## AJRA Rodeo expects 300 participants

Approximately 300 youth should pass through Winters next weekend during competition in the AJRA sanctioned Junior Rodeo. The Winters Rodeo Association is sponsoring this event which will run Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, July 25, 26, and 27. All contestants will be under the age of 19 and have been competing for points all year. The Winters Rodeo will be one of the last shows at which AJRA members can gain points at before the finals, held in Snyder.

Sammy Smith Rodeo Company of Mullin, Texas will be the stock producer for this year's show. Sammy has furnished stock for the AJRA finals in the past and promises a fast paced rodeo with lots of action.

A dance is being planned to coincide with the Saturday night performance. The dance will be in the pavilion from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. In accordance with AJRA rules no alcoholic beverages will be allowed in the dance hall.

## Fire Department kept busy

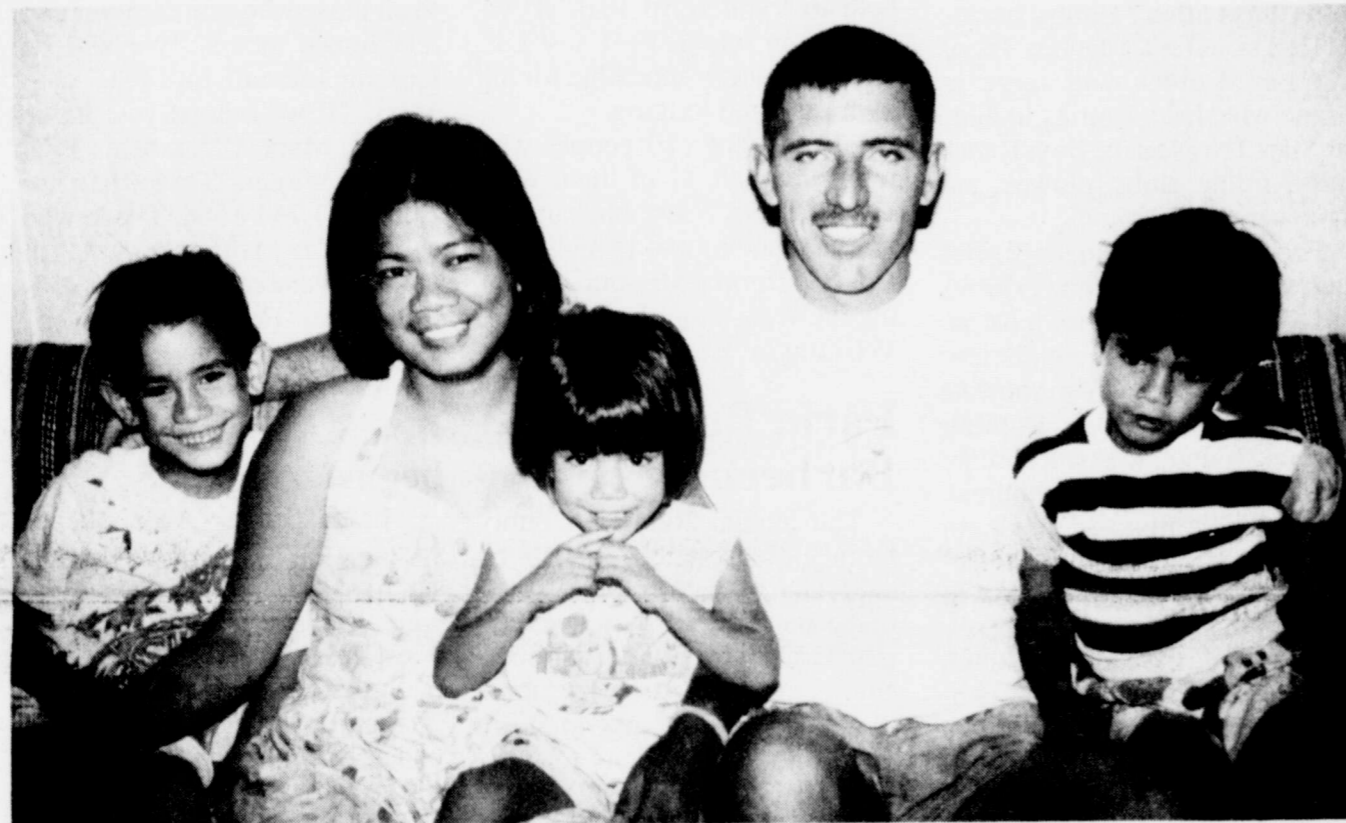
Winters Volunteer firefighters answered a call late Sunday afternoon near Pumphrey to find oil burning at a salt water disposal plant. The alarm was sounded first around 5:45 p.m. and one truck was sent to the blaze. About twenty minutes later a second alarm was sounded and a second truck was dispatched.

Firemen fought the blaze until

around 7:00 p.m., finally bringing it under control. Foam mixed with water had to be used to snuff out the blaze. There were no injuries in the fire and no estimate of the value of property damaged could be obtained. Wingate Volunteer Fire Department assisted in fighting the fire.

On Monday, July 15, firemen answered a call to the Pyburn

Brown residence south of town. Upon arrival, firemen found a hot water heater located under a stairwell ablaze. The fire was brought under control and considerable damage was done in the immediate area around the heater closet. Smoke and water damage in other areas of the house will have to be repaired also.

## Family leaves all in Philippines

The Richard Cavanaugh family left their three-bedroom home in the Philippines with nothing but three suitcases of clothes following the eruption of Mt. Pinatubo. Cavanaugh, a Winters native, said there was no time to move household goods when the orders came to get out. He and his Filipino wife, Marilyn, and three children, Chadrick, age 7; Chuck, age 6; and Charlynn, 4, left first for Subic Bay Naval Base. Finding no room there, they went to Limay Bataan, his wife's family's province and stayed with relatives.

Cavanaugh said when he and his family arrived at Subic Bay, several families were put into three bedroom homes, sometimes as many as five families to a house. He was advised if there was any other place he could take his family, to do so. They drove their car to his wife's family's home, carrying their three suitcases of clothes.

Mrs. Cavanaugh (Marilyn) seemed to be most upset over the loss of all their furniture and other

household goods. Richard says they haven't been told anything by the Air Force about their belongings other than there may be some reimbursement. Cavanaugh photographed all their belongings just prior to leaving as proof they did possess them.

Cavanaugh, who has been in the Air Force since 1982, is a staff sergeant and fuel systems technician. He served a tour in Desert Storm, stationed at Incerlik, Turkey. He and his squadron left the Philippines on February 19 and returned in late March. His duty is to maintain the fuel systems on all types of Air Force planes. In the Philippines he worked with F-4 fighter planes for the most part.

Sgt. Cavanaugh was serving his second tour of duty in the Philippines when it was interrupted by Mt. Pinatubo after eight months. His first tour was in 1983-86 when he met and married Marilyn. In between, he served at Hill Air Force Base in Utah and Tague, Korea.

When the Cavanaugh's left the Philippines on July 1, they just

parked the car and left the keys in it and left. "It was an old one," said Marilyn. Luckily they had a car here in Winters at his mother's house. Marilyn said, "Thank God for that and our clothes we were able to bring!"

Richard graduated from Winters High School in 1978. He is the son of Mrs. Calvin Cavanaugh and the late Mr. Cavanaugh. His brother and sister also attended Winters schools. Ronald, his brother, is now in Amarillo and Ruth, his sister, is in Abilene.

Cavanaugh says even with the loss of his family's belongings, he still plans to make the Air Force a career. "It's a good business to be in," he says.

Meanwhile Cavanaugh has orders to report to Kirtland Air Force Base in New Mexico by August 30. So far, he has spent his time home (the family arrived July 3) painting his mom's house. "It helps keep my mind off all the other stuff. Anyway there's no use in dwelling on it," he says.

**Baptists to fund water treatment plant**

Dr. Dan Murray, pastor of First Baptist Church, Stephenville, announced this week that trustees of the Heart of Texas Baptist Encampment at Lake Brownwood have launched a \$300,000 fund drive to finance construction of a waste-water treatment plant at the encampment.

Murray, who is president of the Board of Trustees, stated that the present system of septic tanks is becoming inadequate for the increasing number of campers using the facilities. Camps, retreats and conferences now use the encampment throughout the year.

"To replace the present system with another septic system required by new stringent Health Department rules would be financially prohibitive and physically impossible. The only viable option left to the trustees is a waste-water treatment plant," Murray said.

Rev. Ferris Akins of Ballinger, chairman of the Capital Funds

Improvement Finance Committee, reported that his committee is already implementing details of the campaign approved by trustees.

Three banquets for Central Texas area pastors were held to acquaint them with the critical need for the waste-water treatment plant, and to seek their cooperation and support of the fund raising efforts.

During the month of September, meetings will be conducted in the ten Baptist associations of the encampment area to acquaint people with the need and to seek cash gifts and commitments.

Plans include solicitation of gifts from churches, Baptist associations and from individuals. 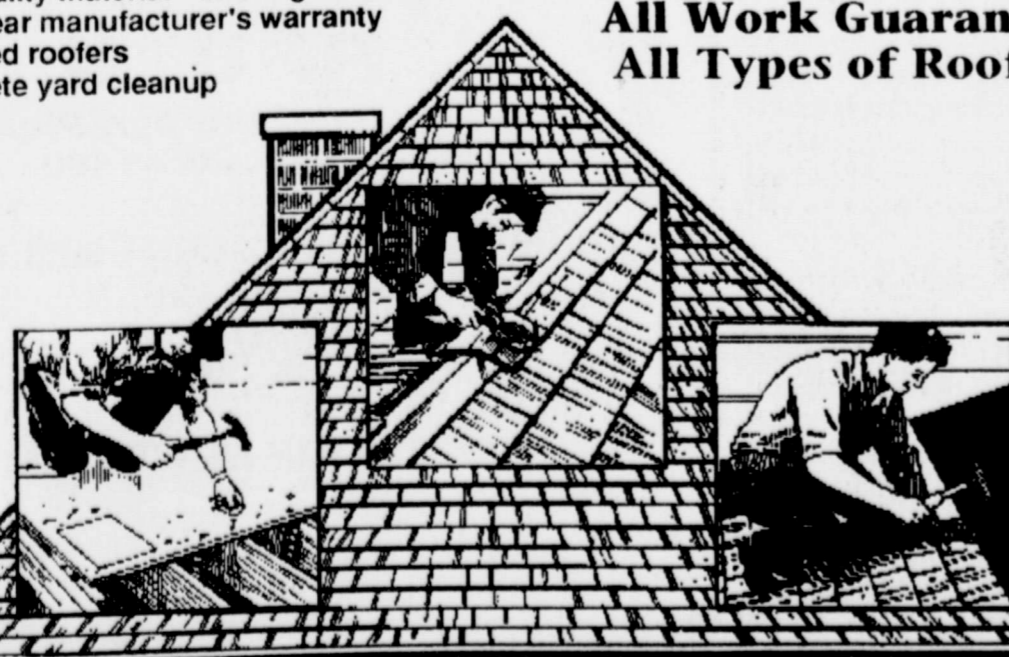


