Spring Clean-up Week, April 20th-25th

Just a reminder for Winters residents that April 20th through April 25th has been declared *Spring Clean-up Week* for the City of Winters. It's time for everyone to join together with their neighbors and support the City in its Spring Clean-up effort.

Look around the outside of your house and on your property. Are you being a good citizen and a good neighbor? Would you want to be your own neighbor? Are you keeping your property cleaned up? Because if you aren't, then you are downgrading other people's property in your neighborhood.

It doesn't cost anything but a little elbow grease to pick up and clean up your lawn and other property. Get rid of those vehicles that no longer run and have become an eyesore to your neighborhood. Show your neighbors and the City of Winters that you care, join with them in cleaning up your property and getting rid of unwanted articles during the week of April 20th through the 25th.

Your City body (Mayor, Council and Administration) solicit your cooperation in seeing that your property is properly taken care of. All residents should be willing to do their part in making and keeping Winters clean and neat.

There are city ordinances requiring grass to be no higher than 12", no accumulation of rubbish, no abandoned vehicles and no unsanitary or unhealthy debris

accumulation.

It is very expensive for the City to enforce these ordinances and they do not have sufficient personnel to physically perform the actual clean-up. (Such tax monies are better spent on police protection, streets, parks, etc.)

If such neglects are not cleaned up by the property owner, the City can contract to have the work

done and then attach a lien on the property.

Again, this is a very costly and time consuming procedure and tax dollars can be more efficiently spent.

So drag out your work clothes and your tools for *Spring Clean-up Week*. Let's all "Take Pride in Winters" and make this clean-up effort a city-wide success.

City hires new lakekeeper

The City Council approved the hiring of David Carroll as lakekeeper on a one year contract at Monday night's regular council meeting.

Mayor Sandy Griffin welcomed new City Administrator Aref Hassan to the council meeting and introduced him to boy scouts and their fathers who were attending the meeting.

Joe Gerhart had been scheduled to give a presentation on the airport to the council but could not attend because of a conflict of scheduling.

Charles Ludwick made the presentation for Gerhart. He related that Gerhart said that he had so many requests for another "Fly Day," that another one would probably be scheduled in the future. He also reported on some of the work that had been done at the airport.

Jerry Sims approached the Council about work on the City tennis courts. He thanked them for the work that had been done on one court—sandblasting and repainting the stripes. He also asked for permission to patch holes on one court that was still usable, doing the work himself.

Baird reelected sheriff, Jobe new constable

Incumbent Bill Baird was reelected as Runnels County Sheriff with a margin of 303 votes over his opponent, Keith Collom. However, Collom won both Precincts 3 and 4 in Winters and Precinct 5 in Wingate with a large majority of the votes. Total votes for Bill Baird was 1570 and 1267 votes for Keith Collom.

Arch Jobe was elected as the Constable for Precinct 2 with a total vote count of 678 to incumbent Barry Hilliard's 331 votes. Jobe won the majority of the votes in Precincts 3, 4, and 5. Hilliard won Precinct 6 (Norton) with 49 votes to Jobe's 9 votes.

Tickets will be sold at the door for \$5 per person. All high school athletes will be admitted free.

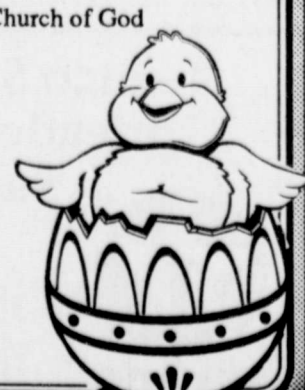
No school on Friday

The Winters Schools will not hold classes on Friday, April 17, for the Good Friday holiday. Classes will dismiss Thursday, April 16, at their regular time.

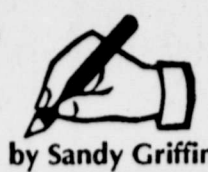

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From Across The Mayor's Desk

As your mayor, I see the many jobs that are done for the taxpayer on a daily basis. City employees do everything they can to make your tax dollars go farther while answering your needs.

Almost daily we get requests to do something about poorly kept areas of town. There's never any money budgeted to mow vacant lots, to remove discarded debris or to tear down unsightly structures, as these duties are the property owner's obligation.

Your tax money is spent for police protection, street lights, street repair, water related services (the lake), the swimming pool and parks, etc.

Once a year the City encourages everyone to be a part of Spring Clean-up week. This Clean-up should be the beginning of a continuing effort by all of our residents to make the place we call home (Winters) something special.

The 1992 Spring Clean-up will start the Monday after Easter (April 20th) and continue through the week.

Arrangements have been made with B.F.I. for extra service that week, at no extra charge. Everything but tires, batteries and roofing materials will be picked up.

Did you know that large items such as appliances, furniture, tree stumps, etc. will be picked up 52 weeks a year on a once a month basis? Why not get rid of this big stuff during Clean-up week and let everyone see and appreciate the difference.

Like a lot of other communities our size, Winters is experiencing economic problems. Last fall, a group was formed to address some of these problems and to work out some solutions. Starting with a lot of determi-

nation and no funds, this group has concluded that improving what we have, making what we've got better would be the first leg of the comeback.

But before anything can be accomplished we (everyone) must make a commitment and stay with our goal. The commitment I ask of you is to make Winters' appearance more pleasing, thus improving what you have.

You know that every traveler driving U.S. 83 goes through Winters. Wouldn't it be to our advantage if these temporary guests left Winters with the impression that this is a town that they wished they lived in. Sad but true, actions speak louder than words. In our case appearance is speaking louder than words.

I recently met with Winters 2nd grade students to explain City Government and my duties as Mayor. At that time I invited the kids to help with the Spring Clean-up by getting the adults involved and by reminding them to be mindful of our environment.

These youngsters responded immediately and had a suggestion of their own. They offered to not drop trash on the ground and to make sure that others didn't drop trash either. Second graders know that pulling together can make a difference.

Can we all pull together for a better appearing City and take pride in that fact? Pride can be rewarding and it doesn't cost any money. PRIDE in our community can be our strongest ASSET.

Following my visit to Winters Elementary, I received a note from each of my new 2nd grade friends. *The Winters Enterprise* has agreed to share some of the notes with you.

Winters Police Beat

Three men were arrested in the 700 block of State Street Thursday night, April 9th, after alert citizens called the Winters Police Department and reported glass breaking at the home of A.J. Bishop Jr.

Upon arrival, the officer saw movement inside the home and saw broken glass in the floor of the home.

Archie Jobe, who had been talking with the officer when the call went out, also went to the residence and is credited with spotting the direction of travel when the alleged burglars fled on foot, abandoning their car which was parked on Sanders Street.

A barking dog, two houses East of Mr. Bishop's house, led the officer to that location, where three males were found hiding in some bushes. As the officer was in the process of arresting the three men, that neighbor telephoned the police to pass along the information and the location of the officer and the alleged burglars.

Archie Jobe then arrived at the location of the officer and suspects and assisted the officer in securing the suspects.

While this was going on, yet another citizen was aiding the police by keeping an eye on the alleged burglars' vehicle. When the back-up officer attempted to respond to the call, that officer found that two tires had been cut on that officer's patrol car, thus disabling the car.

The Winters Police Department would like to thank the alert citizens that called in the burglary, the helpful citizens that

aided the police at the scene, and Archie Jobe for his help in getting the suspects apprehended.

They would also like to remind everyone to keep their eyes and ears open, in their neighborhoods, and to report suspicious activity to the police. With this kind of community involvement your local police are much more effective.

Because one of the three men was armed with a small caliber pistol at the time of the burglary, the three were charged with aggravated burglary of a habitation, which carries a more severe punishment. The three were Raymond Aleman, 19, of Winters; Juan Vara, 18, of Wingate; and Sammy Chapoy, 20, of Winters. Bond was set at \$25,000.

The clearing of this burglary led Winters Police Department officers to request a search warrant for a residence in the 500 block of Quanah, to search for property stolen in a burglary in Ballinger.

In the early morning hours of Sunday, April 12, Justice of Peace Joyce Weems issued a search warrant and that warrant was executed.

During the subsequent search, officers seized what was identified as stolen property from a Ballinger burglary and from another Winters burglary.

Robert Wood, Texas Parks and Wildlife Game Warden, assisted in the search. No charges have been filed at this time on those two burglaries.

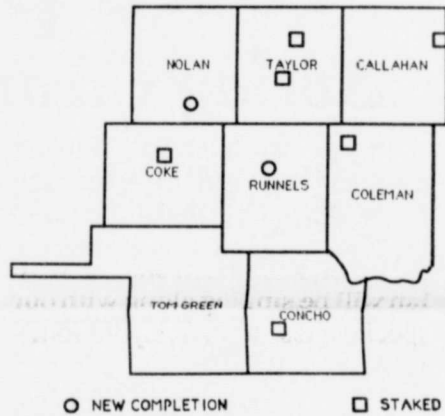

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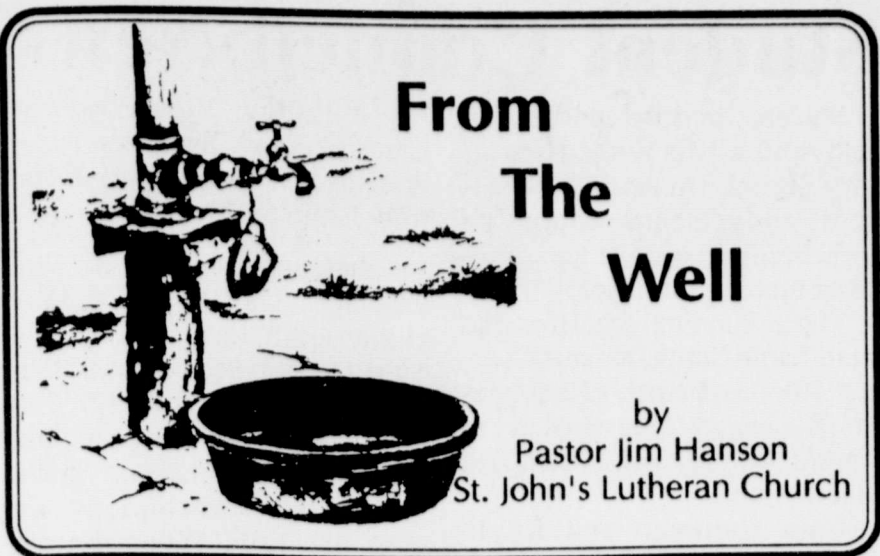
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From The Well

Once a month, on a Sunday afternoon, I would go there. To the Good Samaritan Nursing Home in Odessa Texas. There would be a group there, 20 to 30 "old folks", gathered in the large living room. Seated on couches, easy chairs, and some folding chairs. There was a piano there and someone to play. They were gathered together, and I came, to worship. To sing a few "old" hymns, read some scriptures, pray some prayers, and hear a sermon.

Only, this Sunday was different. This day was Palm Sunday, the Sunday churches celebrate as the day Jesus rode into town on the back of an ass. And the people greeted Him with praises and waved palm branches in His honor. I had wondered whether I should bring the palm branches from church or not. Surely these older folks wouldn't want to be bothered with palm branches. And surely they wouldn't want to wave them in the air as we sang "Amazing Grace."

But I decided to chance it and of course my fears were ill founded. They were delighted with the palms and waved them vigorously as they sang. They were almost as good as the children who had sang in church a few hours earlier.

After the service a little one hundred-year-old lady took my hand and held it for a long time. And then she said, "Thank you for the palms."

Then she went on to tell me about a time 80 years ago, just after she was married. Her mother-in-law was a beautiful woman, and was so pleased with her new daughter-in-law. But she became very ill and died. When she was buried, she was buried in a long white gown and she had a palm branch in her hand.

The little old lady said, "She was ready. To join the great white hosts who are dressed in white and who stand before the Lamb with palm branches in their hands and who praise God."

I remembered the passage, Revelation 7: 9-17, and felt connected, really connected, for the first time. Connected to that first Palm Sunday in Jerusalem. Connected to the little lady in the nursing home. Connected to her mother-in-law. And connected to the great white host. Amazing! Grace! In the strangest place. A nursing home. Palm Sunday. Jesus. And, the palms.

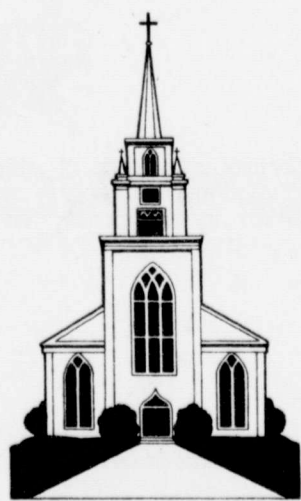

State WMU president to speak at Baptist association meeting

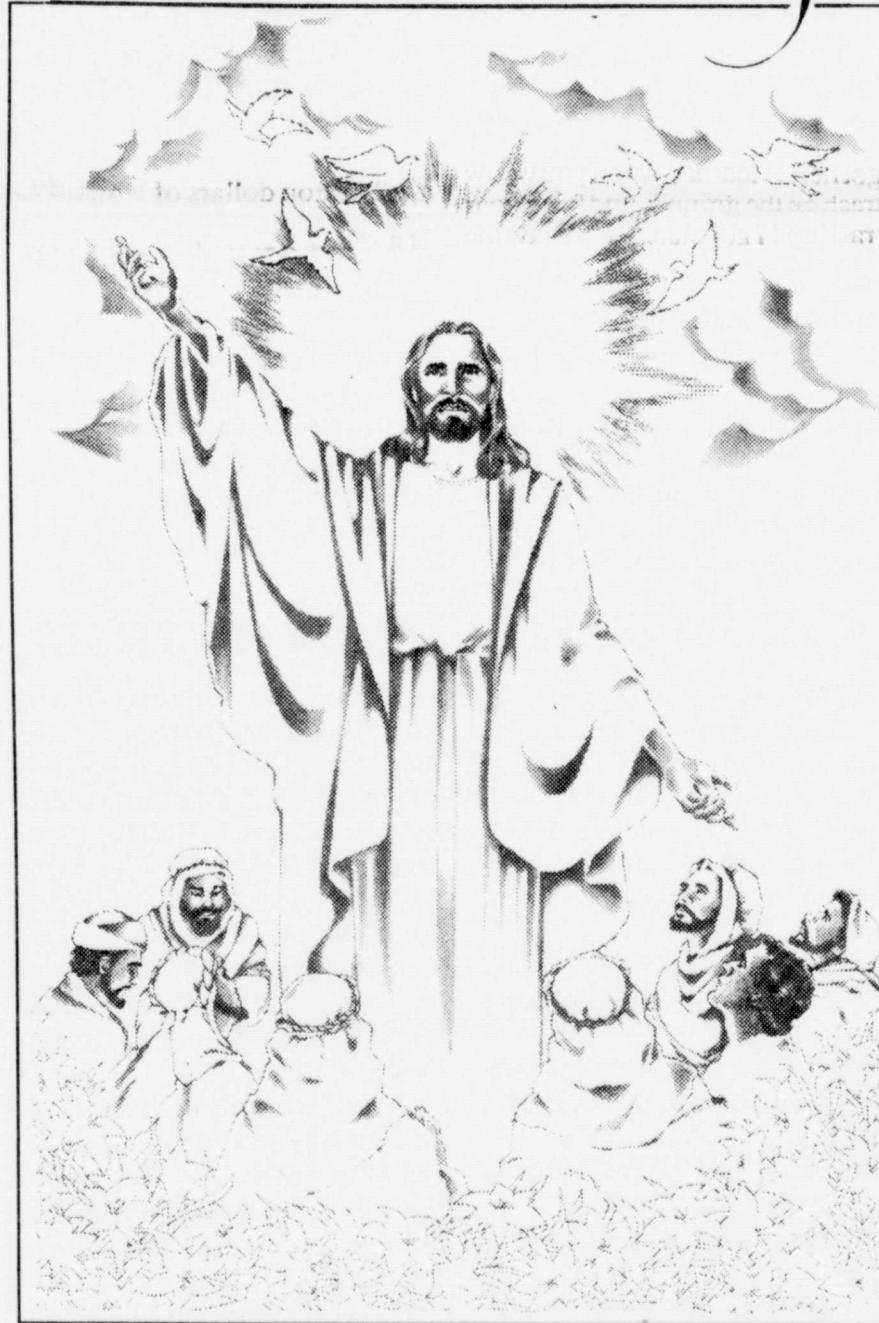
The regular meeting of the Runnels Baptist Association will be held Monday, April 20, at Southside Baptist Church in Winters.

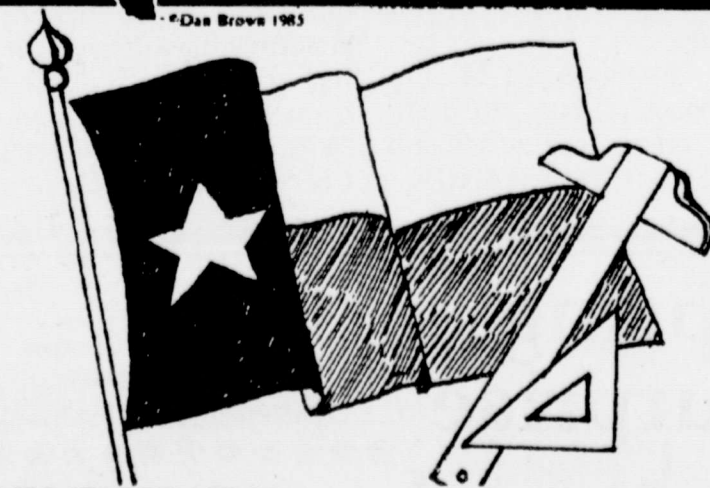

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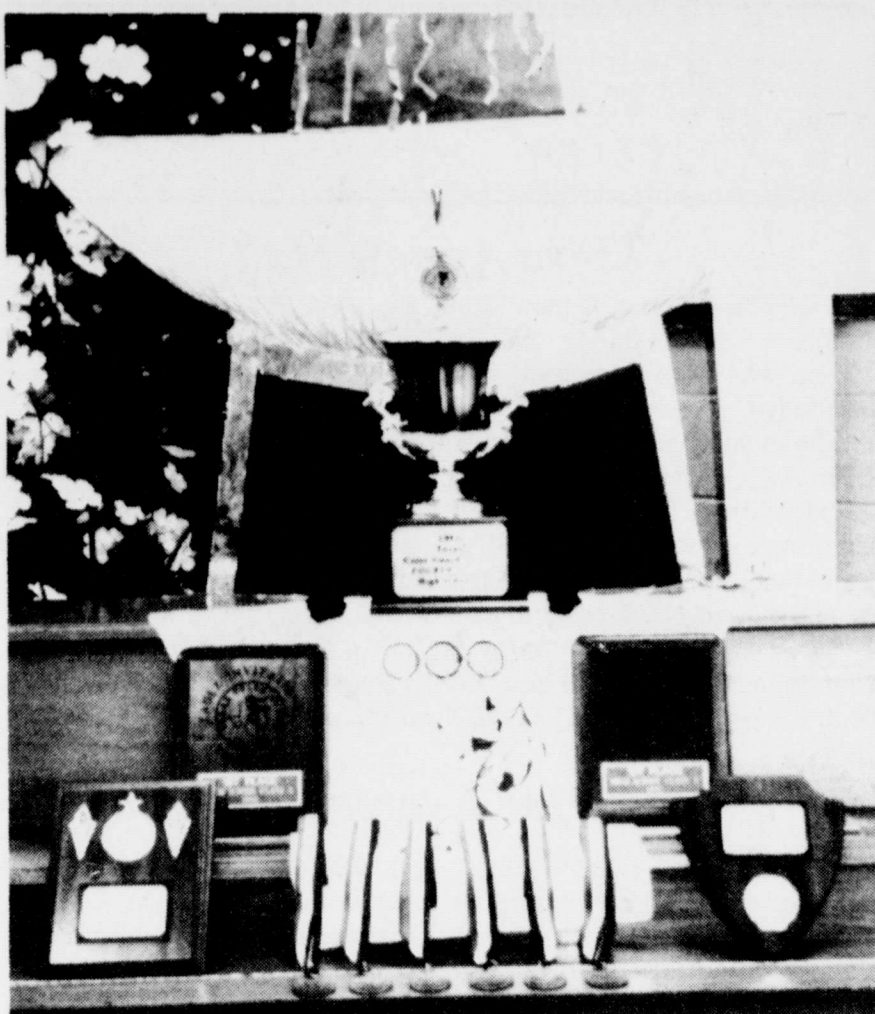

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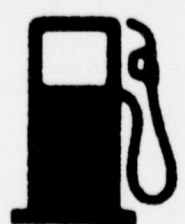

While going to college at Hardin Simmons he worked full time making hamburgers and "Everett's Chili." The most hamburgers he sold in any one day was when Charles Lindburg landed in Abilene.

He taught school in Caldwell and Palo Pinto County before moving to Runnels County in 1931. He was superintendent of the school at Maverick until he was elected Runnels County School Superintendent in 1934, at which time there were over 33 rural schools in the county. During the period that he lived at Maverick, Judge attended law school at the University of Texas in the summer months and was admitted to the Texas State Bar in 1935, following in the legal footsteps of two uncles that were lawyers in Weatherford and Rotan.

He began his career as County Judge of Runnels County in 1940 and then in 1951 he became District Attorney for the 119th Judicial District of Texas for 15 years which included Tom Green, Runnels and Concho Counties.

In his tenure as County Judge, the Runnels County Courthouse was remodeled as it presently stands and one of his notable memories was that construction was going to cease until such time as he made several trips to Austin and worked with Governor "Pappy" Lee O'Daniel, in order to issue warrants for the final construction.

He has been a partner with his son since 1954 and since 1965 was in full time practice as the senior member of the firm along with other partners, J. Don Reese and now Kenneth H. Slimp for the past 13 years.

He has been active in the Ballinger Noon Lions Club for 58 years, was one of the eight District Governors of Lions Clubs International in Texas serving an area from Ballinger to Brownwood.

For over 25 years, he was Sunday School teacher and Sunday School superintendent in the First Baptist Church of Ballinger. With other County Judges in the area, he helped organize the West Texas Boys Ranch in San Angelo.

He and his late wife, Atha, traveled throughout the world. Having been raised on a farm, he owned and operated a stock farm for nearly 50 years.

When asked about retiring on his 80th birthday, he answered a reporter by saying, "not if I can help it. When you retire at my age, you start down hill and I am not ready for a down hill run." He continued to come law office every day until the latter part of March.

He is survived by his son, Everett J. "Ebb" Grindstaff and wife, Jay; two grandchildren, Jeff Grindstaff of Abilene and Michelle Moussa and her husband, Mark Moussa of Dallas; two great-grandchildren, Tanner and Mackenzie; one brother, Alvis Grindstaff of Dallas; and one sister, Arlene Rhodes of Fort Worth. His wife Atha, preceded him in death in 1990.

Kayla Niehues reported that the club had received an award from the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation for their participation in the

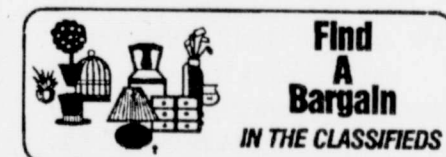
Adopt-A-Highway program.

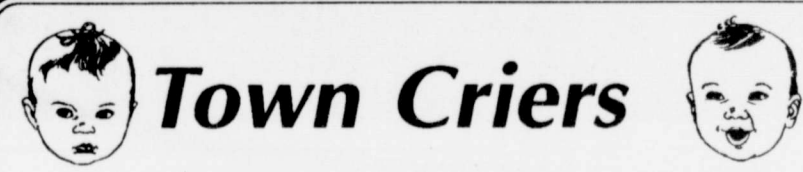

Aggie Muster dates back to the 1883 and has been held annually

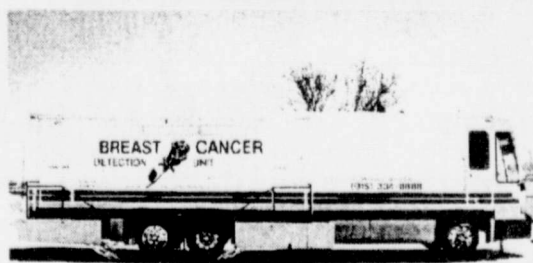
since. More than 400 Musters will be held around the world this year, Lancaster said, "wherever Texas A&M former students live or work."

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

TDA inspectors protecting valuable valley onion crop

To prevent against theft of the Rio Grande Valley onion crop, Texas Department of Agriculture inspectors are checking onion handlers' licenses and records, which verify produce origin, Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said recently.

"The onion crop is very valuable this year—selling for about \$20 for a 50-pound bag," Perry said. "Growers are concerned about theft and some have even posted guards around fields to protect their investment."

Individuals handling onions must have a written statement indicating ownership, the grower, the approximate location where the crop was grown, and by whose authority the onions were gathered.

Under the Agricultural Protective Act, individuals receiving or handling onions must have this information in writing from the seller or from the person from whom the onions are received. In addition to these records, all persons who buy and sell onions must be licensed by TDA.

Onion handlers include roadside and farmers' market vendors. Those without licenses can be fined up to \$500 a day for every day that they operate without a license.
