Wait a minute...

My objectivity is at stake. I am also faced with the conflicts that arise from wearing two hats.

I have been a journalist for about as many years as I have been involved with the medical profession as a health care professional.

Most generally, I must make a special effort to keep these two professions separate. There are times, however, they seem to fit together as a means to an end—maybe.

As we have discussed, the sewers (the folks that sue somebody for financial gain only) have, with the help of their attorneys, created a crisis for those in the medical profession when it comes to liability insurance.

Another problem that has closed many small, rural hospitals is the inequity in Medicaid payments between the small, rural hospitals and the big city medical centers. In our state's legislature there is a bill that addresses some of the problems we face as providers of medical help. This measure, H.B. 18, has already been passed by the House of Representatives and, this week, is being discussed in the Senate. The passage of this bill in the Senate is a most urgent necessity.

The bill would equalize Medicaid payments between urban and rural areas, provide liability protection for the doctors, nurses, and the Emergency Medical Services professionals.

The bill would also enhance student loan programs to encourage doctors to practice in rural areas.

Another major factor in the bill involves hospital transfer procedures for emergency patients.

Due to the importance of this measure, we need to let our Senator Temple Dickson know of our support of the measure and that the voters need his support.

You can call the senator at 512-463-0124. Due to the time factor, there is not really time for a letter. The half-dollar spent on a phone call could have a major effect on the future of health care in rural Texas.

Now, while I'm on a roll, lets talk about Washington, again.

Under the guise of something or another, some of the political figures are using their constitutional rights to threaten our constitutional rights. They are using sensationalism, the news media, and a poor judicial system to try and deny us our rights.

All this to-do about gun control and how bad semi-automatic guns are is nothing but a bunch of bunk. The guy that shot up a school yard in California, or where ever, waited the required five days before he received the gun he used.

Had the judicial system functioned as it should have, that guy would still have been in the slammer doing time.

Then there was the television news guy who was talking while the camera zoomed in on a table of guns. This news type was talking about the automatic weapons displayed. He even mentioned, and pointed out, a single-shot hand gun, referring to it as an automatic.

On or before June 1st of each year, we are required to mail out notices of delinquency remaining on the Current Delinquent Tax Roll—As Per Property Tax Code 33.04.

July 1 unpaid taxes are transferred to the Delinquent Tax Roll and an additional 15% penalty (Attorney Fee) is added.

If taxes are paid in May, the penalty and interest is 13%. During the month of June—penalty and interest is 15%. July 1, penalty and interest is 18% plus the 15% Attorney Fee.

Weather forecasters indicated the conditions would remain the same for the next couple of days.

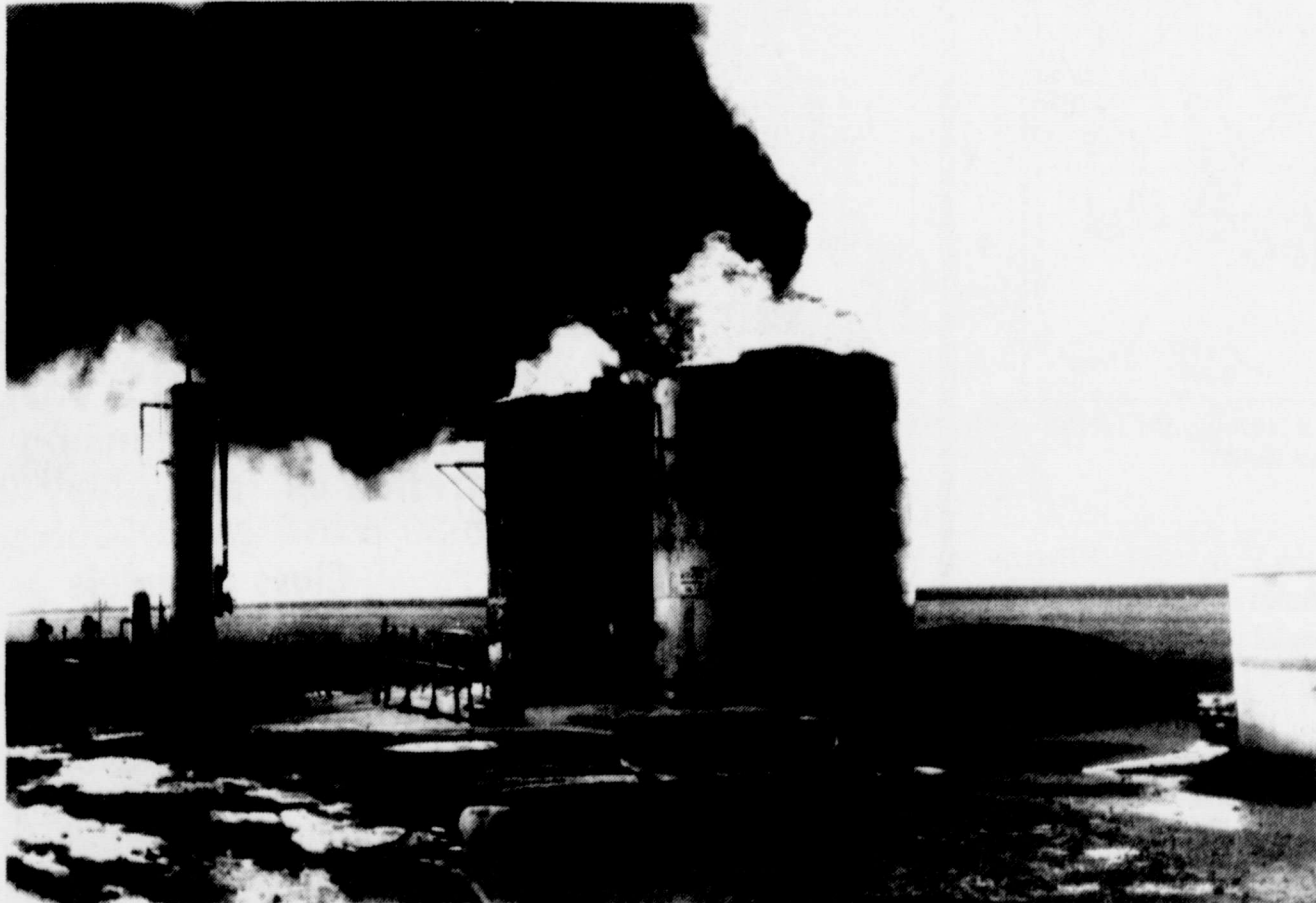
55 Alive Driving Course scheduled

The Winters Rodeo Association will present the Tenth Annual Winters Rodeo Friday, May 19 and Saturday, May 20 at 8 p.m., in the Winters Rodeo Arena. Producer for the 1989 show will be the Sammy Smith Rodeo Company, a producer who is well known and respected throughout the state of Texas. Events will be Bareback Bronc Riding, Saddle Bronc Riding, Calf Roping, Team Roping, Ladies Barrel Racing, Junior Barrel Racing, and Bull Riding. Family Planning services available in this clinic will include: consultation, physical exam with a Pap test, laboratory examination, appropriate methods of birth control, birth control supplies and education regarding birth control methods and continuing supervision.

This program provides free exams for Medicaid clients and charges a small co-pay fee to those who are income eligible. There is no charge for services for unmarried teenagers. Private patients are welcome to participate.

Luther and Lizzie

Lia Conner's story of her parents, Luther and Nancy Elizabeth (Lizzie), is a heart warming story of a family who loved and cared for its own under all conditions. She has a good memory and eye for detail as she describes her parents and those early days on the farm.

Lizzie was a stout woman of medium height, with soft gray eyes and dark hair which began turning gray early. She was jolly and friendly and liked having company. She enjoyed her church work in the Cradle Roll department, and always visited her neighbors, ministering to those who were sick or in need. When not busy making the children's clothing, she was crocheting, embroidering, or quilting one of two quilts she made each year. She wore loose fitting house dresses at home and a bonnet for outdoor chores. Her Sunday costume in the winter was a two-piece black serge suit, with a white blouse. Other times she wore a silk or print dress and always wore a hat.

Luther was a tall man with bright blue eyes and thick, dark hair. He was kind with a pleasant disposition and happiest when he was busy. While working he could be heard singing his

favorite songs, *Haven of Rest*, *O'Happy Day*, and *Home On The Range*, but he never sang in church. He always wore a black

felt hat on Sundays with the crown increased, and people recognized him by this style. On week days he wore a blue shirt, with blue denim overalls and a red bandana handkerchief tied around his neck. He was also known by the bandana trademark. In the summer he wore a straw hat and during the winter he wore a tan corduroy bill cap with ear flaps. When he came in from work and sat down for any length of time, he fell asleep. He was also accused of sleeping in church, but he always knew what the preacher had said. His main desires were to help others and to work hard.

Luther was fifty-seven years old when he died. Lizzie was only forty-three. During the short years that they lived, the Mitchells instilled many ideals in their children's lives that they shall never forget.

Mrs. Conner said that her parents never kept them out of school for farm chores, but they taught us to work and stressed the value of the dollar. After school each day we changed clothes and went to the field to pick cotton, or shock grain. We worked on Saturdays when most people went to town. We were not given allowances, but Papa gave us a five or ten acres of cotton each year. What we made on this land was ours to buy clothes, school supplies and Christmas gifts. One year we made a bumper crop and used the extra money to buy a chifonier and a study table for the

Ray Cooper's job is back in Winters so Ray, Cherry, Amanda and J. T. have moved into the old family home of Grace and Corbert Cooper.

Pat and Earl ate out Mother's Day and spent part of the day with Ray and family.

During the week and Mother's Day with Doris and the cotton and in later years pulled the bolls. What a wonderful day it was when they started using cotton stippers—no more back bending, pulling heavy cotton sacks and crawling!

Papa and Mama had many of the early-day conveniences, or maybe they were inconveniences. The kerosene or coal oil lantern always stayed ready if we had to do something in the dark. The lamps were checked each day to see if they needed refilling with coal oil. As soon as Zora and I were large enough, it was one of our chores to keep the lamps filled and the chimneys clean. Also, we had to make sure there was enough wood or coal inside for the stoves. However, as Audra L. grew older, it was then his job to keep the wood box full, the scuttle filled with coal, and enough kindling to start the fire.

In the early fall before cold weather, Pap, along with some neighbors, went to the McNamey Ranch near Wingate to cut wood for our fuel. It took two days and they carried enough supplies to spend the night. It was hard work to cut a load of wood.

A few years later, we bought a kerosene heater and cook-stove, later to be replaced by a butane stove. The kerosene lamps were replaced by a Delco light plant, which had a motor that had to be run several hours a week to recharge the cells. We also had a Delco electric fan. Rural electrification came in 1939 to the Pumphrey community. It was then that we had other electric appliances.

Due to Papa's poor health, the doctor recommended traveling some each year. We usually left in September, before school started in October. We loaded the covered wagon with our bedding and supplies. I can still remember the old chuck box on the back of the wagon. We went south to near Junction and Kerrville to fish and hunt. Papa's health began to improve and later he went on deer hunting trips which became his favorite sport.

The trips we made before 1917 were all in covered wagons, but that year we bought a Model T Ford. Audra L. Never knew the fun of the wagon days.

I had to laugh at myself. A couple of weeks ago, I began studying the lectionary text. Got out the Greek New Testament. Looked in the Commentaries.

As a result of all this study, I saw something significant about Jesus' message that I hadn't seen before. I got excited. And preached the whole sermon on that point.

Actually, it was more teaching than preaching. Explained the nuance of the text while the congregant on looked at the text. Definitely NOT the way I had learned to preach. And not the way I usually do.

I knew it was good going in, it was fantastic! Got a lot of positive strokes from a lot of people who told me how good it was.

I made a decision that I should change my way of preaching to this genre. Based on having departed from my usual fare for one Sunday.

The next Sunday, I did the sermon the same way.

Talk about a DUD! Lost most of the congregation within 5 minutes.

The difference was that in the first sermon, I had been listening to the text, to what the situation demanded. In the second sermon, I had already ascertained what the situation demanded. My job was to make my preconceived, pre-judged (from our word

prejudiced) ideas fit the situation.

Jesus, on the other hand, was consistently creative. It appears that Jesus walked in to each situation, without preconceived ideas of how he was going to respond. And from his intentional, full presence in the situation, was able to give a creative response to whatever was happening that hit the nail on the head.

Remember the time he was present when the Jews were going to stone the woman caught in adultery? The pharisees asked Jesus what to do, so they could trap him. If he said, "Stone her," they talk about how little respect he has for human life. If he says, "Let her go," they get him for not taking the law seriously.

A marvelous, creative response. "Let whoever is without sin cast the first stone." That is being totally in touch with the situation.

He never used that particular response again. It was too creative. Too situation conditioned. Like LIFE.

After I had a good laugh on myself, I decided I would listen closer before deciding things. Who knows what next week's sermon will be? Or next week, for that matter?

I'll bet there will be some situations that call for some creativity. For all of us.

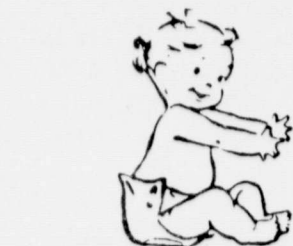

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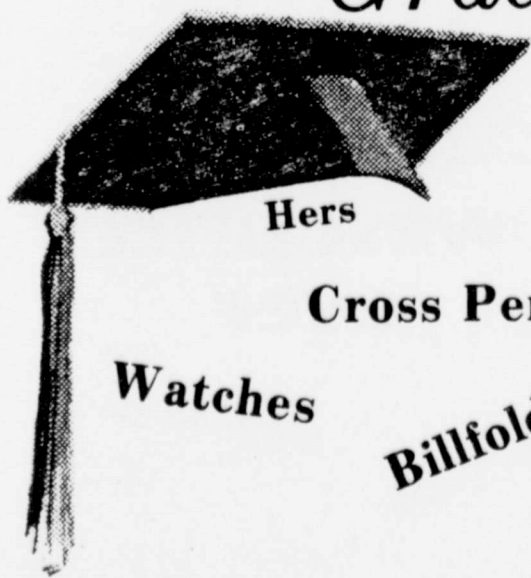
