New Paper Off the Ground

The "new" *Winters Enterprise* now has its first edition off the presses. After almost three months without a "Winters" paper, the new one is now up and walking. Owned by The Winters Enterprise, Inc., a family corporation made up of brothers Roeneal, Rick, Randall and Reg Boles, it is anticipated the paper will improve with each edition.

One of the Boles boys will be moving back to Winters in the not-too-distant future to manage the newspaper and printing operation. Roeneal, who has lived in Mississippi for 14 years will be coming back to manage the business. He is a graduate of Texas A & M University and worked for George Hill and Dick Thomas, former publishers of the paper, from 1957 to 1961.

"We have been very pleased with the reception by the businesses and people of the Winters area," Boles said. "We believe the newspaper and printing operation will be a viable business and an asset to the town," he went on to say.

Copies of the new newspaper will be sent free for two months to all

Winters addresses. The new publishers will honor all subscriptions to the old newspaper, but should be notified by those holding subscriptions of their name, complete address and expiration date.

Having very little experience in the newspaper and printing business, it was felt an experienced person was needed to run the newspaper operation. On January 2, Jennifer Craig of Stamford, who has no relatives in Winters, will become Managing Editor of *The Winters Enterprise*. Ms. Craig grew up in the newspaper business, since her parents owned and operated the *Stamford American* for many years. She is a graduate of Texas Tech University and is a member of the Society of Professional Journalists; West Texas Press Association; Texas Press Association and the National Newspaper Association. She was editor of the *Stamford American* from 1985 until recently.

Runnels County Names New Extension Agent

Marty Gibbs, 23, of Livingston has been named Assistant County Extension Agent-Agricultural (ACEA) in Runnels County effective January 2. The announcement was made in a joint statement issued by Runnels County Judge, the Honorable Michael Murchison and District 7 Extension Director, Ken Cook.

The new agent will be officed in the Extension complex located in the Runnels County Courthouse. He will be under the direction of CEA Mike Mauldin. His major responsibility will be handling the county's agricultural 4-H programs.

The new agent is a December graduate of Texas A & M University and holds a B.S. degree in Animal Science. While attending A & M, he officiated many 4-H and FFA livestock judging contests throughout the state. He also was a member of the University's 1988 Reserve National Champion Livestock Judging Team.

Gibbs was active in school organizations including the Texas A & M Saddle and Siroloin Club and Alpha Zeta Honor Society. While a member of the society, he was named to the list of distinguished students for four semesters.

The new agent is married to the former Jackie Potter of Livingston. The couple plans to live in Ballinger.

Gibbs fills the position vacated by Todd Swift who transferred to Blanco County earlier this year.

District Governor Speaks to Lions

District Governor Bob Noyes of Big Spring was the guest speaker at the December 12 meeting of the Winters Lions Club. Mr. Noyes has been a Lion for five years and spoke to the Lions about the primary projects which Lions support.

One of the primary projects is the Texas Lions Camp which is 500 acres on the Guadalupe River near Kerrville. The camp is host each year to blind, deaf and diabetic children.

A second project is Leader Dogs for the Blind, which is 66% funded by Lions projects. Cost of training

these dogs is approximately \$2,800 each but they are made available to qualified blind persons free of charge.

The third project is the District Lions Eye Bank. Through this program, glaucoma screening is made available free through the use of a special trailer kept in San Angelo and available for use by local Lions Clubs.

The Lions International Foundation makes disaster funds available in areas such as the Hurricane Hugo disaster in North Carolina and the San Francisco earthquake.

OIL BIDNESS.

Well, another year of oil prices under \$20/bbl. It's funny how your perspective changes. In 1985, oil prices of \$18 or \$19 would have been considered disaster, but now it's almost comfortable. As a matter of fact, we're all very happy that oil prices have been at or above \$18 for the last 6 months.

Stability has become as desirable as price increases. The oil business requires lead time and planning. Buying leases and getting drilling funds together for a well in this area can take a year of advance work, so some certainty about what oil prices will be becomes very valuable. I might go as far as to say that I would sacrifice a \$1/bbl increase possibility to get a guarantee of no decrease. That is, unless it was a project with real 'romance'. Oops! That's the oil patch optimism coming out in me, again.

So, what about oil prices for 1990 and beyond? The so-called 'experts' are being very positive, these days. They say there will be some weakness thru April 1990 (\$17+), but prices are supposed to head back to about \$20/bbl by midyear. Furthermore, OPEC is expected to regain control over the world oil market in the early to mid '90's. That should, according to those that think they know, result in a somewhat restrained price rise to \$25/bbl and maybe even \$30 by 1995!

Now, I usually get nervous when all (or most) of the experts agree, but their forecasts seem to be based on solid fundamentals. They are being 'carefully optimistic' at least. So, I tend to agree with the above scenario with a few 'be carefuls' added on.

First, plan for bigger oil price swings than you hear most people predicting. I think one thing we've learned over the last four years is that anything is possible in the oil market. So, measure your tolerance for risk against your project's tolerance for lower-than-expected oil prices.

Second, pick an average price for the life of your well, workover, or facility and see what the cash flow is like. Then ask yourself two questions:

- Does my project fly?
- Do I believe that my average price pick will stand up?

Finally, never assume any deal is a sure thing. Check the local bankruptcy court for those that made that fatal error.

OK, that covers producers, but what about those service companies? How can they plan for oil price changes?

Well, now is the perfect time of year to check the pulse of your customers. Your business will depend on their expectations as much as what oil prices actually do. You've worked with these people, and they have been somewhat successful or they would not still be in business. Learn what you can from them and then factor everything by your expectations.

All in all, 1989 has been a decent year. In the next decade, we will most probably have the opportunity to at least operate under more favorable circumstances than the '80's afforded the oil patch. One of these days, we'll talk about how to diversify with all that new money we are going to make. In any case, booms and busts don't last forever...do they?

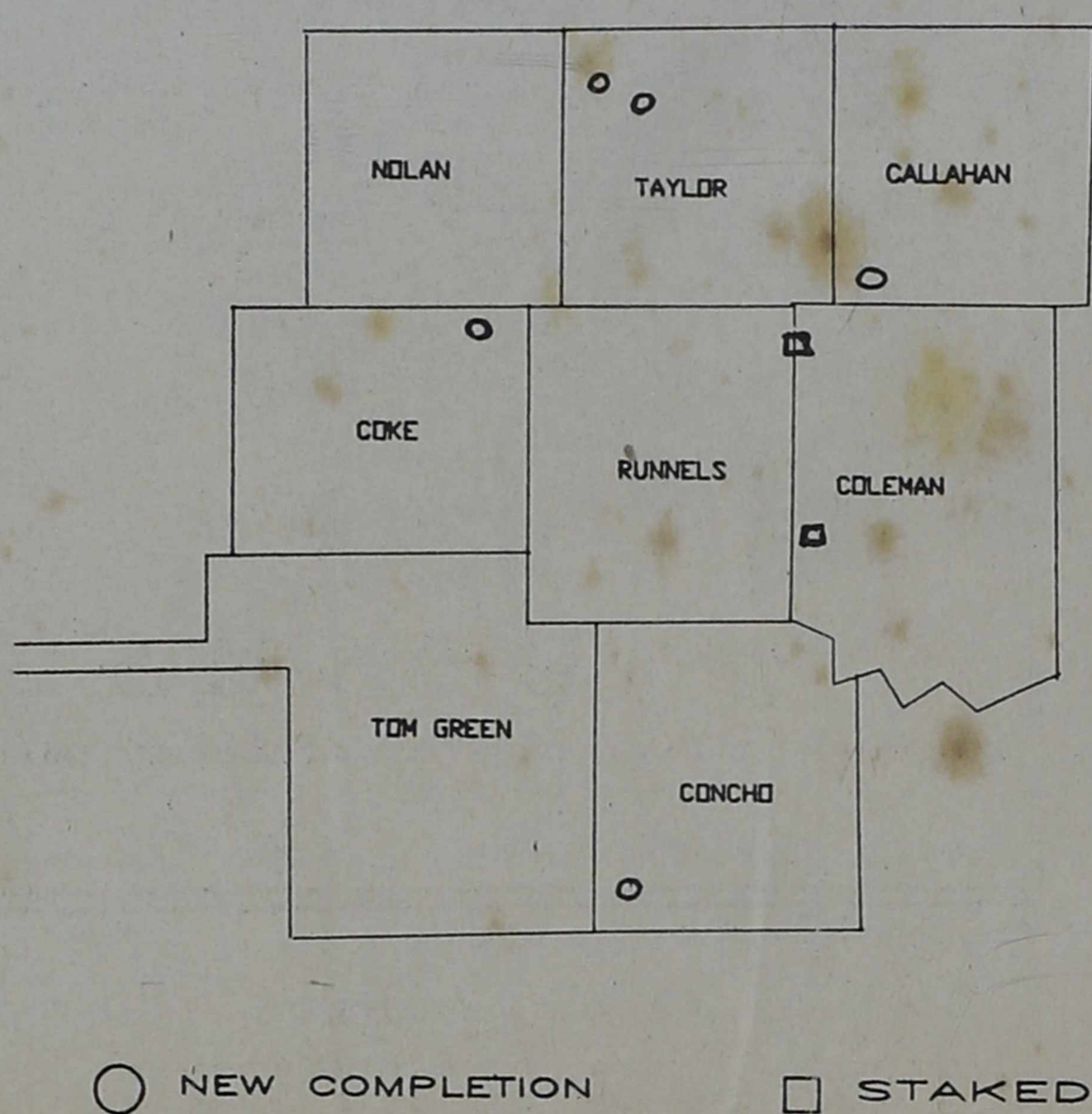

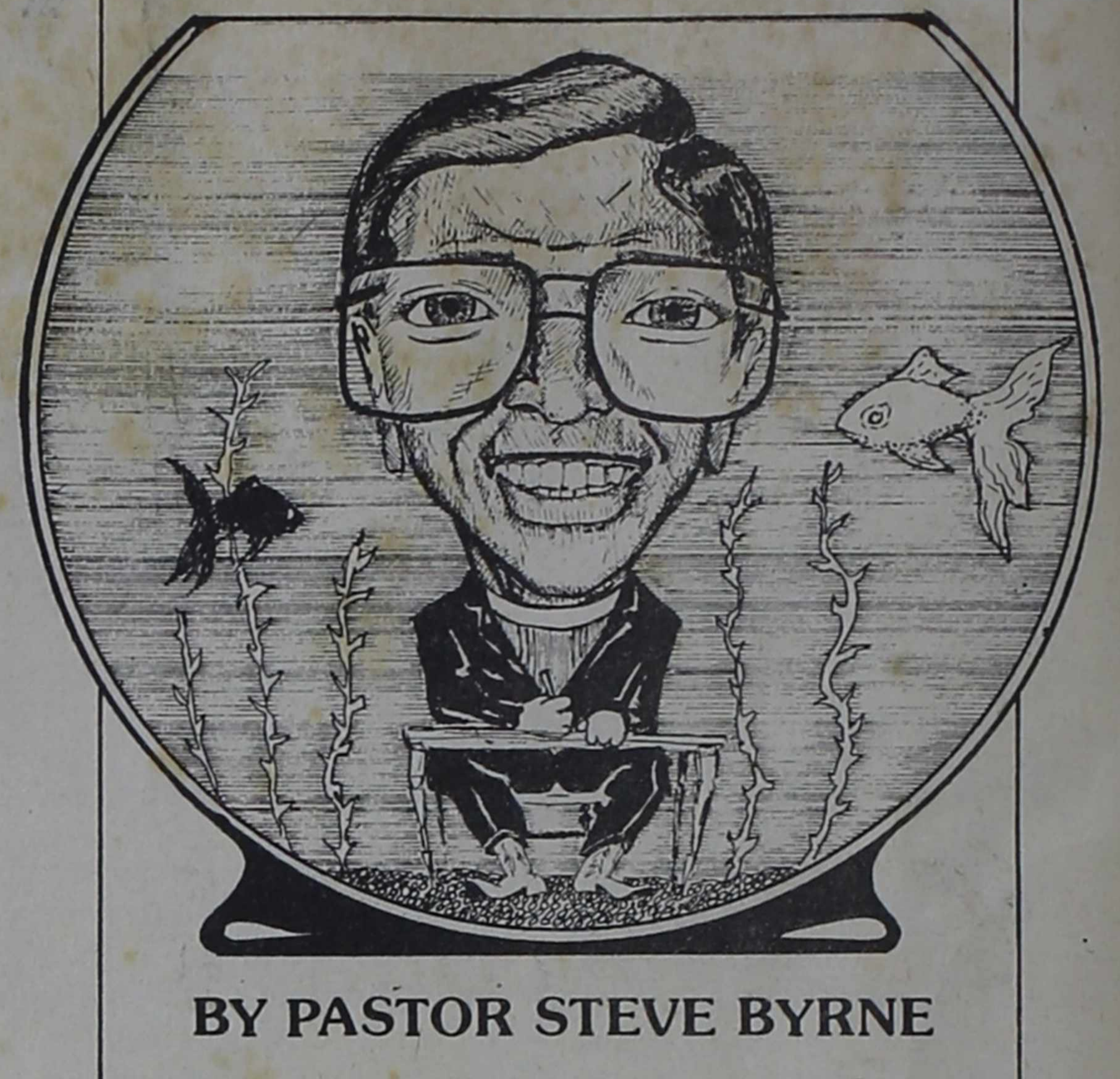

FROM A GOLDFISH BOWL



Six years ago next week, our family moved to Winters. It was late December, 1983. It was cold. And it was cold for a long, long time, by West Texas standards.

During the move I wore my heavy, brown, double-breasted 3/4 length coat with the fake fur around the collar. I had bought it when we lived in Minnesota, and it served its purposes well in that frigid climate. When we got back to Texas, we found it a rare winter's day when this particular coat was called for. I wore it throughout the post-Christmas move in 1983.

When you move as much as we have, you learn that each time you move, you lose things. It is like they hide out right before the move, so you never find them to pack them. Shortly after we had unpacked and halfway settled, I noticed that one of my pipes was missing. One of my favorites. Made by an old Minneapolis pipe-maker.

It wasn't one of the more expensive ones. But one of my favorites. And since I had met the pipe-maker on occasion, it had some sentimental value.

Yet, knowing the reality of the casualties of moving, I looked for it for a while. Then wrote it off as a "moving loss."

A few weeks ago, Winters hosted a couple of quarter-final six-man football games. I was asked to announce. It was outdoors. It was cold. I found the old heavy, brown coat in the back of the upstairs closet. Put it on at the door. Felt in the pocket. Pulled out my lost pipe. Its round, apple shape. Its traditional carved bark.

I suppose I hadn't had the occasion to wear that coat since 1983. The pipe wasn't lost. It wasn't gone. I just didn't know where to look for it.

Sometimes we lose the spirit of Christmas like that. Six years ago. Or ten. Or twenty. Can't remember when it was I last remembered having it. Or when it was I wrote it off as a casualty of age.

Maybe we looked for it. But we looked in all the wrong places. Looked for it in the face of a child, and got close to it.

But the spirit of Christmas is not even in the face of THE child. The Birthday Boy himself, Emmanuel. God With Us. Jesus. The Messiah in the manger.

I only know of one place to look for THAT particular baby. Where he promised he would always be. In Word and Sacrament. The Church.

Hope to see you there Christmas morning. But most of all, I hope you see HIM there Christmas morning.

Services for Louise Morgan were held at 2 p.m. Tuesday, December 19, in Ballinger First Baptist Church.

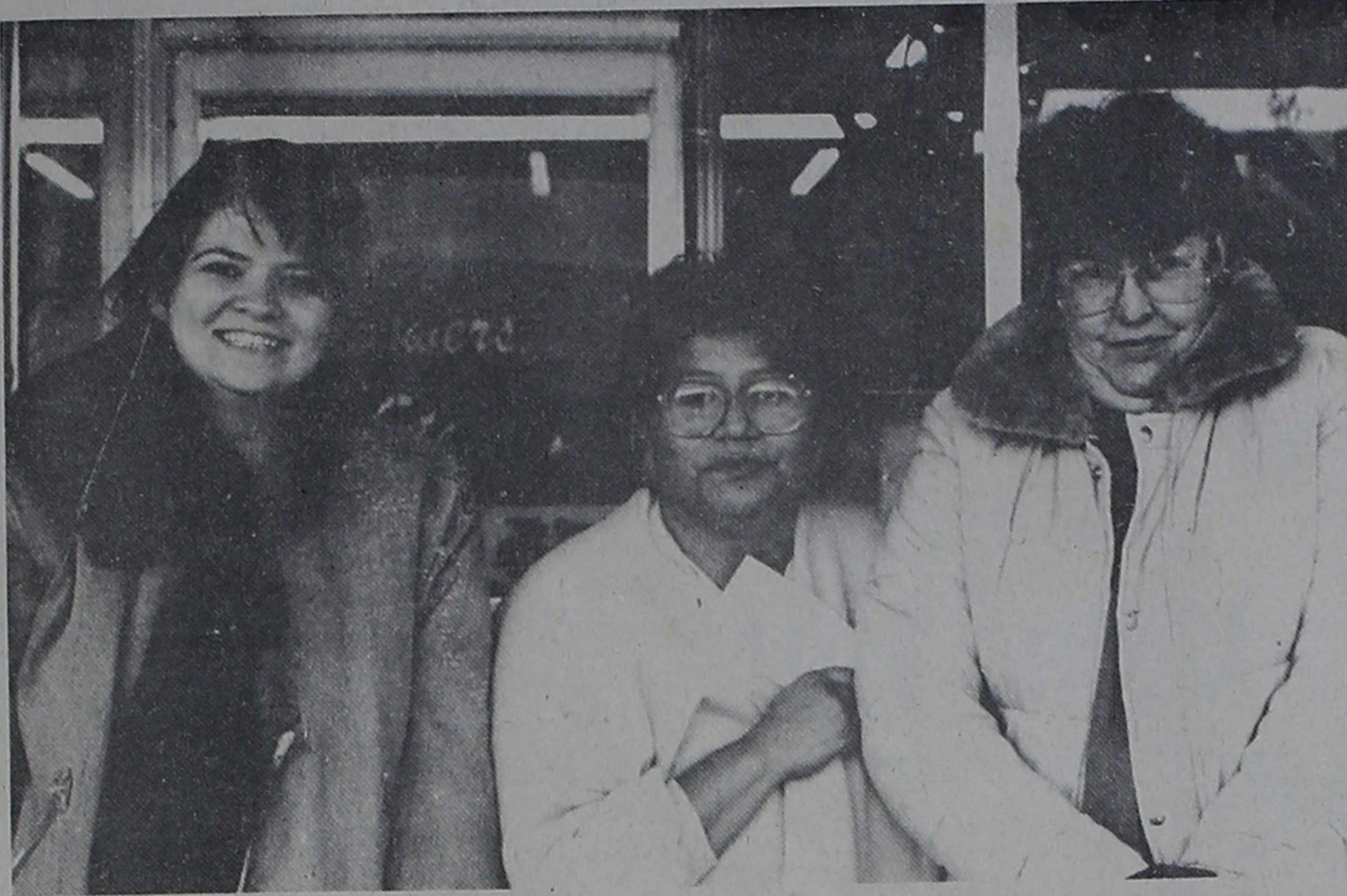
Gus Poehls

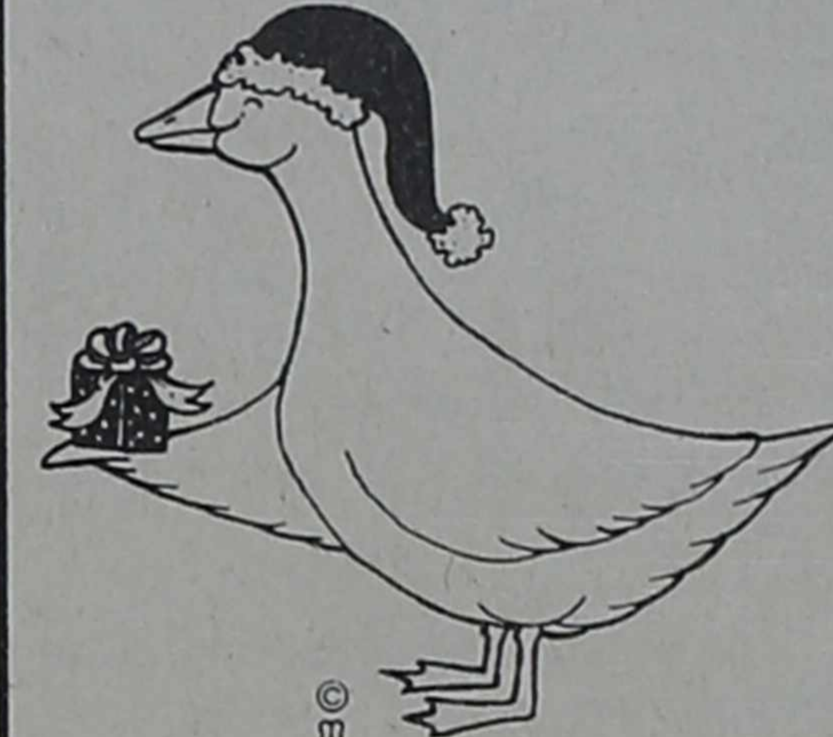

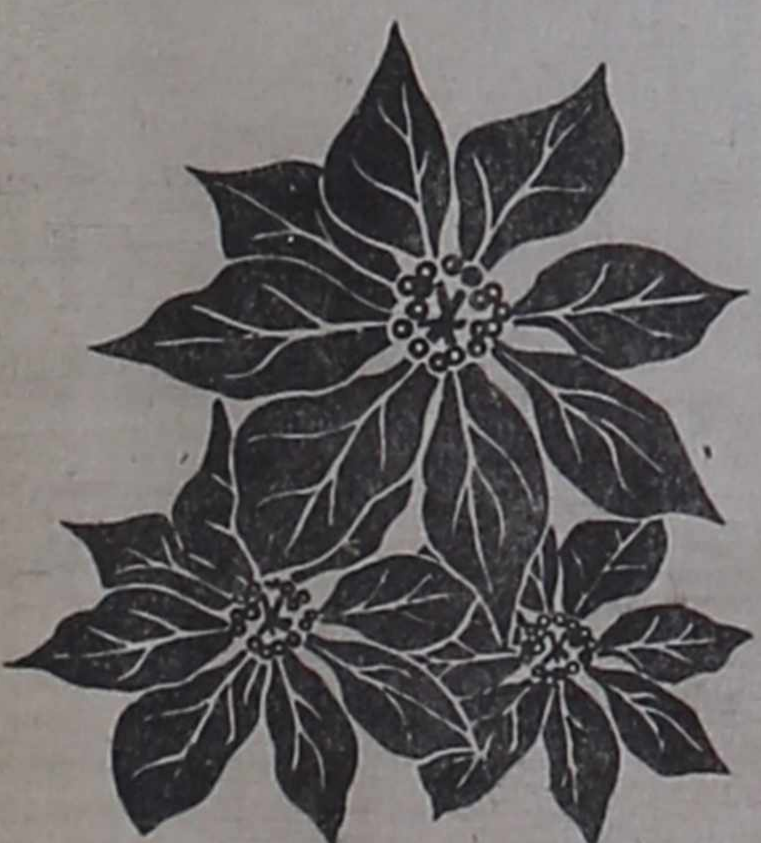

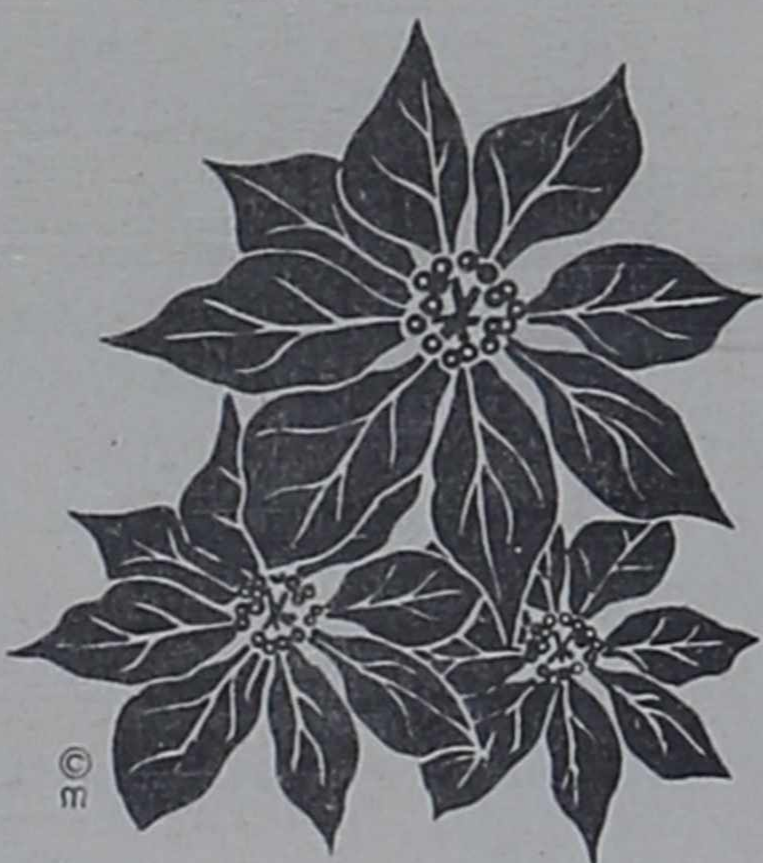
