The onion crop is very valu able this year-selling for abo said. "Growers are concerned about theft and some have eve posted guards around fields to protect their investment.
Individuals handling onions must have a written statemen indicalingownership, he grower he approximate location wher authority the onions were gath ered.
Under the Agricultural Protec tive Act, individuals receiving o handling onions must have this information in writing from the seller or from the person from whom the onions are received. In addition tho bese records, all per must be licensed by sell onions Onst be licensed by TDA side and farmers' market Those without licenses can be fined up to $\$ 500$ a day for every day that they operate without a license.
