Ticks are blood-sucking ex
toparasites, which attack toparasites, which attack a
variety of hosts, including mamvariety of hosts, including mam-
mals, birds, reptiles and even some amphibiana. Apart from causing loss of blood and localized irritation around the bite,
ticks are serious vectors ticks are serious vectors of
diseases that effect people, diseases that effect people, pets
and farm animals, as well as and farm animals, as well as
wildife. Many tick species feed on more than one host and they can act as disease vectors bet ween wild animals; which are
reservoirs of the disease, and reservoirs of the disease, and
domestic species of people. pet care products, and on many pesticides labels, ticks are grouped with fleas as though they were similar pests. The on-
ly similarity between these pests is that both ticks and fleas
suck blood and can therefore suck blood and can therefore
transmist disease. But, while feas are insects, ticks are related habitats of ticks are completely
different than fleas and necessitate quit
trol measures.
Ticks have four developmen-
tal stages, egg, sxx tal stages, egg, six-legged larvae, one or more eight leggednymphs and adult. Hard ticks
usually mate on the host animal. usually mate on the host animal.
The female then drops to the The female then drops to the
ground and deposits from 3,000 to 6,000 eggs, which hatch into larvae or "seed ticks". Larvae climb nearby vegetation where they collect in large numbers
while waiting for small rodents or other vertebrates to pass within reach. After a blood meal on the host, the engorged larvae drop to the ground, shed their
skins (molt) and skins (molt) and emerge as nymphs. Like larvae, the host, engorge themselves with blood, drop to the ground, most and become adults. Adult ticks seek host animals and, after engorgement, mate.
Tick control involves a combination of chemical and nonchemical control measures. The

treatment of cracks and crevices here ticks hide and lay eggs. This contrasts with treatments
against fleas, which primarily inagainst fleas, which primarily in-
volve area treatments of floors. volve area treatments of floors.
Indoor treatments against
ticks may require treating ticks may require treating
crevices throughout the premises. This requires pro-
ducts which aren't only labeled ducts which aren't only labeled
for all the necessary sites, but which won't cause damage to

Rural Health Care and the Public Interest

## In the past few weeks, much has been

 said about the so-called health care crisis in rural Texas. No doubt, even more will be aid in the days to come,debated in the Legislature.
Unfortunately, this issue is shaping up a matter of greed versus need
As a country doctor who no longer has a personally attest to the fact that thiscrisis i personaly
real.
Every
Every three weeks another hospital close in Texas. Currently, 51 Texas counties do not have a hospital.
Millions of rural Texans are being de nied access to health care, as hospitals and physicians curtail and even eliminate pro cedures. Regular maternity care is unavail able in 93 Texas counties. There is no physician, period, in 14 counties, an area
larger than nine states and the District of larger than
Columbia.
Driving these problems are an unbridled liability system, which has forced profes sionalliability insurance premiums through he rool, a severe shortage of medical manpower in rural areas and an inequitable Medicare-Medicaid reimbursement policy which pays rural hospitals up to $40 \%$ les than urban hospitals The rural health care crisis is real. And it s getting worse. And it's threatening the he orevery rural texan, as well as every through the country.

It's something we as caring, compas sionate Texans must deal wiuh. H.B. 18 currently before the House of Representatives and soon to be considered by the Senate, I believe, provides symptomatic relief for this rural epidemic. It is a companion to the efforts of Senator Lloyd Bentsen in Washington, and represents the recommendations of a year-long study conducted by a Special Task Force on Health Care Delivery, appointed in 1987 This bill entiled head-on providing relief in the following areas:
a) Liability. The bill places a cap non-economic damages of $\$ 250,000$ for physicians, hospitals or other health care providers who provide emergency care and obstetrical care to the medically indigent when the provider has not previously provided the patient any care.
It also removes liabililty for physicians or other medical personnel who in good aith provide or give instructions for emer ency pre-hospital and hospital care that is not grossly negligent.
b) Severe medical manpowershortge. The bill makes rural practice more atment programs which assist physicians who practice in rural areas. It also requires Texas amily practice residency programs to provide the opportunity for residents to serve at least one month in a rural setting
c) Medicaid reimbursement. The bill requires the Department of Human Resources to ensure reasonable and adequate reimbursement to hospitals for Medicaid patients. It also creates a Hospital Payment Advisory Committee to advise the Board of Human Services regarding the reim
d) Framed
ate a) molementation of ides a n Office of Rural Healh Care by creating Department of Healtun Pare inthe Texas ealth care in rural areas
Unfortunately, a handful of the Texas laintifrs bar - personal injury lawyer ho typically keep up to tor of a cient misrepresent this legislation.

They argue this bill is discriminatory and cuts off a poor person's right to sue. This is not accurate. The Rural Health Care Rescue Act does not discriminate against the indigent but instead increase heir access to quality healm care by providing physicians with limited legal defenses in high risk circums and such a As I as based on recommendations of the Special Task Force on Rural Health Care Delivery, on which I was privileged 10 serve The Task Force heard morethan 100 hours of testimony in 11 different cities, but not once during these well-publicize earings did any member of the plaintiff's bar speak up.
Now ater all of the hearings and in spit lawyers are claiming the Rural Health Care Rescue Act is a "sneak attack"
But where were they during the public input process? Why were they silent? An where is their alternative?
No matter how you look at it, the crisis in ral healn care is liability driven, and addressed.
This is more than a rural problem. affects everyone. Just ask the Dallas teenhe Houston couple who has a car acciden in Leon County. Everyone is affected by Couls. state of rural health care Texas.
