For instance, Canadian ga imports will tend to offset increased domestic gas production. Increased renewable energy uses will not be able to replace petro leum in a timely manner, so oil imports will still tend to increase as domestic oil production de creases (because there are reall
no concrete incentives in the bill to increase domestic production) I could go on and on.
The bottom-line is that Congress is not capable, in its present form, to create a smart, purposeful policy because it is too responsive to special interests and
