backyard

It has been a sad awakening to learn that the weeds I've been trying to destroy in my yard all these many years are not weeds at all, but beautiful Texas wildflowers.

This was brought home when I began the study of wildflowers in order to discuss the subject intelligently with others. How embarrassing to ride down the highway and be unable to identify the fields of gorgeous colored plants along the way. Shouldn't a good Texan be familiar with his state?

Just think of all the work I've wasted; chopping, pulling and poisioning these plants. And to no avail. They seem to be more prolific each year especially the Texas Dandelion.

What a golden opportunity I've missed to conduct a wildflower festival or tour in my own back yard. Since the dandelions are so plentifulwhy not a Dandelion Trail? We have the Bluebonnet Trail, the Azalea Trail and others.

The dandelion is a member of the daisy family with more than 20,000 members, this is the largest family of flowering plants, and we know why. The bright-yellow flowers are a common sight in the spring and right pretty, but when the flowerheads mature, oh, boy! The seeds, attached to feathery "parachutes", are carried into

the wind, a very effective method of seeding.

Every morning when I go out to pick up the newspaper, I pull the yellow heads off all the nights crop, but the next morning there are little fuzzy balls waving in the wind, and the damage has been done. There will be another full crop.

On second thought, a Dandelion Trail would not be feasible since my next best crop is the Goat-Head. Its flower of five yellow petals blooms from March to October, but it has painfully sharp burrs, as one knows who steps on it. Aptly called the "puncture weed", the vine trails closely along the ground on West Texas prairies and yards as well.

Other prize plants in my yard include the Texas Thistle, so spiny that one can't pull it by hand; a milkweed plant, that oozes a sticky white fluid when broken; and queen anne's lace. It has wide clusters of tiny white flowers and "seed ticks" that stick to clothing and to the fur of passing animals. Try getting these ticks out of clothing. They don't even wash out.

I finally learned that Henbit is the name of the purple flowered plant, growing low on the ground and taking over my

Perhaps I could be a second

Nancy Parker and brew some home remedies for medicinal purposes from my abundant supply of weeds, I mean flowers. Trouble is I don't know which is

had rather take pills. One wild shrub that I like very much is the Ceniza, also called Purple Sage, that grows in the country, usually on the hillsides. It stnds out because of its light-grey leaves, and immediately after a rain, large masses of violet or pinkish blossoms appear almost

miraculously on this manybranched shrub. I had two of these bushes on the farm and bought another

after we moved to town. It grew well for a number of years and finally died. Last year it was replaced with three good sized Cenizas, but two of them expired immediately and one lived

on for several months. Perhaps they were pampered too much or some poison used on nut grass came too close.

There are several types of wildflowers in my yard that have not been identified, but I've only touched on the subject. If I continue studying, maybe I can be like Ferdinand Lindheimer who came to America from Germany in 1833. Several members of the Runnels County Historical Commission visited New Braunfels in 1976 to attend a preservation conference, and we toured Lindheimer's home that is maintained as a housemuseum by the New Braunfels Conservation Society.

Lindheimer served in the Texas Army and acted as scout for German Colonists in Texas, he settled in New Braunfels on

He was one of the first to apply scientific classification to the Texas flora, and to provide large herbariums with preserved examples of them. His name appears in more than 30 scientific names of flowers. He was recognized by the leading botanists of the times. Sometimes called the "Father of Texas Botany."



> Anemia can be a problem for elders too Most of us think of anemia as a nutritional problem of young women and children. But if you're over 65, it could be a problem for you too and one cause

for feeling a lack of energy. Anemia isn't a normal part of aging, yet it's very common among older people. Sometimes it's the result of physical conditions or certain drugs that cause internal bleeding. But usually it's due to not eating enough

iron-rich foods. Meat, fish, and poultry are especially good sources of iron. Slice these foods very thin, if you don't like chewing meats. Also, eating a food high in vitamin C, such as a cup of orange juice, with your meat

will help your body absorb iron. If you're one of those people you may avoid. The following list of foods may be helpful for persons who need to increase food sources of iron. Foods are grouped by heme iron and non-heme iron food sources. Heme iron is the more absorbable form

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

"Doubts Can Be Good"

My favorite of all Jesus' disciples is Thomas.

Thomas, who must have been from Missouri because of his "Show Me!" attitude.

Thomas, the skeptic – if, as some wit has said, "A skeptic is a person who would ask God for his I.D. Card."

Thomas, the universal disciple. The disciple whose characteristics seem to show up in contemporary Christian disciples everywhere.

This hard-headed doubter-this honest questioner-this hungering seeker-this Thomas is the kind of guy with whom I can readily identify.

I can learn something about doubt from Thomas. First, that all of us have doubts.

Frederick Buechner says, "If you don't have any doubts you are either kidding yourself, or you are asleep.'

Who of us has not been tempted to pray the prayer of the skeptic, "O Lord-if there is a Lord; save my soul-if I have a soul.

My doubts are often like Woody Allens. Wood says, "If only God would give me some clear sign! Like making a large deposit in my name at a Swiss bank.'

We all have doubts just like Thomas, But we need to remember That Thomas' doubts are never equated with lack of faith. Just because he has doubts is no sign that Thomas is to be deserted by his friends the disciples, or by his Lord Jesus.

This leads to the second thing I learn about doubt from Thomas-doubts are not automactically bad. There are not always sinful and evil.

Doubts can be good. The

can be positive factors in leading us to a deeper faith.

To quote Frederick Buechner again: "Doubts are the ants in the pants of faith. They keep it awake and moving."

"One of Thomases great virtues," writes William Barclay, "was that he absolutely refused to say that he understood what he did not understand, or that he believe what he did not believe."

"There is an uncompromising honesty about him. He would never still his doubts by pretending that they did not exist. He was not the kind of man who would rattle off a creed without understand what it was all about."

Then Barclay quotes Tennyson, "There lives more faith in honest doubt, believe me, than in half the creeds."

There is more ultimate faith," continues Barclay, "in the person who insists on being sure than in the person who glibly repeats things which he has never thought out, and which he may not really believe. It is doubt like that which in the end arrives at certanity."

Dostoevski testified to this same truth when reflecting on the growth occasioned by doubt in his life, he once exclaimed," My Hosannas were forged in the crucible of doubt."

Doubts are good when the lead us in a search for truth. Doubts are good when they drive us to find answers.


Doubts are good when they lead us to faith.
