September 1. That \$500 was only one-third of the amount suggested and requested for such service.

When notified of the offer, Nolte called it an "insult" and said that Taylor County could

keep their money and that service would be provided when needed.

The Merkel ambulance service was contacted Tuesday by the Taylor County Commissioners' Court and asked to at-

tend a budget meeting Wednes-

day to discuss the problems in western Taylor County. North Runnels Emergency

Service had not been contacted

by Taylor County at all. Both Randy Nolte and Vernon Wade say that unless Taylor County Commissioners do something very soon, residents of the rural areas of south and west Taylor County will have to call Abilene Emergency Medical Service, the same service that

did not respond to several critical calls in southern Taylor County in the past few years.

The Winters City Council, in regular session Monday evening, heard discussion concerning the purchase of new Christmas decorations for the city and agreed to earmark some \$2,000 for the project.

Council member Sandy Griffin has been working on the decorations idea, looking toward getting something new and different.

The decorations the city currently has are beginning to look rather shabby and it is hoped that the new decorations can be obtained in time for the holiday season.

One idea discussed Monday included the use lighted banners, which would be mounted on the new street light standards on the east side of Main Street at a cost of about \$1,000 and a banner that would extend across Main Street and would cost about \$1,000 also.

On other action, the council granted approval to Mark Garcia to use the city's radio frequency for emergency communications with the police dispatcher only. Garcia has just started in business as Winters Security Patrol.

The location of a parking shed for use by the fire department was discussed by the council along with representatives of the fire department. The shed is presently located immediately behind the city hall-fire department building. Plans call for the shed to be moved to behind the old power plant building.

The new location will allow the fire department to close in the building and add heating for one fire truck and the emergency response van.

The council voted to again require a cleaning deposit along with the fee for the rental of the Community Center in an effort to recover the costs of making the center available for rental and the cleaning up after its use. In a budget workshop session, the council looked at the Water and Wastewater Fund. No major changes are planned with the major emphasis on the refurbishing and repainting of the north water tower. That project will cost approximately \$40,000. The council met in executive session to discuss personnel salaries which is a part of the planning for the new budget
