## Bobcats Second In Happy Tourney

The Dimmitt Bobcats came home from the Happy High School Invitational Basketball Tournament Saturday night with a second place trophy after falling to the Canyon Eagles 39-46 in the finals.

The Bobbies also fared well in the girls' division, winning third place. They won their laurels by defeating Kress by the tight score of 50-51.

Junior DiCuffa and Keith Lowe were named to the all-tournament team. The Bobcats won two, lost one and the Bobbies won three and lost one in the tournament. Betty McDermitt

and Dovie Smithson won all-tournament honors in the girls' division.

So far this week both Dimmitt teams have continued their winning ways. The Bobcats defeated Sudan Monday night 62-40 with Keith Lowe as high point man with 32 points. The Bobbies defeated the Sudan girls 41-53 Tuesday night with Dovie Smithson scoring 18 points and Mickey Pelly making 17.

The Bobcats and Bobbies are scheduled to appear this week-end in the Abernathy High School Invitational Tournament Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

Last year at this time, Mrs. Perry donated \$200 each to the libraries. This year was her second such donation.

## JayCee-Ettes to Stage Christmas Welfare Project

### Christmas Card and Fountain Pen Sales Help Finance Project

Christmas in about twenty-seven homes in Castro County will be made brighter this year by the Dimmitt JayCee-Ettes.

This group of twenty-five young women, all wives of members of the Dimmitt Junior Chamber of Commerce members, began working last September on their anticipated Christmas welfare program.

First began by selling Christmas cards and added an addressing and mailing service for people buying the cards. More recently they obtained and sold one hundred perfumed pen and pencil sets.

A JayCee-Ette spokesman indicated this week that the money collected would go into the twenty-seven Latin-American, Negro and white homes they had learned were in need of welfare assistance. These families will be given mostly staple foods, some clothing and used toys that are still in good condition. "We're afraid we couldn't fix up broken or unusable toys," said Mrs. Courtney Armstrong, JayCee-Ette president. "But anyone with anything they feel would help to brighten Christmas for the poorer people of Dimmitt would certainly be a welcome addition to our circle of donors."

Only permanent residents of Dimmitt or Castro County will receive the aid. Transients have been excluded from the plans. Most of the needy have jobs, but the large sizes of some of their families, among other reasons, have placed them on the welfare rolls. The JayCee-Ettes hope to spend as much as \$10 per family if all their plans materialize.

Final plans for the Christmas welfare project will be mapped out when the JayCee-Ettes hold their next meeting Monday night beginning at 8 o'clock in the District Court Room.

## Fire Destroys Tenant House

A four-room tenant house was completely destroyed by fire Sunday morning about six miles southeast of Dimmitt on the Hart Highway.

The house belonged to Noel Gollehon and the fire began at 8 p. m. It was vacant at the time and the loss was partially covered by insurance. No other property was damaged.

The fire was seen and reported by a passing Texaco Sales Company driver. The Dimmitt Fire Department rushed to the scene but the house was already completely in flames when they arrived and there was no water available.

## Tractor Shooting Lands Two in Jail

Two Latin-American youths are in Castro County jail after causing considerable damage Saturday, with hunting rifles, to a farm tractor belonging to Mr. John Alldredge.

According to Castro County Sheriff Jack Cartwright the two boys were hunting and finding nothing to shoot at, they came upon Mr. Alldredge's tractor about a mile northeast of Dimmitt. They shot out the lights and ruined one tire.

Ralph Ramos was fined \$150 and court costs and sentenced to three months in jail and Armin Marcando was fined \$100 and costs and received two months in jail.

## Bootleggers Draw Heavy Fines Here

Two bootleggers were apprehended by the State Highway Patrol in Castro County Wednesday. Their arrest resulted in one of the largest liquor hauls in several months in this county.

Fined \$200 and court costs here was Wendell Wayne Molder of Anton. He was in possession of 25 cases of canned beer and four cases of whiskey. Legitimate value of these intoxicants was estimated to be about \$300 with a bootlegging sale value of almost \$1,000.

Also apprehended for illegal transportation of intoxicating beverages was Jose S. Ortiz who was fined \$150 and court costs after being found in possession of several cases of quart beer.

Both arrests were made between Nazareth and Arney.

## First Block Marker Laid In County

John Alldredge, county surveyor, Monday installed the first block monument under a plan set forth by the Commissioner's Court for insuring future positive guide points for land measurement.

While there are about twenty blocks making up the county's land area, most of the land is encompassed in five blocks. According to Mr. Alldredge, accurate land measurement is extremely difficult without knowing the original block and section guide points. Additional block markers will be established as the points are found. The county was originally laid off by government surveyors in the 1890's. One of these surveyors, Henri Castro, was the county's namesake. The marker Monday was set up by Mr. Alldredge at the northwest corner of block K-13 and the northeast corner of block T-4.

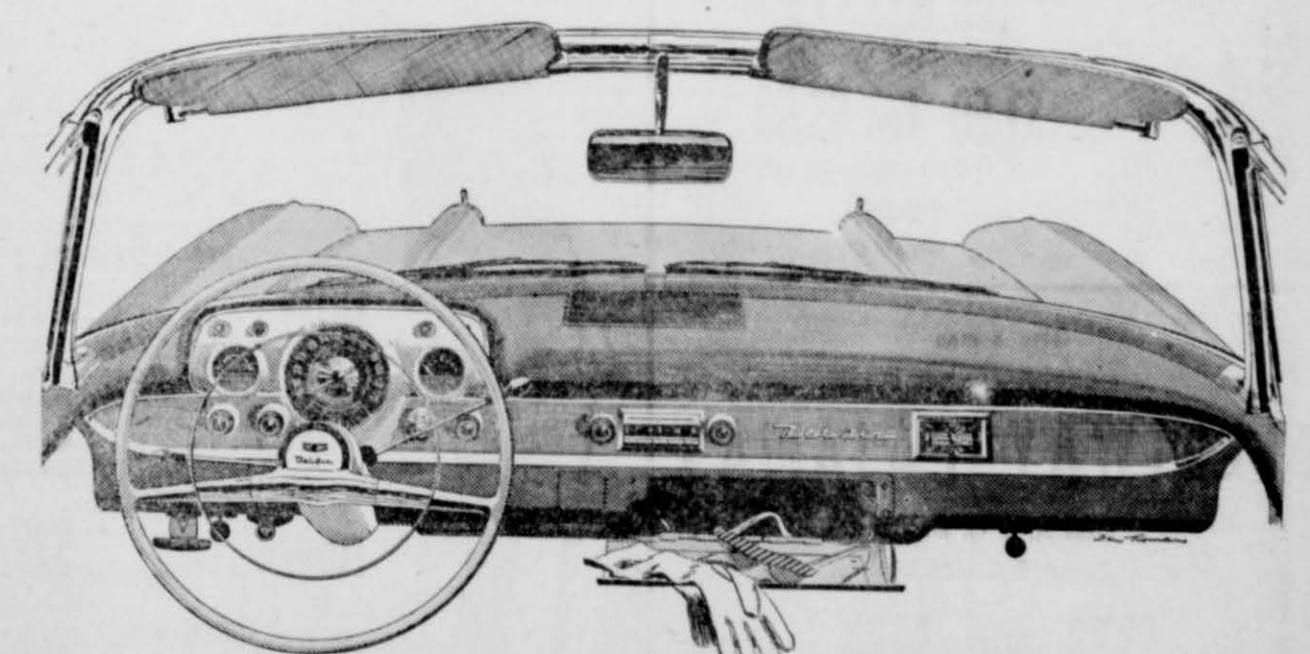

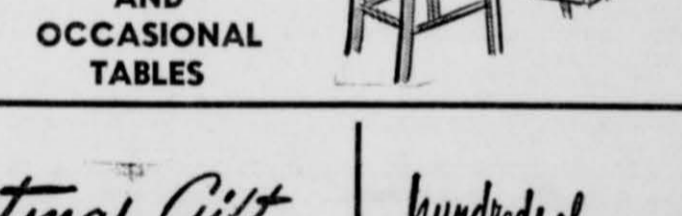

Better Farm Deal Goal Of Union Convention

A better deal for the farmer was the general theme of the 33rd annual convention of the Texas Farmers Union held December 7-8 at the Weston Hotel in Abilene.

Bill Bell and Joe Newman, all following is part of the general policy of the Farmers Union adopted for next year.

"We have seen many great changes pass across the face of America in a few short years. Some have been good—many have been bad. We recognize that to hold onto the good while retreating our steps to eliminate the bad, is a process that takes great patience and understanding."

"By and large, we are a prosperous nation, and for this we are thankful. However we register our alarm at the great and growing islands of our American population who remain isolated from this prosperity. We know that for a perpetual prosperity to endure it must spring forth spontaneously from the very core of a strong national economic structure."

"We reaffirm our strong belief in the true free-enterprise system, and we cherish it as a part of our American heritage. But, we must keep a constant vigil against those who for personal gain or special interest, would thwart the common good of all Americans by marching under an evil banner they falsely label, 'Free Enterprise.'"

"We realize that as men and women who actively engage in farming, our greatest area of common interests lies with other people who work with their hands, and we welcome all those to our cause who would join in the fight for the preservation with dignity of the family farm."

General resolutions adopted by the convention included full parity for farm income protection and opposition to sliding scale on all farm commodities; that the government take steps to improve the demand for farm products and the more efficient utilization of production; keeping farm markets in balance with demand (through soil bank, etc.); federal-sponsored farm credit availability; federal crop insurance; more positive grading of cotton; 100 percent of parity for the fight for the preservation with dignity of the family farm."

**PGC Backs 8-point Cotton Classing Move**

William A. Hawkins, Sr., and Edd C. McLeroy, County directors of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., announced this week that the PGC was backing the eight changes recently recommended for improving of cotton classing for South Plains farmers.

The Directors explained the eight recommendations were made unanimously at a meeting held in Lubbock November 29 attended by representatives of the PGC, the South Plains Farmer-Ginner committee, South Plains Ginner Association, Farm

nesses. The eight specific recommendations the group listed as favoring the improvement of cotton classing were:

1. Establishment of uniform
2. Multiple classing offices be considered for this area. W. O. Fortenberry, President of PGC appointed a committee to study this program and report later. This committee's Curtice Loyd, Lubbock, chairman; John I. Bowling, Hale Center, and Kenneth Purcell, Brownfield, members.
3. Samples of bales taken at both gins and presses were discussed and the group voted for more uniform samples regardless of where taken and also recommended that the ultimate goal be the taking of automatic samples of gins.
4. Recommended the return to the use of class or "pink" sheet by the classing office and that each classer be given a code number and it be placed on the pink sheet.
5. Establishment of a classing review board composed of one qualified classer each to represent the farmer, the cotton trade and the government, and the grade given by this board be a final grade.
6. The date entered on the green card be the date the sample was received at the cotton classing office instead of the date the cotton was actually classed.

**ASC DATES**

The Castro County ASC office has announced several important dates for farmers in this area to remember. They are:

- Jan. 31—Final date to apply for grain loans.
- Feb. 21—Deadline date for new grower cotton allotment.
- March 15—Final date for signing 1957 conservation reserve agreements.
- March 31—Maturity dates on grain sorghum and wheat loans.
- April 30—Maturity date on barley, oats, rye and corn loans.
- May 1—Deadline date for filing form MQ31 to preserve 1957 wheat history.
