The department now has a truck and a tank and pump unit. The department also has another tank and pump unit ordered and delivery is expected very soon.

By using funds allocated for the purchase of a piece of firefighting equipment from the Forest Service, the fire department ordered the construction of a trak and pump.

Then the one that had been on the way for several years came


along-minus a truck. Now the department has two pumping units, complete with water tanks and only one truck.

Two women and two men are seeking the city judge's position. Edna Horn and Mrs. L. V. Johnson are on the ballot along with Doug Wadsworth and Bud Everett.

Two seats on the Ballinger City Council, Place 3 and Place 4, are on the May 7 ballot.

Place 3 incumbant Woodrow Hoffman is not eligible to seek another term on the council. The Ballinger City Charter prohibits a councilman from serving more than two terms.

We began with the El Capote Cabin, 1838, typical of the primitive log cabin structures erected while Texas was a Republic. Michael Erskine, one of these building's early onwers, was among the pioneers of trail

hungry gold miners in California. The cabin was originally located in Gonzales County.

Next in line was the Hedwigs Hill Cabin, built by immigrants to Texas in the 1850's, illustrative of German participa-

tion in early Texas ranching. The cabin was originally located on a hill overlooking the Llano River near the road between Fort Mason and San Antonio.

Joly Ranch Stone House and its out buildings (1875) were built by George Jowell, according to legend, after his log cabin had been burned to the ground while he was on a trail drive to Kansas. Such isolated ranch houses, along with unguarded herds on the North Texas frontier were inviting targets for Comanche and Kiowa raiders. The stone house, with one room above the other, actually a fortress with 16 inch thick walls. The bottom was an arsenal with only gun holes for windows. There was no visible means of reaching the upper floor where the family lived, possibly a rope ladder pulled up for safety, a stair-way had been built outside for visitors. The self-sufficient complex including a cooler building and cistern, was originally located in Palo Pinto County near the present Possum Kingdom Lake.

The Matador Half Dugout (1891) is a common architectural form adopted by early ranchers on the plains because trees were scarce and lumber had to be freighted long distances by wagon. After lumber became available, structures of this type continued to be used as line or

fence camps located on the outer perimeters of ranch boundaries. Built by J. C. Davis and traded to the Matador Ranch when the ranch enlarged its boundaries in 1916, this structure was formerly located in northern Dickens County.

Phil told us that the Matador land was bought for ten cents an acre - one cowboy rode one way on his horse and another rode the other way, and all the land was bought between the two cowboys. It covered four counties according to our guide.

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

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NOTICE OF RIGHT TO NOMINATE BY PETITION

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) is accepting nominations for County Committee elections for Runnels County. This notice is issued to inform eligible voters of the right to nominate candidates by petition. Copies of the petition and instructions on its completion can be obtained from your local FmHA office.

Persons nominated should have an interest in a farm as an owner, tenant, or sharecropper within the county or area in which activities of the county or area committee are carried out. They must be citizens of the United States or aliens lawfully admitted to the United States for permanent residents, and be well qualified for committee work. Spouses of those persons who meet the eligibilty criteria are also eligible for nomination for election to the county committee. Nominations must be received in the Abilene Office no later than May 19, 1988. FmHA committee elections are open to all eligible voters without regard to race, color, religion, national origin, age, political affliation, marital status, sex

used to prevent the skin problem, may make the symptoms worse. Rubber gloves trap perspiration, which can aggravate dermatitis, and prevent the rash from healing properly.

TMA suggests the following tips to prevent dishpan hands. -If you must wear rub-

ber gloves, avoid wearing them in hot water, which causes your hands to perspire, and aggravates the rash.

-Cotton gloves can be worn under rubber gloves to absorb perspiration. Remove jewelry

before using the cleaners, Residue under jewelry can lead to a rash on the skin.

- Moisturize your skin with creams to keep hands soft. Avoid using creams and lotions containing anesthetics or antibiotics because they can make the condition

Farmers Home to elect new county committee members

ministration (FmHA) will begin accepting nominations April 5 for election of county committee members under new rules that make it easier for farmers to qualify as candidates and to vote, Don M. Newhouse said today.

FmHA county committees perform a variety of duties for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's credit agency, including deciding whether an applicant is eligible for a farm loan.

"One important change broadens the definition of a farmer to anyone who has an interest in a farm in the county as owner, tenant of sharecropper," Newhouse said. "The new definition requirement that more than half of the candidate's income must come from farm operation has been dropped."

"The nominating period has been extended to 45 days from

The Farmers Home Ad- the previous 25 days, thus allow ing more opportunity for people to run for the committee,' Newhouse said. "At least three eligible farmer voters, including the nominee, must sign the petition.'

Two of the three committee members are elected by Farmers in the county, and one is appointed by FmHA. One of the elected seats is to be filled for a three-year term at the year's election, which is scheduled for June 30.

"Another important change this year is that one member of the committee can be an active FmHA farm borrower, or be eligible for an FmHA farm loan," Mr. Newhouse said. "Previously, this was not allowed."

Anyone interested in running for the committee can obtain a petition and other information from the FmHa county office at 2203 Federal Building, Abilene, Texas, Newhouse said.

Railroad Commission names committee to advise on natural gas rules changes

Railroad Commission Chair man James E. (Jim) Nugent and Commssioners Kent Hance and John Sharp named a 12-member Natural Gas Rules Committee to suggest improvements to the Commission's rules governing natural gas production in the

Specifically, the committee was asked to study and comment on current rules; provide information on gas production, gathering, pipelines, and markets to Texas; detail the probable effects of current and proposed rules; and advise how gas consumers can best be served.

The committee was also asked to develop a consensus position among gas consumers, producers and piplelines on revised RRC gas propration rules to satisfy requirments of state law while ensuring market demand for gas is met.

Refrigerate your Easter eggs

If you're tempted to color baskets and baskets full of eggs for Easter, remember to store them properly or to not eat them, says a Texas A&M

Commission Chairman James E. (Jim) Nugent pointed out two unique aspects of the advisory committee and its task. "Gas consumers will be equal partners with producers and pipelines as the committee begins its work, recognizing their importance to the overall gas picture in Texas," he said.

"We've also asked the committee to recommend ways we can simplify our rules as we improve them," Nugent said. "You shouldn't have to hire experts to understand our rules."

Kent Hance noted that the committee will report to the commission by May 1 and stressed the need for quick action by the Railroad Commission. "We need clear, understandable rules to guide the industry in production of natural gas-one of Texas' most valuable resources," Hance said.

University Agricultural Extension Service poultry specialist. Dr. David Mellor says a recent study in the Poultry Science Journal showed that hardcooked eggs stored at room temperature spoil in less than a week. But eggs put in the refrigerator after two days at room temperature keep for three weeks. Hard-cooked eggs kept in their shells and stored the whole time in the refrigerator show the least bacterial growth, he reports. "It's best to remove the Easter eggs from the basket as soon as possible, refrigerate them and use them within a few days," according to the specialist. "If your children like to carry their Easter baskets around for days include some plastic eggs for play and refrigerate the real eggs that the family will eat," Mellor advises.

This week is Holy Week. If you are reading this article on the day of The Enterprise's publication date, it is Maundy Thursday. Throughout Christendom, today is the day that we commemorate and celebrate the Lord's instituting the Lord's Supper.

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It is a subdued celebration. Death is already in the wind. Tomorrow is Good Friday. There is no way to celebrate Maundy Thursday without the thought of what happened the next afternoon. The death of Jesus.

This week reminds us of our own immortality. That we some day will die.

Jesus on the cross. Suffering terrible pain. Slowly dying. This vision is haunting. Gives us a sinking, helpless feeling. But in death a lot of people have to suffer physical

The most haunting scene from the cross is Jesus crying out, "My God, My God, why have you forsaken me?" The ultimate feeling of abandonment. The ultimate fear of death is not the dying. Nor even the suffering. It is dying alone. Abandoned. By friends, relatives. Seemingly by even God, Himself.

Karen was a parishioner. She was a friend. We were soul friends, as one author described two people who shared a bond created by God for mutual support in their

Then one day the word was spoken. That most evil, dreaded word. "Cancer." At first we talked about it in terms of cure. Then the key word changed to "remission." Finally, life forced us all to see its evil for what it was terminal. When put together, these two words, "terminal cancer," strike fear in our hearts. They bring denial.

Finally we were able to say the words. To comprehend the reality the words pointed to. Saying the words were scary and devastating for both of us. But we had to get

past the denial and false hopes. The cancer was moving to fast. We had to say the truth. And we did.

When all the feelings and fears came out, Karen realized that she didn't have much control over what was happening to her. She began to come to grips with suffering and even her eventual death. What frightened her the most was the fear of walking the last leg of her earthly journey

This was something that we had a little bit of control over. No one could promise healing. But I promised to be there at the last. She would not die abandoned. Like Jesus did.

It was a stupid promise to make. A hundred things could have happened that would have made that promise impossible to keep. But I never once doubted that promise or wished that I had not made it. For once, I had a sense that this was not totally "my thing." There was Another upon whom I depended to carry out the promise I had made.

At the last I WAS there. Along with her husband and son. We wept. We read Scripture. We prayed. She was in a coma. But we were there. I think she knew we were there. She had not been abandoned. By her family. Nor by her pastor and friend. In a sense, our presence mirrored God's earlier and greater promise never to abandon her.

I think of Karen this Holy Week. I think of God's promise never to abandon her. And I think of God's using the three of us to be living reminders that no one has to die alone.

In the darkness of our own Maundy Thursdays and Good Fridays, God is with us. He guides us through the pain and the fears. And brings us, at last, into the light of His Son's own resurrection. Our resurrection. On Easter.

Just like he did for Karen.





VA requires address updates

Some veterans are not getting the latest updates in benefit changes according to Waco VA Regional Office Director Stephen L. Lemons.

"More veterans are taking ad-

vantage of the security and efficiency of electronic fund transfers (EFT) for compensation and pension deposits directly into their bank accounts," said Lemons. "And when veterans change residences, the deposits contine uninterrupted. That's

good and we encourage EFT." However, many veterans forget to provide an updated mailing address to the VA Regional Office when they move, perhaps thinking it unnecessary. But when notices went out recently explaining the 4.3 percent increase in compensation, retroactive to December 1987, many were returned with "no forwarding address.'

Make sure you are kept abreast of all benefit changes affecting you by insuring that the VA Regional Office has your current mailing address. Send updated addresses to Waco VA Regional Office, 1400 N. Valley Mills Drive, Waco, Texas 76799, or call a Veterans Benefits Counselor by dialing 1-800-792-3271 and ask that your address be updated.

I am writing this letter to you because I want you to know several things about my grandmother, what she was like, and what she means to me.

This past Sunday a visiting chaplain delivered a message. He said even though God loves the new and fresh and innocent, He prefers the old and broken because He can heal them. He went into different ways that God can heal, and not all of them happen on our level of existence. In this manner of thinking, God healed my grandmother.

After the initial shock of hearing of her passing, my first feeling was of relief for her; a type of celebration that she was finally out of her pain. I saw visions of her, no longer trapped in her aged body, joining her husband and others who have gone before. I then became worried because I wasn't crying. As my thoughts raced back through time, the tears came.

She loved her family and nothing made her happier than when all her family was together. I can recall visits when I was a child. She would always have some sort of "surprise" for me, whether it was taking me out to the cotton field and letting me fill a little pail with cotton bolls, allowing me to gather eggs all by myself, or putting together a little playhouse. A very vivid memory in my mind was almost nine years ago when all her children and their spouses, her grandchildren and great-grandchildren gathered together for a reunion. She was delighted the whole wonderful weekend. After our daughter was born 13 years ago, she could hardly wait to have a photograph taken of the four generations. Of course, none of our family gatherings would have been complete without gathering around to sing. We would sing "old church songs," Nana would always sing as loud and strong as the rest of us. At
