Mayor's husband confronts Winters City Administrator

There was no April Fool's joke as W.A. (Bill) Griffin entered City Hall at about 8 a.m. on April 1, and allegedly threatened City Administrator Aref Hassan.

Griffin, husband of Mayor Sandy Griffin, has been charged with making a terroristic threat against Hassan and is awaiting a pre-trial hearing.

The threats apparently came as a result of disagreements voiced at a called meeting of the Mayor and City Council on Wednesday, March 31, at City Hall.

Mayor Griffin had called the meeting at the request of several city employees "to hear comments on the job performance of the City Administrator and to conduct an evaluation thereof."

Present for the meeting were Mayor Griffin, Councilmen James Spill, Randy Loudermilk, O.J. Murray, and Manuel Esquivel, City Attorney Ken Slimp, Administrator Hassan, Assistant City Secretary Shelia Paschal, and City Employees Jack Davis, Jr., Jack Burns, Charles Grenwelge, Felix Gonzales, Bob Palmer, Keith Collom, Toby Virden, Donna Donica, Jerry Jackson, Jack Davis, Sr., Jim Ventress, Tony Torres, Carey Balentine, Curtis Jackson, Mike Helm, and Ken Schooler.

During the course of the meeting, Hassan pointed out a discrepancy in following details outlined in Article 5 of the Personnel Policy in the City Employee's Handbook concerning proper procedure for grievances.

City Attorney Slimp advised the council "to forgo any deliberations on the employee grievance procedure" at that time, and that "he would advise employees of the procedures in place."

The incident on Thursday

morning resulted in the arrest of Bill Griffin, 61, by Winters Police Chief Carey Balentine at Hassan's office. Griffin was then transported to Ballinger by Dan Stoker of the Runnels County Sheriff's Office where Griffin was booked and then released on a Personal Recognizance bond by County Judge Michael Murchison. Griffin has been charged with making a terroristic threat which is a Class B misdemeanor. No other charges have been filed as of April 6.

Hassan has served as City Administrator since April 1, 1992.

OIL BUSINESS . . .

Why is there oil in Texas but not in, say, New Hampshire?

Is it because God smiled on Texans but not on Yankees? I'm sure you can get a few opinions on this theory, but the facts of the matter point to several reasons why mother earth placed more oil in some parts and not in others.

Let's start with the basics. Oil and gas are hydrocarbons. That means they have hydrogen and carbon in them. Like water is two hydrogens and one oxygen, petroleum is a mixture of hydrogen and carbons tied together in chains at the molecular level.

Carbon is found mainly in living things—plants, animals, etc. Thus, the idea that oil and gas are from dinosaurs arises. What this really means is that some sort of organic creatures many centuries ago were eventually broken down into molecules and atoms, of which carbon was one. This carbon then collected at some point and was subjected to heat and pressure over geologic time deep under the ground, until it formed hydrocarbons.

But, that is not the end of the story.

Near the hydrocarbons, water was collected, also. This oil and water was moved around as geologic forces changed the formations in the ground and at the surface. This oil and water migrated over the years until it found a resting place—oil on top of water in most cases.

This resting place is where we find oil today. These resting places are caused by faults (cracks in the earth), formation pinch-outs (the formation goes away), or by some other force of nature. The very nature of a geologic formation can cause it to trap hydrocarbons, as well.

For example: many oil reservoirs are found in a syncline or anticline, which are humps (up or down) that prevent (by the effects of gravity) oil from escaping once it has collected.

When oil fields are explored for, a wildcatter uses techniques to locate these certain geologic events or traps that might lead one to believe that oil may be trapped there. Even when a structure is located that could hold oil and/or gas, it still may just hold water. The water is there because the oil was unable or unwilling to stop there. It may have moved on to where gravity or some other natural force would have it settle.

Which brings us back to the reasons some places on this earth have oil and others do not.

First, the conditions have to be right at the right time to make a region or area petroleum prolific. If the conditions are not there to create the oil, then there will be no

oil. If the oil is ready for migration but the traps are somewhere else, the oil would most likely pass through without stopping.

Some places like the Permian Basin of West Texas and the reefs and thin layers of sand and limestone that are throughout Central West Texas are ideal places for petroleum to form and to be trapped at the time most of our petroleum was created deep under the earth. Then, geologic events happened to create the trapping mechanisms required for the petroleum to stop and wait to be discovered eons later.

The lack of deep basins and reefs throughout geologic time in New Hampshire are prime reasons why there is not much oil there. It is unclear if any petroleum may have been created "way back when," but we are pretty sure that it was not trapped in very many places in New Hampshire.

Thus, geologic events and timing of life cycles of pre-historic plants and animals have conspired to place oil and gas in certain places and not in others.

Now, whether this was the result of God smiling on us and not on them...that is another matter entirely.

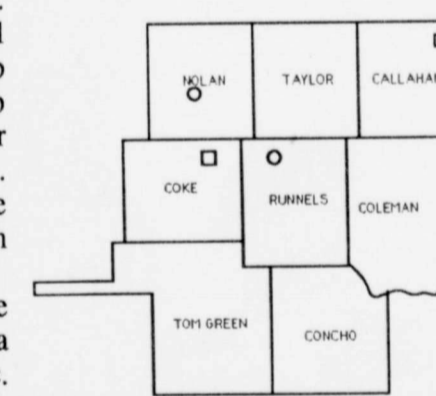

Mrs. C.A. Turk, 79, of Winters side-swiped the back of the trailer with her 1983 Chevrolet. Mrs. Turk, who had minor injuries, refused to be transported by ambulance.

Mrs. Fitzer and her husband, Otto, were uninjured.

The accident was investigated by the Ballinger Police Department, Runnels County Sheriff's Department and the Constable of Precinct 1.

Poe's Corner

A leap from the past to the future

Members of our group were well acquainted by the time we returned Tuesday night for dinner at Lajitas. We reached the restaurant through a long entrance that connected on the left with a bar and reception room. On the right side was a bakery.

Virginia (Gen) Muncy of Maryneal is a pianist and, after dinner, she entertained us in the reception room by playing everything from "San Antonio Rose" to "Sentimental Journey." Florine Hoelscher of San Angelo tried to lead us in singing, but little talent was exhibited.

The cowboys at the bar applauded and one asked Gen if he could join her by playing his viola. This added to our concert. He said, "I didn't know we had a piano and I live here. Wish we could hear it played more often."

Wednesday's schedule included a break at Sul Ross University on the way to lunch at the Prude Guest Ranch followed by a guided tour of historic Old Fort Davis. At 2 p.m., outside the W.L. Moody Visitors Center at the foot of Mount Locke, we joined a guided tour of the observatory facilities which lasted about an hour.

Our salad luncheon at the Prude Ranch lacked a little being ready. We were invited to visit the gift shop and the grounds outside. Again, Gen played for us on the piano in the large dining hall. I needed a sweater and found one in the gift shop that I couldn't do without.

The Prude Ranch was originally a family operated ranch on Limpia Creek. It has been developed into a dude and guest ranch. Known throughout the U.S., it caters to all ages and interests, including children's summer camps and Elderhostel groups, conventions, family reunions and other gatherings.

Our guide was a grandson of the original owners. He said his Grandmother Prude ran the ranch from her wheelchair until she was 102 years old. They show 35,000 visitors through the ranch each year. She found it was cheaper to herd people instead of cattle.

"Once land was cheap," our guide continued. "My grandmother and her people owned about 560 thousand acres of land. The depression came on and much of it was lost, but we are happy with the 10,000 acres of homestead we have left."

This is an area rich in history of the past and great prospects for the future of the McDonald Observatory.

Fort Davis was founded in 1854 at the crossroads of the famous Chihuahu Trail and the Butterfield Overland Mail Trail. It was abandoned at the outbreak of the Civil War in 1862. Most of the buildings were burned and destroyed by the Indians.

The soldiers returned in 1867 and the fort was rebuilt. It was used until 1891 when the Army ordered the remaining garrison of Fifth Infantry to abandon Fort Davis.

The old fort buildings saw a variety of uses until the 1950's when several of the old officers' quarters were used as vacation cabins.

By this time area residents were making serious efforts to save Fort Davis. Finally, in 1961, Congress authorized the establishment of Fort Davis National Historic Site.

Fort Davis is a town steeped in history which was established under the protection of the U.S. Army post of the same name. There are many remnants of the post sprinkled around town to help provide its unique flavor. It once served as the county seat of Presidio County and now of Jeff Davis County.

Located outside Fort Davis on Highway 118, on 1,869 acres of the scenic Davis Mountains is the Davis Mountains State Park with many attractions for the traveler.

In the blink of an eye, we are at the McDonald Observatory, one of the outstanding observatories in the world. The mountaintop complex consists of five telescopes varying in size from 30 inches in diameter to 107 inches. Plans for a new 340-inch telescope are underway. When completed in 1995, it will be the world's second largest telescope.

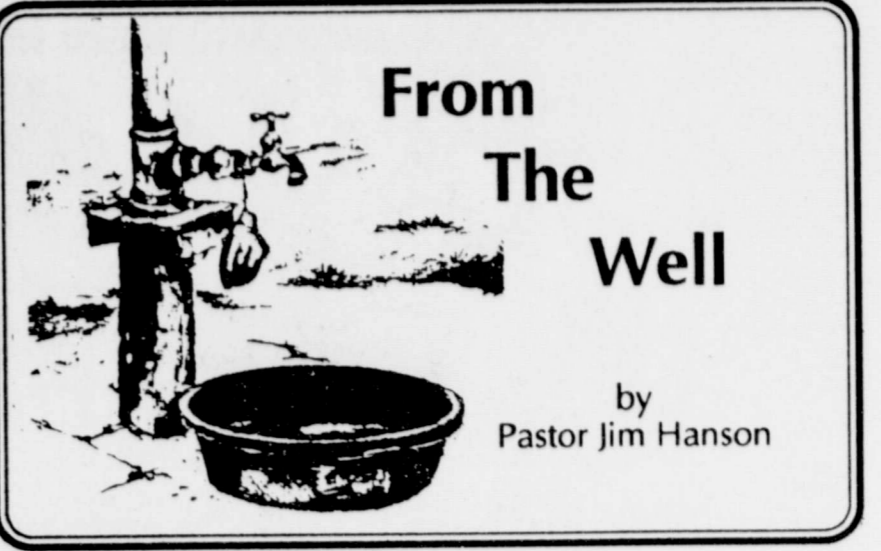

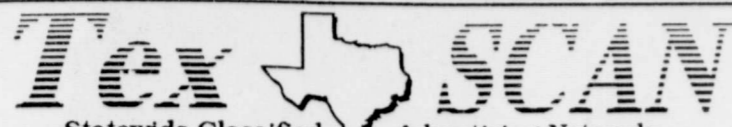

Farmers Home to elect new area committee members

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will begin accepting nominations April 2, 1993 for election of area committee members under new rules that make it easier for farmers to qualify as candidates and to vote, Bruce R. Bailey said today.

FmHA county committees perform a variety of duties for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's credit agency, including deciding whether an applicant is eligible for a farm loan.

"One important change broadens the definition of a farmer to anyone who has an interest in a farm in the county as owner, tenant or sharecropper," Bailey said. "The new definition also includes the spouse of an eligible farmer."

An old requirement that more than half of the candidate's income must come from the farm operation has been dropped.

"The nominating period has been extended to 45 days from the

previous 25 days, thus allowing more opportunity for people to run for the committee," Bailey said. "At least three eligible farmer voters, including the nominee, must sign the petition."

Two of the three committee members are elected by farmers in the county, and one is appointed by FmHA. One of the elected seats is to be filled for a three-year term at this year's election, which is scheduled for June 30.

"Another important change this year is that one member of the committee can be an active FmHA farm borrower, or be eligible for an FmHA farm loan," Mr. Bailey said. "Previously, this was not allowed."

Anyone interested in running for the committee can obtain a petition and other information from the FmHA county office at 3400-B S. 14th St., Abilene, Texas, Bailey said.

The Society also has information on resources offered by other local organizations. In the last fiscal year, 22 patients were provided with \$1,652 in services.

The Need for Funds

The American Cancer Society nationwide provides more money for cancer research than any other organization outside the federal government. Yet, due to a lack of funds, the Society was only able to fund 11% of the research grants submitted during the 1990-91 fiscal year. A portion of the money raised helps support research projects. Last year, the North Runnels Unit raised \$6,025.
