## School board accepts resignations, hires new teachers

In their regularly scheduled school board meeting Tuesday, August 20, trustees accepted the resignations of Ruby E. Emery, Deborah Haley, and Deborah Pritchard. Also accepted was the resignation of David Evans as a bus driver.

Hired as new teachers were Kathleen Pringle, 4th grade, and Naida Barker, 6th grade. Lydia Ivey was hired as a secretary.

Raymond Lindsey was employed as a bus driver and Rhea Sue Parramore was hired as an aide to the band director.

Substitute pay rate was set at \$45 per day for the first four days and \$50 per day thereafter when employed in the same position.

The board approved a 5% pay raise for all bus drivers and cafeteria and maintenance personnel.

Also set were rates for building rental:

Auditorium \$15.00 plus janitorial wages, double time  
Cafeteria \$15.00 plus janitorial wages, double time  
Gyms \$35.00 plus janitorial wages, double time  
Home Economics Bldg. \$7.50, no janitorial fee required  
Football Field \$250.00 plus 2 janitor's wages, time and a half

Preliminary figures show an enrollment in the Winters schools of 463 elementary students and 410 secondary students.

A motion to grant the Freeport Exemption to qualified applicants was carried unanimously. A motion to prohibit the use of tobacco products in the gymnasium also passed.

The regular meeting was recessed until August 22, at which time the trustees met again. Mr. George Schriber was hired as a teacher for Chapter I. Board members also voted to accept the newly erected large metal building as substantially complete with tentative plans for new sidewalks around the structure.

WISD administrators are T. D. Lancaster, superintendent; Charles T. Kidwell, high school principal; Wm. G. (Bill) Cathey, dean of students, and L. C. Hounsel, elementary principal.

## School budget increases

A school budget of \$4,609,089 was adopted by trustees in their board meeting August 20. The 1991-92 budget is a 10.33% increase over last year.

A public hearing on the budget was held prior to the regular board meeting, with no individuals appearing.

According to school officials, using the same tax rate (\$1.24) as last year, revenue for this year would be \$4,628,133. The 1990-1991 revenue was \$4,632,441 for a budgeted expenditure of \$4,177,548.

The tax rate this year will be divided into two parts. With the new County Education District (CED), part of the school tax rate will be set by the Winters Independent School District and part by the CED. The local school tax rate cannot be set until the CED has set its rate.

The County Education District will set its tax rate September 5, after which time the school district will set its rate.

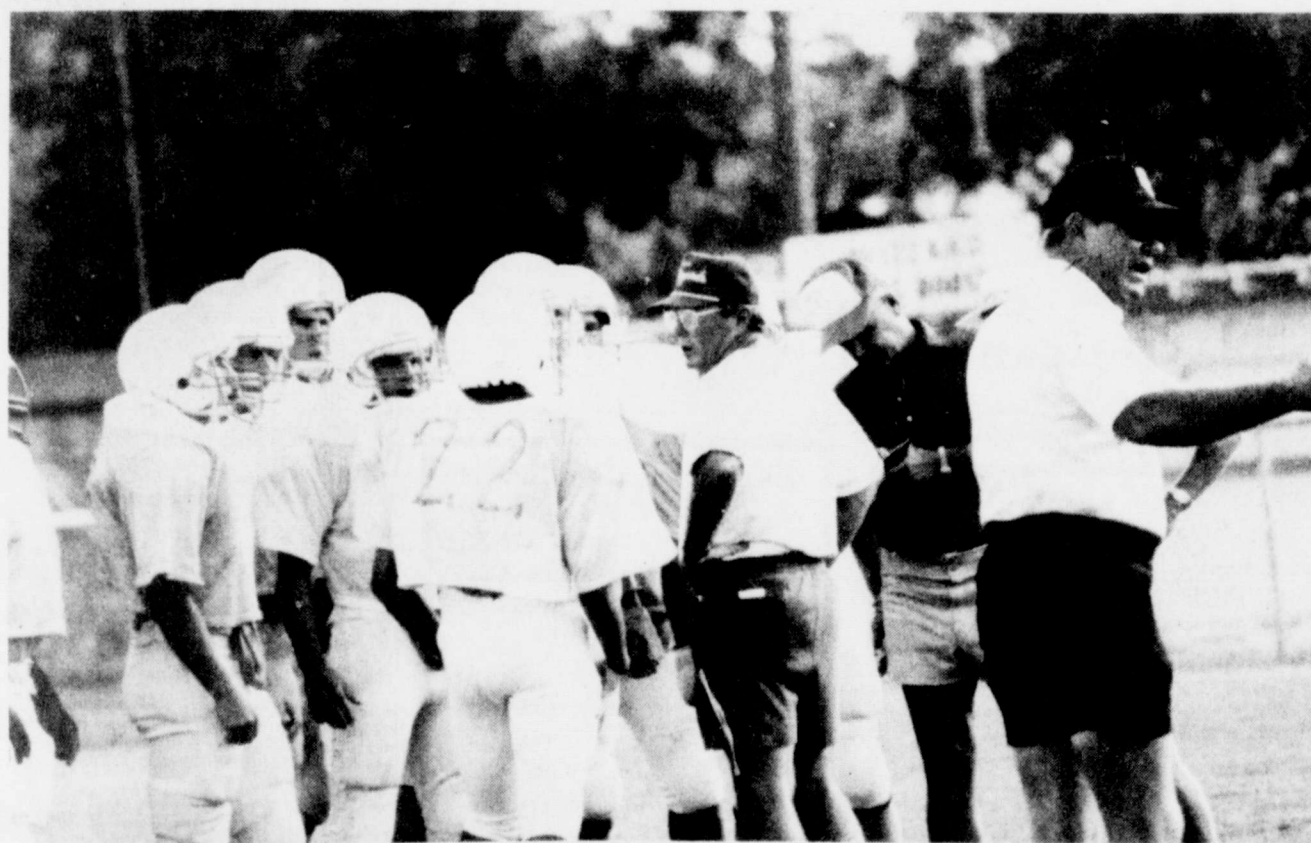
## Winters offers Pledge Station for MDA telethon

## Blizzards defeat C-City, scrimmage at Eden

The Winters Blizzards scored two touchdowns to Colorado City's one in a hard-hitting scrimmage last Friday night.

The Blizzards scored on the ground and in the air while allowing C-City to score on a 45-yard run. Winters' first score came on a 40-yard run up the middle by David Roman. Roman showed both power and speed on the TD run.

The second score was a pass from Ron Jones to Adrian Albarado from the ten yard line.

The Blizzards showed good offensive drives all night but had

some problems with both fumbles and interceptions.

The patented "Randolph defense" showed signs of another good year with some bending without breaking. A 4-down defensive stand against Colorado City inside the 20-yard line showed glimmers of another good defensive year.

"We were not lacking in hitting and aggressiveness tonight," head coach Dan Slaughter said. "Some rough edges need to be smoothed out but overall I was pleased."

The Blizzards scrimmage at

Eden this Friday night starting at 7:00. The Bulldogs will be another good test for the Blizzards as Eden is picked to win their 11-A district. They were 11-4 for the season and 5-0 in district last year.

Returning an All-District quarterback and fullback along with twelve other starters from last year, Eden will present a challenging task for the Blizzards.

This is the final warmup before starting the regular season against the Coleman Bluecats on September 6.

## New law changes motor vehicle registration

In September, the simple matter of registering a motor vehicle in Texas will become a little more complicated.

The change is a result of insurance reform enacted by the 72nd Legislature.

Beginning September 1, the owner of a motor vehicle must submit current proof of financial responsibility with an application for initial registration, renewal of registration, or transfer of registration. Also for the first time, Texas will have to show proof of insurance to receive or renew their driver's license and vehicle inspection stickers.

The most common evidence of financial responsibility is a liability insurance card issued by the

policyholder by the insurance company. Examples of other types of acceptable proof include insurance policies and binders, pool coverage documents, certificates of self-insurance, and certificates of bond.

The new law applies to registration handled in person or by mail. Questions about proper evidence of financial responsibility for vehicle registration may be directed to your automobile insurance company, your county tax assessor-collector, or to the local Division of Motor Vehicles regional office. For information about driver's licenses and vehicle inspection stickers, contact the Department of Public Safety.

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# OIL BUSINESS

That sound you DON'T hear is the impact of the U.S.'s National Energy Strategy (NES).

You say you don't really care? Those clowns in Washington can't help poor little 'ole you way out here, anyway—right? Probably better off without their help, too?

I sympathize with your reasoning, but a National Energy Strategy affects every operator, service company, and plain old 'poor boy' in the country. (I see that doubt in your eyes—bear with me.)

The National Energy Strategy is important, not only for its practical applications, but also for the psychology involved. A strong NES would tell the world that the United States is serious about providing a stable environment for energy sources into the next century.

I had hoped against hope that the time was now for such a policy to make its way to the forefront, considering the recent events in the Middle East. Sure, Congress is totally ineffective and nonresponsive, but this energy thing is big. Surely they will listen and do something about the problem.

I wasn't disappointed—about Congress being worthless, I mean. But, I was disappointed in hoping that the seriousness of the matter would be taken to heart by our duly elected leaders—legislative AND executive branches.

The fact that our country depends on foreign suppliers for 50% of the most utilized energy source in the world doesn't seem to sink in. The fact that the domestic petroleum infrastructure could be in real danger due to the volatility of the oil market apparently isn't alarming enough either.

Even the fact that we are willing to risk American lives for the stability of the Middle East oil producing area is not enough to pull the NES issue up the Congressional agenda.

Cheap gasoline is the problem. In constant dollars, gasoline is the cheapest it has been in decades (net of taxes). People tend to become apathetic about the energy supply when it seems so easy to fill up their car.

All I can say is—WAKE UP! The time has come to take this bull by the horns. Establish a coherent policy that takes into

account domestic production, alternative fuels for the present and the future, environmental issues, long term economic goals, etc.

Just do it NOW. Don't wait until we are being held hostage for oil supply and everybody is yelling about the greedy oil companies. It is everybody's problem—not just the oil companies.

Oh sure, the oil producers want what is good for them—it is only natural. But they are going to have to be willing to do what is best for the country—just as consumers will. I don't have the answer, but I do know inaction is NOT the answer. Make a policy with some guts, and we (producer and consumer) will use it as an anchor for a firm energy foundation of the future.

Is anybody listening or are you Congressmen too busy spending your new raises you voted yourselves?

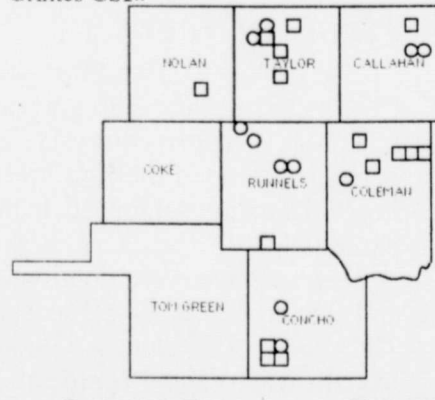

## Land of Promise - Part 7

A continuing series of articles on Johnny Ballew

The following article which appeared in the *Ballinger Daily Ledger*, July 7, 1915, is an illustration of Ballew's attempts to persuade people to come and share his newly found land of promise:

For quite a number of years we have tried to keep our county in the public eye. I have farmed here on the 100th meridian eleven years and the longer I stay the better I like the great undeveloped West. I want to do my full part in developing our section and inducing a desirable citizenship to come up the state and help us.

I have never induced a man to come here from a malarial district that I did not believe deep in my heart that I had befriended him and his posterity.

We have produced the bumper crop of small grain, wheat and oats, and are selling at satisfactory prices. I used to be a cotton crank. I don't mind being called a crank because it takes a crank to run things. Well, I was a cotton crank, and I made money out of cotton. I produced last year one hundred and thirty-four bales of cotton on 195 acres of land without irrigation....

But away with cotton. This year not having time to sow a grain crop, I traded for one from a progressive farmer who sowed early in the fall before the excessive rains began.

There was 34 acres in oats and 46 acres in wheat. The oats made 69 bushels per acre... The wheat made...a fraction less than 30 bushels per acre. After the ex-

pense of 75 cents per acre for cutting and binding and after paying for shocking, twine, hauling, threshing, sacks, and all incidental expense, including one-third out for the use of the land, this 80 acres netted \$766.26...At any rate the net proceeds over and above every expense would foot up at least \$800.00 on the 80 acres with every lick of work hired done.

And now I'm a grain crank, so you see I'm a double crank and things must turn. With a soaking rain the last half of June the outlook for cotton, milo maize and feterita is indeed flattering.

As a matter of fact conditions were never better. With Jersey cows, silos, cream, chickens and eggs and the cash system, an era of great prosperity is dawning.

Runnels has on her glad rags: wheat bread, drumsticks, livers and gizzards. Living with a laugh and a smile, no croakers save the frogs. Everybody a booster but fools and they are silent. Brother, fate put you here--push and shout, ring it out. The only pauper in Runnels County is a deaf, dumb and blind idiot. Farming in Runnels County has truly been revolutionized. Everything on the modern farm is running smoothly and the running is both pleasant and profitable.

Bully fine times--frog-joy, joy rides, jelly cakes, and Johnny cakes go away trouble.

Farming in Runnels County is a "toppy" and "classy" business. Let the editors lead the cheering!

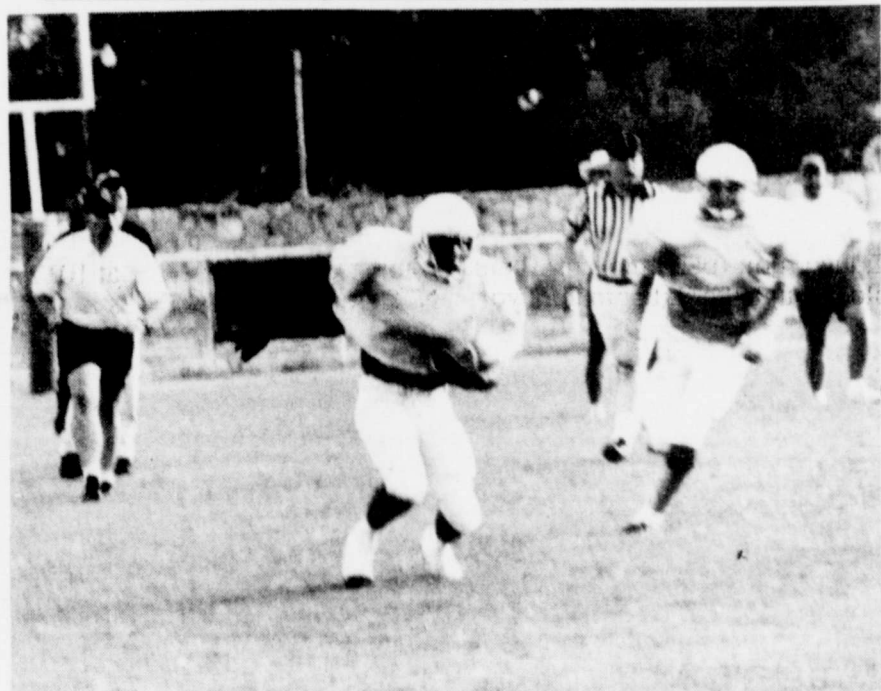

## Transamerican Diagnostic Area Mammography Services receives accreditation by ACR

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit of Odessa, Texas, which services Winters, Texas received the certification of the American College of Radiology Mammography Accreditation Program.

Mammography is an x-ray examination of the breast, which the American Cancer Society and other medical experts see as the best means for the early detection of breast cancer.

The program is voluntary and is designed to insure that women receive optimum quality mammographic examinations. The process is done through a peer review evaluation of the facility's staff qualifications, equipment, quality control and quality assurance programs, image quality, and breast dose. The accreditation must be renewed every three years.

The accreditation program was instituted because of the concerns of radiologists, other national medical organizations, and the public that qualified personnel perform and interpret mammo-

It further recommends mammography on the following schedule: A baseline mammogram (for reference) between age 35 and 39. A mammogram every one or two years between age 40 and 49. According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

**Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.**

- 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.
