Winters Council hears request for Police Reserve

Galloway appeared before the Winters City Council Monday to ask the council to consider authorizing a reserve police officer program in Winters.

The police chief said that a reserve officer program would provide a supplement to the five full-time police officers in the city, allow for increased patrol activities during week end hours, and give the department more help in keeping overtime hours at a minimum.

Galloway said he was asking for authority to form a 10-man reserve force, but that he would

In other business, City Administrator Chuck MacIlvaine requested council approval of new rates for the swimming pool at the city park.

The administrator said that the pool will open on May 30 and will be open from 1:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. daily through the summer.

The admission charges at the pool will be \$1.50 for adults and 50 cents for children under five. The children must be accompanied by an adult.

Also approved were special passes which contain 20 swim tickets at a price of \$20.

A special swimming session, for women only, is planned for Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 6:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. and family sessions on Tuesday and Thursday at the same time.

The council also set the private party rental rate at the pool at \$25 per hour.

Winters Police answer 73 calls during April

In his monthly report, of the accidents were minor, Winters Police Chief Ted Galloway said that his department answered a total of 73 calls during the past month, issued 44 citations and 25 warning tickets.

Leading the list of calls answered by police officers was assistance to citizens. Officers responded 30 times to lend assistance to persons needing help of some kind.

Officers responded to 19 disturbance calls and three burglary alarms.

During the month, officers made five DWI arrests, two felony arrests, one misdemeanor arrest, and one arrest on an outstanding warrant.

Five traffic accidents were handled by the department. All with no injuries.

Other calls included assault, attempted burglary, juvenile calls, abandoned vehicles, theft, criminal trespass, vandalism.

The department recovered one stolen car. The vehicle had been reported stolen in Lubbock and one subject was arrested in connection with the stolen car.

Officers also recovered property taken in a January burglary and are continuing an investigation.

Just how did we come to set apart a day to revere motherhood? The idea of officially honoring mothers may be less than 100 years old in the United States, but goes back centuries in others parts of the world. According to The World Book Encylopedia, ancient

civilizations-such as the Greeks, Assyrians and Romans-compared nature's creative powers with those of a mother, because they believed a mother is the source of life.

A day for honoring mothers was observed many years ago in England and in Yugoslavia. In the United States, people began holding their own celebrations in honor of their mothers, but it was Julia Ward Howe in 1872 who made the first known suggestion for an official Mother's Day. In 1907, Anna Jarvis of Graphton, West Virginia and Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, began a campaign for a nationwide observance of Mother's Day. By 1912, a delegate from her church introduced a resolution naming her the founder of Mother's Day and the second Sunday in May as the day of observance.

Finally, on May 19, 1914, President Woodrow Wilson signed a joint resolution of Congress recommending the government's recognition of Mother's Day. This led to the proclamation in 1915 of the national observance of Mother's Day each Spring.

This Mother's Day (Sunday, May 10) why not take time out to recognize the vital roles mothers play in our lives. There is perhaps no group more deserving of our appreciation.



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Oil and gas workers may be eligible for retraining program

If you are an oil and gas worker who has been laid-off or have received notice of a pending lay-off, you may be eligible for a state-sponsored retraining program funded under Title III of the Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA).

In order to be eligible for Title III, you must meet State and Federal requirements as follows:

1. be a displaced oil and gas industry worker from the 19 county West Central Texas SDA which includes the following counties: Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Comanche, Eastland, Fisher, Haskell, Jones, Kent, Knox, Mitchell, Nolan, Runnels, Scurry, Shackelford, Stephens, Stonewall, Taylor, and Throckmorton.

2. have been terminated or laid-off or have received a notice of lay-off and you are eligible for or have exhausted your unemployment compensation; and and it is unlikely that you will return to your previous oil and gas occupation.

3. be determined eligible by the JTPA staff of the West Central Texas Council Governments.

In order to determine your eligibility, you will have to furnish the following information:

1. Birth certificate or voter's registration card for proof of your U.S. citizenship.

2. Selective service rating (if applicable)

3. Proof of where you live

4. Proof of age

5. Social Security card 6. Proof of the members of your family

7. Lay-off notice or verification from your employer verifying layoff (we can assist you in obtaining this information)

You will be expected to furnish most of this information. However, a trained intake worker will assist you throughout the eligibility determination process.

If you are determined eligible for Title III, the following program services are available to

CLASSROOM TRAINING: The program will pay allowable tuition and training costs at Texas State Technical Institute (TSTI) ONLY in the following areas: 1) auto mechanics, 2) diesel mechanics, 3) automated office skills/technology, 4) electronic service technology, 5) computer literacy/microcomputers, 6) energy conservation and weatherization, 7) blueprint reading-production, 8) plant mechanics-industrial electronics, 9) small power equipment, 10) fiberglass repair, 11) used car reconditioning.







Teleservice can be used to: *Start an application for Social Security benefits or Supplemental Security Income Payments. The applications can be started by telephone and completed by mail.

*Apply for Medicare.

*Report a name or address change.

*Report a change in marital *Report that a person has

stopped or started work or to report other events that may affect receipt of checks. *Report a lost or stolen check

*Report a lost or missing Social Security or Medicare

or delayed payment.


*Get help in completing Medicare claims forms.

*Request a copy of a person's Social Security earnings record. *Get help in requesting a

review of the decision made on


