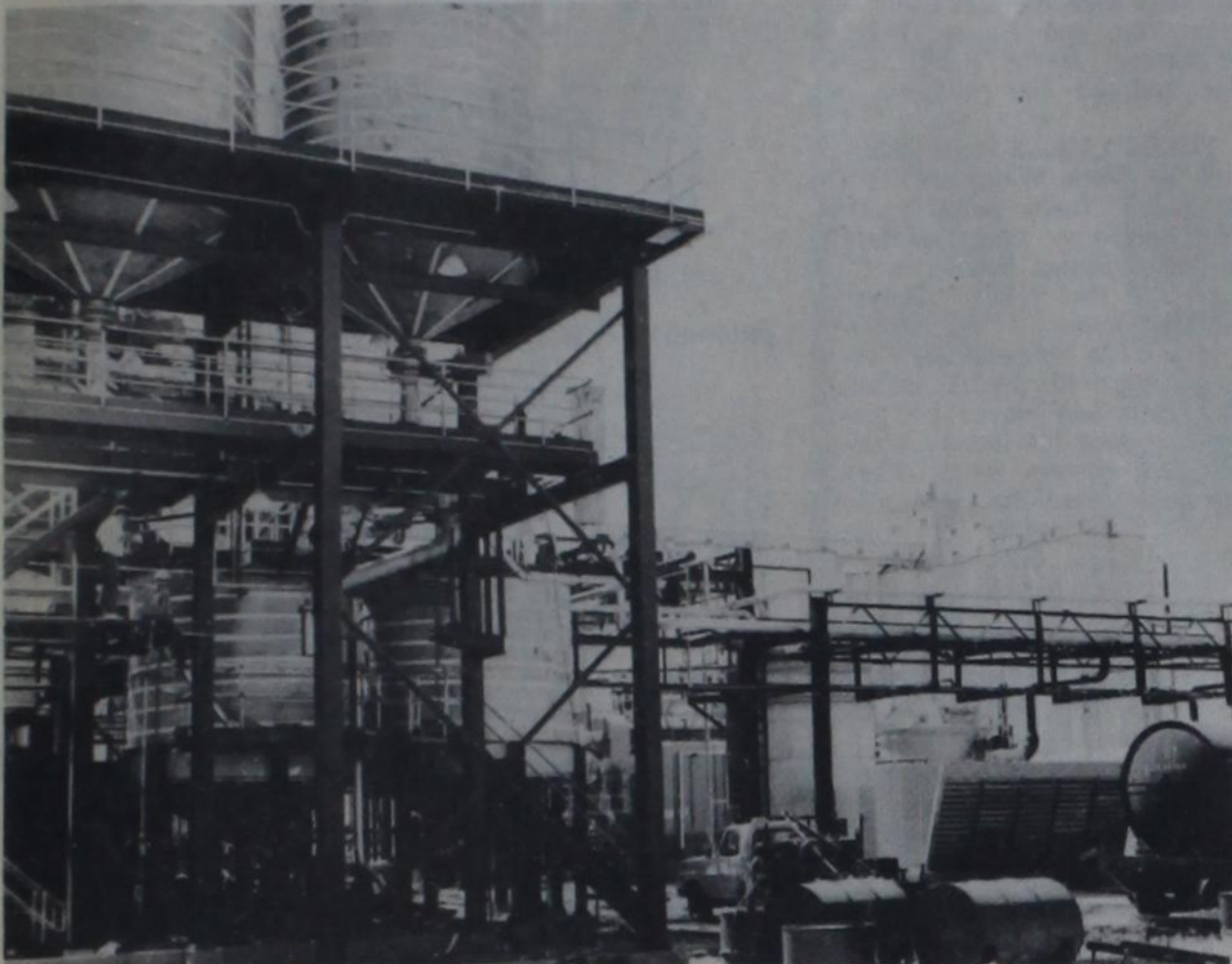

Syrup refinery starts up



SUCCESSFUL START-UP of the Dimmitt Agri-Industries corn syrup refinery has been achieved. The process turns corn starch into thick, pure corn syrup. The

railroad tank car at right will be rolled under the loader for the first shipment as soon as testing is completed.

The final chapter of construction of the corn milling plant complex of Dimmitt Agri-Industries has been completed with the successful start-up of the refinery.

THE REFINERY starts with corn starch, the raw material produced by the wet-process corn mill. Through the use of chemicals and enzymes in a complicated process, it produces corn syrup.

This syrup has a wide variety of industrial and consumer uses. Many are familiar with corn syrup under a variety of trade names on the market. It is used by the homemaker on pancakes and waffles, as sweetening in cakes and formulas. A major ingredient in ice cream, corn syrup is also used in chocolates, marshmallows and gum drops — and even in

pickle making, tanning hides and luncheon meats.

Approximately 250,000 pounds of corn syrup have already been produced at the recently opened plant. The syrup is stored in tanks awaiting further chemical checks.

THE PROMISE of the refinery has brought new faces to the area. The talents of the personnel — Paul Blanchard, plant technical director; Johnny Tan, technical superintendent; George Rush, plant chemist; and Barry Love, manager — have aided in the short construction time.

Experts from other areas also assisted in the construction and start-up. The Anheuser-Busch Co. sent two of its experts — Jerry Wokaimt, manager of chemical engineering, and Louis Slapshak, corn products research — to assist in the start-up. The companies furnishing instrumentation sent their specialists to assist in the refinery construction and opening.

The experts checked the operation of the parts of the plant that their companies supplied, and assured plant personnel that all components function to design specifications.

A grand opening of the refinery and milling plant is planned for later.

Yields are light

Wheat nearly all in

The wheat harvest is nearly complete.

MOST elevators reported 90 to 99 percent of their customers' wheat already in. The yields and quality varied from average to below average, depending on location and weather.

J. R. Brown of Bruegel & Sons Elevators reports 95 percent of his customers' wheat harvested. An average of 30 bushels was common, varying with hail damage received by each farmer. The yield was quite a bit lower than last year due to late hail damage, Brown said. The highest yield was about 56 bushels from a farm reporting 10 percent hail damage. Quality is "real good, with an average weight of 60 pounds per bushel," Brown reported. "It is good and dry, and protein content is about 14."

cent of his customers' harvest is complete. The quality is lower than normal due to the hot, dry weather conditions this spring. Clark had not completed yield average computations.

Cutting should have been completed Wednesday in the Flagg area, George Blanton of Flagg Grain Co. said. He estimates his customers' average yields at 50 bushels. One farmer reported a 100 bushel yield. The grain is good quality and little or none suffered hail damage.

Best news pictures

News wins state plaque

The Castro County News has the best news pictures of any weekly paper of its size in Texas.

THAT WAS the opinion of judges who awarded the local newspaper the first-place plaque in the news-photo category of the Texas Newspaper Contests, sponsored by the Texas Press Association.

It was the first state first-place award ever for the News. Although the local newspaper has been a consistent award-winner in Panhandle and West Texas competition, this is the first year it has entered the state contests since 1956.

Announcement of the award was made during the annual TPA convention in Austin's Sheraton Crest Motel. Managing Editor Don Nelson accepted the copper engraved award plaque from TPA President Ellie Hopkins of the Longview News-Journal during the association's annual awards breakfast Friday morning.

ATTENDING the convention with Nelson were his wife, Verbie, and their two sons, David and Nathan.

Highlights of the three-day convention were an autograph and picture party with Phyllis George of Denton, Miss America of 1971, who was named the "Texan of the Year" by the state press association; a tour of Johnson City, the LBJ Ranch; and Lyndon B. Johnson State Park, with an informal party at the ranch and a talk by the former president

at the park's visitor center; dedication of the Texas Press Association's new headquarters building in Austin; and a "This Is Your Life" program honoring Vern Sanford, who is retiring after serving 24 years as manager of the TPA.

In the Texas Newspaper Contests, the News competed in Division V, for weeklies published in cities of 2,000 to 5,000

population. The five top-scoring newspapers in the division were the Diboll Free Press (general excellence award winner) the Rockdale Reporter, the Lockney Beacon, the Hamilton Herald-News and the Castro County News.

A neighbor newspaper, the Bovina Blade, was named the best all-around weekly in any Texas city under 2,000 population.

US Postal Service — July 1, 1971

POSTMASTERS of Castro County will help launch the new US Postal Service today — and what better way to commemorate the event than putting their faces on a giant stamp? At top are John Wood of Dimmitt and Mrs. Jewel Brooks of Hart.

New postal era to begin with open house today

Castro County's postmasters invite all members of the community to visit their local post offices today and enjoy the hospitality of the new US Postal Service.

THE UNITED STATES Post Office Department fades into history today (Thursday) after nearly 200 years of service to the American people. The United States Postal Service, a governmental corporation, takes the department's place.

The inauguration will be celebrated in all post offices across the nation and in Washington, D.C., at the same time. Dedication ceremonies in Washington will be hosted by Postmaster General Blount. Members of Congress, former postmasters general, the Board of Governors of the new US Postal Service and other personnel will be honored guests at the dedication. This program will be broadcast on radio and television networks across the nation.

The Postal Service will offer a limited number of commemorative first-day envelopes free to visitors, today only. In addition, a limited number of cancelled first-day covers will be available for eight cents.

A **NEW** eight-cent stamp will be issued carrying the emblem of the new service — a stylized eagle posed for flight. This stamp will be available simultaneously at all post offices, a first in postal history. Big, bright, colorful posters containing blow-ups of famous stamps will be on display for visitors to see, and they can be purchased for home use.

These posters can be obtained by writing to Historic Stamp Posters, US Postal Service, Washington, D.C., 20036, and specifying the type of poster desired. The posters are \$1.50 per sheet or \$5 for the four-sheet set, plus 50 cents for handling. The themes of the posters are space, environment, history and transportation.

postal area to come in to the post office's open house from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Visitors will be shown through the office and will receive souvenir envelopes. The lobby will be decorated with stamp poster displays, pictures showing the workers of the Postal Service and the new emblem decals on doors and windows.

Former postmasters of Dimmitt have been invited to drop in during the day's activities as special guests. Wood served as a clerk from Jan. 1, 1945, until he was appointed postmaster in July 1967.

MRS. JEWEL Brooks, Hart postmaster, has a morning of activities planned for her patrons. At 8 a.m. the Cub and Boy Scouts will have a flag-raising ceremony. They will be followed by addresses from Mayor E. E. Foster and Supt. Ted Averitt. Two groups will present a musical program.

Everyone is invited to open house from 9:30 a.m. until 4 p.m., and coffee will be served. Mrs. Brooks has been post-

master at Hart since Jan. 26, 1957.

IN NAZARETH, Postmaster Rose Warren will host an open house from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. She has served as postmaster since 1944; she spent 10 months before that as acting postmaster.

POSTMASTER Eva Lookingbill of Summerfield will celebrate the Postal Service inauguration today, and her 43rd wedding anniversary on Wednesday.

Mrs. Lookingbill and her husband have worked together in the post office for many years. She was appointed postmaster April 6, 1929, and had been acting postmaster since May, 1928. She is believed to be one of the longest-term lady postmasters in the nation.

THE DIMMITT Post Office has a colorful history of postal and delivery service which matches the history of the area itself.

W. A. "Buck" Tale served as pony rider in the early 1900s. Each Tuesday and Thursday he rode with the mail to a point between here and Amarillo known as the Frying Pan Ranch, to meet the Amarillo rider and exchange mail sacks. During one spell of bad weather he made the trip nine times with the same mail before the Amarillo rider made contact with him. The 1890 census listed nine residents in the county.

The post office has been in many locations in Dimmitt. One of the earliest was in a small building that sat in what is now the street in front of Polson's White's Auto. It has been in several locations in the 100 block of East Bedford and the 100 block of South Broadway. It was in the 100 block of West Jones before moving to its current location in 1966.

MRS. GAINES NEILL was postmaster from 1918 until 1933, and she remembers much of the postal history in Dimmitt. (See NEW POSTAL, Page 9)

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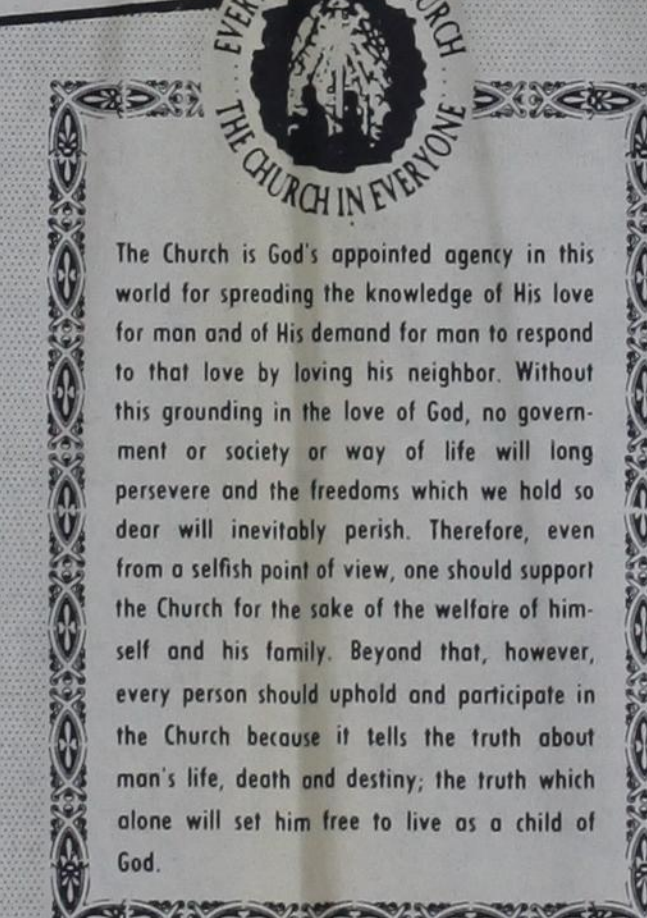

Make sure fire insurance and other insurance policies on your home are in force and paid. You may also want to place valuables and important papers in safekeeping.

AN UNMOWED lawn may indicate a vacant house, so arrange to have the lawn mowed if you will be away long. Store outdoor tools, appliances, furniture, ladders and hoses inside to avoid damage.

Window shades or venetian blinds should not be completely closed. When you're ready to leave turn off heat and disconnect electrical appliances. Lock all doors, then leave a key with a neighbor so, if necessary, your house can be entered without breaking a window or lock. Never leave keys outside, under a mat or over the door.

768 on Social Security here are drawing \$64,000 per month

Social Security benefits were being paid to residents of Castro County at a rate of \$64,000 a month at the close of 1970, Travis Briggs, social security district manager in Amarillo, said this week.

A BENEFIT increase signed into law by President Nixon March 7 raises the monthly rate of payment by 10 percent for most of the 768 social security beneficiaries in Castro County, Briggs added. A small number of beneficiaries over age 72 who are not receiving regular social security cash benefits will get a 5 percent increase.

Of the social security beneficiaries living in Castro County, 447 are retired workers and their dependents. Another 223 are receiving benefits as the survivors of workers who have died, and 72 are getting benefits as disabled workers or their dependents.

Briggs pointed out that although most social security beneficiaries are older people, about one out of every four is under age 60. In Castro County, 258 people under age 60

are collecting social security payments each month. Nearly 167 are under age 18, receiving payments because a working father or mother has died or is getting social security disability or retirement benefits.

Most of the 26 beneficiaries in Castro County between 18 and 22 years of age, are getting students' benefits under a provision in the social security law permitting the continuation of a child's benefits beyond his 18th birthday, and up to age 22, if the child is attending school full time.

Young man, are you tax exempt?

If you are a student who is working during the summer and you will not earn enough to owe any income tax (\$1700), it's not too late to go back and talk to your payroll office about completing a Form W-4E. The "E" stands for exemption.

A RECENT change in the tax law allows your employer to let you take home all your pay under these circumstances. The new law allows your employer to stop withholding on students who will not earn enough to owe any income tax. It also saves the government the trouble of sending you an income tax refund next January or February.

The West Texas AAU Junior Olympic Track and Field Championships will be held in Borger July 17.

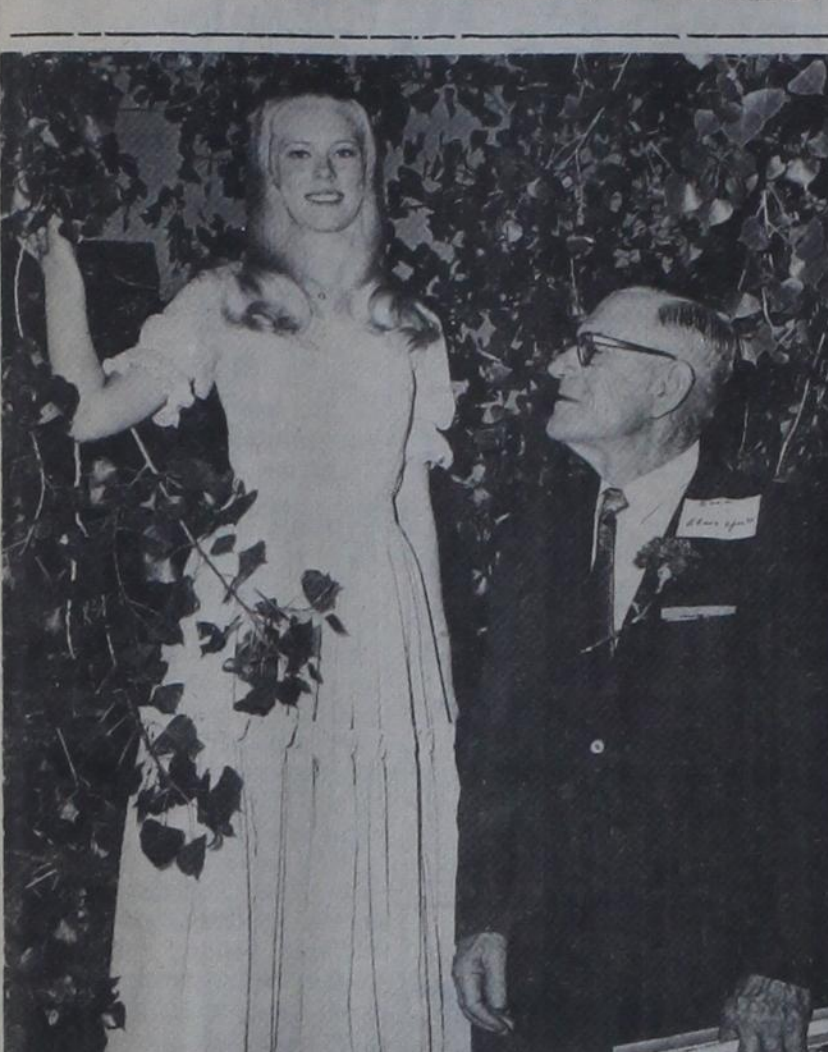
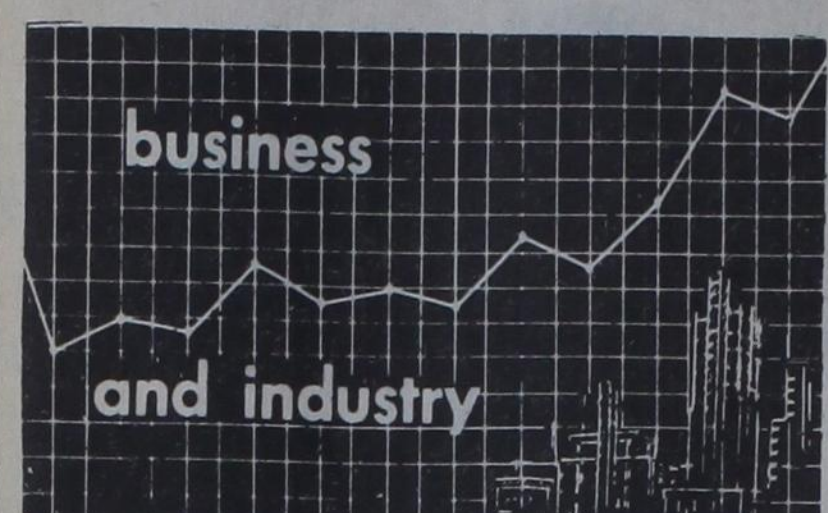

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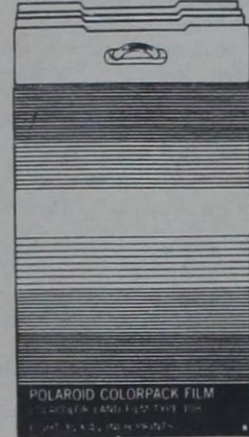


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Kitchen talk

For summer clothes and swimsuits, do you need to cut a few calories?

Summer clothes often reveal bulges we've been trying to forget all winter. Many people tend to gain a few extra pounds during the winter when heavy clothes cover them up. But it all shows in clingy summerwear. **HERE ARE** some low-calorie fillers for you to try:
You can cut a few calories every day by leaving margarine and jelly off your morning toast. One slice of bread only has 50-70 calories, depending

on the number of slices per loaf. A slice of bread makes an excellent snack, low in calories and filling.

Cottage cheese is often a dieter's choice. Two-thirds cup of low-fat cottage cheese offers about 100 calories; creamed cottage cheese, about 200.

TO ADD sip to your cottage cheese, try these additions:
Relish delight: Mix two tablespoons sweet pickle relish with cheese. This adds about 40 calories.

Zippy cheese: Mix in one teaspoon prepared yellow mustard or one-half teaspoon hot mustard. Count five to 10 more flavorful calories.

Cottage cheese Danish: Mix one-half teaspoon sugar with one-fourth cup cottage cheese. Spread the mixture on hot toast; dust with cinnamon. The entire Danish is about 115 calories.

Sparklers: Add (to taste) instant minced chives or green onion, grated carrot or minced green peppers. The calories are low on all of these.

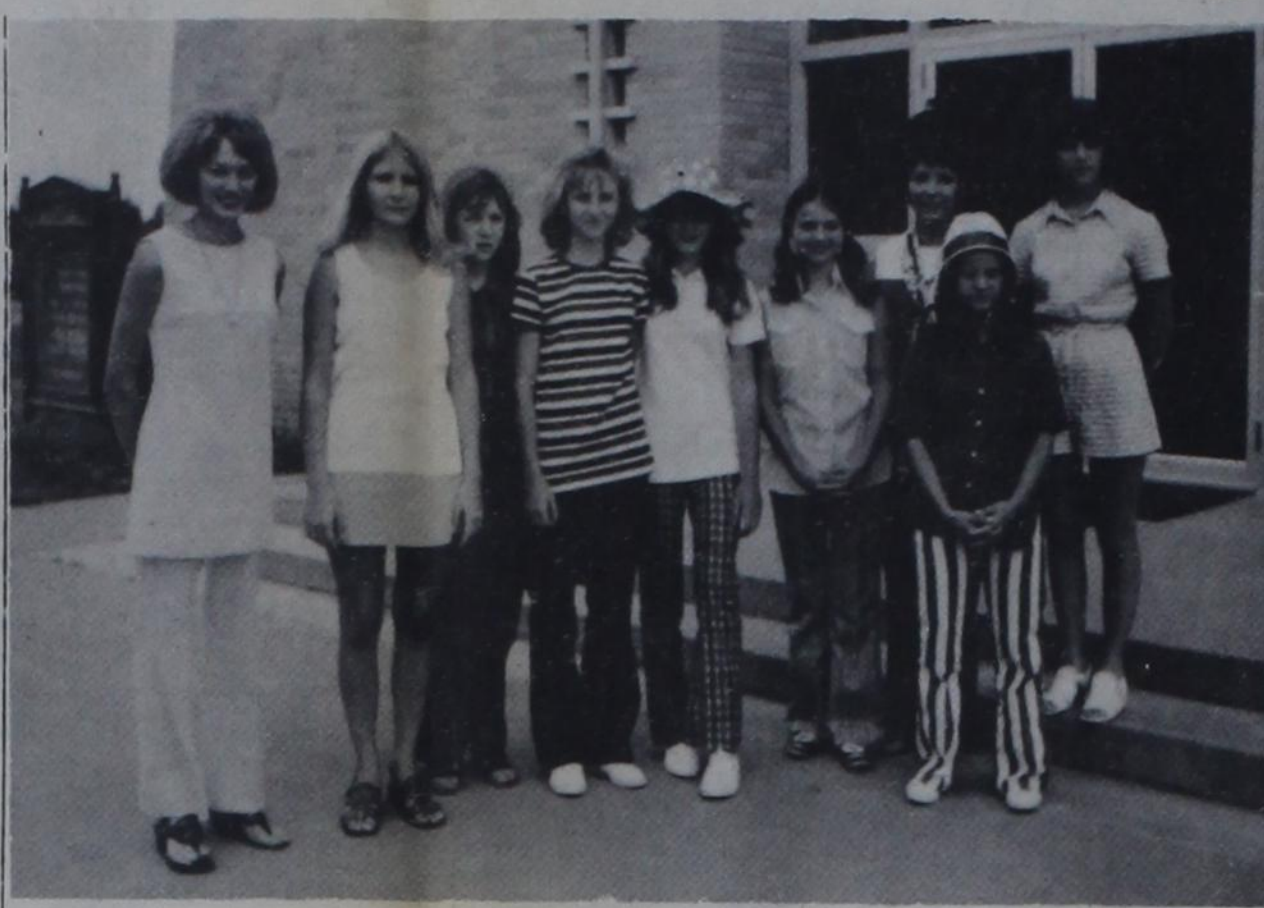

(Continued from Page One) Dimmitt. The post office was in the Rawlings Hotel building for many years, sharing the space with mercantile and barber shops.

Mrs. Neill processed mail for the entire county and had to place all postal orders for the other towns to Dallas. One post office burned while she was postmaster. Everything burned except a few items held in the safe, she recalled.

It went from a fourth to a third class post office during her term as postmaster. This is thought to be the first time that help was authorized for the post office. Now the Dimmitt post office has three clerks and four carriers.

Stamps sold for two cents during Mrs. Neill's time as postmaster, and the mail came from Hereford by train.

The Summerfield Post Office history during Mrs. Lookingbill's service has been colorful, too. While serving as postmaster, she reared a family of five, and now has 22 grandchildren.

On Dec. 20, 1949, the post office the Lookingbill's home and store - which were all in the same building - burned. Mr. Lookingbill saved only the mail which was sacked awaiting dispatch. Later, they discovered that Mr. Lookingbill had thrown in the money sack without realizing it during the fire.

The Summerfield store-post office combination has been broken into twice, the post office bothered only once.

TODAY the county's four post offices begin a new era as part of a vast public corporation, the US Postal Service. The new era will somewhat see the widespread use of automated mail-sorters, computerized address readers and other such fancy machinery for the speedier dispatch of mail.

The federal government intends for the new postal corporation to be self-supporting. This goal in itself may spur controversy in the future, for the public has always gotten more service than it has paid for in postage.

But the post office people will be the same and no drastic changes in postal delivery are planned for the near future, so the service - in Castro County, at least - will continue to be personalized.
