## Water case hearing over, interim rate set

Following two full days of hearings, an interim rate for the Runnels Water Supply Corporation has been agreed upon. A rate of $\$ 2.56$ per thousand gallons was recommended by the Texas Water Commission staff as a fair rate for the city to charge NRWSC Both parties agreed to the rate following a recommendation by Hearings Examiner Kerry SulliCommission.
The hearing on merits of the case began on Monday morning in Austin. The matter of the rate charged NRWSC by the City had been appealed to the Texas Wate Commissionby NR WSC in April, had met several times in trying to reach an agreement on a rate, but had not been able to agree. The City Council, by ord nance, on April 18, 1991 set the new rate to be charged NRWSC effective April 22 at $\$ 2.84$ per thousand gallons. The hearing on Aprits of the case was to begin on was obtained by North Runnels in order to combine the appeal of the original $\$ 2.05$ rate set by the City in 1990 and the new \$2.84 rate. At that time, NRWSC also petitioned the Texas Wate Commission to set an interim rate oo be paid by NRWSC to the City until a final judgement was ren The two dwo appeals cross-examination by attomey for both sides was concluded late on Tuesday afternoon. Following the conclusion of testimony Examiner Sullivan told the par ties that he could not make a final ruling on the interim rate, but he would recommend to the Com mission that the $\$ 2.56$ rate be set would agree to that rate it could

From the perspective of a net importer, a stable supply is paramount. If a country has to depend on an undependable source, then hat country is at risk to the whims fust work to have a good rela ionship with a very stable and dependable source or sources. Nothing wrong with that-it is good business and smart politics. In addition, that importing country wants to have a strong domestic source, if possible, to eep dependence to a minimum. his practice also makes a lot of sense.
, some consuming counhe above, but they usually try to he best of their government's ability.
What seems to pervade a consuming country's pattern of be havior is that the producing counhe consuming countries' nomic well-being. This is usually premised on the thought that those


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- net importers will eventually find a way to develop an alternative to petroleum long before the reser
out;
- as a result, producers must realize that petroleum will not be a perpetual money machine,and, $\underset{\text { - consumers must realize tha }}{\text { producers have the ability tomake }}$ producershave the ability tomak develop alternatives.
It all boils down to the mark pushing both consumers and producers to equalize the equation of supply and demand in the future. Any delays in realization of this fact by either party may
delay this equilibrium, but, evendelay this equilibrium, but, eventually, market forces in the form
of higher energy prices will push the two participants intothisequilibrium.
If both parties will open their
eyes and ears a little wider to these realities, they should realize the value both parties have to offer at this point in time and what
each can do to make the transition into the future-no matter how far away it is.

Be it enacted by the Country Club and the Winters Realty Company, that all non-resident stock shall be assessed $\$ 12.50$ per year for maintaining and improv-
ing the club properties; also for the payment of taxes and insurthe pay

The law gives propery owners the right to protest
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concem about:
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exemptions that may apply to you;
cancellation of agricultural appraisal
whether your property is taxable;

property; or you think the appraisal district has done
thing else that adversely affected you.
Informal Review: Taxpayers are encouraged to make an appointment with an appraiser to discuss their property value. This may be done by calling
(915) $365-3583$. They should bring information to substantiate why they feel their property value is incorrect. The appraiser will discuss their property and may recommend an adjustment to the Appraisal Review Board. If the taxpayer is satisfied with the adjustment, he does not have to appear before the Appraisal Review Board.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board: If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you have your case heard by board (ARB) is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals and other concems listed above. They have the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a noice of protest) before the deadine, ue ARB will set your case for a hearing. Yo and place of the hearing. The
tion of the time, date, hearing will be informal.. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 6 th and Strong, Ballinger. Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB member outside of the hearing. The law requ' the ARB hears your case.

Review by the District Court: After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy or with
order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must stan the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at $\$ 1,000,000$
