## Ambulance service for rural Taylor County to end

It may seem like a subsequent chapter in the continuing saga of ambulance service for the rural areas of Taylor County only this time the area affected is not restricted to just the southern portions of that county.

North Runnels Emergency Service, Inc., of Winters, and the Merkel Volunteer Ambulance Service have both indicated that they will cease providing ambulance service to rural Taylor County effective September 1, 1989.

Vernon Wade, a paramedic with the Merkel ambulance service said Tuesday that he will recommend to the Merkel City Council that the ambulance service be limited only to that city's limits after the end of this

## D.A.R.E.-a long-term solution to a problem

Over the past several years, Runnels County entered into an aggressive offensive in the war against drugs. Officers in the county, as well as Ballinger and Winters, have taken active roles in an effort that has resulted in an drastic increase in the number of arrests and convictions in drug-related offenses.

As drugs began to become a major problem in previous years, law enforcement agencies tried to intervene and to teach high school students the harmful effects of using drugs. These programs, however well intended, produced little results.

In some instances, the officers presenting the programs found themselves at a disadvantage because the students they were trying to teach about drugs actually knew more, often from first-hand experience, about the drugs that did the officers.

About six years ago, in 1983, the Los Angeles, California Police Department and the Los Angeles Unified School District began a program aimed at drug prevention rather than intervention—stopping the problem before it started rather than trying to stop it after it had become a problem.

Runnels County Sheriff's officers Randy West and Quentin Watkins have become active in that program in this county.

Deputy Randy West, of Winters, said that the program, known by the acronym D.A.R.E. means Drug Abuse Resistance Education.

West said Tuesday that the program employed law enforcement officers in elementary school classrooms in California. In describing the program he said, "Educators of the Los Angeles Unified School District developed a 17-week curriculum for uniformed police officers to teach the senior level elementary students."

Both deputies said that junior high and high school education

areas of southern Taylor County ends on September 1, 1989.

Nolte said that there has been no attempt by Taylor County Commissioners to contact him regarding the service and that he assumes that Taylor County is no longer interested in providing for the residents of the southern portions of that county.

Following a series of meetings late last year and early this year, Taylor County Commissioners submitted to demands of the residents of the rural area to try and provide emergency medical service. That attempt

included offering Nolte \$500 to provide coverage until September 1. That \$500 was only one-third of the amount suggested and requested for such service.

When notified of the offer, Nolte called it an "insult" and said that Taylor County could

keep their money and that service would be provided when needed.

The Merkel ambulance service was contacted Tuesday by the Taylor County Commissioners' Court and asked to attend a budget meeting Wednesday to discuss the problems in western Taylor County.

North Runnels Emergency Service had not been contacted by Taylor County at all.

Both Randy Nolte and Vernon Wade say that unless Taylor County Commissioners do something very soon, residents of the rural areas of south and west Taylor County will have to call Abilene Emergency Medical Service, the same service that did not respond to several critical calls in southern Taylor County in the past few years.

The Abilene service contracts with the City of Abilene which, in turn, contracts with Taylor County for emergency ambulance service in the rural areas.

The same apparent lack of concern by Taylor County Commissioners John Thompson and John Dudley for the rural areas of their precincts will also cost taxpayers there additional money to reprogram the "911" system to direct calls for medical help to the Abilene ambulance service rather than Winters or Merkel.

Both Randy West and Quentin Watkins recently underwent an extensive 80-hour seminar to qualify them to teach DARE in the elementary schools.

Our help is needed for the program to begin and to succeed. An estimated \$3,000 is needed for books and materials to get the program started. DARE is a non-profit organization that operates on donations only.

Deputy West said that donations may be sent in care of the Runnels County Sheriff's Department, Courthouse, Ballinger, Texas 76821. Checks and money orders need to be made payable to D.A.R.E.

## Christmas decorations on council agenda

The Winters City Council, in regular session Monday evening, heard discussion concerning the purchase of new Christmas decorations for the city and agreed to earmark some \$2,000 for the project.

Council member Sandy Griffin has been working on the decorations idea, looking toward getting something new and different.

The decorations the city currently has are beginning to look rather shabby and it is hoped that the new decorations can be obtained in time for the holiday season.

One idea discussed Monday included the use lighted banners, which would be mounted on the new street light standards on the east side of Main Street at a cost of about \$1,000 and a banner that would extend across Main Street and would cost about \$1,000 also.

On other action, the council granted approval to Mark Garcia to use the city's radio frequency for emergency communications with the police dispatcher only. Garcia has just started in business as Winters Security Patrol.



Permit No. 3749 (A-4032) was issued to James B. Nevins and Central National Bank of San Angelo, Texas Trustees, on July 23, 1980 and authorizes the owners to impound 146 acre-feet of water in a proposed Soil Conservation Service dam and reservoir on Elm Creek, tributary of the Colorado River, Colorado River Basin, designated as Site No. 6, Elm Creek Watershed Project. The dam will be in the Wharton County School Survey No. 509, Abstract No. 500. Permittees are authorized to divert and use not to exceed 120 acre-feet of water per annum from the reservoir at a maximum diversion rate of 1.1 cfs to irrigate 64 acres on land in Runnels County, located approximately 23 miles northeast of Ballinger, Texas. Permit No. 3749 contains a Special Condition whereby permittees are authorized to divert water only when the water level of the reservoir is one foot or higher above the invert of the low flow outlet. Special Condition 4. (b) in the permit indicates all irrigation authorization under the permit will expire on December 31, 1989.

The applicants seek to amend the permit to extend the term of the permit for ten years or in perpetuity.

Application No. 4032A was received on May 9, 1989, and accepted for filing on July 7, 1989. The Executive Director has reviewed this application and declares it to be administratively complete.

No public hearing will be held on this application unless a person that may be affected requests a public hearing. 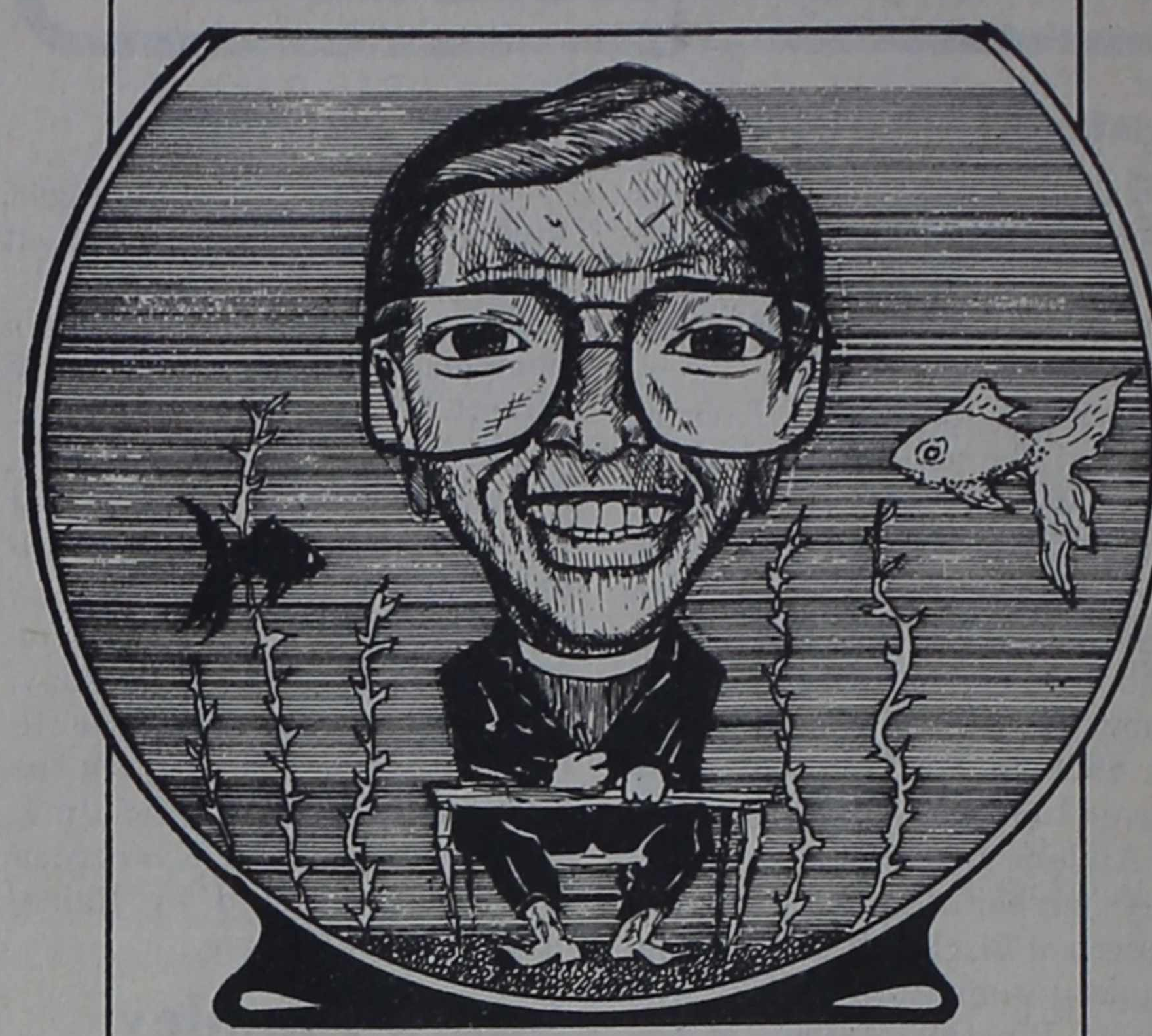

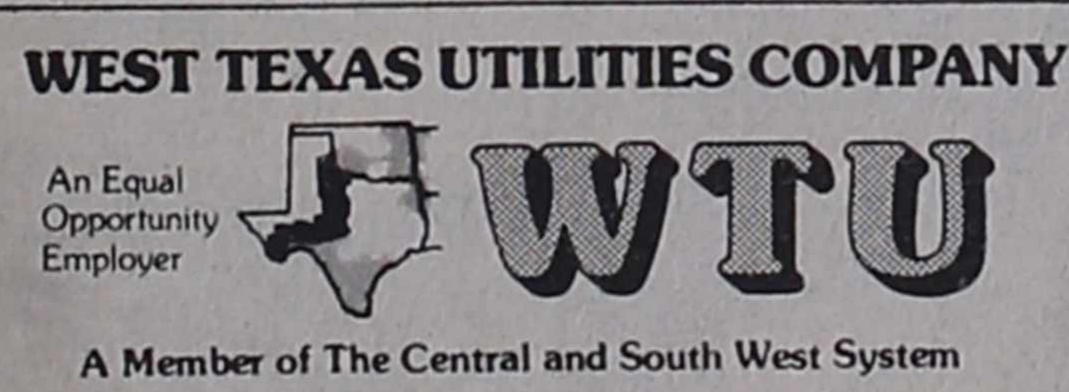
