Water Shed Project dedicates first dam

After 25 years of waiting, the first dam has been completed as part of the Elm Creek Water Shed Project. Dedication of the 26foot-high, 2,600-foot-long earthen dam will take place on Tuesday, November 17, at the dam site located on the Dr. James Nevins property four and onehalf miles southeast of Bradshaw in upper northern Runnels County.

A free barbeque lunch will be served at noon, hosted by the Runnels Soil Conservation Service and the Elm Creek Water Control District. All taxpayers in the Elm Creek Watershed District are encouraged to attend this

The dam is one of seven such structures scheduled to be built along Elm and Bluff Creeks in Runnels and Taylor counties as part of the long awaited Elm Creek Watershed Project.

Infrastructure work will take the stage as funds will pumped into cement companies, construction companies, etc.

Despite this somewhat restrichope of the American dream Bill has mentioned, in quite overcoming any difficulties. Through it all, I believe that any honest hard-working businesss person with a viable product or service can still prosper. Because, government has always tended to get in the way, but the capitalist can always find a new path to

The story is the same for the oil patch. The added bonus is that the new president does kind of like one of our products--natural gas. We may all benefit from that in, as of yet, unknown ways.






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Yesterday was a, pardon the pun, "red letter day" for us. We got two letters in the mail. And both got read. Two read letters in one day makes it a red letter day!

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

Cash prizes to be given for homemade decorated tree




