Wait a minute...

I don't remember how long ago, a couple of years maybe, since we visited about the highway department's project on highway 53 (now Texas 153) over in Coleman County.

It seems that a certain roadside park, about midway between Glen Cove and the Runnels County line fell victim to the reconstruction project. We had assumed that that park would be reconstructed also—it wasn't.

Perhaps, more significantly, that great old Live Oak tree is no more.

Now that new highway is a real treat to drive on, but that old tree's absence is obvious. The same is true for several others.

The state can be proud of that stretch of road but, should be ashamed of the wanton destruction of such magnificent trees.

That one tree, the one at the park, must have been hundreds of years old. Live Oak trees don't grow fast and they don't live forever—just nearly—unless somebody just has to tear one down.

To destroy such a tree is no easy task. To use a chain saw on this kind of tree is to create many sparks and lay waste to many chains. Only one swing with a double-bit ax, with its vibrating jar when it hits the tree, is enough to change the mind of even a real lumber jack.

No, it took two, or three, bulldozers to uproot and move that tree. A tree that was there long before the white man discovered the Indians roaming the area.

It is interesting to note the efforts, recently, of the legislators, the big-time news media, and other folks that finally found a way to get their names and faces in the national news by expressing their opposition to "assault rifles."

There was no such cry when Charles Whitman fired round after round from the tower at the University of Texas. He used a similar type weapon, just not as new or popular as the AR-15 or the AK-47 or some of the others.

But now, we have been hearing from every corner of the country about how civilization will be saved if these terrible weapons are kept out of the hands of the honest citizens of this great country.

One of those in the opposition was real quick to use the Constitution as a shield for his comments. The rights of free speech in the First Amendment.

This high-up elected official overlooked, apparently, the following Second Amendment which guarantees us the right to keep and bear arms.

The logic of those who would make laws to prohibit private ownership of guns is questionable.

How many things have been determined, by law, to be against the law and the ownership of such or possession deemed to be a violation of the law?

Let's see here. They made it against the law to possess certain drugs and to rob banks. There are many other things that we, by law are prohibited from possessing or doing.

In all these cases, the ones where it is against the law to have or hold something, the honest, law-abiding folks have not been suspect. They, in most cases didn't have any of what ever it was they weren't supposed to have anyway—but the bad guys did.

Like that bumper sticker said, "When guns are outlawed, then, only the outlaws will have guns" is most accurate. You may substitute any number of things for guns in that saying, heroin, cocaine, marijuana, high octane gasoline with lead, loaded dice, marked cards.

City Council to highlight area elections in May

By the end of the filing period for the Winters City Council election, a total of six persons, including the incumbents, had filed as candidates for two council seats and incumbent Mayor Randy Springer had drawn an opponent in his re-election bid.

In the Winters Independent School District the two incumbents were the only ones to file for the two positions at stake in this election.

The North Runnels Hospital District has four directors' positions

on the ballot and the incumbents are the only candidates to file for the seats.

In the City of Winters, Mayor Randy Springer is being opposed in his bid for a third term by Rommie Lee Loudd.

Six candidates have filed for two seats on the Winters City Council. The seats are those held by Sandy Griffin and by Boyd Bedford. Both Griffin and Bedford have filed for re-election.

Other candidates filing for the two council seats are Lisa Nitsch, Steve Byrne, Jeri Speegle and Gary D. Goff.

The two council seats are at-large positions and the two can-

didates receiving the most votes will be elected.

For the Winters Independent School District Board of Trustees, incumbents Ronnie Poehts and Bob Webb were the only candidates to file.

In the election for the Board of Directors of North Runnels County Hospital District, incumbents Randall Boles, Archie Jobe, Phil Colburn and Bob Webb are the only candidates to file.

Voters will go to the polls on Saturday, May 6, to cast their ballots in each of these elections. The filing period for candidates ended on Wednesday, March 22.

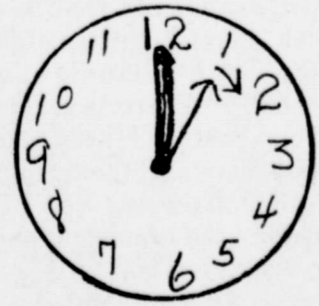
Little League registration Monday

Winters Elementary pre-registration for 1989-90 year scheduled at school

Pre-registration for 1989-1990 Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten students has been scheduled for Thursday, April 6, 1989 at 7 p.m. in the Elementary Library. Parents of children who will be four for Pre-K or five for Kindergarten, on or before September 1, 1989, should bring birth certificates (hospital or church records) and immunization records. Those students not enrolled in Kindergarten and who will be six on or before September 1, 1989, should also register for the first grade. **All students are required to have a Social Security number.**

Pre-Kindergarten—a four year old child shall be eligible for Pre-Kindergarten if he/she is unable to comprehend the English language or is from a family whose income is at or below subsistence level. Pre-Kindergarten classes shall be offered for one-half day.

It is very important that all students should be registered.

The school needs to determine the number of Pre-Kindergarten, Kindergarten and First Grade teachers that will be needed for 1989-1990.

Joy Poe of Dallas, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Poe is one of 51 Texas women artists being honored this year, both nationally and in the state. The first reception celebrating "The Exhibit of Texas Women Artists" was held at The National Museum of Women in the Arts, Washington, D.C. on December 1, 1988. Under the Honorary Chairmanship of the Vice President of the United States and Mrs. Bush the Texas State Committee of the National Museum of Women in the Arts, Washington, hosted the celebration. The second event was held Sunday, March 19, at the Laguna Gloria Art Museum in Austin, under the Honorary Chairmanship of Governor William Clements. The Texas State Committee again hosted the celebration. Special recognition was given to the members of the Texas 600 committee whose patronage made the exhibit possible. The event was supported in part by a grant from the Meadows Foundation—its director is Patricia B. Meadows, one of the patrons of the arts. Poe is a Dallas sculptor and Gallery Director at Brookhaven College. She was commissioned to do the sculpture for a new

Fashion, and the Nude. The DMA Calendar of Events touted the series as "the various ways artists have portrayed women in art," or, as it turned out, women, as seen through men's eyes.

"The portrayals continue to the present day, with male television and film directors giving us images of the "light" or "dark" women (saint or sinner) and, given the rare opportunity, female directors present well-balanced women with real strengths and weaknesses.

When Poe went to Dallas seven years ago, her first work was at the historic Majestic Theatre, a landmark, which the city converted into a center for the arts. This work continues.

A single parent, she has reared two daughters; Shana Callanan of Chicago and Dana Wheeler of Portland, Oregon.

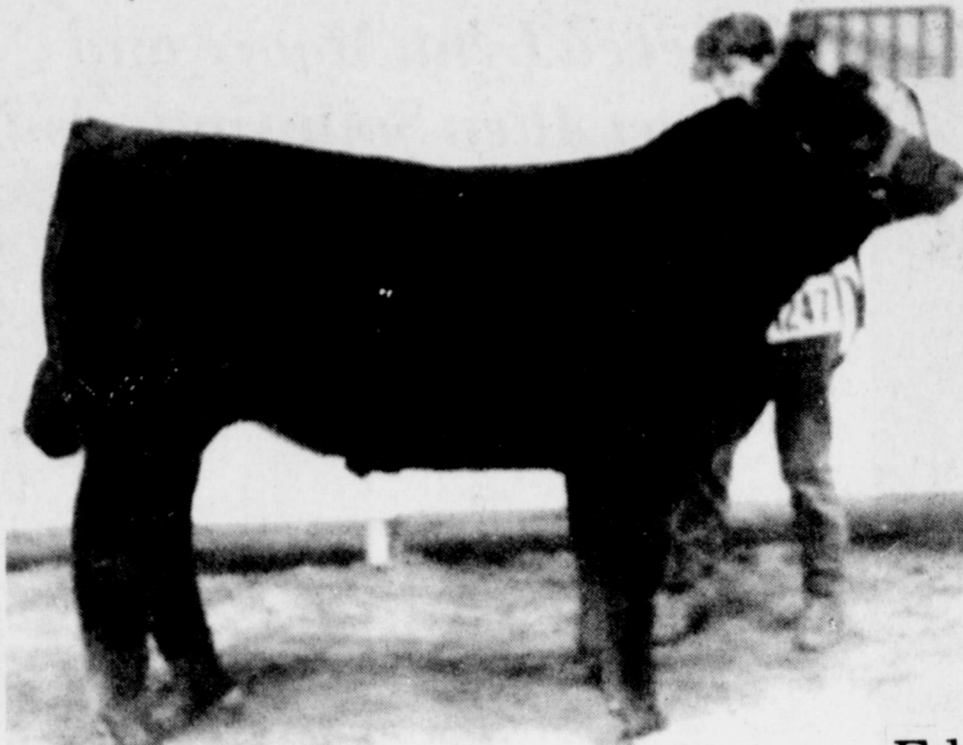
Spring revival to be held in Wingate

David Speegle, of the First Baptist Church in Winters, will be leading the music. He has been with the Wingate Church before and they look forward to having him with them again.

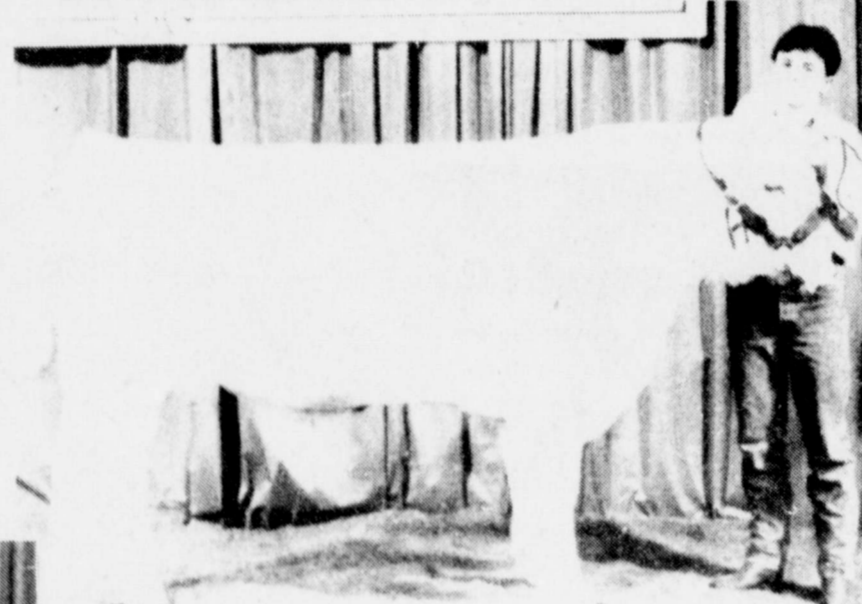

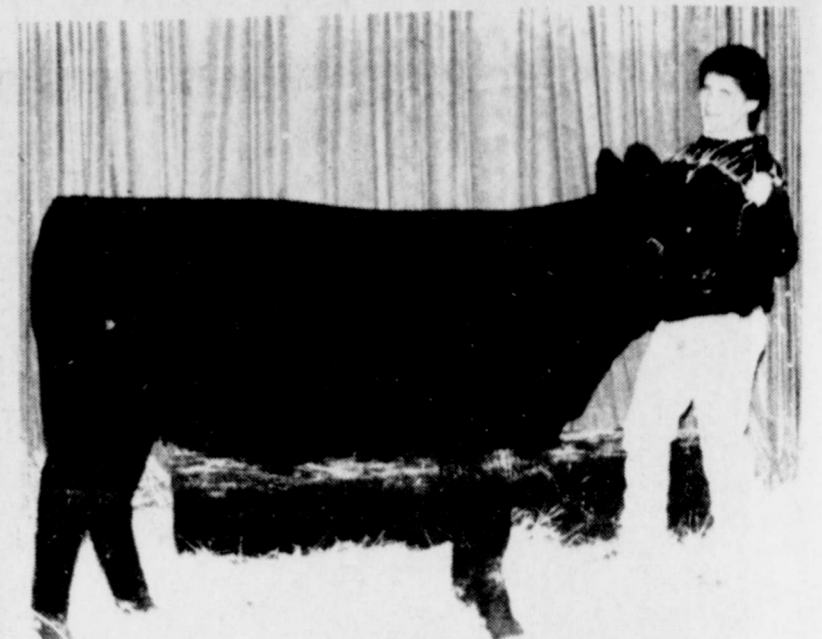

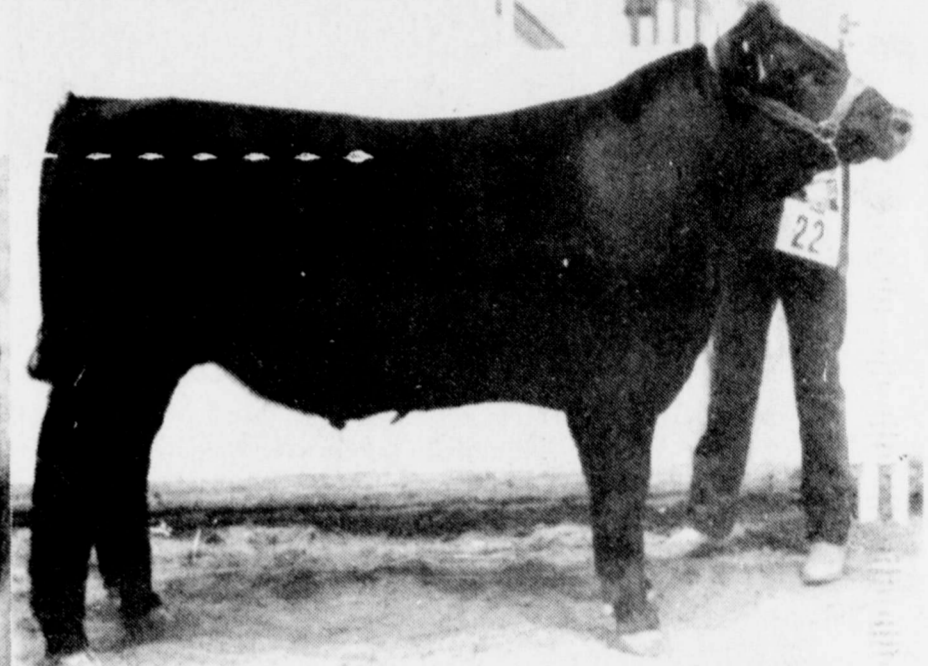
