## Special election called for Winters liquor option

Voters within the Winters city limits will decide on October 30 whether or not to allow the sale of alcohol for off-premises consumption.

Runnels County Commissioners on Friday called for the special election after approving the results of a local option petition that has been circulating in Winters in recent weeks. The election legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption will be allowed within the city limits.

Hatchel community north to the county line which includes Win-

Eva Reyna, who spearheaded the petition, says her interest in the local option stems from concern for her community.

"It seemed a little bit ridiculous to go seven miles (to Hatchel) town," she said. "We need to keep our tax dollars here."

Reyna said she and her group of 35 volunteers gathered more than 250 signatures, well above the number required to push for the special election.

The longtime Runnels county resident said she feels the option has a "pretty good chance" of being approved by voters.

"Everyone that I've talked to has been in support of it. Of course, I'm sure there's a few that are against it but it comes down to a matter of free choice."

If approved by voters, the local measure would be identical to Justice Precinct 1 which includes Ballinger and all points to both the Concho and Coleman county

Early (absentee) voting for the Local Option Election to be held October 30, 1992, is in progress in the Runnels County Clerk's Office through October 26th. Written requests for ballots must be received by October 23rd at Box 189, Ballinger, Texas.

#### Police in high speed chase



passage of the National Energy Strategy (NES) is over.

The bill is ready for the President's signature after Congress created a compromise version from Senate and House bills. It has been through a lot, though, since its first introduction.

What's left is akin to a skeleton dressed in a Halloween costume: it looks like an energy policy, and it has the outward structure of an energy policy, but, unfortunately, it has no guts.

The final version of the bill bears little resemblance to what President Bush proposed about 18 months ago. Provisions regarding opening the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (ANWR) to exploration, expanding offshore access, and certain tax provisions that would equalize the oil industry with other heavy industries did not make the trip.

What does the final bill contain?

1. Easier and faster licensing of nuclear power plants;

2. New government-mandated efficiency standards for light bulbs, electric motors, shower heads, etc.;

3. New government-mandated standards for federal, state, municipal, and private fleets for conversion to 'alternative fuels' (alternative fuels to be defined by the federal government);

4. Tax breaks for development of renewable energy sources (wind, solar, etc.);

Opening of market for generating electricity beyond huge utilities to the smaller non-traditional producers of electrical power;

6. Unspecified Alternative Minimum Tax (AMT) relief for independent oil producers (to be worked out by separate tax com-

discrimination (prevents U.S. from charging an import fee on Canadian gas);

This list includes the most important provisions, although the 1000+ page document contains other more subtle aspects that are beyond my comprehension at this time.

There is no provision regarding state's rights to prorate gas (or oil) production. This provision was finally booted after filibusters from various Congressmen regarding the unconstitutionality of such a bill. Unfortunately, most folks in Washington D.C. still think that gas prorationing is an all-new, sinister plot by southern states to drive up gas prices. (It's certainly not new, and it can't do that much to drive up prices-see earlier columns.) What does it all mean to the oil and gas business?

The full impact will not be known until the final bill is published and more fully analyzed, but there are a few conclusions that can be drawn at this point.

Independents stand to gain IF the tax committee doesn't mess up the final wording of the bill regarding AMT relief. Anyone holding gas reserves MAY benefit, because 'alternative energy'

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The long tortuous path for sections of the bill regard natural gas as 'alternative,' thus increasing the market for gas. (We'll have to wait and see how much market increase results.)

Otherwise, oil companies see very little in this bill. Major oil companies will hardly feel a ripple from the bill's passage and implementation.

The bill is a hodge-podge of special interest provisions. The strongest lobbies had the biggest impact. Thus, an energy bill that is trumpeted as having the unified purpose of decreasing oil imports and increasing self-sufficiency is really contradicting and sometimes self-defeating.

For instance, Canadian gas imports will tend to offset increased domestic gas production. Increased renewable energy uses will not be able to replace petroleum in a timely manner, so oil imports will still tend to increase Amarillo. as domestic oil production decreases (because there are really no concrete incentives in the bill to increase domestic production). I could go on and on.

The bottom-line is that Congress is not capable, in its present form, to create a smart, purposeful policy because it is too responsive to special interests and regional bias.

Vote the son-of-a-gun's out is the only solution.





Funerals are an "up and down" time. Your feelings are like a roller coaster. You are glad to see your family and you are sad that Mother died. Bittersweet. I hope we all feel free to express our feelings, to hug, to cry, to smile, and to laugh. It's all part of the party.

So, she asked me, "Jim, with all my friends dying, do you think God is trying to tell me something?" I said, "Mother, do you think God is trying to tell you something?" She replied, "Yes." So I asked her what she thought God was telling her. She said, "He's telling me to get ready!" I asked, "Are you?" And she said, "Of course I'm ready."

She was ready. She lived by faith in her Lord. And she died in that faith. She didn't have to trouble herself as to what to pack. When one goes on that trip, the biggest and best one, to our eternal destination, we leave it all behind. You don't take anything. You are just took. By the hand. All the way home. By him. Victory in Jesus. Hallelujah! Praise God for heaven. She's home, free.



A travelogue of Thailand was presented to the First Baptist Women at a meeting held in the fellowship hall Tuesday. Beth Bradley conducted the program as an interview with the wives of two missionaries.

For 40 years Ronald and Evelyn Hill have anchored their lives in the rich soil of Thailand. From Bankok they have served over all Thailand and are now in Lampang. The rainy season is ending in October and the air is cooler.

The Spears have spent almost 38 years in Thailand. Recently they began a new work down south on the trunk of the elephant. couple.

Even though the Hills and Spears were pioneer missionaries in Thailand, they did not arrive in in the unique places in Thailand, time to see King Mongkut, who was made popular by "The King and I." He reigned 100 years before their appointments.

Both couples have gazed at the Grand Palace, which was built in 1782 as the centerpiece of the capital city of Bangkok, known as the "city of angels."

In addition to rice dishes, Evelyn Hill said, "The people eat noodles, vegetables, and lots of sea food. Where they are povertystricken they eat dogs, snakes, and locusts—anything available."

Jeannie Spear added, "Don't forget the abundant fresh fruit, such as pineapple, pomelo (resembles grapefruit), bananas, oranges, grapes, and papaya-to name a few!

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
