Just about everyone dreams of going it
By that I mean that we all have entertained the thought of what it would be like to have our own company and 'be our own boss. and others are just now done it Still others only dream of it Still others only dream of itAnd, to be fair, some are plenty happy being part of a bigger operation and don't ever plan on doing their own thing.
I have several acquaintances and colleagues that have taken advantage of separation packages lump sums to start their own o and gas concerns. The terminaion payoff from their former to get their new business off the ground-they hope.
Some have decided to become tand-alone consultants, while own producing company by sell own producing company by sell ing theiroperationsexpertise. Stil others have taken the bigges plunge and decided to buy heir investors, and develop them for profit. Some of the more ambitious of the lot have combined all three businesses into one opera tion.
The across-the-board results have been both encouraging and sobering.
At least half have succeeded, but that means nearly half hav
failed. The reasons are varied not always logical and fair, but something can be learned by listening to those that have entered this world of entrepreneurship. Almost to a person, they al have said they didn't prepare themselves properly to becom business owners. They spent more to investors, etc. and basically ignored the business planning required to set goals and mile stones for success.
Many of them did not prepare a cash flow plan or profit projection to decide how much income they needed to meet expenses of client base. Instead they seemed to think they could make a whole lot more money on one deal than they could ever spend on office supplies or secretarial help.
T can't blame them too much
thinks the oil business is so rich it can't go broke. But, I think the number of oil ompanies that are nprofitable and the failures of indicates that the oil busind lef profit/LOSS business like any ther kind.
Their advice would be to sit own and figure what has to be accomplished over some perio of time to keep the operation in he black, and then work like heck oet there in time. After tha keep pushing to add customers cash spig production to keep th out of the office.
The discussion so far is much like any small business semina so often attended by other serious it can be owners, but, believe me, oil patch. In the realm of more industry-specific problems, the reports are quite informative, as well.
Wanna-be consultants found out quickly that they must look for a niche that is not already
being filled, because there are already a lot of consultants out there. The right potential clients, the right types of jobs, and the right price are imperative to get ting started from scratch in th petroleum consulting business.
Producing companies that want to operate properties for other have a hard row to hoe, because being drilled. So there aren' many new potential clients and wells being added to the marke for an operator. Knowing the right people can really help to land an operator job, because trust is a key factor.
Those planning to being thei own oil company find no shor age of properties to buy, although
some are real dogs and finding ome are real dogs and fiamond in the charcoal is difficult. Capital for buying thos reserves can be the hardest thing tocome by. Investors are out there but they are already tied into othe investment networks and are hard to attract without some good

Burning of old CRP fields recommended by ASCS
The winter buming season will be here before we know it, and now is the time to begin thinking
about prescribed buming in CRP fields. If you have not though fields. If you have not thought
about burning your 3-5 year old about burning your 3-5 year old tages: a reduction in the population of predators and varmints; a reduction in the chance for uncontrolled wildfire; benefits to quail and deer, and invigoration of grass.
Several years after establishment, most CRP fields develop dense mats of old, dry grass. This
accumulation of dry grass proaccumulation of dry grass pro-
vides an ideal home for critters
ke skunks, coyotes, and wild threat of wild fire This increased threat of wildfire. This same build up of several years' grass growth limits habitat quality for quail who need sparse vegetation to walk
through and deer, who eat small weeds. The prescribed or planned burning of CRP fields during the winter is allowed by ASCS as long as it is a part of the official
