LULAC files suit against WISD

Group cites need for single member districts

A lawsuit was filed in Federal Court on May 11 challenging the method of electing members of the board of trustees of the Winters Independent School District. The lawsuit, filed by the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC), claims that the method of electing members of the board of trustees discriminates against the minority community.

Yvonne Blackshear, President of the Runnels County LULAC Council 658 said, "This lawsuit is of great importance to the minority community. The minority community has a right to elect candidates of their choice. I hope the school district is not offended by the filing of this suit, we want to work with them; we ask that the Winters ISD do what many other school districts have done, like

the McCamey ISD, go to single member districts."

The Winters ISD has a Hispanic population of 1,040 or 25.3% and a Hispanic student population of 333 or 39%. There are no minorities on the school board.

Joe Guajardo, vice-president of Runnels County LULAC further states, "it is felt that if single member districts were created, as they have been in many other communities, the minority community would have a better chance to run and elect candidates of their choice."

The lawsuit was filed at the San Angelo Federal Courthouse, claiming that the election system used by the Winters ISD violates the Federal Voting Rights Act.

Similar lawsuits have been successfully prosecuted in Midland ISD, San Marcos ISD, Hitchcock, and the Lamar ISD.

Mr. Tommy Lancaster, Superintendent, issued the following statement in response to the lawsuit filed against Winters Independent School District in Federal Court May 11 challenging the method of electing members of the board of trustees.

"Until contacted by the Winters Enterprise, I was unaware that a lawsuit was being prepared to be filed or being filed challenging the method of electing members of the board of trustees.

I am aware that on December 17, 1992 correspondence was received from Yvonne Blackshear, President of the runnels County LULAC #658 requesting information on enrollment, staff, and the minority representatives within Winters ISD jobs; and that on January 11, 1993 a letter was mailed to Ms. Blackshear informing her that the information she had requested had been gathered. In this letter I requested that she contact me to schedule a meeting so that we could discuss the information we have available, and so that I could answer any questions she might have concerning Winters ISD.

I am disappointed by the manner in which the filing of the lawsuit was handled. I regret that Ms. Blackshear chose not to respond to my invitation to sit down and work together on the issue of single member districts. The filing of this lawsuit will needlessly cost the taxpayers of this district thousands of dollars in attorneys fees."

OIL BUSINESS . . .

What is the deal with gas prices? Prices have stayed above \$2 per thousand cubic feet (MCF) despite moving into the warmer spring. They are up almost 70 percent from where they were last spring. If oil prices had increased that much, they would be roughly \$34 per barrel. Just what is going on?

Lots of things, I think. (Profoundly put, don't you think?)

First, the winter of 1992-93 was colder and longer (across the U.S.) than any winter since 1987. The late-winter blizzard that blasted the Eastern seaboard put an exclamation point on it by extending peak gas needs through March. The net result of the cold winter was that gas users were reminded that gas supplies can get tight in a hurry if the demand is there.

Secondly, gas storage by pipelines and others has fallen about 350 billion cubic feet below year earlier levels. This means there is a greater call on producers' gas to refill that storage to its normal levels.

And, thirdly, the underlying factors that make a good case for gas being an important fuel for the future (cheap, clean, plentiful here, etc.) are being believed by more and more folks.

Add this to the fact that drilling for gas reserves in this country are almost nil, and you have the realization that the ability to deliver gas to meet demand is at a critical point. It is now possible for demand to outstrip deliverability at any short-term juncture where demand spikes and over the long term as demand grows and reserves shrink.

True to its free-market tendencies in the Mercantile Exchange of New York, the price for gas has risen and remained high because it is a valuable commodity with a tight fit between supply and demand with growth in demand expected in the future.

Now the follow-up to our lead question concerning gas prices: will operators start drilling for more gas?

Some will and some won't. (I have a way with words, don't I?)

As usual, major oil companies will be slow about it. They will discuss and consider and reconsider. Meanwhile, independents, the bold ones with some cash, anyway, will start moving to take advantage of the situation.

Companies like Mitchell Energy and Enron are already gearing up in the Gulf of Mexico and onshore Texas to start new gas drilling programs. They are also considering zones where gas is behind pipe in existing wells to be put on in short order as gas prices increase.

Finally, majors like Amoco (biggest gas reserves of any U.S. company) will finally pick up steam in building a new gas development plan. But, remember, they were burned during the mid-80's trying to gear up too early for the coming gas boom. They and other majors jumped on a bandwagon that said getting into gas in 1985 was a shrewd move because

the gas bubble (a big one at the time) "couldn't last much longer".

What happened is that they were stuck with some gas production selling for less than a dollar per MCF. Kinda left a bad taste in their mouth, you know what I mean? As a result, they will move slowly back onto the bandwagon. But, believe me, when they start moving back toward gas, it will be a stampede in a hurry—majors like the supposed safety of numbers.

All in all, the market is working quite well at present. The demand for gas and the perception of future demand is sending a signal to operators of all kinds. This signal is price, and it says there is some profit to be made in gas these days.

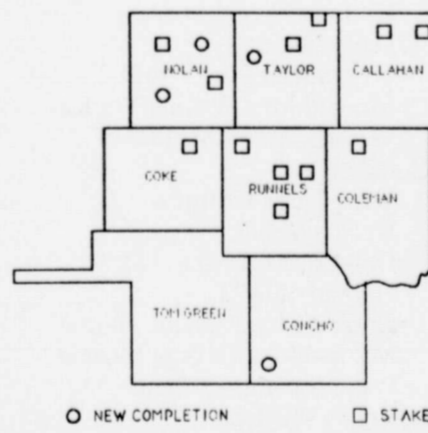

Baby Jack has been out several times to get in a little farming and ranching, but he'd really rather just take a nap under the shade of his John Deere cap. The rest of the family can't wait to begin teaching Jack all the ropes when he is a little older.

Steve and Penny both continue to say "Beware of blind dates."

For sure, they can become permanent arrangements.

From The Well

Mother's Day has been on my mind. The memory part of my mind has been drawing deep from the well. Memories of mother are surfacing.

She loved being wife and mother. She was the "Marie" part of "Art and Marie." What a gift they were to God's family, the church. For 40 plus years, they served in Minnesota and South Dakota. They started out in a six point parish headquartered in Middle River, Minnesota. Their first home was an abandoned bank building which had neither running water or an indoor toilet. It really didn't matter all that much to mother. She had a heart for her husband and made him a home. Their last home was a modest one in Moorehead, Minnesota, where they retired after Dad had been a bishop for eleven years. She loved her husband and was there for him wherever they lived.

She was always there for us, "the boys." She had no daughters, just four sons. After the second son was born the doctor said, "No more children. It isn't possible for you to have any more." Six years later she made a false prophet of that good man by giving birth to me. And five years later my kid brother John was born. All of us were wanted, prayed for, and loved. And we knew it.

Home was where mother was. When I was a kid coming home from school or play, when my feet hit the top step of the back porch and my right hand grabbed the back door, my first word was, "Mother?" I yelled it into the empty spaces of the house. And like an echo, her reply, "I'm here." Only she hung on to that word, "here" until all the empty spaces were filled and I knew she was there. For me. For us. Present. Home is where the heart is. Mother was the heart of our home. Even in her last years, when her home was a room in a nursing home, when I'd come in and say, "Mother", she'd reply "Jim", and I knew I was home again.

After she was engaged to dad, and before they were married, she taught school. High school mathematics and some Latin. She was an excellent teacher. Years later she tutored me at home, all the way through algebra, geometry, and "trig." And when John was having trouble learning how to read, she spent hours each day coaxing the syllables and the words into his head.

But the greatest lessons she taught were not book learning. Not head knowledge. Heart knowledge. "Do your best, work hard, trust God, love your brothers, be faithful, and forgive and forget." Every meal we ate was consecrated, filled with her love. Every time I smell fresh baked bread, it reminds me of her. One time for my birthday, she made me a whole apple pie, just for me. Oh, she could discipline. Her love was tough at times. It had to be, because love endures.

When she died, there was literally nothing left. She had given it all away. But her greatest legacy and my greatest inheritance was her gift of love. To me. To all of us. And it will never run out. Because as the apostle Paul say, "Love never ends." I am so blessed.

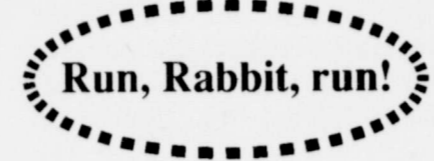

Texas Wheat Growers get new weapon against damaging pests

Wheat insects like Russian wheat aphid and grasshopper take their toll on Texas's 6.2 million-acre wheat crop each year. A 1991 study by a task force of state university researchers estimated the economic impact of Russian wheat aphid in the Western United States at \$675 million from 1987-1991. The tiny insect sucked \$833,000 from Texas wheat growers in 1991 alone in a relatively light infestation year. But, a recent action by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency gives wheat growers here a new weapon in this tough battle.

Lorsban* 4E insecticide has just been conditionally registered by the EPA for control of aphids, including Russian wheat aphid,

and grasshoppers in wheat. The registration covers 16 states, including Texas.

According to John Fitt, product development manager for DowElanco in Indianapolis, Ind., the product has been used successfully on wheat insects in several states over the last few years under emergency use labels. The new conditional registration for Lorsban* 4E grants a federally approved label for key wheat growing states.

Fitt says applications of Lorsban* 4E on wheat must be made in full compliance with the federal label. Interested wheat growers can get more information from their local ag chemical dealer.
