Lincycomb resigns from City Council

The City Council regretfully accepted Councilman Jim Lincycomb's resignation in their regular meeting held Monday, May 18. Lincycomb will pursue paramedic training with classes being conducted on Monday nights (regular Council meeting night).

"The decision was hard," said Lincycomb. "I enjoyed working with the present Council. I'll be back on the Council sometime."

The Council has a choice of holding a special election or appointing someone to fill the unexpired term. The term would run to May of 1993. In an informal poll, the Council was in favor of appointing someone to fill Lincycomb's seat.

In other business, the Council approved curbing of ten lots at the Lakeview Cemetery to be handled by Mike Meyer.

Tim Glendening with Professional Services made a presentation concerning making applications for community development grants. The City would sign a 2-year contract and pay \$200 a year for Glendening to complete applications for the City of Winters.

If any grants were received by the City, Glendening would then administer these grants for the City. Action was tabled until City Attorney Ken Slimp could review the contract.

The monthly bills were approved for paying and the meeting was adjourned.

School Board declines bids for Wingate campus, elects to lease property

The Board of Trustees of the Winters Independent School District met in regular session at 7:30 p.m., Tuesday, May 12.

Two guests were present. Jamie Sims appeared to thank the board for repairing the tennis courts and Sealy Bryan voiced his concern about chemicals possibly causing fainting spells of his daughter.

The oath of office was administered by Jimmy Butler to newly elected Place 1 Trustee Joe Pritchard and re-elected Place 2 Trustee Bob Webb.

Officers for the upcoming year were elected. Gary Pinkerton will serve as president, Joe Bryan as vice-president, and Charles Allcom as secretary.

Discussion of classroom needs and use of school facilities after hours was tabled; however, the trustees did approve summer usage with supervision by the building committee.

Bids were reviewed for the sale of teacherages at the Wingate campus. Bids were received as follows: Vivian Serratoz, \$2,200 for Unit #4; Mary Balch, \$1,000 each for Units #1 and #2; John Bradshaw, \$1,901 for Unit #2; and John Killough, \$80,000 for entire facility. All bids were declined.

Trustees then approved leasing the Wingate property to the Pioneer Church of God for a period of ten years with the option

of renewing the lease for another ten year period.

One resignation was regretfully accepted and two employees for the 1992-93 school year were hired. The resignation of teacher Joyce Krause was accepted effective at the end of May, 1992. Bette Raymond and Alicia Wyatt were hired as new teachers.

In other business, the trustees elected to retain contracts for part-time professional employees, to appoint Superintendent Lancaster to serve on the Region XV Advisory Committee, and to adopt the resolution of appreciation to Ronnie Poehls for his service to the Winters Independent School District Board of Trustees.

1992 Project Graduation: a growing list of supporters

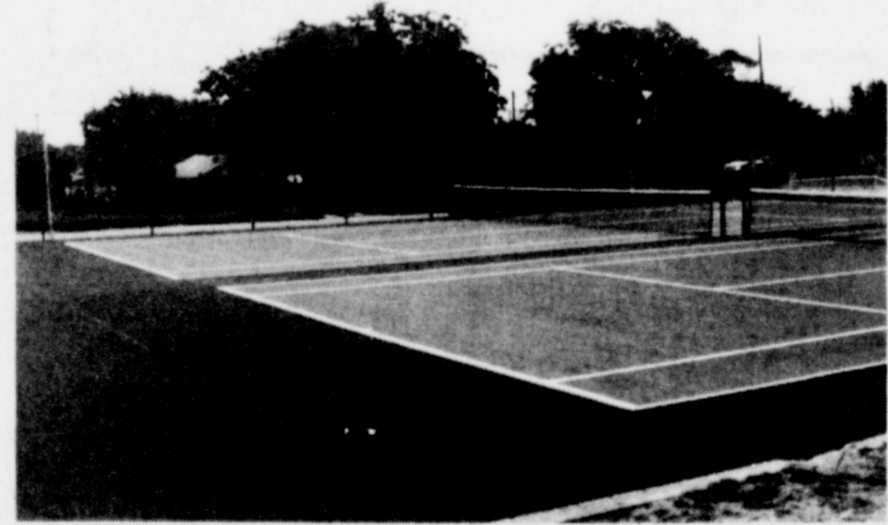

OIL BUSINESS

It seems the center of the horizontal drilling universe has moved.

While the beginning of the horizontal drilling boom was born in the Pearsall Field, the Giddings Field has taken the heart of the horizontal drilling business east.

The Texas Railroad Commission reports that 22 horizontal drilling permits were issued for the Giddings Field in February, while only 4 were issued for Pearsall.

Oh sure, the Pearsall Field remains the field with the most horizontal producing wells in the world, but the activity center has definitely moved from Dillecy, Texas to Dime Box, Texas.

In case you are wondering, the same formation that created all the fuss in Pearsall is in Giddings—the Austin Chalk. But, there are differences.

The Pearsall Austin Chalk had a higher recovery per well than the Giddings area (with vertical wells), and the overall size of the field is larger, also.

The intensity of the all-important fracture systems have been a question in the Giddings Field, while the Pearsall Field was always known to have intense and large clusters of fracture 'swarms'. While there is no question that the Giddings Austin Chalk has fractures in a very tight matrix (same general characteristic of the Pearsall chalk), there are very real doubts about the ability of the possibly less intense fractures in the Giddings chalk to contribute the high rates everyone expects in a horizontal well in Texas on a consistent enough basis.

Never-the-less, there are operators who have had successful wells in the Giddings horizontal play. They and others are willing to pursue the possibility of a hugely successful drilling program, while being fully aware of the risk.

But, that is not so hard to believe. Especially considering the sermons I have preached in this space concerning the virtues of risk and reward.

One thing that is missing from this discussion of horizontal drilling is a clear, accurate picture of true economic results for prudently operated horizontal wells drilled to-date. The reason it is missing is that an industry-wide study has not been done, and any internal company studies are being kept as proprietary, for obvious reasons.

The scuttlebutt is that a minority percentage of horizontal drilling programs have been economic hits. Don't confuse 'programs' with 'individual wells', because there have been many hugely successful individual horizontal wells. The reason programs as a

whole were not as successful economically is due to the 'learning curve' that operators were on during this period.

By learning curve, I mean that the operators had (and still have) a hard time determining optimum drilling locations. Furthermore, very early in the life of horizontal drilling in South Texas, 'closeology' was utilized to determine drilling sites in most cases. Unfortunately, just being close to a successful horizontal well did not mean the offset would be successful also.

As a result, many poor wells were drilled and the overall economics of the drilling programs were dragged down to very low levels. As time passed, proficiency in selecting well sites improved, but there are still many unknowns in prediction of new well performance based on location.

What does this all mean to the Giddings play?

Most probably it means that caution will be more in vogue and fewer speculators will be involved (also, just a few companies have most of the acreage locked up). It also means that it will not be a get-rich-easy deal. It will require hard work and patience.

In all probability, the operators involved will make a nice profit (at least some will) and move on to other prospects. Just as it was not a bottomless gold mine in the Pearsall area, neither shall it be in Giddings.

But, at least for a while, the price of a cup of coffee in Dime Box will hold firm at 50 cents.

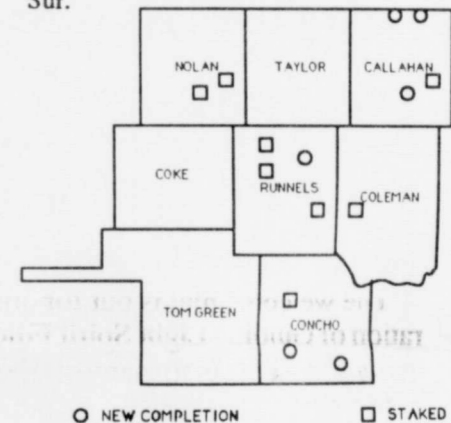

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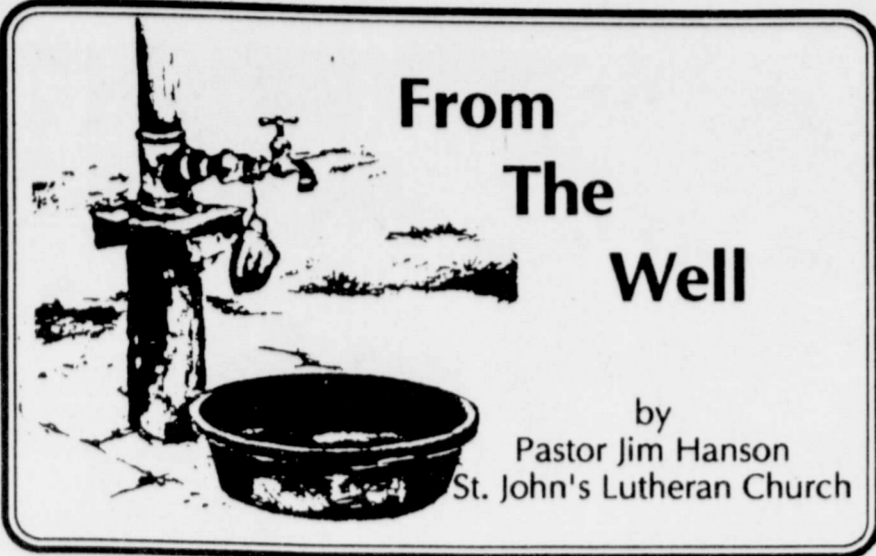

From The Well

They used to call it Rogationtide. It was a special time of the year. In the spring. After Easter. In the villages and small towns all over Europe, people would gather together in the church. "To ask." That's what Rogation means. The word is a Latin word, and it means "asking." They gathered together to ask the Lord's blessing. Only this time the blessing they were asking was a very special blessing. It was for the seed they were going to plant and the soil that would receive it. And for the people who plowed and planted and who would later harvest the crop.

After church, the priest would go out to the farms, the small farms that surrounded the village. He would bless the fields of each farmer. And he would bless the seeds. It became a tradition and a practice in many denominations. When the children of these folks immigrated to the United States, and their pastors and priests with them, they continued the practice. Each year a service of the blessing of the seed and the soil.

They saw and felt and believed in the divine connection, the connection between God, the earth, and the people. They knew that "the earth is the Lord's," that He created it and that "while the earth remains, seed time and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night, shall not cease." "God had fashioned them from the earth to be care takers of the earth, to hold it in its high and proper place."

They knew that there was just one "Holy Lord," but that all land was holy, because all land was created by God, and redeemed by His Son. The soil was sacred stuff. Not God. But special.

Yesterday we had a special service which included the blessing of the seed and the soil and all those who work to produce food and fibre. And after the service, seven of us, together with three pilots, flew over all of Runnels County, asking God's blessing on all that was beneath us, the farms, the villages, the towns, the people, the seed, and the soil. Somehow this flight was different from just flying and seeing the country. All of us felt a special something. A connection. Divine. God, the earth, and His people. 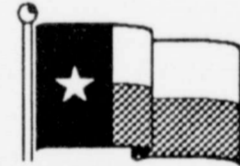

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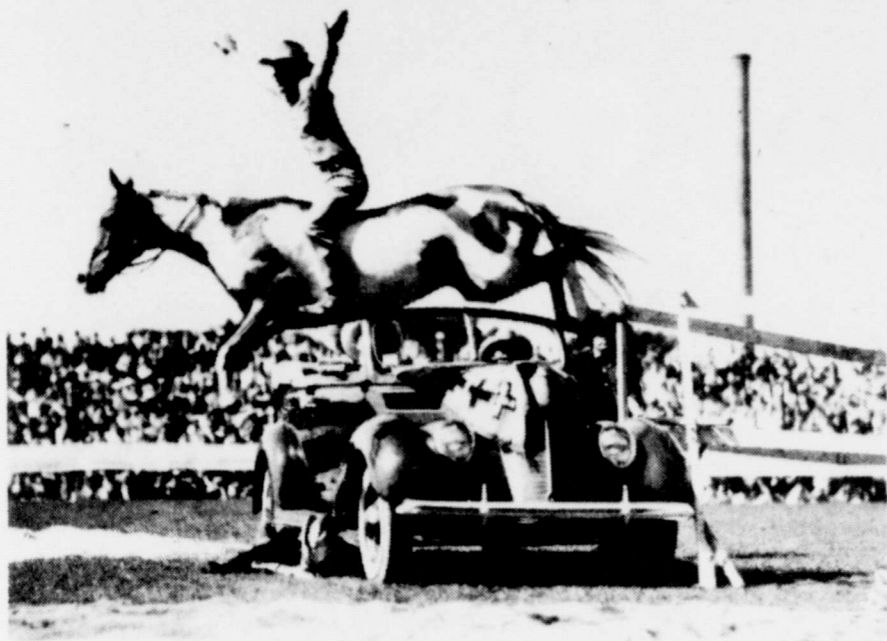

The joys of a pack rat

I'm not ashamed to be a Pack Rat since I read Legacy of a Pack Rat by Ruth Bell Graham. She calls her attic "a veritable treasure trove of disorganized surprises."

For years her husband, Billy Graham, wanted her to take a bulldozer to the attic until he discovered some of his old bible school notes which were valuable to him.

My treasure trove is in my basement that my husband asked me to clear out before his death 20 years ago. I have done some cleaning and rearranging so that more treasures could be added.

One of the greatest joys of being a Pack Rat is the thrill of discovery: finding some article that was lost or some treasure of bygone days that had been forgotten.

Added to the pleasure of discovery is the excitement of finding needed information that you were unaware of owning.

This happened to me while I was writing my latest book. Among my research material there were many rodeo pictures with the name R.R. Doubleday, photographer, stamped on the back. Searching through the pictures brought little information except he worked for Booger Red: World Champion Cowboy and became the sport's first great photographer.

While searching through my treasures, I discovered a 1989 True West Magazine, bought for the story of Grand Canyon. Turning through its pages, I stared at a picture and story about R.R. "Dub" Doubleday written by Willard H. Porter. It was called "Shooting the Rodeo."

Doubleday was quoted as saying, "I always rode the horse with the cowboy. When I felt I was going to buck off, I snapped the shutter."

Though the pictures were sometimes unflattering to riders, his fans loved them because they often showed cowboys flying head-over-heels through the air in a state of helpless disarray.

Foghorn Clancy, rodeo announcer, once said, "Doubleday is the World Champion Rodeo Photographer." For more than 40 years he traveled to rodeos all over the country and snapped thousands of pictures of rodeo action. His work was a big factor in the development of the sport.

R.R. "Dub" Doubleday was born July 4, 1881 in Canton, Ohio, the son of a doctor. When he was 17 years old the family moved west and settled in the Black Hills of South Dakota. Dub went to work for the CY outfit. In 1900, the family moved to Sycamore, Illinois, where the young man began his photography. That win-

ter, his picture of the town's frozen standpipe found ready sales, causing him to turn his hobby into a profession.

Doubleday was a first class salesman and sold hundreds of thousands of rodeo post cards. He once remarked that he had made the first three reels of moving pictures ever made in rodeo. In 1952 he was beginning to go blind and his work was coming to an end.

After his death a collection of 4,000 choice rodeo negatives were donated to the National Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City.

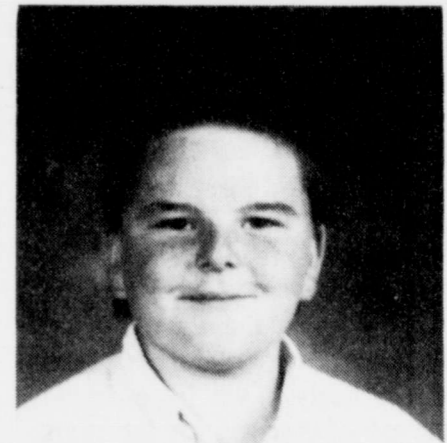

"Dad-blame feral hogs!" Ace Sandusky muttered out loud as the truck bounced hard over a rooted-out rut hidden in the switchgrass.

The wild hogs had indeed been getting worse every year. As skittish as any deer, the beasts were seldom seen and if you did catch a glimpse, it was a fleeting one through the underbrush.

Brutes as far as the environment was concerned, the hogs wallowed out holes, mutilated crops, tore up fences and made a general nuisance out of themselves. But perhaps their most dastardly deed was eating up all the corn fed out through Ace's deer and turkey feeders. So, Ace made up his mind that there was only one thing to do and he set his mind to do it—Ace was going to trap the hogs.

Equipped with a length of 4" X 4 1/4" expanded wire panel, a measure of sucker rod for supports, and a tattered diagram from an old trappers magazine, Ace fired up his cutting torch, clamped in a welding rod, and commenced construction.

Ace had seen enough of wild hogs to appreciate their size and strength. Some of the big boars down along the river bottom would go 250 pounds or more. With this in mind, Ace took double welds along all the corners, sides

To prevent this on his trap, Ace came up with his own ingenious invention, designing a heavy, steel U-beam that rode side-saddle atop the trap door. Even at a distance, a distressed polecat would have smelled like Channel #5 in comparison to the odor of rancid grain and spoiled table scraps. Looking for some measure of relief, Ace had just finished poking the ends of his shirt-tail up his nose when a big boar shuffled up the bank of the creek and on over to the trap.

The old hog ambled in, ate his fill of mash, turned and walked out—simple as that. Ace could not believe his eyeballs. Leaping from his perch, he broke a limb off a nearby mesquite, stuck it in through the cage wire, and poked the trip lever. Nothing happened. He doubled checked the ropes, the pulleys, the cables and poked the lever—nothing.

If there is one thing that Ace is not, it's patient. He found a couple of stout-looking sticks and wedged them on each side under the trap door, breaking each one off about six inches shy. This way, he could tell when he had fixed the lever, as the door would fall, but be restrained by the two staves.

Ace wrapped his shirt around his head and over his nose as an emergency air filter, crawled into the trap and on past the door. When he touched the trip lever, the door came crashing down, splintering the two support sticks like kindling wood. Then all was quiet, except for the metallic clinks of the metal pins dropping into place on the locking mechanism above. Before you could holler Daniel Boone, Ace was trapped in his own trap!

It must have been a horribly long night for Ace. Probably worse than laying in the rotten slop and listening to the wild hogs grunting at him all night was the pure embarrassment of it all.
