for Texas teachers whereby both state and teachers contribute:

3. To change the 90-cent Land Board and increase the Veterans Land Fund by \$100,000,000;

6. To differentiate between out-of-office of appointive and elected public officials;

7. To require medical or psychiatric testimony before committing a person of unsound mind to a state institution and providing for right of waiver of trial by jury for the commitment of such persons; and

8. To permit a court judge, or magistrate to deny bail to a person charged with a felony who has already been convicted of two previous felonies.

A sample ballot containing the caption paragraphs of these amendments and the names of all candidates to be voted upon appeared in last week's issue of the News as a public service of the First State Bank. The amendments were published in their full text in the News for four consecutive weeks this summer.

Polls will open in each voting precinct at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m.

BBobcats Preserve Perfect Record By Drubbing Canyon Eaglets, 38-0

Hal Ratcliff and Clint Smithson caught two touchdowns passes each last Thursday night to account for four of Dimmitt's six touchdowns as the BBobcats dominated the Canyon Eaglets, 38-0, in a game played at Canyon.

The victory boosted the BBobcats' win record to seven straight games against no losses. The BBobcats, composed mostly of freshmen, had command of the game almost from the opening whistle. Smithson made the first BBobcat touchdown when he received a pass from Crovis Byrnes and went all the way. The extra point attempt failed, and the BBobcats led 6-0 early in the game.

Minutes later, the ball again went into the air, and Ratcliff was waiting for it when it came down. He took the pass and went all the way for a second BBobcat touchdown. The point-after attempt failed, and the BBobcats held a 12-0 lead over the outclassed Eaglets.

The Eaglets went to the air in the second quarter in an attempt to tie the game, but a punt by Smithson—and she has a little spare time for them since her son, Joe, has reached the ripe old age of 13. The loss stopped the Bobcats' short winning streak and sent the Eagles well on their merry way toward a likely District 1-AA championship.

Canyon's opening kick was taken by halfback Keith Lowe, who was nabbed on the Bobcat 15-yard line by Dimmitt's Jimmie Curtis.

But the future variety wasn't through yet. Jimmie Curtis broke loose for the sixth and final BBobcat touchdown in the fourth quarter. The conversion attempt was nil, and the final score was Dimmitt 38, Canyon 0 as the BBobcats retained one of the only undefeated records in these parts.

The Eagles picked up another seven, then two, and then enough for another first down. On the next play, then Lowe dropped the ball and turned until they crossed the goal line for their first touchdown. The kick was good, and the Bobcats led 7-0 with two minutes remaining in the first quarter.

The Eagles took the punt on their own 40 with 30 seconds remaining in the half. Quarterback Adams tossed a balloon pass to Britian, who skittered the distance for the third Canyon touchdown at halftime.

Canyon kicked off to start the second half but the Bobcats bogged down and had to kick out to the fourth and eight situation. Adams completed a pass to Britian in two more plays yet had their fourth touchdown. The extra point attempt was good, and Canyon led 27-0.

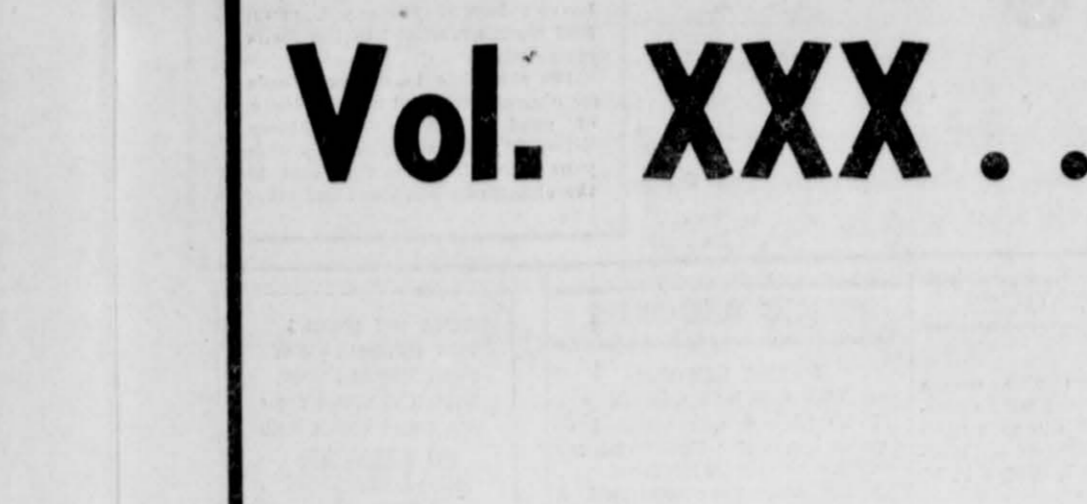
The Eagles finished a pass to bring up second down with 10 yards needed. Then they started getting a step farther up the field.

They found the answer when the Eagles received a series of setbacks they found impossible to overcome and had to kick. The Bobcats took over on the Eagle 49-yard line.



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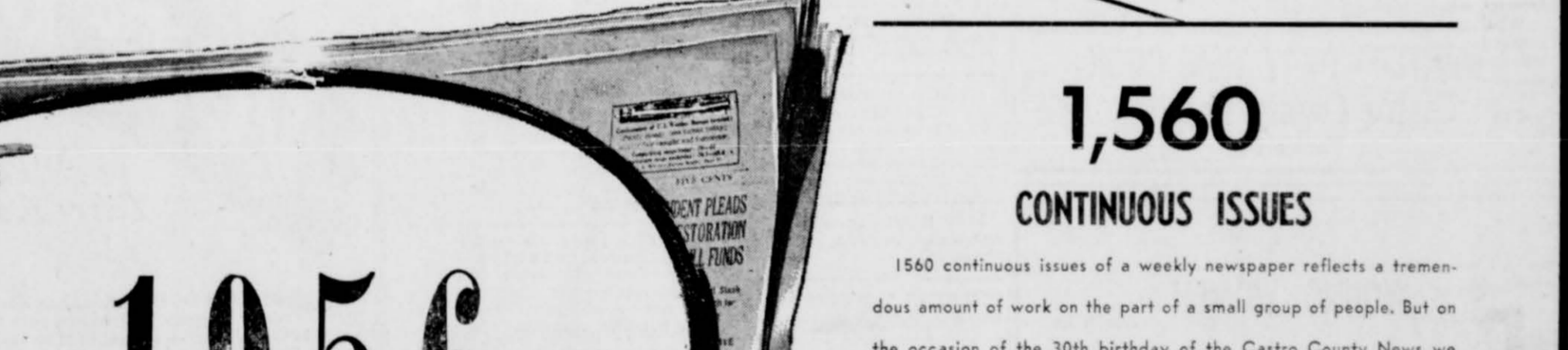

County American Legion Posts Endorse Fifth Amendment

The Dimmitt, Hart, and Nazareth posts of the American Legion this week endorsed the proposed amendment to the Texas Constitution pertaining to additional funds for the Veterans Land Program of Texas.

Listed below is the local Legion Post's statement concerning their endorsement of the amendment (No. 5 on the ballot):

"Several years ago the State of Texas saw fit to extend credit to the veterans of the state who desired to purchase farm property within the state.

"Through this program, approximately 17,000 Texas veterans have been able to purchase farm property which they likely would not have been able to purchase without this extension of credit by the state.

"Like most other programs devised by federal, state, and local government and private concerns, there were many policies which required changes after the inception of the program. When discrepancies were found in the Texas Veterans Land Program, action was taken to correct those discrepancies and an appropriate person guilty of misapplication of the law. The American Legion took the lead in the investigation and final prosecution of this person.

"Since changes in personnel have been made and since additional safeguards have been instituted, there is no evidence of any recurrence of misappropriation or poor management.

"Since the inception of the Veterans Land Program, the state of Texas has realized a net profit in excess of two million dollars, and will, upon repayment of the total number of loans made to date, realize a net profit of approximately 12 million dollars. Therefore, it is obvious that this is not a tax-supported program and is costing the tax-payer absolutely nothing.

"All money which was initially available has been spent in the purchase of property for Texas veterans. Only about 2 percent of the eligible Texas veterans have been able to participate in the program thus far. Proposed Amendment No. 5 to the Constitution of the State of Texas will be voted upon November 6, 1956. If this proposition meets with the approval of the voters of the state an additional one hundred million dollars will be made available for loans to those Texas veterans desiring to purchase Texas farms. This amendment will also provide an additional safeguard by effecting a change in the present Veterans Land Board.

"We believe that the Texas Veterans Land Program is basically sound and that the veterans in the State of Texas are deserving of the benefits provided by this program. We therefore urge support of this program..."

WEATHERFORD, Okla., Nov. 1 (SP)—Haydon Battles, son of Mr. and Mrs. Shelby Battles of Dimmitt, is among 20 Southwestern State College (Oklahoma) seniors who have been chosen for the 1956-57 edition of Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities. They were named for the national publication by a faculty committee.

Students are recommended for the collegiate Who's Who on the basis of their contributions to the school, their qualities of leadership, and on scholarship and character.

Battles, who graduated from before his parents moved to Dimmitt, is co-captain of the Southwestern State football team and has twice been named all-conference halfback. He is secretary-treasurer of the O Club and is a member of the Student Senate.

FTA Supports Fourth Amendment
 (An Editorial)
 For the past few months one of the topic subjects for conversation is the 4th Amendment concerning Teacher Retirement. We can cover the reason we should support this amendment in these simple a, b, c's.

(a) ASSIST IN RECRUITING NEW TEACHERS: There are around 100,000 boys and girls enrolling in the first grade in Texas each year. We need this amendment to recruit new teachers to help teach these additional children.

(b) TO HELP KEEP EXPERIENCED TEACHERS: Teachers are dissatisfied with the present retirement plan which was written in 1937, and some of our experienced teachers are leaving the teaching field for one that is more promising. This plan would help to make the work more at-

tractive.
 (c) IMPROVE RETIREMENT PLAN OF 1937: The retirement plan that was drawn up in 1937 was drawn up during the very heart of the depression. This plan needs to be improved and brought up to date.
 (d) PROVIDE BENEFITS COMPARABLE WITH INDUSTRIAL WORKERS AND AFFORDED GOVERNMENTAL WORKERS: This is to provide disability, death, and survivor benefits. By providing this plan the field of teaching is more promising.

(e) PROVIDE PROTECTION FOR DEPENDENTS: This will allow teachers to increase their deposits in order to assure more adequate retirement benefits and provide protection for dependents.
 (f) RAISE BENEFITS: It will help to raise benefits of retired teachers now receiving mere pittance.

(g) REPLACE EX-OFFICIO MEMBERS: It will replace ex-officio members of the retirement board with appointed members. This is reason enough to explain why new teachers, students, and parents will benefit from the 4th Amendment.

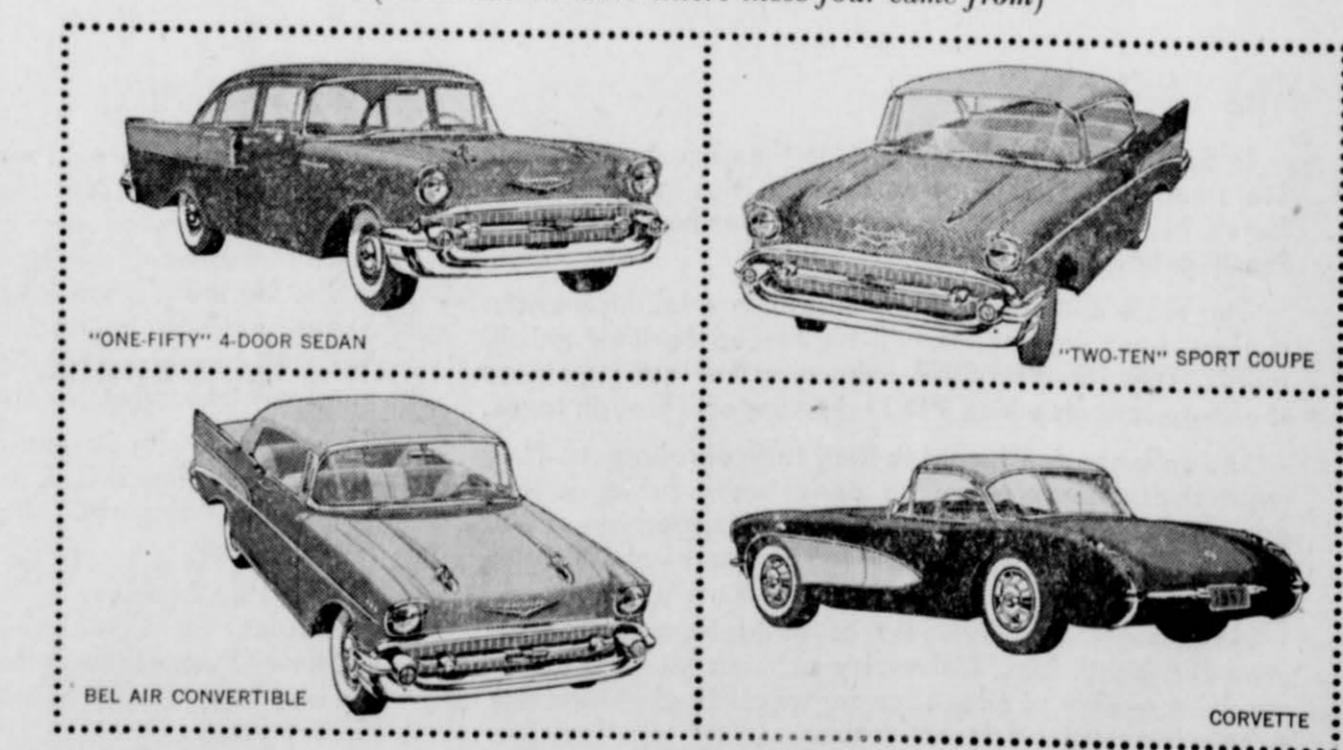

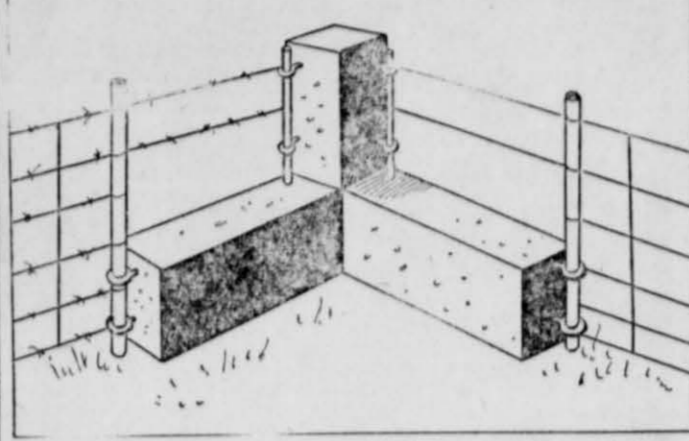

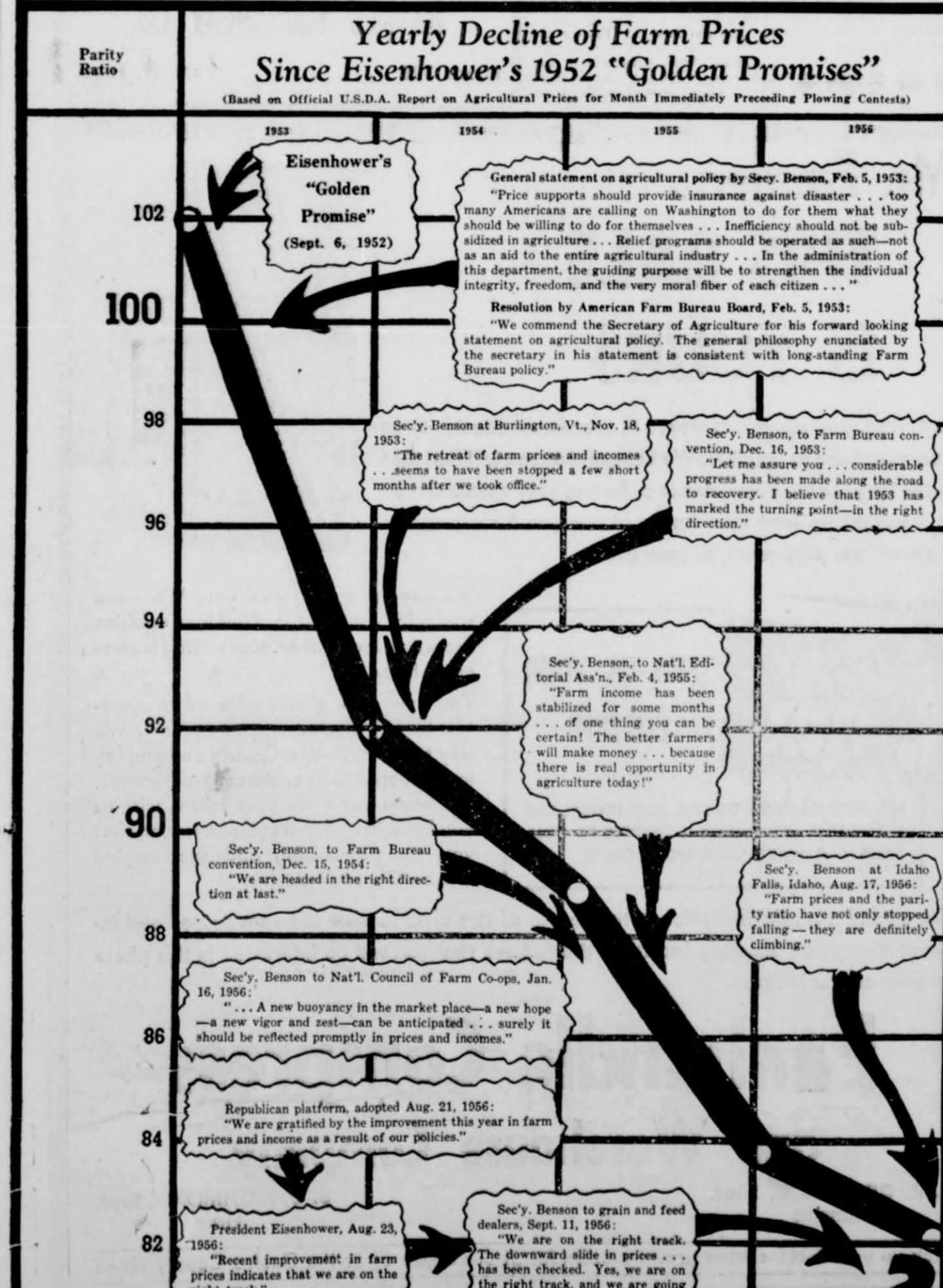

Parents and Teen-agers Talk Things Over

SHOULD TEEN-AGERS be allowed to date on school nights? WHEN, IF EVER, is it all right for teen-agers to go steady?

The TRI-UNE Conference of Hartford, Conn., is an attempt to answer these questions. Each conference consists of three sessions. Only teen-agers attend the first and only their parents attend the second. The third is "the knock-down-and-drag-out" session where teen-agers and

parents discuss together the problems from the previous two sessions.

MEETING in parish halls and school auditoriums, each session is begun by a few remarks from the moderator, Father John C. Knott or one of his priest assistants.

The starting point of the TRI-UNE approach is the Catholicism definition of a person: a creature composed of body and soul, made to the image and likeness of God.

After seeing the dignity of the person, the group goes to his individuality. Parents begin to realize that tom-boy daughter Ann can't be the lady-like girl

across the street. Teen-ager Johnny sees he is wrong when he complains Pop is not like Mr. Jones next door.

"EVERYONE IS a creature of God, made to live with Him in heaven." "Everyone is a unique individual, seeking to love and be loved." Having understood these principles TRI-UNE sets about applying them.

Generally speaking, the teen-agers show themselves aware of the dangers in going steady. They see it prevents them from knowing more members of the opposite sex. They see it often puts them in the danger of sinning. Through TRI-UNE they learn that sex is God's gift to married people, that "necking" and "petting" are occasions of sin for unmarried people.

AT ONE final session of parents and teen-agers, each group listed what they liked and disliked about each other. Parents praised teen-agers' earnestness; criticized disrespect. One teen-ager spokesman said, "Our parents complain because we don't confide in them. But what can they expect when they give us the impression they're 'too busy.'"

The results of TRI-UNE? No official record is kept, but one happy father said, "Thanks to TRI-UNE we got things out in the open. We really cleared the air. Believe me, life is more pleasant at our house today."

The increasing number of TRI-UNE Conferences indicates that many others have seen the same happy results.

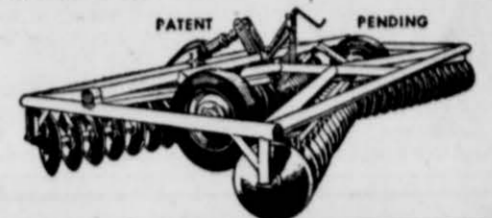

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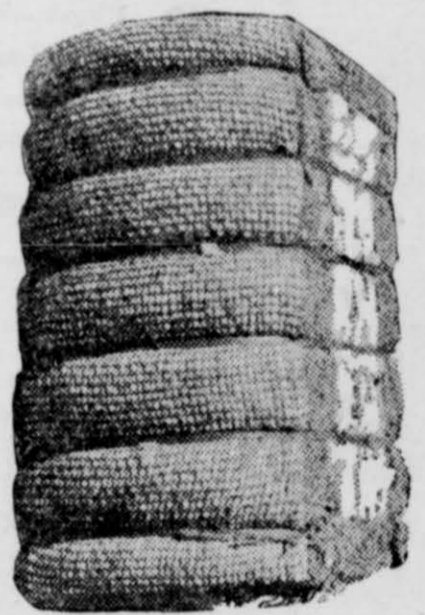
