Pre-registration for 1989-1990 Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten students has been scheduled for Thursday, April 6, 1898 at 7 p.m. in the Elementary Library. Parents of children who will be four for Pre-K or five for Kindergarten, on or before September 1, 1989, should bring birth certificates (hospital or church records) and immunization records. Those students not enrolled in Kindergarten and who will be six on or before September 1, 1989, should also register for the first grade. All students are required to have a Social Security number.

Pre-Kindergarten-a four year old child shall be eligibile for Pre-Kindergarten if he/she is unable to comprehend the English language or is from a family whose income is at or below subsistence level. Pre-Kindergarten classes shall be offered for one-half day.

It is very important that all students should be registered.

The school needs to determine the number of Pre-Kindergarten, Kindergarten and First Grade teachers that will be needed for 1989-1990.




Flag Raising





Sign-up for the Runnels-Tom Green Pest Management will begin April 3 and continue until Friday, April 21.

Persons wishing to have their cotton scouted for insects may contact one of the following steering committee members, Russ Weatherford at Veribest Ag, Tommy Chapman at Wall Seed and Delinting or Brent Mikeska at Wingate Gin. Other steering committee members are Rodrick Bredemeyer, Michael Deike, Scotty Belew, Edward Kellermeier, Nolan Niehues and Herbert Woehl.

Producers in all areas of Runnels and Tom Green Counties are welcome to enroll their fields to be checked. After all fields are enrolled the Steering Committee will meet and review total acreage and location. If the total acreage signed up exceeds steering committee guidelines, the committee may elect not to accept all fields into the program.








Nathan Smith 9th Place European Cross Steer, Fort Worth 1989





Let's not forget these Drivers. They hold the safety of our children in their care.


