

I heard about something new description of what someone the other day, and I thought I would share it with you.

A new technique for plugging tubulars (for a variety of purposes) has been developed and is commercially viable.

Ice plugs are the newest thing, and the sheer simple elegance of the application really makes one admire the application of a new idea to an old problem.

There are several reasons to plug-off tubing or casing or line pipe, and many times, a temporary plug is desired. For example, an operator might want to fix a leak in a flow line, but she would normally have to shut-off the line's source and then drain the oil or water into some receptacle. With this new technology, she could put a freeze plug in the line on both sides of the leak and then just drain a very minuscule amount and fix the leak

After she is finished, she can thaw the plugs and everything is back on line, with the melted plugs mixed into the flow stream without any problem.

The same principle can be applied to gas pipelines, tubing, casing, and other situations where tubulars are involved. The ice plugs normally do not cause damage to the pipework, and they can be removed without causing damage, as well. In typical mechanical plugs used in tubulars, pipe scarring, stretching, and deformation can occur.

Typically, the plugs are liquid nitrogen at -321 degrees F. There have been applications where plugs have been used to pressure test tubing to 3500 psi. Some plugs can be held in place for several days.

The machinery required to place the plugs in place are very similar to a mobile dry ice machine with special attachments to insert the plugs into tubulars by injecting liquid nitrogen which solidi-

needs to form a temporary plug that may be discarded with ease.

To me, that points up the fact that all the good ideas haven't been taken. There always seems to be another good idea from someone persistent and stubborn enough to believe they have a better idea for solving a problem.

There are also attachments to heat the plugs to allow dissolution into the flow stream. Cooling devices are usually attached to the tubular to keep the plugs cool until the operator is ready to thaw the plugs.

The application of this technology is limited to surface or shallow applications, mainly due to the heat encountered downhole. But, several companies are working on heat transfer devices that would allow maintenance of low temperatures by removing heat from downhole tubulars by means of a device connected at the surface.

The downhole applications would be many. Retrievable bridge plugs would be almost obsolete, as freeze plugs would take their place with a lot less cost and hassle. Any situation for a temporary plug would be an application for the ice plugs.

The simplicity of using ice to temporarily plug off a part of a section of pipe is so simple and smart, it causes me to ask why someone didn't think of it sooner. After all, ice is hard and solid for a while, then it melts and it is easy to wash away. That is a perfect

### **Ozie Mae Allen Stanley**



"Dan Quale was right." I could hardly believe my eyes. After the beating he took by the media last fall when he dared to say the truth, that our biggest problem in this country was not the economy, but the breakdown of the family. And that Murphy Brown was not the way to go. The media had a great time putting Dan down. And exalting Murphy Brown.

But, there it was, in bold print on the cover of The Atlantic, a rather sophisticated eastern magazine. These words, "Dan Quale was right," was the title of the cover story. Barbara Dafoe Whitehead writes the story. Some excerpts are: "After decades of public dispute about so called family diversity, the evidence from social science research is coming in: The dissolution of two parent families, though it may benefit the adults involved, is harmful to children and dramatically

Some of the evidence she cites is overwhelming. "Children in single parent families are six times as likely to be poor (and) two to three times as likely as children of two parent families to have emotional and behavioral problems. They are also more likely to drop out of school, to get pregnant as teenagers, to abuse drugs, and to be in trouble with the law."

Contrary to popular belief, many children do not "bounce back" after divorce or remarriage. Children who grow up in single parent or step parent families are less successful as adults, particularly in the two domains of life, love and work, that are most essential to happiness.

It is true. The traditional two parent family, father and mother and children, is the best. Scott Peck, a famous counselor and writer once told an audience of 2,000 professional counselors, "The greatest invention of western civilization is parents, one father and one mother for every child." One of the "Big Ten", one of the commandments says, "Honor your father and your mother, that is may go well with thee, and thou mayest live long upon the earth that the Lord thy God giveth thee." This commandment assumes the traditional two parent family.

To be sure, our parents weren't perfect. But, like it says in "What You Owe Your Child" by Willard Sperry, dean of the Harvard Divinity School, "We now know that our parents' theology was founded on mistaken geology, biology, astronomy, and history. We are quite clear that their morality was too largely a matter of taboos, repressions, inhibition, and the like. We know that in many matters they were wrong where we are right, and yet there was a right in their wrongness that bothers us. We look into their faces as their pictures hang on our walls, and we have the disquieting suspicion that, in spite of our gains in scientific accuracy, they were better men and women than we are." During wars, Aggies mustered in foxholes, on the battlefield, aboard ships, in airplanes and in medical hospitals. In World War II, a muster was held on Corregidor Island shortly before the Japanese captured it in 1942.

Every muster ceremony is the same, Vanicek reported. Texas Aggies pay their respects to all those who are absent because of death since the last muster. When the names of the honored dead are called from the muster roll, a friend of the deceased answers "Here."






