School Board accepts bids for new classrooms

The Winters Independent School District Board of Trustees has accepted a bid for portable classrooms and has sold part of the Wingate campus.

In a regular meeting held on Thursday, December 3, the only bid submitted for two portable classrooms was accepted by the Trustees. One portable building will have two classrooms and will cost \$32,000. The other classroom will be for Life Skills and will cost \$51,000.

More classroom space will be needed for the next four to six years because of an anticipated increase in grade sizes. Life Skills requirements mandated by the state and the number of Life Skills

students were given as reasons for the purchase of the Life Skills portable classroom.

The portable classrooms will be built on site and will be placed behind the high school building and east of the agriculture building.

A bid of \$600 was accepted for one of the teacherages which is to be moved from the Wingate campus. A separate bid of \$500 for a bus barn also to be moved was accepted.

The Life Skills house that presently serves the school district is also to be moved, and the only bid of \$510 was accepted.

In other business, the architect brought preliminary plans for

building on to the cinder block field house. A varsity athletic dressing room is to be added to the present block building. The barracks type building presently serving as the varsity dressing room would be removed.

After viewing the plans, the Board suggested some changes and asked the architect to return with new plans.

The 1992 football gate receipts totalled \$17,286.

The audit report of the 1991-92 fiscal year by the CPA firm of Eckerd, Ingram, Tinkler, Oliphant and Featherston was presented and accepted by the Board.

Bills were approved and the meeting adjourned.

OIL BUSINESS

Something that didn't materialize last year is lifting the local market for drilling and service contractors—the annual year-end push to drill before December 31st.

This time around, the prices are right, the opportunities are there, and independents have shaken the rigor mortis that paralyzed them last year.

Rig rates are stable, and there is a good match between contractors and wells to be drilled (although things are getting tight in December). It is as if everyone has been through the bottom of the contractor's market, and the companies left are confident that they can live out anything to come.

This confidence, as it manifests itself in stable rig rates, equipment in good repair, and general low blood pressure among tool pushers, causes the operating companies to have confidence in finding an affordable contractor. This, in turn, results in operators only worrying about prospects, and not so much about just getting someone to get the hole made on time.

Those prospects are now being generated by independents realizing that \$18/bbl is a floor with a few boards missing and not a short step on the way down to the basement at \$10/bbl.

There are certainly plenty of geologists and engineers available out there to look at all those prospects, so some interest is finally being shown in some deals that will work at \$18/bbl, no matter what else happens. It was getting to where operators couldn't bring themselves to develop a prospect at today's prices just because they were sick about prices not being higher.

The other end of the spectrum was worried sick about \$10/bbl prices around the corner, so they would not look at those prospects, either.

So, the aforementioned rigor mortis was setting in.

But, now, there seems to be a coming thaw. No boom, mind

you, but operators are seeing that money, albeit in small denominations, can be made at today's prices. A certain type of optimism, characterized by a 'step-at-a-time' type attitude is starting to awaken in the oil patch. This is good for everyone involved, because it opens doors to profitable business and closes doors on the one-track mind that says no money is to be made in the U.S.

Finally, the evidence is starting to show. The rig count is up considerably over last year (100+ rigs in Texas), and well permits are up to where they should be in a restrained, but hopeful situation in the domestic oil patch.

No shortages of tubulars, yet, just a good steady demand (December may be tight in this part of the business, too). It is a steady growth that benefits all by not inflating expectations but providing much-needed cash flow for contractors. The same story in other equipment and services—no boom, just a few extra bucks for Christmas, this year. Now, if coffee goes up at the local coffee shop, then you will really know business in the oil patch is picking up.

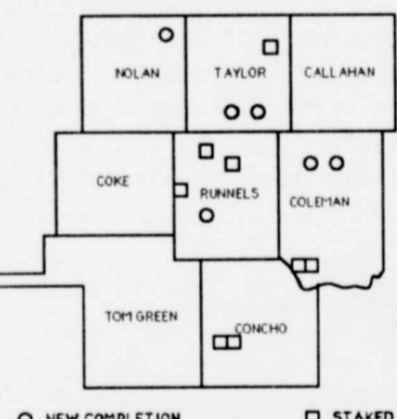

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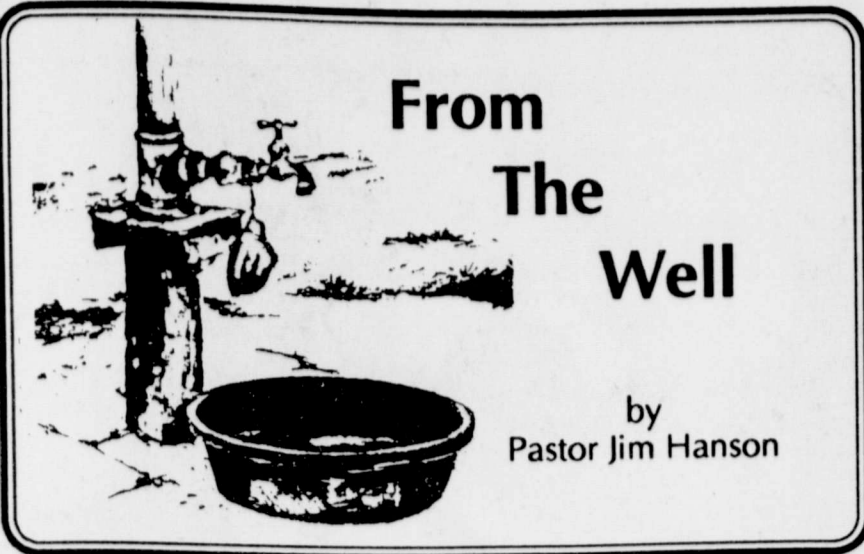

We just had a marvelous week with her, her parents, and her big brother, Peter, who is almost four. He's into cowboy boots, bow and arrows, and little sisters. The very first day of her life her on earth, he held her for 15 minutes.

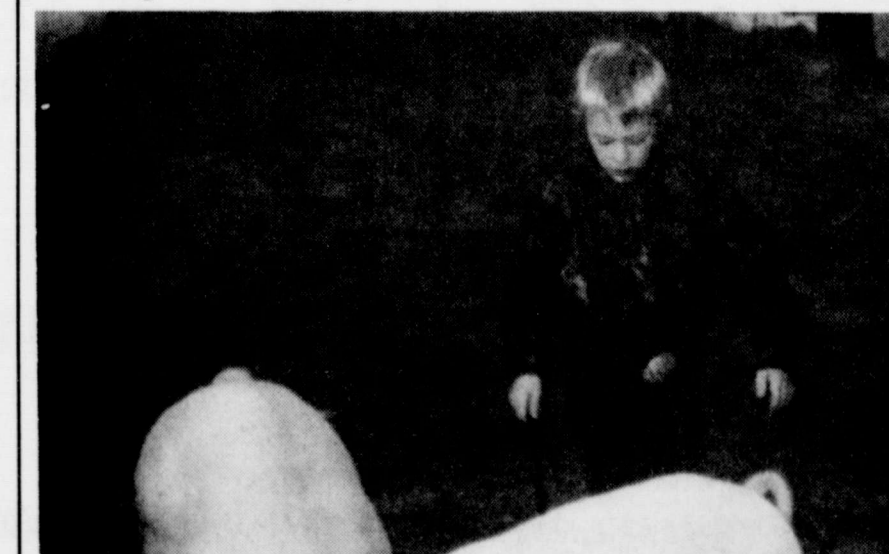

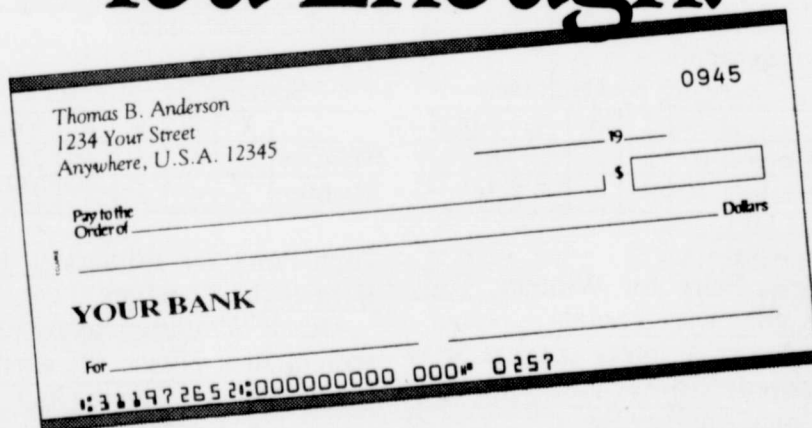

Financial aid will be discussed in general terms that apply to any institutions offering these programs. She will take time to "walk through" the necessary application process also.

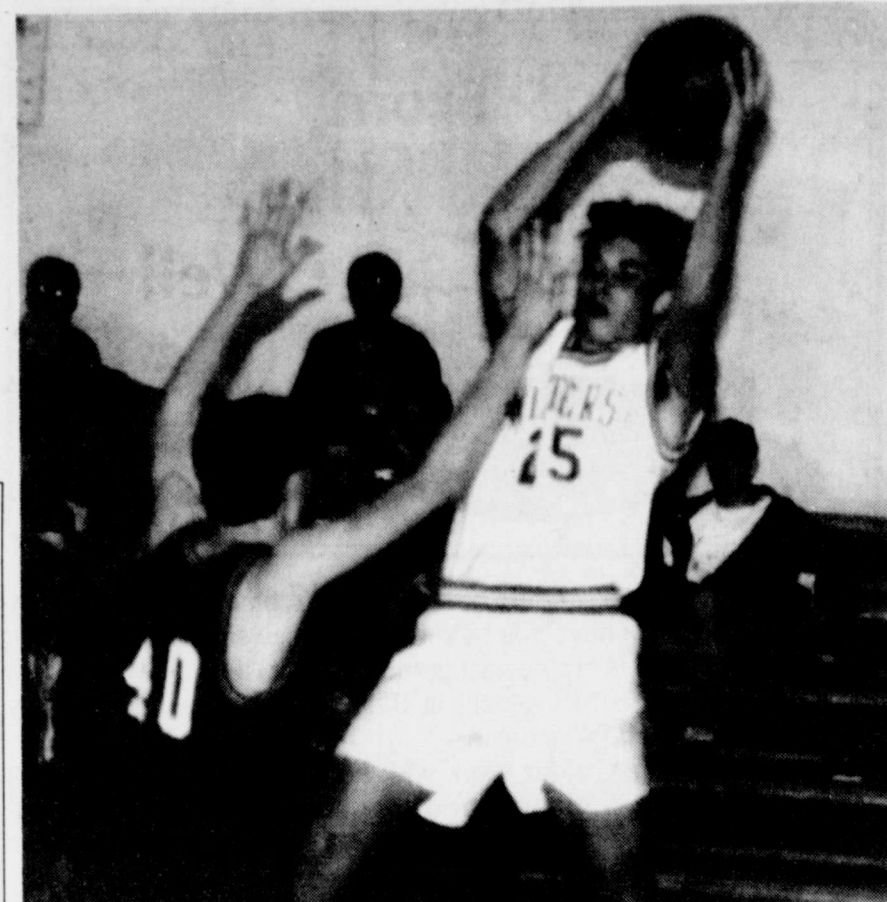

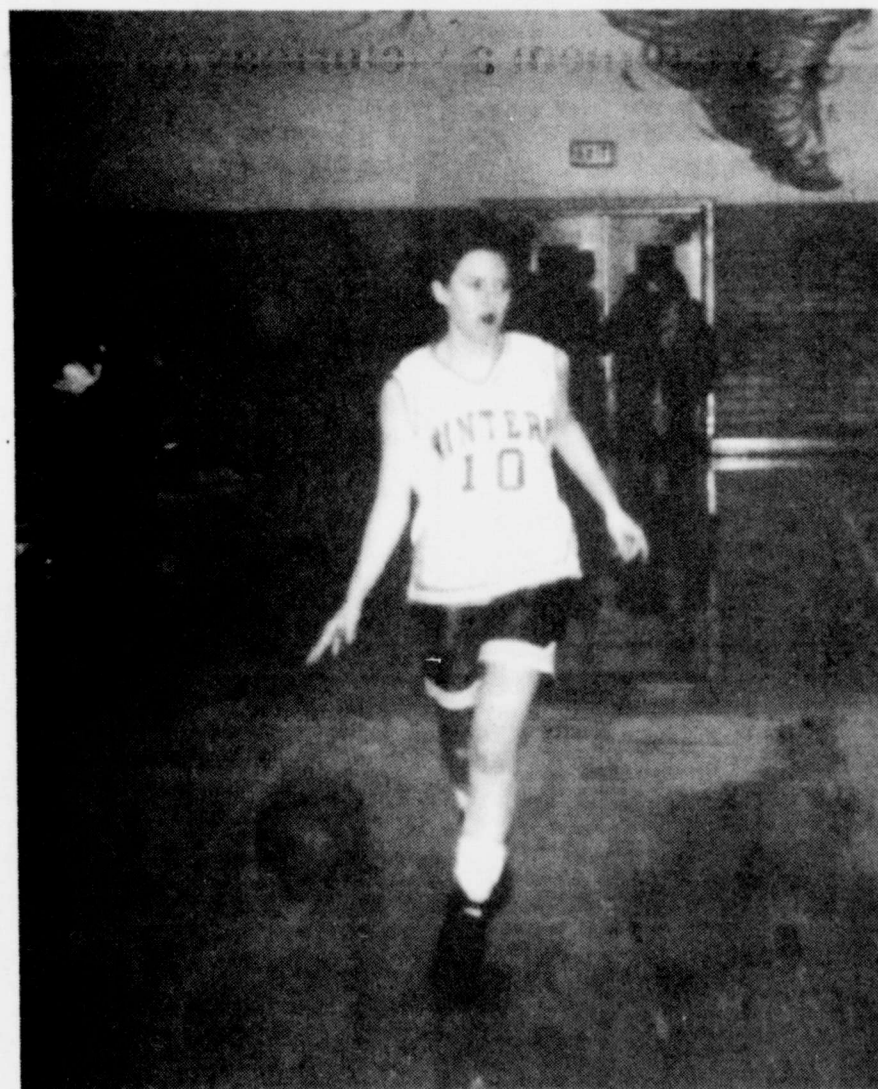

Champion pie maker

"I start with a basic recipe, but I always use a little addition and subtraction until I get the right taste," Lillian says. "And I want the food to look attractive; this is important."

From experience she has learned that a pinch of salt accents sweets, a touch of sugar improves vegetables and vanilla flavoring brings out the flavor of sweets.

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe McCartney, Lillian and her two sisters, Vivian and Lois, were small when their mother became ill. They lived with their McCartney grandparents for a time on the White Ranch near Melvin.

"Grandmother taught us how to cook. We scrambled eggs and prepared other dishes. She let us make tea cakes and the most fun was to roll the dough and cut out the cookies," Lillian says.

When their mother was well enough to return home, the girls continued cooking and enjoyed it. Lillian cooked her first meal on her 12th birthday. Her mother permitted her to bring home some friends for dinner. Her parents had to leave and Lillian prepared the meal. All she can remember is that she cooked cabbage and a cake with butterscotch icing.

After Lillian and Don Eubanks were married they lived and farmed in the Winters area until 1952. With a family of one daughter and five sons, one can be sure

there was plenty of cooking to be done. Imagine the stacks of hot biscuits, scrambled eggs and bacon as well as meat dishes, pies and cakes that have been dished out through the years.

After living in New Mexico for a time, the Eubanks moved to South Houston where Don was employed as an aircraft mechanic. Lillian went to work as a pastry cook at San Jacinto Junior College, but was kept so busy making hamburgers and sandwiches for the students that she had no time for any other cooking.

Eubanks was a member of the American Business Women's Association. She was named "Woman of the Year" and represented her chapter at the convention. She retired in 1975 after ten years working with the college.

With the children grown and her work ended, Lillian soon found time heavy on her hands and began helping friends. She did some short-order cooking for a drive-in, and cooked breakfasts and lunches at a cafeteria. After cooking lunches at another place for three years, she ended up cooking meals for 150 to 200 senior citizens. Two ladies came at 10 o'clock to load lunches and carry them to shut-ins.

Eubanks gave this up in 1986 to move to Winters at Thanksgiving. After Don's death she wanted to be near her son Dale and family and other relatives and friends.

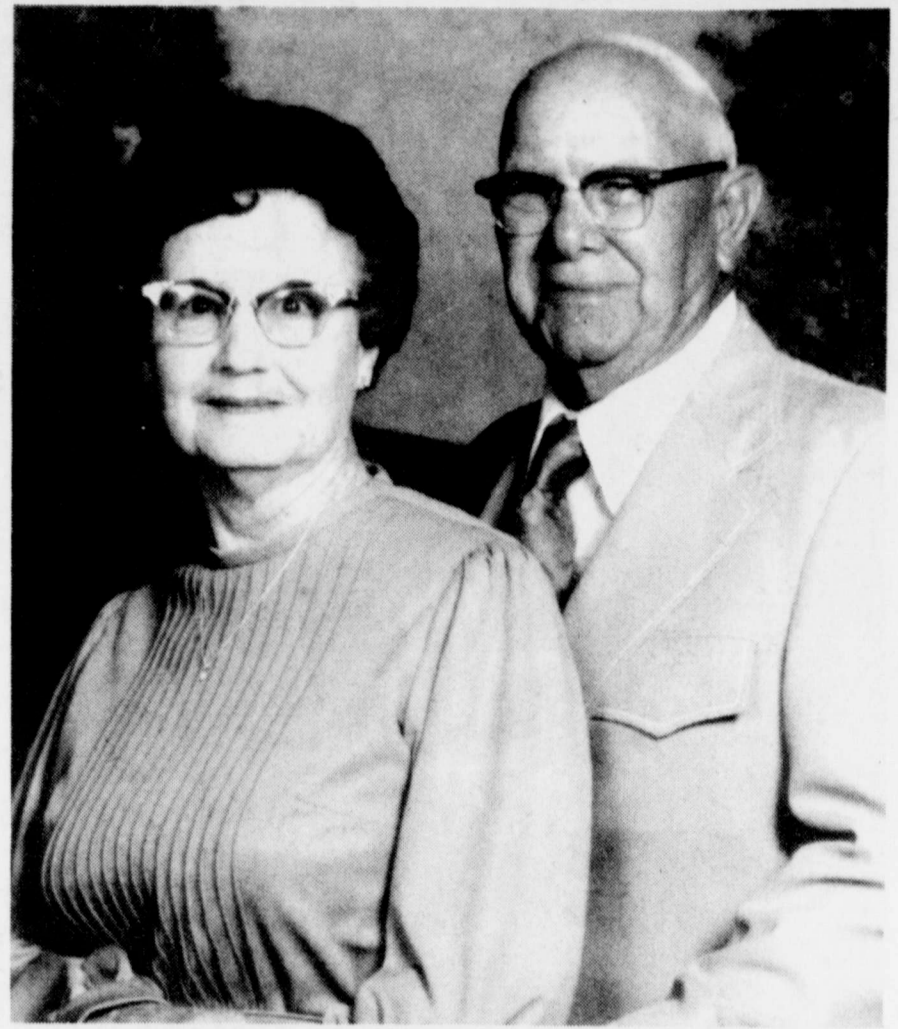

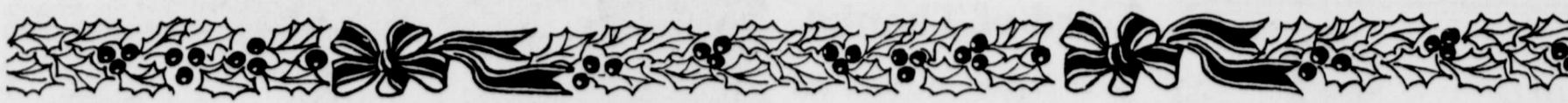

Order windbreak trees now

Santa Claus is coming—you can count on it! And while Santa will be here and gone before we know it—so will the opportunity to order Windbreak Trees for another year.

The Runnels Soil and Water Conservation District is offering these trees for sale to area landowners/producers/residents through the annual Windbreak Tree Program. These tree seedlings, which are raised in the Texas Forest Service nursery near Lubbock, are healthy, viable seedlings that are well-adapted to the soil and weather conditions here in Runnels County.

Over the past four years, 293 residents have purchased and planted almost 18,000 evergreen (conifer) and hardwood seedlings. These windbreak trees are well on their way to providing shade, beauty and protection to their owners.

If you have not purchased windbreak trees for your property or need additional or replacement trees, the RSWCD will be offering four categories of seedlings this year: bullet conifers, conifers, hardwoods and wildlife pack-ets.

Evergreen conifers (12 inch) are sold in multiples of 20 for \$35. We have Afghanistan Pine,

Austrian Pine and Red Cedar still available. Bullet conifers (12-inch but smaller root volume) are 20 for \$25 and are available in the Afghanistan Pine variety.

Hardwoods (approx. 24 inch) are priced at \$20 per 25. Species range from Mulberry to Red Oak and all in-between. Wildlife pack-ets contain 100 trees in four different species and are priced at \$45 per packet. Please contact the Soil Conservation Service office for specifics.

Consider ordering early so that your trees may be reserved for you before stocks are depleted. Afghanistan Pine, Red Oak and Green Ash are among several species that always sell out very early. Stocks of pecan and walnut seedlings are already depleted for this year.

The Windbreak Tree Program will conclude on February 7, 1993, with the seedlings arriving at the SCS office in Ballinger on February 17, 1993.

For information on this year's Windbreak Tree Program, please stop by the SCS office or call 365-3415. Make the commitment to not put it off again this year. Stop by the office and get your trees ordered now for planting this spring. In the years ahead, you'll be glad you did.

USDA announces signup dates for 1993 Farm Programs

Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan announced that the 1993 acreage reduction program signup for feed grains, wheat, rice, and upland and extra-long staple cotton will be March 1 through April 30.

On September 29, the secretary announced 1993 set-aside

percentages of 10 percent for corn and 5 percent for grain sorghum. The set-aside for barley, oats and wheat were set at zero percent.

A preliminary announcement of set-aside of 7.5 percent was made November 2 for upland cotton.

The Education of a Small Town Doc

Hello, Winters! Just writing back again to tell you how things are going up here in Lubbock. I just finished my second round of tests. The third round of tests begins December 14, and finals are just after that.

For this month's article, I will explain what classes I am taking and why medical students have to take them. I'm taking three classes altogether; Gross Anatomy, Biochemistry, and Histology.

Gross Anatomy teaches us the structure of the human body, as a whole; how everything fits together and how different pieces and parts are related to each other. For example, say a patient comes into the emergency room with a stab wound to the neck. What major blood vessels have been damaged? What nerves have been damaged? Have any vital structures in the neck been damaged, e.g., voicebox, trachea, esophagus? To answer these questions the physician must know exactly where these things are. That's the purpose of Gross Anatomy.

The format of the course is a lecture from 11-12 on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, and lab from 1-3 on the same days (we spend a lot more time in lab than this, however). It is an eight credit-hour course. In lab, we dissect actual human cadavers (bodies of the deceased). People from all over the state donate their bodies to medical study. The state distributes the bodies to the seven

medical schools in Texas as needed. I have tremendous respect for these people. Medical education benefits greatly from their donation to science.

The second class I'm taking is Biochemistry. Biochemistry teaches medical students about the nutrients needed by the human body to remain healthy, what happens to food we eat, where it goes once it is digested and absorbed, how we store energy and how the body utilizes energy in foods. It also teaches the chemical aspects of blood clotting, hormones, the immune system and other specialized functions of the human body. This class meets from 9-11 Monday-Thursday, and 9-10 on Friday. There is not lab. It is a nine credit-hour course.

The third and final course I'm taking is Histology. Histology is also an anatomy course. It is microscopic anatomy, i.e., anatomy (or structure of the human body) that can't be seen with the naked eye. You have to have a microscope to see it.

Let's say a patient comes in and describes symptoms of a stomach ulcer. How does the doctor know for sure? Well, Histology teaches us the NORMAL microscopic structure of most of the organs of the body. If a piece of the ulcer is cut and taken out with a special instrument (a biopsy) and studied under a microscope, it will look different than normal. How microscopic structures look under diseased condi-

tions is the purpose of another course called Pathology which is taken during the second year. You have to learn how things look normally before you can learn how they look abnormally. Histology is a four credit-hour course. Lecture meets from 11-12 on Tuesdays and Thursdays and a lab meets from 1-3 on the same days. In lab, we look at glass slides and Kodachrome slides of prepared specimens from different parts of the body.

As a disclaimer, let me say that any medical anecdotes, treatments, or procedures described in passing in this column should NOT be relied upon in real life situations. I am a first year medical student and have a long way to go before becoming a licensed physician. In this article, I'm only explaining how doctors are educated. Go see a real doctor if you're really worried about a health problem.

Oh, and by the way, the Aggies are ranked number three in the CNN/USA Today poll as of this week. Just FYI.

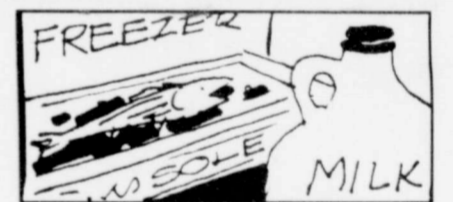
