## Water Shed Project dedicates first dam

After 25 years of waiting, the first dam has been completed as part of the Elm Creek Water Shed Project. Dedication of the 26-foot-high, 2,600-foot-long earthen dam will take place on Tuesday, November 17, at the dam site located on the Dr. James Nevins property four and one-half miles southeast of Bradshaw in upper northern Runnels County.

A free barbeque lunch will be served at noon, hosted by the Runnels Soil Conservation Service and the Elm Creek Water Control District. All taxpayers in the Elm Creek Watershed District are encouraged to attend this special occasion.

The dam is one of seven such structures scheduled to be built along Elm and Bluff Creeks in Runnels and Taylor counties as part of the long-awaited Elm Creek Watershed Project.

The project was authorized by the Texas State Legislature on June 7, 1967, but has been awaiting government funding for the past 25 years, according to Runnels SCS Manager Ronnie Vanicek.

Cost of the project is being shared by the SCS and the Elm Creek Water Control District. The SCS is bearing engineering and construction costs, while the Water Control District is responsible for obtaining land rights and easements on properties affected by the project.

Other sponsoring agencies for the project include Runnels County Commissioners, Taylor County Commissioners, Middle Clearfork Soil and Water Conservation District, Runnels SWCD, the City of Winters, the City of Ballinger, and the Runnels County Water Authority.

## Blizzards end season

Winters lost 30-27 to Jim Ned last Friday night to end any play-off hopes. Going into the game the Blizzards were in a four way tie for first place in District 7-2A.

Coupled with a loss by Stamford, Hamlin is the District champion and Rotan is the runner-up.

In action last Friday night at Blizzard stadium Jim Ned jumped out to a 14-0 lead and seemed to have the momentum going for them in the first quarter.

The Blizzards came back to score a touchdown in the second quarter with a good drive of 60 yards. David Roman scored on a 2 yard run but the extra point kick missed.

The Indians scored again in the second quarter to make the score 21-6. But before the half was over Roman scampered 50 yards around the right end to score. Roman then passed to Adrian Albarado for the two point conversion to make the halftime score 21-14.

Again in the second half, the Indians came out and promptly scored a touchdown and a field goal to make the score 30-14. At this point the game looked well in hand for the Indians.

Then the Blizzards decided to make the game exciting. Wes Hart intercepted an attempted screen pass and ran 27 yards for the touchdown. The kick by Jamey West was good and the score was 30-21.

With 2:10 left to play in the game, Winters scored on a 49 yard pass from John Belew to Adrian Albarado. Things were really exciting at this point.

In fact, it was so exciting that the clock keeper put only 26 points on the scoreboard. The coaches on the field thought they had to go for two to even have a chance to beat Jim Ned. The try for two failed, leaving the score 30-27.

The onside kick was next. The Winters fans went wild as Winters recovered the kickoff. But as

it had seemed most of the evening, the referees tried to determine the outcome of the game.

From about 25 yards away, the referee determined that the Blizzards had touched the ball, just two inches from the required ten yards. Jim Ned took possession and ran out the clock with the final score 30-27.

The Blizzards finished the year 4-6 and 4-3 in District 7-2A.

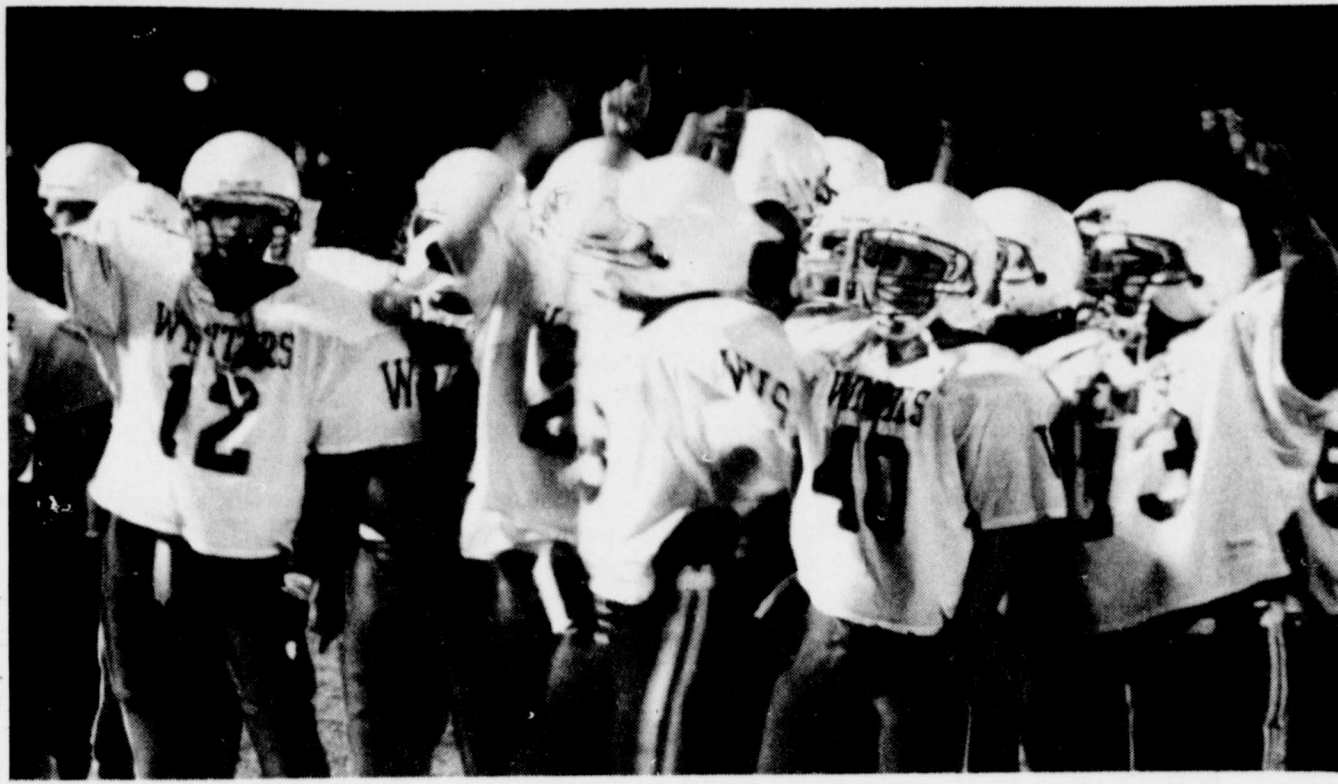

## JV is "winningest" in recent history

### Blizzard JV 19—Jim Ned JV 14

As was expected, the game with Jim Ned was one of the toughest of the season, because of the intense rivalry that exists between the two schools. No matter what the teams' records are, both always play to the best of their abilities.

The junior varsity Blizzards had two quick touchdowns in the first quarter, one by John Biddix and the other by Robert Silva. Jim Ned had no earned first downs in the first quarter of play.

In the second quarter, no points were added to the score, with two Blizzard touchdowns being called back.

Jason Carrillo scored on a 7 yard run in the third quarter, with Cody Whittenburg contributing the extra point.

The Jim Ned team never threatened, mainly due to 5 turnovers turned in by the Blue Defense. Fumbles were recovered by Jason Carrillo, Lance Donica and Kevin Conner. There were interceptions by Mike Hernandez and Robert Silva, the latter putting an end to Jim Ned's hopes of winning the game. Both of the Indians' scores came in the last few minutes of the fourth quarter.

This win marked the first time in many years that the Blizzard

J.V. has come out of the season with a district championship. This was a major goal for the team for several reasons, specifically: last season was not a good one; for the most part during this season the Blizzards were not necessarily the biggest or best, but they did play harder; practice and conditioning sessions were long and difficult; and the team wanted to develop team pride and to play with intensity.

Captains for this game were the ninth grade players. For last week's Rotan game, the upperclassmen on the squad were captains.

## Cross-Country team goes to region I-2A meet in Lubbock

The Winters Blizzard Cross-Country team ventured north to run at the Region I-2A Cross-Country Meet.

Facing a very cold, blustery wind, the Blizzards placed 10th out of 14 teams. "These young men are to be commended for their efforts. It takes a lot of intestinal fortitude to go out and run, not just the three mile course itself, but the training runs beforehand, to get ready to run," Coach Ed Henley commented.

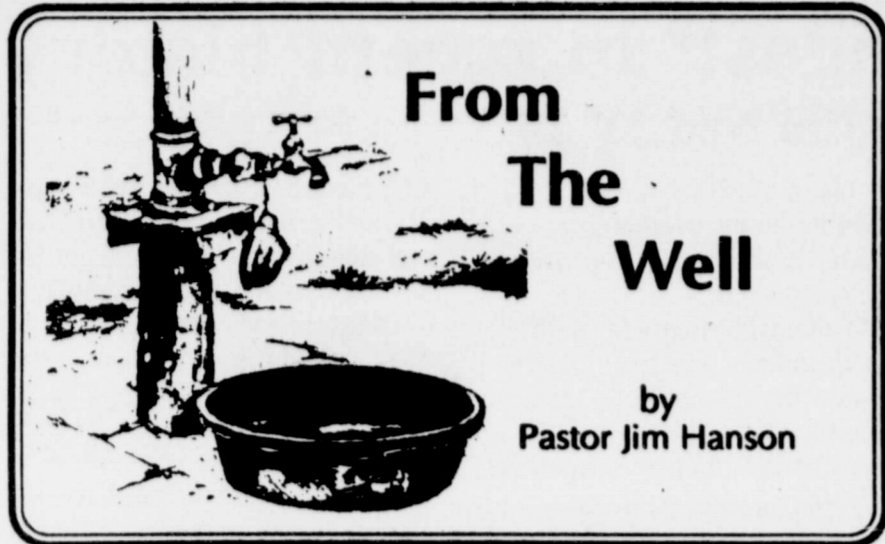

Yesterday was a, pardon the pun, "red letter day" for us. We got two letters in the mail. And both got read. Two read letters in one day makes it a red letter day!

The first was from a dear friend who is president of Concordia College in Moorhead, Minnesota. When we went to the funeral home in Moorhead to see mother in her casket, one of the first bouquets to arrive was from Paul Dovre and the Concordia College family. Paul couldn't make the funeral because for the first time in 18 years he was on a "two month study leave" as a "visiting scholar" at Harvard University. All five of our children attended and graduated from Concordia while he was president. He wrote a note about mother. "I really got to know Marie through church and through the grandchildren. She was as you said the "mother superior" of northern Minnesota. To your kids she was the "third" parent. She always had a sparkle, a positive word, and a down to earth perspective. Her loyalty to me personally and to the college was a mile wide and a mile deep! Blessed be her memory in all of our lives." Wow! What a wonderful word to read! We cherish this letter.

The second letter was from our "kyds" as Paul spells it. After many years trying, it seems we have a "Round Robin" going. A "Round Robin" is a letter that goes round the family from house to house. The way it works is that each household writes a letter, which is addressed to all the other households, and sends it on to the next one. By the time the letter gets to us, it is a "fat letter" at least two stamps worth, full of letters. When it comes to us, we take our last letter out, put in a new one, and send it on. It usually takes 2 or 3 months for the "Robin" to make the "round." But it is so welcome, so wonderful to receive! And yesterday it was especially so.

Some excerpts from the letter from our oldest, Nathan, who is pastor in American Falls, Idaho. "Of all the reunions, Grandma Great's (great-grandma) passing bravely into the Beyond we cherish so, holds the stage for me. I will always remember the picture of her in her red coat and feathered hat, I needed to hear her remembered as a "cardinal." It was almost the best of reunions, for I picture heaven that way." And then he goes on to write his "gratefults" - "I am grateful for my wife, for her support and call. I am grateful for my parents and their instruction of the faith. I am grateful for my sister for her perseverance in the face of my persecutions, to my brothers, fellow partners in such persecutions...and in the gracious forgiveness of such FOIBLES...I am grateful for our gift of music." A geyser full of "gratefults", gushing out all over the letter, a grand chorus of great gratitude, so good to read. To revel in. To rejoice. And be glad.

It was a "read letter" day. It made us feel so good. I think I'll write some letters today. And pass on the gratitude. For they are what's great!
