# Members reconstruct Country Club bridge

Volunteer workers can take pride and credit in the recent work and renovation to the bridge across Bluff Creek, located at Winters Country club.

Much history and many fond memories trace this bridge back to the original "suspension" bridge that was replaced in 1973.

This needed improvement to the current bridge was made possible by both volunteer workers, which included; Donald McWright, L.C. Hounsel, Cotton Hubbard and James "Pee Wee" Gehrels, as well as the ABC Scrambler and Bill Hall.

If you are at the Winters County Club, look to your left as you go in the Clubhouse and on the wall is a framed sketch of the original Clubhouse and golf course. It shows how the original site and grounds looked in 1926.

The sketch depicts two "sushouse porch.



Some interesting news about finding costs came out just recently, and it shoots a few holes in the theory that development costs are too high in the U.S--maybe.

You see, the conventional wisdom (if there is such a thing) lately has said that the reason all of the big boys are going overseas is that finding costs are so much lower outside of the U.S. A recent study shows that finding costs (costs of exploration, development, etc.) related to new reserves from discoveries, extensions, revisions, etc. are quite competitive between North American and the rest of the world.

An oil analyst's report released in late May says that U.S. finding costs were approximately \$4.82 per barrel, while costs in the rest of the world were \$4.64 per barrel for 1992. The North Sea average was a horrendous \$8.05 per bar-

The significance of this report and its findings are obvious. If everyone has been saying that the reason for going overseas is to lower costs per barrel, then this report would suggest that this might not be a smart thing to accept as a rule. In fact, it might be another case of 'herd mentatility' where everyone does something because everyone else is doing it.

I think a study such as this points up the fact that there are some good things that are happening right here at home as far as reserves finding is concerned and not all good things happen 'over there'. In the same breath, I also realize the study may have some flaws.

For instance, acquisitions are included in the calculations, and this might skew the domestic finding costs to the low end because many properties have been on the market here and some low prices have been set. Also, many of the largest international reserve additions will come later as some really big fields start to be worked on by American companies.

With that said, it is still very important to understand that the major cost reduction efforts that have been going on domestically are bearing fruit. They are the reason that the calculated costs are getting even close to competitive. Companies, especially independents are poised to take advantage of the decreasing competition in the American market.

This will mean some major money and some major reserves will be found by those willing to go after it. Let's see who gets there first.

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



gins with grandfather Christopher Frederick II, called Chris, one of the twins born to Christopher F. "Kit" Young and Frances Ann Donoho, on July 14, 1862, in Johnson County. It is doubtful if the twins' father could leave the Civil War to see them.

The twins' mother did not have enough milk to nurse both children. Their grandfather, Richard Young, provided a Negro "nannie" to help care for them. She nursed Chris while Frances Ann nursed Fanny.

Chris told his children stories about his German grandmother who couldn't speak English. She made the children tea-cakes.

Chris married Nancy Ann Thurman on October 23, 1895, at Harper in Kimble County. His wife said that Chris had "hair as black as a crow and eyes as blue as the sky."

He was of slight build and his shoe was a mere size six. He was quiet and hated arguments. When his step-father and his father-inlaw, Jack Thurman, were present, there was often a heated discussion, usually about some passage of scripture. When Chris's father did not return from the Civil War his mother married I.G. Young, his father's brother.

Nancy Hart recalls a story about

Chris and his twin sister, Fanny. The preacher was an honored guest at the Young's for a Sunday much, he hoped that he choked because all of the good pieces would be gone before the children were served. Sure enough, the preacher choked. The twins were frightened thinking they had

Due to a lack of educational opportunities in growing up, Chris was unable to read. He and Nancy had few books until they found a Bible that had fallen from a traveling salesman's wagon. Afterwards, they often sat around the table with a coal-oil lamp while she read to him. Nancy taught her husband how to write his name.

Before there was a road between London and Harper in Kimble County, Chris helped a covered wagon across the Blue Mountains. ## **Control white** grubs in lawns

Timing of treatment for white grubs in lawns is approaching in the Concho Valley. The whitegrub is the larval form of an insect commonly known as the May or June beetle.

They live in the soil and feed on grass roots. Their feeding causes the grass to die in irregular-shaped areas and the grass can be rolled back like a carpet.

There are several ways to determine if your lawn has white grubs. You could wait until the irregular-shaped brown areas show up and you roll the sod back like a carpet, but this may be too late. The best way is to take a shovel or knife and cut a flap (one square foot of grass) on 3 sides in the grass and roll the flap back. Examine the roots in the upper 4 inches of soil for white grubs. Make this test in several different places in the lawn during earlymid July. If you find more than 2-3 grubs per square foot of sod, an insecticide treatment is needed.

The best time to treat for white grubs are when the grub worms are less than 1/2 inch long and located within the top one inch of soil. This should be around July 5 to July 20. A second treatment around August 25 may be needed if small grubs (less than 1/2 inch in body length) are present in the top one inch of soil.


Some suggested insecticides for white grub control include: Triumph®, diazion, Oftanol®, or Dursban<sup>®</sup>. Triumph<sup>®</sup> is only available to commercial applica-

What could be more fun on a hot early summer afternoon than to drive north to Albany, Texas and take in the "Fandangle"? In case you are wondering what a "Fandangle" is, don't look it up in the dictionary. I did, and it said "a Spanish dance or a foolish act." What you do to discover what it means is to go to one and experience if for yourself. We did, Aref, our city manager, Ramona and I. And it was neither a Spanish dance or a foolish act. It was a great experience.

The Fort Griffin Fandangle is the name for a whole town production of a musical "documentary" in which they celebrate a piece of their own history. It takes place in an open air playhouse with the stars and the moon for roof and the stage is an acre or more of grass. You can see and hear everything. The actors and actresses are locals and one of the most exciting scenes is when a big bunch of longhorn steers are moved onto the stage, rounded-up, and moved out while a cowboy sings his cattle song.

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Of course, the Fandangle had a good beginning. The first script was written by a home town boy who made good. Robert E. Nail went east for his education and came up a good writer and producer of plays, on or near Broadway. But, after a couple of years in the big city, and making a name for himself, he decided to come back to Albany where he dedicated the rest of his life to his mother and to his home town. It was he who put it all together, using home town talent, and first class writing and directing and producing. He died in 1968, and this is what is said of him, "In this 20th century, it is not rare to find some man or some woman who has given something of his or her talents for the benefits of others. It is rare, however, to find a person who has dedicated all of his life, his energies, his intellect, his vision, his funds, and his accomplishments to the betterment of his community and its citizenry." No wonder the Fandangle continues, its good beginning sank roots deep into the minds of the whole town.

What a production it was, beginning just at dark! An older couple, who narrated the script, rode in on a horse drawn wagon, and the lady, Connie Parker, read from the poem, "Cattle", written by Berta Hart Nance, a native of Albany,

"Other states were carved or born

Texas grew from hide and horn.

Other states are long and wide,

Texas is a shaggy hide.'

The poem is longer, but I included these to give you the feel for the night. Horses and riders, cowboys and Indians, soldiers and settlers, Indian villages and army camps, courthouses, churches, and saloons. The city manager of Albany said, "You won't find anybody at home in Albany these nights. Everybody is in the production."

Who knows if Albany would even be here today if it were not for the Fandangle. It produced a lot of good fruit, good community spirit, good schools, good stores, a first class museum. When you go deep into the well of every person, you find something beautiful. And when you give everyone a part in the production, it has got to be good!

# **Pest Management News**

### GENERAL SITUATION

Hot and Windy. Winds have been terrible all week and have really hampered producers spraying overwintered boll weevils. Weevils can still easily be found in cotton fields which are adjacent to pastures. Grain sorghum looks good with very little insect problems, but with the weather conditions the way they are, a rain would be a welcome sight for many area sorghum fields.

### COTTON

Overwintered boll weevils Most fields planted on or near the planting date have received their first weevil treatment and are getting ready for their second shot. The big questions are: How many days between applications? Answer: Four days normally and no more than 5 days apart.

How many applications will be necessary: Answer: Who knows for sure. I feel if you are in an area somewhat distant from overwintering habitat probably two applications 4 days apart will be sufficient. If your field is adjacent to prime overwintering habitat (creek bottoms, northern Runnels County) two applications may be necessary if scouts continue to find live overwintered weevils in the field and/or fresh feeding

Is a band application still recommended: Answer: Yes, if the wind is not blowing; but with the current windy conditions band applications are not recommended. It is advisable to go to a

broadcast application or 3 nozzle per row. Cone nozzles are great if you are using drops and 3 nozzles per row. If you are using the broadcast boom, it is recommended to use a flat fan nozzle. This reduces drift because of the larger droplet size.

### BOLLWORMS/BUDWORM

Normally we get our first flurry of bollworms around the first week in July. Scouts are picking up a few bollworm eggs in the field now, but nothing to be alarmed about yet. Remember, there is alot of mortality of small worms prior to bloom because of poor plant canopy and other factors. With the weather conditions as they are now, worms will have a difficult time of surviving in pre-blooming cotton.

If you are in a situation where you are treating for weevils and have a significant number of bollworm eggs present, you may consider using an ovicide such as OVASYN at 1/8 lb./acre. Egg counts should be very high to economically justify this treatment though, and cotton should be in the blooming stage.

### **FLEAHOPPERS**

Fleahoppers numbers remain low for the most part. Cotton is loading up well and we certainly want it to continue. Watch square sets closely now, we would like to keep square sets in the mid to upper 80 percentile during the first two weeks of squaring. If square sets drop below 75% during the first 3 weeks of squaring something is wrong somewhere.

Dimethoate, Orthene MSR, and others are quite effective against fleahoppers.

The economic threshold is 15 to 20 fleahoppers in combination with a 75% square set or less.

### COTTON APHIDS

Cotton aphids can be found in some fields, but at very low levels. We want a few out there anyway to feed our beneficial population. Please don't get excited about the aphids right now. Remember, if conditions are conducive to rapid aphid build up it is usually around the end of July to mid-August. We will continue to monitor aphid population closely and I don't feel like they will increase rapidly right now.

FMC has been given a 24(c) labeling for the use of Furadan®4F for cotton aphid control. The rate is 1/2 pint (.25 lb.) per acre. A maximum of two applications per season may be made. Use a minimum of 2 gallons of finished spray/acre by air or 10 gallons of finished spray/acre by ground application. Restrictions will be discussed next week.

### SCOUT SAFETY

The safety of our field scouts is extremely important. If you spray a field which is in the scouting program, please let them know beforehand so they will not be exposed to the pesticides. Read all labels or the cotton guide for reentry intervals.


