Perhaps, their mandate needs a slight change. That is something one, or two, cannot do. It must be done by all of us.

Family Planning Clinic scheduled

The regular Family Planning Clinic will be held Tuesday, April 18, 1989. Applications are taken from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m. While parental consent for minors is not required, it is encouraged. All information is held in strict confidence. Family Planning services available in this clinic will include: consultation, physical exam with a Pap test, laboratory examination, appropriate methods of birth control, birth control supplies and education regarding birth control methods and continuing supervision.

This program provides free exams for Medicaid clients and charges a small co-pay fee to those who are income eligible. There is no charge for services for unmarried teenagers. Private patients are welcome to participate.

The clinic is held monthly at 601 W. Pierce, Winters, Texas and Central Texas Opportunities, Inc. of Coleman, Texas is the provider for the Texas Department of Human Services.

Winters girls capture 1st ever District Golf title

The Winters Blizzard Golf Team bested the field Friday, April 7, 1989 at the District 8 AA golf tournament to bring home their first ever District championship.

The girls played extremely well on a very difficult course to shoot a fine score of 408. They beat their nearest rival San Saba by 37 strokes. To make things even better our 2nd team placed third and gives them the alternate team position for regional should something happen to San Saba. The team was led by regional qualifier Kim Slaughter and Stephanie Powers as they tied for the 2nd medalist spot with fine scores of 99. Kim defeated Stephanie on the 1st hole of a sudden death playoff. The other team members who turned in fine performances were Tami Belew 104, Lynda Billups 106, and Mindy Andrae with a 113. This team will advance to the regional tournament in Abilene on April 27th and 28th.

"I was as proud of the second unit, as the first, for their excellent play and team score of 486. They were led by Brandi Brown's 118 and Latricia Palmer's 119. The rest of the team was DeDe Davis 123, Kati Harrison 126, and Kristi Pringle 138. Competing for medalist honors were Jennifer Harrison 124 and Page Polston.

It should be noted that the San Saba coach told us this was the 1st time in 12 years his girls team had not won the district title, but just as it seems things are going our way, problems arise. At the regional tournament there is going to be a schedule conflict with one of our players which may cause them not to compete. This is not good because for the first time in a long spell our team has a very good chance of placing or winning the regional title and

perhaps advancing on to the state tournament in Austin. Coach Slaughter is in the process of discussions with the regional director to see if this can be ironed out. The loss of a quality player would greatly hurt our chances of a title but we have some fine players who could step in and hold their own with the best of them. Regardless of the outcome or who competes, we will hopefully be in the hunt for the regional title.

The girls golf team had an outstanding year. They competed in four other tournaments this year and captured 1st place, score of 417, at the Baird Invitational where Tami Belew won the medalist trophy with a final score of 101 on a very windy and cold day. There were nine teams entered and again our fine second team placed third with a respectable score of 509. The team placed 2nd at Ballinger to District 5-AAA champions in Breckenridge. They placed 2nd in the 17 team Eastland Invitational which was won by 5-AAA runner-up Merkel. The team came in third at the Robert Lee Invitational after posting their highest scores of the year. Tami Belew was again 2nd medalist winning a sudden death play-off on the 1st hole.

Our girls had an outstanding year this year and I was extremely proud of their effort. Many times it was extremely cold and windy and they just kept on playing. It's not easy to get up at 5 in the morning and ride a bus for an hour to an hour and a half then climb off and be expected to play up to their abilities, but our girls did it and we're proud of them. We hope they continue to play well and perhaps advance on to the state tournament.

Re-Counting His Blessings

Lawrence Trott of Abilene, pastor of Winters First Baptist Church for five years, has written a book of his life's experiences. *Re-Counting My Blessings* is the name of Trott's book

almost as though I have lived in two worlds, and in the last one I've spent much of the time getting ready for yet another world, the eternal one."

The first one lasted about 20 years, and began with the sand hill farms of Central Texas providing the setting. It was a time of small farms, brush tabernacles, shivery oak trees, two-room schools and cotton crops.

His second world shifted from Central Texas to the mesquite trees and Catclaw bushes of West Texas. And here he has spent almost 60 years being a pastor. This land announces its presence in the spring with blowing dust and rolling winds, where you lift up your eyes, not to the hills, but to far horizons. They call it the Big Country. It's the home of cattle, cotton fields and oil wells with great stretches of prickly pear and lacy mesquite trees interspread.

On May 7, 1988, a ceremony took place at Hardin-Simmons University, the school around which much of Trott's life has revolved. University officials awarded him an honorary degree, a Doctorate of Divinity, and said, "Thank you, Brother Trott, for a lifetime of service in the Lord's work. Well done, our good and faithful servant, you have run the course and you have run it well."

Not that the course is over. "Not to my way of thinking," said Trott. "I'm 85, not ready to

quit. Too many lonely, sick, discouraged people still waiting for a phone call, a word of encouragement, and expression of hope."

But the recognition seemed good to him for a number of reasons: his family appreciate it, and his friends acknowledged it.

"This honor was a total surprise to me, but I appreciate it more than words can express."

Lawrence Trott was born and reared south of Cisco in the Pleasant Hill Community. The Pleasant Hill High School only went through the ninth grade. With his desire to further his education and become a preacher, Trott enrolled in Simmons Academy in the fall of 1922.

He stayed in the home of the Rev. Willie Lawrence, who had been his pastor, \$10 a month and working part-time for his room and board. Extra work on the campus provided money for other expenses. It paid .25 cents and hour.

During the summer, Trott supervised campus work, earning \$75 a month. Work on the farm paid off because he knew how to handle responsibility. He moved into old Toler Hall and batched. But—there was a catch. He was not homesick, but lovesick for his childhood sweetheart, Ruth Martin.

They were married on Sunday, September 9, 1923, as they stood on the porch of her father's home and exchanged vows while friends and relatives stood in the front yard and watched.

"Our good friends gave us a food shower consisting of canned fruit and vegetables. Aunt Mittie gave us a three-burner Perfection Kerosene cookstove. A cousin loaded our possessions in his dad's pickup and we headed for college.

"We arrived in Abilene with no place to live, but friends helped us find a room, which we rented for \$5 a month. Ruth made a dresser with two orange crates, using feed sacks as a cover for the front. I made a table with shiplap and two-by-fours. School started and we walked a mile to class.

"We were expecting our first baby and needed help, so we moved back to the folks place in June. I worked on highway construction for \$3 a day. Joyce Maurine arrived on July 19, 1924, providing us not only with our first child but Dad with his first grandchild.

"With our situation under control by the end of the summer, we headed back to school. Our housing situation improved, we were able to rent two rooms. Ruth cooked meals for two young preachers, and this

Fourteen (14) members of the Texas Extension Homemakers Association (TEHA) from Runnels County attended the annual spring meeting of the District 7 Extension Homemakers Association in Robert Lee, Texas, March 22. Those attending included Martha Crawford, Edleen Buxkemper, Marcille Mapes, Kaila Blessing, Kathy Greene, Nancy Halfmann, Melissa Anthony, Monya Waldrop, Bonnie Reed, Elsie Redman, Cordelia Gully, Mildred Bigby, Elizabeth Urbanek, and Patricia Hohensee, County Extension Agent—H.E. helped us to eat."

Pleasant Hill called Trott to serve-half time as pastor; he preached two Sundays each month. "I caught the train from Abilene to Cisco, where Dad met me with the wagon. The trip served two purposes in addition to the preaching. I took food back with me, which the folks provided from the farm. When "annual call" time came I asked the church not to consider calling me again, they had done enough for me."

"From the Pleasant Hill Church I went to a small church in Colorado Bend on a half time basis, located south of Colorado City, near Silver. I moved my family to Bauman in 1927, a rural school four miles south of Loraine, where I taught full time."

For the next eight years he taught full time in schools and served part time in rural churches. The family began to grow at this time. Lawrence Lynn, the only son, was born in 1926, Virginia Ruth joined the family in 1929. The last child, Glenda Marlene was born in 1933, when they were living at China Grove.

In 1932, Trott moved to China Grove as teacher and minister part time. At this point came the goal toward which he had aimed—the champion Baptist Church, southwest of Roscoe, made him a full time pastor. "Now I could become fully what I had dedicated my life to becoming. Life for me and my family changed from this time on."

Delores Gully, District 7 TEHA Director for Tom Green County presided at the meeting. The business session was conducted following the opening ceremonies and a welcome by Wilson Bryan, Mayor of Robert Lee.

The keynote speaker was Kathy Dickson of Sweetwater. Mrs. Dickson is the wife of State Representative of the 24th District, Temple Dickson. She spoke to the group on current educational programs to deal with drug and alcohol abuse.

Also included during the day's activities was the presentation of 50-year certificates and the awarding of the District 7 Scholarship Representative, Christie Criner of Irion County. Christie is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Criner of Mertzon. Recipient of a 50-year certificate from Runnels County was Winnie Vincent of Rowena.

Speaking to the group for the State TEHA Board was President, Threasa Leatherman, of Parker County. The group also viewed a film presentation entitled "Self Protection for Women".

The TEHA is composed of Extension homemaker club members. It coordinates the statewide activities of the Extension homemakers clubs, expresses the desires and interest of club members, and cooperates with other similar organizations.

Boyd Bedford

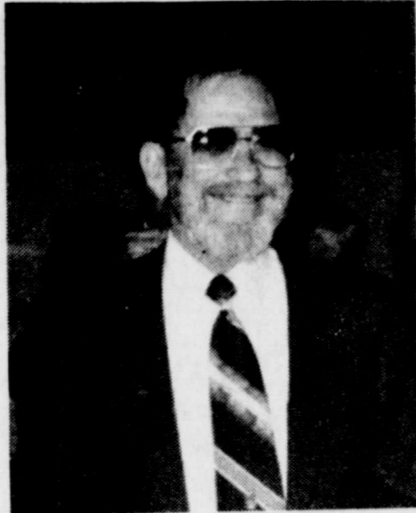
John Boyd Bedford, 60, of Winters, died at 5:30 a.m. Thursday, March 6, 1989, at Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene.

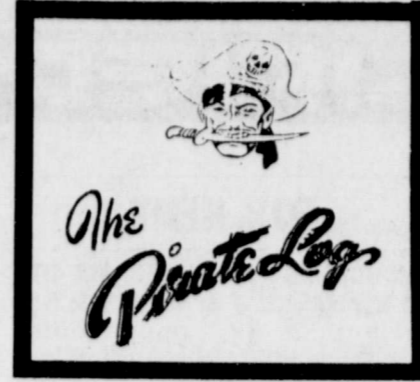

I can still remember my first fishing trip to the Rio Grande. Not so much the particulars of the trip. But my first impression of the country, itself.

Rugged land. Sandy. Hot. Almost barren.

It was awesome. And harsh. Seeming for all practical purposes to say, "Go Back! I am your enemy. You don't want to tangle with me!"

Then there was the river itself. Sometimes as still and peaceful as a glass mirror. Other times raging and swirling. The foam of the rapids hiding the jagged rocks that could easily end the trip. Or a life.

I was a bit afraid of it all. The first time. Maybe because it was really saying, "Don't try to tame me or make me into a land that I'm not. I am what I am!"

Which is the part that I have grown to love most about that country. You can't make it into anything but what it is.

But...When I began to accept it on its own terms—for what it is—I began to see its own beauty. And appreciate it.

Instead of working against it to dominate it, I began to

see the Rio Grande as a partner. To respect. To fear—at times. To appreciate. To let it be what it is.

Then we began to get along. I gave to it. It gave back. But neither dominates the other. Or takes advantage of the other. Both river and person maintaining their own distinct, God-given integrity.

There are folks who devote their lives to this mutual give-and-take with the earth, that when it gets dry, they get cotton-mouth. When the rain falls and the plants turn green and spring up, they walk with an extra spring in their step.

These people vicariously hold the keys to the souls of all people and what God intended for man-kind. They may well be the last thread that holds humanity in balance with nature.

They are known by two names—Farmers and Ranchers.

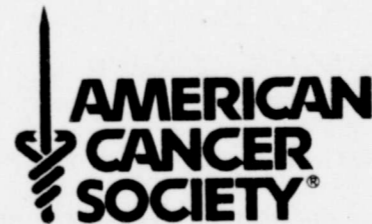

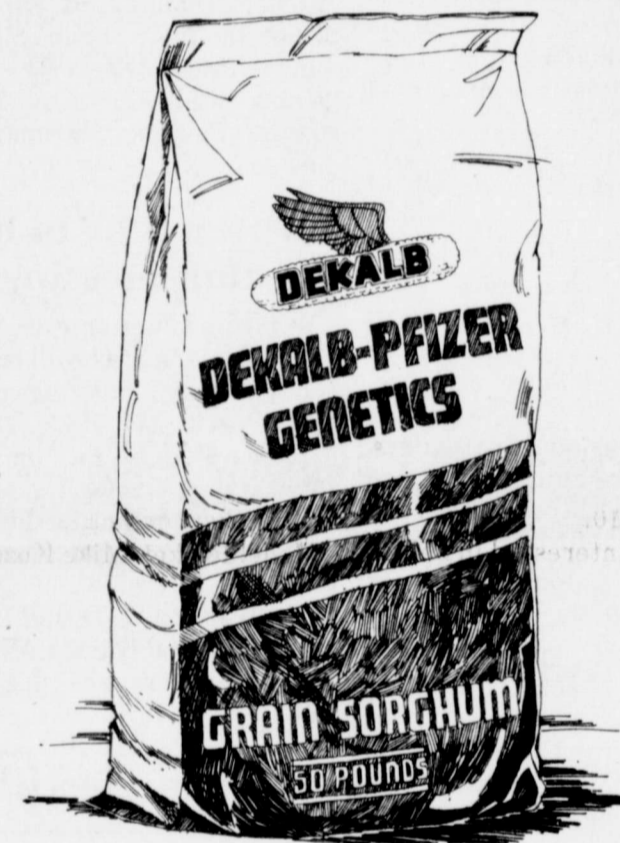

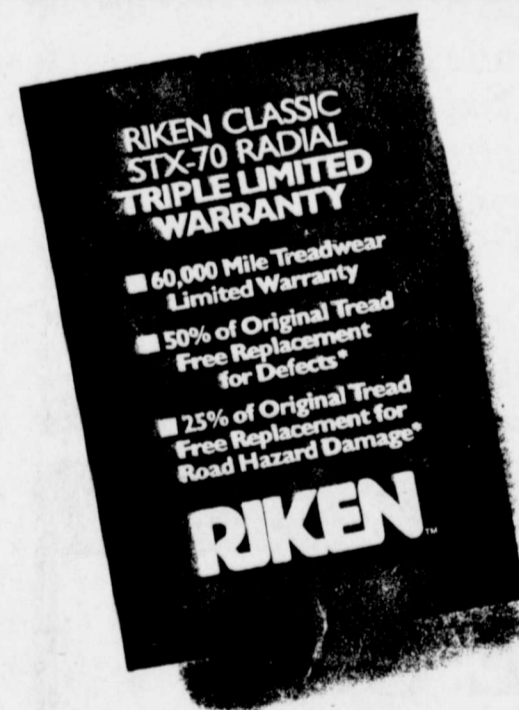

I do, however, know some of the things which contribute to the attitudes expressed by Ms. McSherry and the people who previously wrote two (2) letters expressing much the same concerns.

When the taxpayers exist for the benefit of the government, instead of the government existing for the people (or governed) many things begin to appear. "Ticket races", pursuit of statistics, invalid display of presentation of "validating" reports of all types, etc. (all of which plague the DPS and many other police agencies), not only pervert the true picture of what those agencies are actually doing, these things actually serve, in a very real way, to destroy the intended purposes of police, especially.

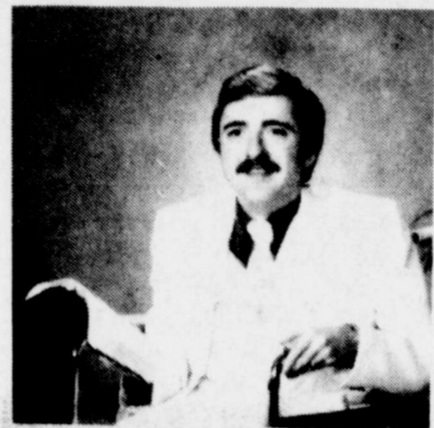

Rev. W. M. Graham to speak in Winters

Rev. W. M. Billy Graham, a native of Fort Worth, Texas, is committed to the ministry of evangelism and teaching. He presently ministers through evangelistic crusades, revival meetings, Bible Conferences, and a rapidly growing tape ministry which sends free Bible Studies on cassette tape to all who request them.
