# **Family leaves all in Philippines**

The Richard Cavanaugh family left their three-bedroom home in the Philippines with nothing but three suitcases of clothes following the eruption of Mt. Pinatubo. Cavanaugh, a Winters native, said there was no time to move household goods when the orders came to get out. He and his Filipino wife, Marilyn, and three children, Chadrick, age 7; Chuck, age 6; and Charlynn, 4, left first for Subic Bay Naval Base. Finding no room there, they went to Limay Bataan, his wife's family's province and stayed with relatives.

Cavanaugh said when he and his family arrived at Subic Bay, several families were put into three bedroom homes, sometimes as many as five families to a house. He was advised if there was any other place he could take his family, to do so. They drove their car to his wife's family's home, carrying their three suitcases of clothes.

Mrs. Cavanaugh (Marilyn) seemed to be most upset over the loss of all their furniture and other

household goods. Richard says they haven't been told anything by the Air Force about their belongings other than there may be some reimbursement. Cavanaugh photographed all their belongings just prior to leaving as proof they did possess them.

Cavanaugh, who has been in the Air Force since 1982, is a staff sergeant and fuel systems technician. He served a tour in Desert Storm, stationed at Incerlik, Turkey. He and his squadron left the Philippines on February 19 and returned in late March. His duty is to maintain the fuel systems on all types of Air Force planes. In the Philippines he worked with F-4 fighter planes for the most part.

Sgt. Cavanaugh was serving his second tour of duty in the Philippines when it was interrupted by Mt. Pinatubo after eight months. His first tour was in 1983-86 when he met and married Marilyn. In between, he served at Hill Air Force Base in Utah and Tague, Korea.

When the Cavanaughs left the Philippines on July 1, they just

parked the car and left the keys in it and left. "It was an old one," said Marilyn. Luckily they had a car here in Winters at his mother's house. Marilyn said, "Thank God for that and our clothes we were able to bring!"

Richard graduated from Winters High School in 1978. He is the son of Mrs. Calvin Cavanaugh and the late Mr. Cavanaugh. His brother and sister also attended Winters schools. Ronald, his brother, is now in Amarillo and Ruth, his sister, is in Abilene.

Cavanaugh says even with the loss of his family's belongings, he still plans to make the Air Force a career. "It's a good business to be in," he says.

Meanwhile Cavanaugh has orders to report to Kirtland Air Force Base in New Mexico by August 30. So far, he has spent his time home (the family arrived July 3) painting his mom's house. "It helps keep my mind off all the other stuff. Anyway there's no use in dwelling on it," he says.



Well, in case it slipped by you last week, one of our honorable representatives in Washington has introduced a bill that would establish a FLOOR price for oil.

I knew that might get your attention, and, before I lose that attention, let me explain further.

Details: the recommended floor price is \$20.

Other information is sketchy and typically vague, as it often is in Washington press releases. But, there are a few 'generalities' being bandied about by the author of the bill and his spokespeople.

Before we get to that, let's talk about the Congressman who introduced this measure. There are a few surprises.

First, the measure was NOT introduced by a Congressman from Texas, Lousiana, or Oklahoma. The bill contributor is from Missouri-yes MISSOURI.

Also, the Representative is the House MAJORITY leader. For those who don't keep up with such things, that means he is a Democrat. That is not necessarily unusual, except that most Democrats involved with energy issues are from an oil producing state if they are supportive. Otherwise, they are more interested in reinstating the so-called Windfall Profits Tax or investigating the price gouging of scoundrel oil companies.

Enough mystery. Richard Gephardt (D-Mo.) is the one who has proposed what so many independent oil trade associations have clamored for. It is kinda funny how we have yet to hear much from those groups in support of this measure.

Maybe it is because the Honorable Mr. Gephardt hasn't always been in lock-step with the policies of those independent oil groups. As a result, the associations are a little cautious about supporting a bill that sounds good to them but has yet to have its details published and debatedespecially coming from such an unexpected source. hailed as the Energy Security and Price Stability Act. It will involve some sort of variable surcharge on imported oil (varying according to what, I don't know as of yet), and it will "encourage oil and gas development in the Western Hemisphere." What that means is yet to be explained, but it will include provisions to encourage exploration in the U.S. AND Mexico AND Venezuela.

Gephardt says the bill will "empower the President to waive substantially any tariff on Western Hemispheric oil." That could mean any number of things, but it sounds like there will be some flexibility for the President in application of this bill. It also sounds like there may be incentive for some foreign exploration

To further enlighten us, Rep.

as well as domestic development. Hopefully, that will not dull the effect of encouraging the domestic industry by giving oil companies just as much incentive to drill in Mexico and Venezuela as in the U.S. This could be a problem for a couple of reasons.

Both of the aforementioned countries have been known to have periods of instability and U.S. generated development dollars could be lost in a radical change of policy. Also, reserve potential in those countries is of the magnitude that much more 'bang for the buck' could be attained than for similar expenditures in the U.S. If the incentive is increased even more by some floor price applied to those big potential reserves, dollars for development could begin to leave the domestic market even faster than they are now.

With all of these unknowns, it is hard to make a fair judgement of this proposal, but it will hopefully be available for public debate soon.



#### Malta Reunion

It has been 20 years since Mary Jane Blackshear, of Winters, lived in Malta where her husband, Charley, was employed by Intairdrill, a U.S. based oil company.

Blackshear was on the last plane out of Tripoli on his way home to Malta for a four-day break from his oilfield work on the Sahara Desert. All was quiet at 2 a.m. and he knew nothing about the takeover in government.

The first thing Moammor Gadhafi did was to cut off communications with the radio station on Malta. Gadhafi took over with a bloodless military coup in September of 1969.

While in Malta the Blackshears adopted a baby girl and named her Deedra. They returned home under difficulties in January of 1972. They are quite content to live back home, but would like to visit Malta again sometime. They have two more children, a daughter, Loy, and a son, Perry.

About a year ago Mary Jane became so hungry to see and talk to her Malta friends, many of whom she had not heard from since leaving Malta, that she began making plans for a reunion all on her own. She prepared flyers and sent them to everyone they knew who had lived in Malta or Libya from 1968 up to the present.

Mary's dream became a reality and the first Malta reunion was held in Vandergriff Park at Arlington on July 6, 1991 at 9 a.m. Each one was responsible for his own food and lodging.

There were 120 people who registered and 71 of them were from Texas. Thirty-one arrived from Oklahoma and 18 registered from California, Missouri, Washington, West Virginia, Louisiana, Wisconsin and Kansas. One

Do some picking, canning and freezing of all sorts of fresh fruits and vegetables. Something really back to nature and terrific and healthy and tasty. Yeah, sure.


I tried to make pickles but nobody could recognize the sight or smell of my finished product so I hid them in the johnsongrass patch.

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




