County Businessmen and Farmers Paid Top Stock Show Premiums

Big premiums highlighted the Second Annual Junior Fat Stock and Project Show of February 17 and 18 in Dimmitt. Businessmen and farmers from over the county paid the money as an addition to the market price offered by packers to help defray the farm youngsters high costs of producing show livestock.

Hays Implement Company paid \$486.76 for one calf, one lamb, and three hogs. Castro County Grain paid \$411.48 for two calves, two lambs, and three hogs. One calf and one hog went to C & S Equipment Company for \$282.85 and Sears Grain Company paid \$274.68 for two calves, two lambs, and one hog.

\$249.15 was paid by Dimmitt Gin and Elevator Company for two calves, one lamb and five hogs. Panhandle Compress and Warehouse \$45.54 for one calf. Clovis Cattle Commission Company paid a total of \$808.32 for one calf, one hog, and thirty-five lambs.

Dimmitt Wheat Growers bought two calves and two lambs for \$103.04. Ranchers and Farmers of Clovis paid \$295.63 for two calves. Sheppard Gin of Hart paid \$78.63 for a calf and a lamb.

BRICKLAYING STARTS ON NEW SCHOOL BUILDING

Russel A. Moran To Attend Austin Lawmen's Meet

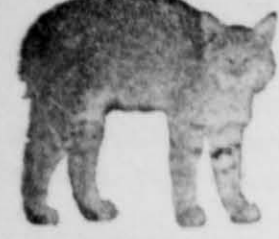
