Not too long ago, I wandered into a bookstore. I was looking for a recent biography of Teddy Roosevelt. I didn't find it. But I did find one on Harry Truman. As I opened it, my eyes fell on the page where these words were written, "Boys, pray for me. Pray for me like you have neck, the sun, before. I feel like a whole load of hay has fallen on $m$ y neck, the sun, the moon, and all the stars." As I read these word
As I continued reading, I discovered that Harry Truman was talking to a group of reporters who had come to meet with the vice-president. And the reason they came was that they, together with the vice
