

Civic clubs join forces to honor teachers tonight

Prime roast beef, homemade salads and cherry cobbler will be on the menu tonight (Thursday) when four Dimmitt civic clubs host the 1974 Teacher Appreciation Banquet.

THE ANNUAL event to honor Dimmitt's teachers will begin at 8 p.m. in the South Elementary School cafeteria.

"We will try to start serving about 15 minutes early if we can, because we expect a crowd of about 350," said M. E. Cleavinger, general chairman of the banquet. "We would like all those who are making salads to bring them to the cafeteria by 7:30 if possible."

The banquet is open to all teachers and school board

members and their spouses, and all members of the Dimmitt Lions, Rotary, Kiwanis and Jaycees, and their wives.

No admission fee will be charged.

FRUIT AND vegetable salads will be served from such large containers as buckets, plastic dishpans and giant bowls. Kiwanis Club members are even planning to bring potato salad, tossed salad and gelatin salad in tubs. Each individual salad-maker is urged to prepare enough for 30 servings to accommodate the large crowd.

Entertainment will be provided by the Elson Clark Trio, featuring vocalists Ben Gollehon and Patsy Morris, with Elson Clark at the piano. Gollehon is a 1954 graduate of Dimmitt High School, and Mrs.

Morris is a former employee of DHS.

The event will be "awards night" for six teachers. Supt. Charlie White will present trophies to five teachers who have passed service milestones of 10, 20 and 25 years in the local system. And the Dimmitt Jaycees will name the 1973-74 recipient of their "Outstanding Young Educator" award plaque.

JERRY MARVIN, manager of KDHN Radio, will be the master of ceremonies. Presidents of the four hosting civic clubs — Dr. Charles Vandiver of Rotary, Avery Thrasher of the Jaycees, Carl Bruegel of Kiwanis and Don Nelson of the Lions — will take part with brief welcoming remarks and introductions.

Hays services held Saturday

Funeral services for Charlie Hays, 63, longtime Dimmitt resident, were held Saturday afternoon in the First Baptist Church, Rev. John Street, pastor, officiated. Burial was in Castro Memorial Gardens Cemetery under the direction of Dennis Funeral Home.

MR. HAYS, a rancher and former implement dealer, died last Thursday afternoon at M. D. Anderson Hospital in Houston after an illness of several weeks.

He had lived in Dimmitt since April 1, 1944 when he established the Hays Implement Company. Prior to his Army service in World War II he had been co-owner of Rosson-Hays Implement Company in Hereford. In 1960 he bought the Hereford store again; then had retired from the implement business three years ago because of ranching duties.

He was born in Fannin County to Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Hays Sr. Sept. 10, 1910, and in 1928 he moved with his family to the Black community. He was married to Miss Nancy Conkwright of Hereford May 9, 1943.

Mr. Hays was a member of the First Baptist Church of Dimmitt and was chairman of the finance committee of the church for many years. He served as city commissioner for several terms and was a member of the Dimmitt School Board for 12 years. He was also president of the Castro County Chamber of Commerce in its infancy.

SURVIVORS ARE his wife, Nancy; two daughters, Mrs. Kent Hance of Lubbock and Mrs. Rob LaRue of Abernathy; a son John Hays of Hereford; three brothers, Clyde of Friona, Jim of Dimmitt and Glenn of Sydney, Australia; two sisters, Mrs. Jim Bookout of Hereford and Mrs. Lucille Kimmins of Phillips; and two grandchildren, Ron and Susan Hance.

Pallbearers were Ward Golden, Graham Shelly, Russel Moran, Boyce Carter, Harold Stephens, Bob McLean and G. L. Willis, all of Dimmitt, and Buster Sublett of Hereford.

To compete in tennis, track

Athletes bound for Austin

Nazareth's Kim King, Delphine Wethington and Patti Hochstein will represent Region 1-B in the state tennis tournament in Austin for the second consecutive year and Dimmitt speedster Robert Mayberry will represent Region 1-AA in the 100 yard dash and broad jump at the state track meet as the four county youths earned tickets to Austin during regional sports competition Friday and Saturday at Lubbock and Odessa.

STATE competition in both tennis and track is scheduled to get underway at the University of Texas May 3.

Kim King of Nazareth led the list of regional tennis champions in competition at Lubbock as she won the Region 1-B girls' singles tennis championship for the second straight year Saturday. Miss King is the defending state Class B girls' singles champion.

Saturday the blonde senior gunned down Holly Harris of Fort Davis 6-2, 6-0 for the regional girls' solo crown.

Delphine Wethington and Patti Hochstein took their second Region 1-B girls' doubles crown Saturday as they bested Bronte's Jean Ann Raughton and Shallon Cooper 6-0, 4-6, 6-0. The Nazareth juniors hope to improve on their state-runnerup finish of last season when they fell to Celeste's Deborah Stutzer and Sharon Gray in Austin.

ROBERT Mayberry turned in a second place finish in the 100 yard dash and won the broad jump as he earned the right to represent Region 1-AA in two events at Odessa Friday and Saturday.

Mayberry barely missed a first place finish in the 100 yard dash as he stopped the clock at 9.9. Hamlin's Johnny Jones edged Mayberry for the blue ribbon with a time of 9.8 and the third place time of 10 seconds went to Stanton's David Standefar. Mayberry was clocked at 9.8 in the preliminaries Friday.

The junior speedster won the broad jump competition with a leap of 21 feet, 5 1/2 inches.

Mayberry came within a fraction of qualifying in the 220 yard dash as he was clocked at 22.2.

DIMMITT cindermen finished second in overall Region 1-AA standings as they posted a total of 35 points.

The Bobcat 440 yard relay team made up of Ronnie Lawson, Gene Veals, Cliff Parker and Mayberry finished third with a time of 44 seconds flat.

Parker turned in a sixth place finish in the 440.

Deane Wright is the Dimmitt High School boys' track coach and Joe King is the Nazareth High School tennis coach.

Langford named as All-State cager

Dimmitt's Paul Langford has been named to a berth on the 1974 Texas Sportswriters Association Class AA All-State Basketball team.

LANGFORD, a senior at Dimmitt High School, was named to third unit of the All-State dream team.

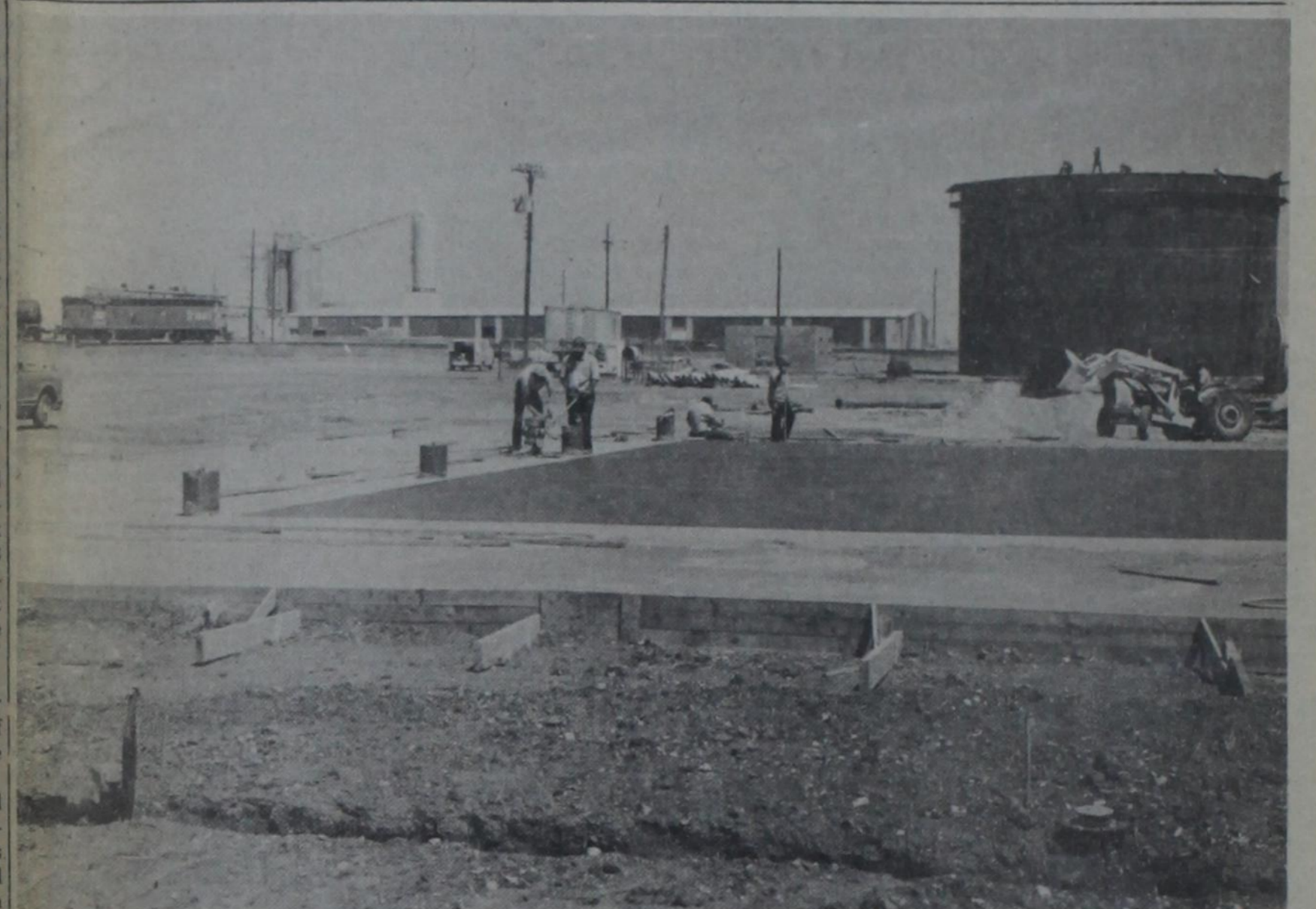
Minor League tryouts set for Saturday

Child psychologist lauds new MH 'outreach center'

Facilities for child therapy in Castro County's new Mental Health Outreach Center are "the best I have anywhere — better even than in the Plainview center," according to psychologist Laura Vincent, who works out of the local center two days a week.

MRS. VINCENT is director of children's services for the Central Plains Mental Health Center in Plainview, which serves nine counties including Castro.

The new outreach center in Dimmitt is located at Northwest Third and Halsell, in the offices of the late Dr. Harold Bischoff. Judy Birdwell is the full outreach worker at the center, having recently succeeded Phyllis Murphy.

Also working out of the local center two days a week is Roy Alexander, director of outreach services for the nine-county area. Other specialists are called in as needed.

IN ADDITION to praising the children's therapy facilities at the Dimmitt center, Mrs. Vincent said she is getting "very good cooperation" from local schools and individual teachers

in helping children resolve their problems.

"One person covering nine counties can spend only so much time with the children, but when I can sit down with the teachers and work out details for preventive help for children, it makes a lot of difference," Mrs. Vincent said.

Purpose of the center here is to provide necessary psychological and therapeutic services to local residents in their own environment. These services are aimed at helping people with problems of mental illness, mental retardation, alcoholism, drug abuse, family and marriage problems, children's learning disabilities, and emotional problems.

TO HELP people with these problems, the center's staff employs individual and group psychotherapy, chemotherapy, marriage counseling, recreation and occupational therapy, special education activities and a crisis intervention service. Also, the center is ready to conduct seminars and classes for any group interested in better community health.

One of the services that

comes under the heading of "better community health" is a pre-natal class scheduled next month for expectant parents. The classes will start May 6 and will include four 90-minute sessions dealing mainly with "what to expect" emotionally and physically.

"WE WANT to emphasize the importance of fathers attending these sessions," Alexander said. "These programs deal with the family concept and the effects that parenthood has on both the mother and father."

Alexander and Mrs. Vincent also are now developing group counseling sessions for parents, "and we think that meeting in groups may help parents to see their own problems in perspective with the problems other parents have," Alexander said.

Alexander, Mrs. Vincent and Mrs. Birdwell, along with Carol Lantz, Central Plains Center trustee for Castro County, meet regularly with a local advisory board to discuss mental health needs of the community that can be served through the new center.

Congress has decided to get into the middle of the controversial no-fault auto insurance issue. The Democratic side of both the Senate and the House is sponsoring legislation, already approved by the Senate Commerce Committee, to establish federal no-fault insurance standards and to make those standards mandatory in states which do not have no-fault insurance laws or which have no-fault laws which do not meet the federal standards.

THE PROPOSED legislation would eliminate fault-finding in just about all automobile accidents which occur and it would require direct payments by insurance companies to policyholders for all medical, hospital, and rehabilitation costs as well as for lost wages.

Clearance is still needed on the question of whether the proposed federal legislation encroaches on the traditional right of the states to regulate the insurance activities within their borders. The insurance industry is pretty much in agreement over the need for no-fault insurance, but it is badly divided over whether the states or Congress should be responsible for the legislation creating it. A major factor sparking the current federal legislation is the snail-like pace of the states in passing no-fault bills. Only twelve states have no-fault insurance and another six or eight states are expected to pass it this year. The governors of Illinois, New Hampshire and New Mexico vetoed no-fault legislation. Arkansas, Oregon and Texas have passed no-fault bills but have not taken away the right of the injured party to sue.

However, none of the states have passed no-fault legislation that meets the proposed federal standards. In Massachusetts, the pioneer promoter of no-fault insurance, and in Florida where no-fault limits for bodily injury are held to a maximum of \$1,000, significant reductions in premiums for bodily injury have resulted.

THE PRIMARY opposition to the whole concept of no-fault insurance comes mostly from the trial lawyers who would lose income from any plan which would reduce the number of lawsuits arising from auto accidents.

Cattle prices should rebound

"All signs point toward an increase in the prices of both feeder and fat cattle by late April or May," believes a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

FEEDER CATTLE prices should reach last year's levels while Choice slaughter steer prices should move up to the \$48-\$50 range, contends Dr. Ed Uvacek.

"The high price for the year may not be much higher than that, and some downward pressure is highly probably thereafter."

In analyzing the present problem of low prices to producers, the specialist points to overfat cattle in feedlots, the trucking strike, fuel shortages, retailers lowering wholesale prices in order to widen margins, and past government controls as having a hand in depressing an already weak market.

"Neither oversupply of beef nor a lack of consumer demand caused the low price levels of last month," Uvacek says. "Slaughter of cattle was off one percent in January and four percent in February, yet prices fell drastically. On the other hand, retail beef prices in January were up 17 percent from a year ago and six percent above the December, 1973 level.

Dr. Hill to attend animal health confab in Fort Worth

Dr. W. J. Hill, Dimmitt veterinarian, will participate in the 6th Annual Southwestern Animal Health Conference for Livestockmen scheduled for April 27 and 28 in Fort Worth at the Green Oaks Motor Inn. Dr. Hill is a member of the program planning committee, co-chairing the Feedlot Section of the conference.

THE CONFERENCE will feature authorities on animal health and nutrition who will discuss topics of both general and special interest to producers, points out Dr. James Armstrong, veterinarian for the

Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Special sessions on cow-calf, dairy, equine (horse), feedlot and swine will be featured Saturday morning, April 27, and will be conducted all day on Sunday. A general session will be held Saturday afternoon.

The cow-calf section will feature discussions on such topics as current infectious disease and parasite problems, toxicity problems, calf scours, herd management, herd health, estimation of calf crop, necropsy (an autopsy), pre-conditioning, calving problems and induced

calving. In the dairy section discussions will include owner responsibility to his milking system, vaccination, reproduction, calf-raising, skin and limb problems, practical herd tips, failures in milk fever and ketosis, handling semen, programmed mastitis control, practical dairy management, drug withdrawals and limitations, and management of retained placentas.

HORSE OWNERS will have an opportunity to hear talks on equine infectious anemia, animal health requirements, horse identification, selection of a trainer, clinical laboratory procedures indicating health and training status, medication of horses in athletic competition, available vaccines, immunization at the brood farm, and routine surgical procedures.

Speakers at the feedlot section will dwell on such topics as programs for receiving cattle, drug interaction, use of force, problems in feeder cattle, hemophilus infection, research underway at Bushland, backgrounding in a commercial feeding program, use of alfalfa pastures, and basic parasitology and approved anthelmintics. The session for swine producers will include discussions on management and disease prevention, controlling diseases in reproduction, herd health management, commercial hog feedlots, sensible use of antibiotics, feeder pig health, and the profit potential of a dead pig.

The general session will feature discussions on "Cow Psychology" by Dude Meenach of Superior Foods, Dallas; "How American Agriculture Can Solve the Energy Crisis — the Daw Theory" by David Wits, Dallas attorney; and "The Future of Food Animal Medicine" by Dr. George Shelton, dean of the College of Veterinary Medicine, Texas A&M University.

ALSO, Dr. William Anderson, a Dallas veterinarian, will bring an up-date on the brucellosis eradication program in Texas, and a panel will discuss "Why Vaccines Work."

The annual conference is being sponsored by the Texas Veterinary Medical Association and Texas A&M University.

A **NATIVE** of Buffalo, in East Texas, Davis attended Sam Houston State College in Huntsville, where he earned a BS degree in agriculture.

After teaching two years, he joined the US Soil Conservation Service in 1951 as a conservationist at Terrell.

He has also served in Van Alstyne, Rockwall, Gainesville and was then named area conservationist in

North Central Texas in 1968. He came to Amarillo from Terrell.

Davis' main duty as area conservationist will be to supervise all conservation programs in the western half of the Panhandle. He will visit the local conservation district office approximately every two months.

He served in the US Navy during World War II in the South Pacific as a gun crewman on merchant ships. He enrolled in college upon his discharge.

DAVIS AND his wife, Marie, have two sons, Tommy, a senior at Texas Tech, and Jimmy, a high school senior. His family is remaining in Terrell until the end of the school year.

Consumers can get refunds on items

Consumers can get refunds on hazardous products they've already purchased, the Consumer Product Safety Commission ruled recently.

"THIS INVOLVES all products banned by the Federal Hazardous Substance Act — including toys for children and other articles," Mrs. Doris Myers, home management specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, noted.

As a result of the ruling, dealers must post signs which read, "Banned Articles or Substances List and Repurchase Procedures." The signs must inform customers:

- which products have been banned, on or after March 6, including model number or other distinguishing characteristics,
- name and address of manufacturer,
- dates notice was received from manufacturer or distributor (a manufacturer must notify wholesalers and/or retailers whenever one of his products is banned),
- nature of hazard involved, and
- how they can get a full refund.

"SIGNED listing banned products and telling customers how to get refunds must remain posted for 120 days."

Mrs. Myers said consumers can be reimbursed for "reasonable and necessary transportation charges that include actual costs of returning the article by mail or car."

Tuberculosis on upswing in Texas

The American Lung Association of Texas reported recently that statistics on reported cases of tuberculosis throughout the state are making a definite climb, with 85 cases of the disease reported in Texas for the first week of April.

CASTRO COUNTY representative on the Top of Texas area program board of ALAT is Jim Petra. "For a while, the five year median was stabilized at about fifty cases of tuberculosis per week," Petra said. "Because of the increase in reported cases, that median has now climbed to 68 cases."

The Lung Association's medical division, the American Thoracic Society, has advocated that physicians include the Mantoux tuberculin test as a part of the standard physical examination, that positive reactors be x-rayed for signs of lung disease, and that individuals considered to be at high risk of developing TB be treated preventively with daily doses of INH for a year. "A lot of people have been under the false impression that TB is a thing of the past," the Christmas Seal spokesman said. "This unfortunately just isn't so. I am reminded of that period in our history when we thought we had VD whipped, too."

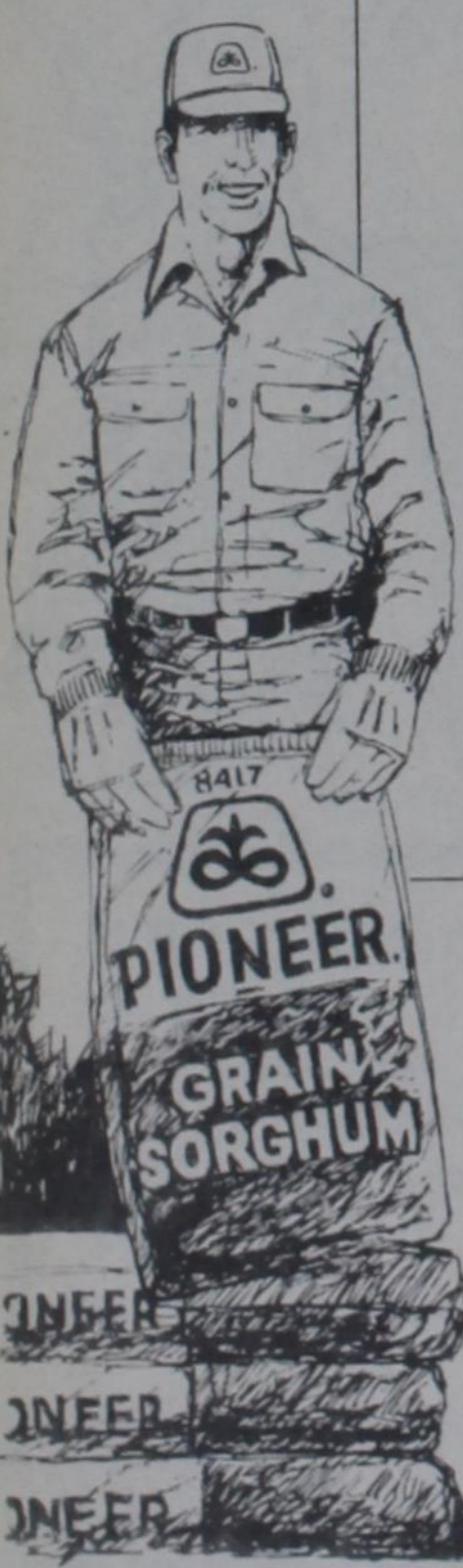

VETERANS' SERVICES

By BEDFORD W. SMITH
County Service Officer

Veterans who are now attending a college or university under the GI Bill are reminded that they must establish their entitlement to continued Veterans Administration benefits this month. This information is given through the Castro County News to be sure all veterans attending school be reminded that all such veterans must now be sure that their "cert" cards are properly completed and returned to the VA.

Your Service Officer states that the certification of attendance card, which the veteran should have received with his VA check on April 1, 1974, must be completed and returned. Otherwise, the VA cannot prepare his check which should be due May 1, 1974, to cover his final month of attendance this semester. Also, if the card is not returned by the end of the current semester, the veteran cannot automatically be reenrolled for the upcoming

summer or fall sessions, in the event he plans to continue his education.

The certification card is a small IBM punch card with a blue stripe. This card must be completed by the veteran, certifying his attendance for the entire current enrollment period.

Your Service Officer also reminds veterans that they must inform the VA of any changes in their legal dependents. A veteran may receive additional monthly amounts for his wife, minor children and dependent parents. Every veteran should also advise the VA of any program changes, such as an increase or a decrease in the courses being taken. Such actions on the veteran's part will help to prevent an overpayment in VA benefits. When an overpayment occurs, it must be repaid or it is withheld from future benefits due the veteran.

Let's be sure that veterans in our Waco Regional Office area do not have a postponed VA

payment check.

THE VETERANS Administration reminds married home-minded veterans that it is now easier to qualify for GI home loans.

The VA now accords full recognition to incomes and expenses of both veteran and spouse in determining ability to repay loan obligations.

The VA is required by law to determine if contemplated terms of repayment bear a proper relation to the veteran's anticipated income and expenses before approving the loan.

"But while the spouse's income has always been considered," explains Jack Coker, "local rules sometimes had the effect of discounting the spouse's income. Now, however, no such local rules are imposed, and the spouse's income is given full consideration."

VA guarantees 60 percent of GI home loans (maximum \$12,500) private lenders make to servicemen, veterans and eligible spouses of World War II, Korean and post-Korean con-

flicts and the Vietnam Era.

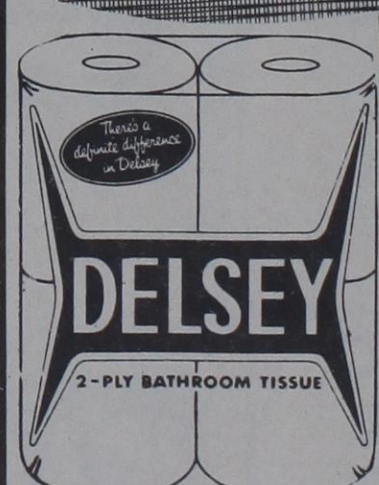

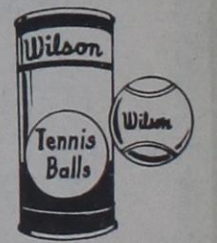

Briscoe tells Water Task Force to search for additional sources

Governor Dolph Briscoe told his Water Task Force members to consider looking out-of-state for development of future water sources for Texas. The Governor was the featured speaker at a two-day meeting of the Governor's Water Resource Conservation and Development Task Force, April 15-16 in Austin. The 33 members of the Task Force heard the Governor's opinions of a study pre-

presented to him by the Task Force, "Statewide Program for Conservation and Development of Texas Water Resources."

FIRST DRAFT of the document was given to the Governor in late March, with the final draft being presented to him on April 15. Concerning the study, the Governor assured them "that it will receive careful study, and I will respond to it as you proceed."

The Task Force was created in November, 1973, to coordinate the numerous planning activities of the various state and regional water authorities in Texas.

Briscoe told the Task Force "We must continue to accelerate our efforts to protect and improve water quality conditions throughout Texas." The Governor spoke of his views on the importance of irrigated agriculture to the economy and social well-being of Texas. The Governor told the meeting that he has directed his staff to work with Task Force members and other interested and informed groups throughout Texas and elsewhere in the nation, to make certain that the place of food and fiber production generated by irrigated agriculture is properly documented and supported by comprehensive study, based on today's real-life situation.

THE GOVERNOR also said that he believes that ground water resources should be managed through local authority. "As you know, I believe very

strongly that management of all resources should be exercised at the most local level of government where that responsibility can be undertaken effectively," added Briscoe. The Governor explained that we must face the problems that have accompanied the exploitation of some of our ground water resources. He said, "We must face this problem objectively and forthrightly. Working with the local governments in the area, and the interests now served by ground water, we must take the necessary measures to alleviate these problems." Continuing the Governor stated, "Elsewhere in the state, where ground water is a resource that can be made a part of our overall water supply availability, effective management for the joint use of surface and ground water supplies is needed. I believe such programs can be most effectively designed and implemented at the local level. I believe also that as a safeguard to the public interest, where that interest is threatened, and where effective local action needs support, we must all work together to find reasonable and equitable solutions."

The Governor stressed the importance of providing an assurance of fresh-water inflows and other protection to the bays and estuaries of our Texas coast, to maintain their productivity. "The amount of fresh-water inflow, and the method by which it is to be provided, are questions that we must continue to investigate," stated Briscoe.

The Governor is also concerned with water supplies and waste treatment facilities that do not adequately meet the standards which should be met by such services. The Governor explained "The short and long term planning and program implementation upon which we are embarking must take these needs into account. Such actions and projects must be included as may be necessary to improve these facilities to the point that all of our people are adequately served."

The Governor also encouraged the continuation and expansion of research and development activities, and in test-

Hugh Edburg announces for state comptroller

Hugh Edburg of Austin has announced that he will seek the office of Comptroller of Public Accounts for the State of Texas, a post held for the past 25 years by Robert S. Calvert who is retiring from public service.

EDBURG, who has served under the comptroller since 1962, filed for the Democratic nomination to the post. He is now chief of accounting, Revenues and Statistics Division, re-

we've continued to lower the cost of processing the dollar through better use of manpower, improved systems and more sophisticated electronic equipment.

IN SEEKING the comptroller's job, Edburg pledged to report to the people of Texas where each dollar comes from and where it goes, and to see that the state's books are kept open to the public view.

As chief of accounting, Revenue and Statistics, Edburg has monitored the financial condition of state funds and has reported to the governor and legislature on the economic status of the state. All appropriation bills authorized by the legislature have passed through Edburg's office before certification. Authorization of deposits and withdrawals from the state treasury has been his responsibility.

Initially, Edburg served as head of Systems, a division of the comptroller's office, which kept him in regular contact with leaders in industry and government, both state and federal.

Edburg, 49, is an accounting graduate of the University of Texas, with minors in economics, statistics and science. He held management positions with US Steel and Shell Oil and served in the Air Force and the Texas National Guard.

Edburg received the Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal and a Presidential Citation for his actions during World War II. After the war, he served as assistant adjutant general with the 49th Armored Division of the Texas National Guard. During the Korean conflict, he was an industrial cost accountant and internal auditor with the Air Force Auditor General's Department. He was honorably discharged from the reserves with the rank of captain.

Calvert referred to Edburg as "one of the finest men I know and one of the very few men in Texas today with a thorough knowledge of Texas fiscal matters through his 11-year tenure with the department."

Calvert said Edburg will have his full support.

"The comptroller's job is highly technical since it entails the direct supervision of the overall fiscal affairs of the state. It requires a professional, a man who understands the principles of money management," Edburg said.

"Since the comptroller is responsible for the collection and disbursement of more than \$1 billion a month of the people's money, the office should be kept above politics."

"Over the past several years, the fiscal activities of the state have increased at a rate greater than 10% a year. However,

Beef prices are "more pleasing than they have been for some time, according to one observer.

MRS. GWENDOLYNE Clyatt, consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, listed round steaks and roasts, ground beef, arm and blade pot roasts and steaks as showing best values currently.

"Pork values include shoulder roasts and steaks, end-cut loin roasts and chops. Some brands of bacon are down in price, too."

Citing turkey and turkey parts among the most economical, high-quality protein foods available, Mrs. Clyatt suggested roasting a larger turkey and using leftover cooked meat for later meals.

Turning to fruit counters, the specialist noted that ample quantities of apples, grapefruit and oranges are available in the moderate price range.

"Reasonable Temple oranges are still around at attractive retail prices.

"MURCOTS (honey tangerines) are slightly higher priced than Temple oranges — but they're very good, and pineapples from Mexico are plentiful."

Strawberries, bananas, cantaloupe, honeydew and watermelon are available at various price levels, and soft-shell squash prices are trending downward.

Fresh vegetables in good supply at the most economical prices include cabbage, carrots, mustard, collards, turnip and greens, broccoli, radishes and green onions, the specialist said.

CONSUMER WATCH-WORDS: There's no saving in buying a less expensive cut of meat if most of it is bone and fat. In roasting beef, slow cooking keeps meat from drying out and shrinking — and that saves money.

Our circulation has increased

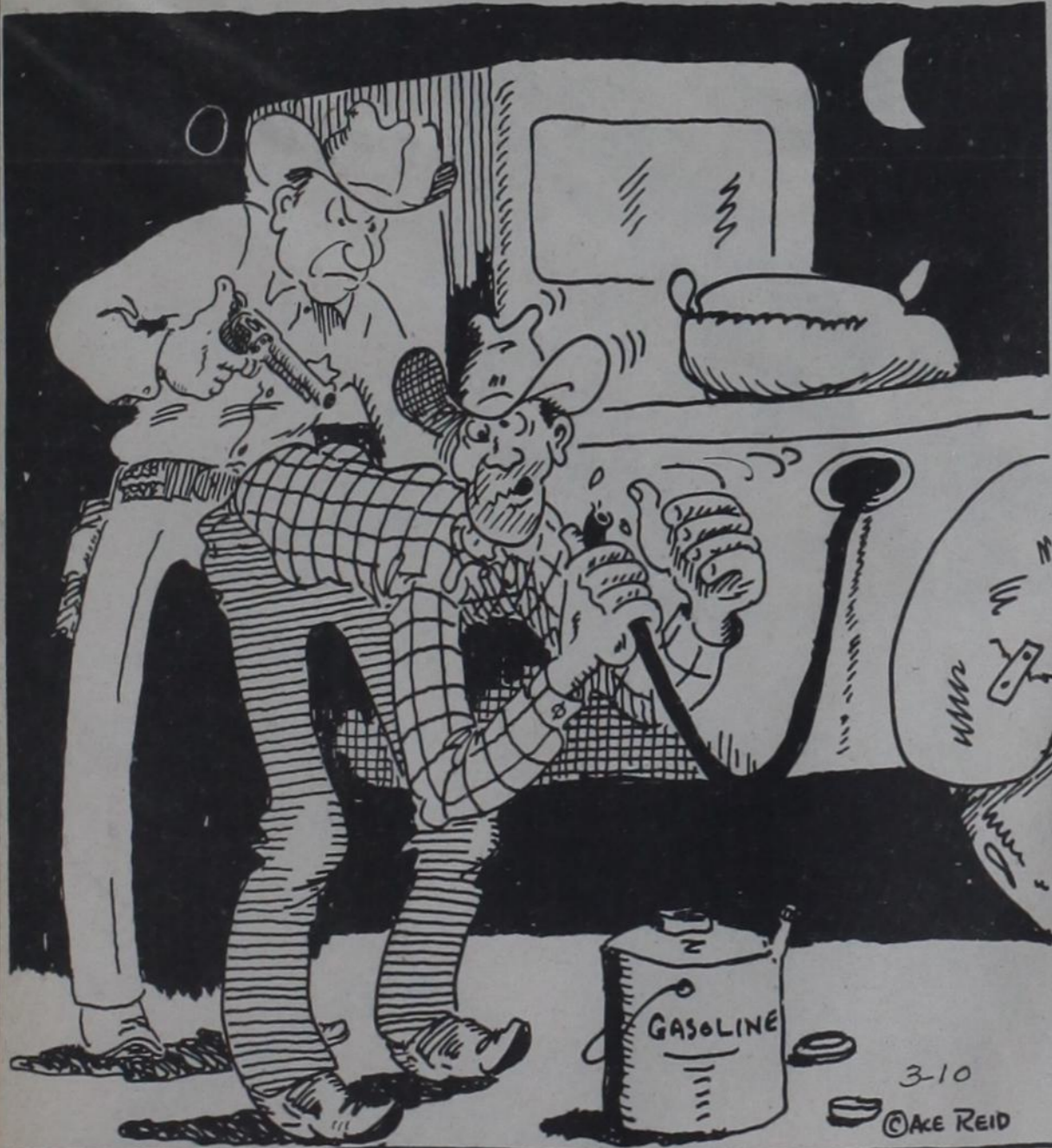

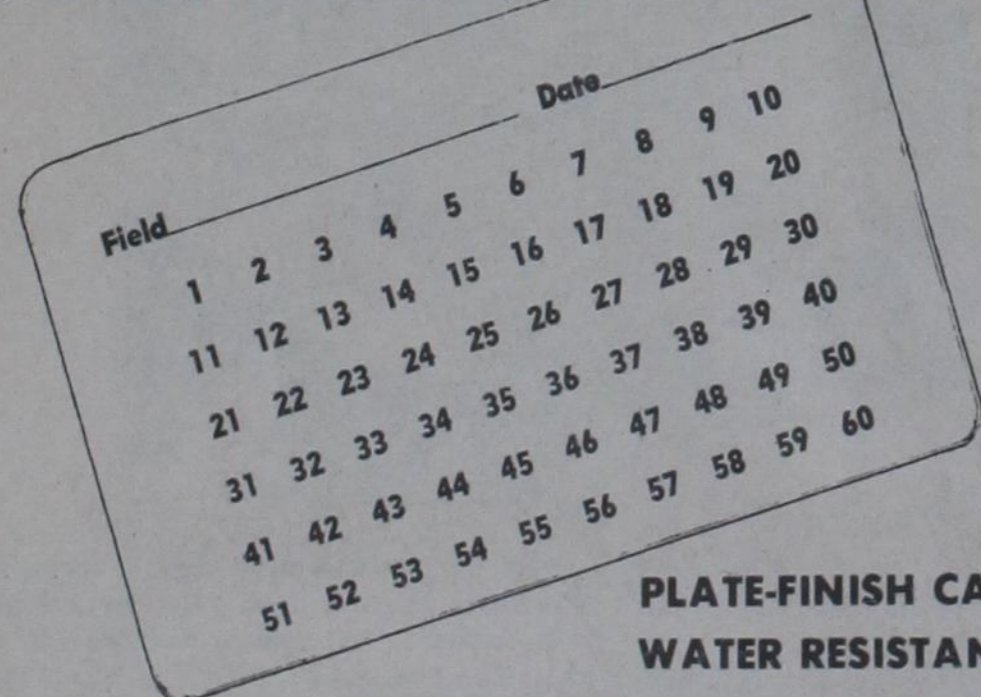

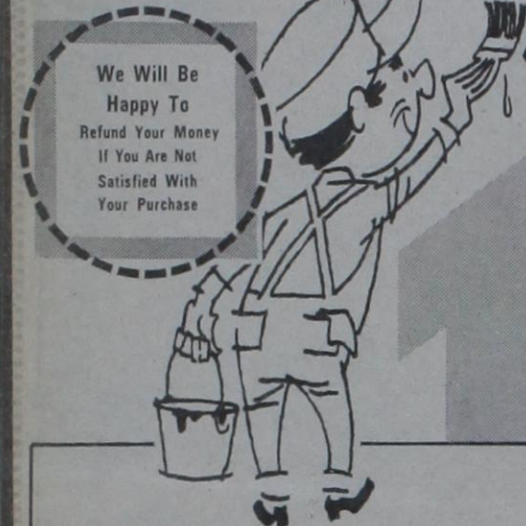
