## Rock Hotel receives \$50,000 gift

A gift of \$50,000 given toward the restoration of the Rock Hotel was announced at a coffee held October 7.

Mac Sayles introduced the program at the Rock Hotel. The program was the presentation of the generous gift from the estate of Eunice Gardner Lail, the only daughter of Walter and Lilly Gardner, a pioneer Runnels County family. Eunice was the twin sister to the late Bernice Gardner.

1889. He taught school at Antelope and was a first teacher at Baldwin School when it was built in 1902. He was married to Lilly Brown and they continued living here their entire lives, supporting the town and churches.

Jim said that "Sis" (Eunice) always loved Winters and upon retirement she returned to Texas from California with husband, Ernest. She also contributed many personal items to the Z.I. Hale Museum.

The Rock Hotel is part of the museum complex. Originally built in Runnels City, the hotel was moved to Winters in 1909 when the Santa Fe Railroad bypassed Runnels City and the Abilene & Southern Railroad was built through Winters.

The Rock Hotel lasted longer than Runnels City, which disappeared after it lost the county courthouse to Ballinger. The hotel stayed in business until it was purchased in 1987 by the Z.I. Hale Museum board.

The hotel is being renovated into a meeting place for community events.

### "Sis always loved Winters"

### WISD board burning the midnight oil school settles LULAC suit

The Winters Independent School District Board of Trustees voted on October 5 to settle the lawsuit with The League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC), in exchange for paying the plaintiff's attorney.

Business manager Jimmy Butlersaid that the offer of \$6,513 was made and the school board accepted the offer.

LULAC sued the WISD in San Angelo's federal district court last May, seeking to abolish the present at-large system of representation on the school board. LULAC claimed that the current system discriminates against Hispanics.

In other business, the board members voted to adopt the 1993

tax rate at \$1.26.

The published tax rate was to be \$1.29. The \$1.26 is made up of \$1.05 for maintenance and operation and \$0.21 rate for debt service.

The school board held a public meeting on the tax rate on September 28 at the WISD administration office. No one attended the public meeting.

A resolution was adopted to join the "Suitable Provision" lawsuit.

This lawsuit pertains to the state's part in school funding. The state is regulated to put money into the school system and this has not been the case.

## OIL BUSINESS . . .

If you've ever had kids, you know the routine.

Two kids in the back seat arguing over control of the roadmap, or whatever. Both want it desperately, although the reasoning behind the "want" is somewhat murky. When one gets it, depending on your arbitrary ruling, of course, that one no longer desires it nearly as much as he or she did a few moments ago when the other one wanted it.

We adults are the same, in many ways, as history will show.

Back in the 1920's, no one wanted to have anything to do with the desert wasteland known as the Middle East. It was too far away from London, Washington, D.C., Paris or Berlin for any of the major powers of the day to handle in a profitable way. It was dusty and inhospitable, and it was filled with strange people with funny non-Christian customs.

Sure, it was good to have on the old scorecard during the empire-building days, but money was getting tighter and just "having" a country was no longer a good enough reason to have it.

How does this relate to the kids in the back seat fighting over a map?

I can guess what will happen, and it will be a lot like my kid in the back seat who finally gets what they think they want. They no longer really want it very bad. As a matter of fact, if there is not money or power to be had out of the Middle East, I imagine we'll all drop 'em like a hot camel burger.

What will come of all our promises to make the Middle East a better place, a more democratic place? Will we still be as concerned with human rights and the quality of life there?

I guess I'm being a little negative; but, hey, I've got a lot of time on my hands.

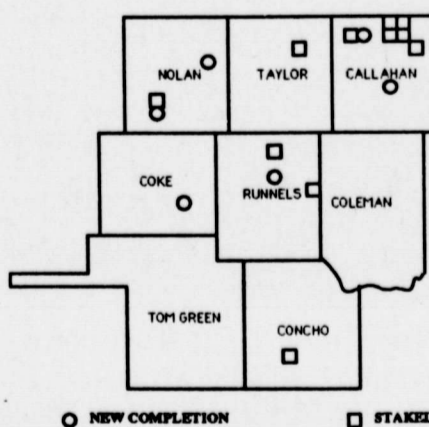

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## WISD board lowers tax rates; tax payments increase

In the October 5th school board meeting, the WISD board of trustees set the tax rate at \$1.26 per hundred dollars of valuation.

This tax rate is three cents lower than last year's tax rate of \$1.29. Last year's rate was \$1.046 for the County Education District (CED) and \$.24 for the WISD.

The CED was determined to be illegal by the courts this past January, and the Texas State Legislature abolished the CED in favor of a new school funding plan.

In abolishing the CED, an extra homestead exemption was also taken away. The school district has had, and still has, a \$5,000 homestead exemption. The CED carried another 20% of homestead valuation for exemption from taxes.

Now this exemption is gone. This could mean that with a lower tax rate, a property owner could be paying more taxes.

For example, a \$30,000 home carried as a homestead would have paid \$259.74 in taxes in 1992. For 1993, that homeowner will pay \$315. in taxes.

### Aid for Wool and Mohair Producers

The House of Representatives has passed an amendment which will permit wool producers to receive incentive payments for the 1993 crop of wool.

This is in response to recent Senate action that would have retroactively killed the program for the 1993 production year.

The amendment which was adopted eliminates funding for the 1994 wool and mohair incentive program, but will allow producers in the 1993 program to receive their payments.

In Texas there are 16,000 producers in 35 West Texas counties producing more than 90 percent of the nation's mohair and 25 percent of the country's wool.

The American Sheep Industry Association has estimated that 25 to 30 percent of the nation's 125,000 producers would be lost if this program is abandoned.

The \$55.26 increase is a 21.3 percent increase. This percentage will vary between 20 percent and 50 percent in tax dollars paid even if your 1993 tax valuation is the same as 1992.

The school board lowered the tax rate by three cents to help compensate for this tax increase. Not all properties have homestead exemptions so that was the rate necessary to bring in the budgeted amount of revenue.

The total tax revenue for WISD will be approximately the same for 1993 as it was in 1992.

## Three years of work and dreams

The formal opening and dedication of the Z.I. Hale Museum on August 1, 1982, was the culmination of three years of work and planning on the part of many interested persons in Winters and the surrounding area.

It all began on May 23, 1979, when 24 people met and agreed to form a museum foundation in response to letters sent out by Mrs. Marvin Dozier, Project Committee Chairman for the Chamber of Commerce. Temporary officers named were Marvin Jones, Chairman and Edna England, Secretary.

Those attending became charter members and a nominating committee was selected. Announcement was made that Mrs. Z.I. Hale and daughters, Dr. Martha Hale and Dickie Gerig, wished to donate the late Dr. Hale's clinic building, a two-story structure, to be used as a museum. Jones explained the steps to be taken in forming a museum board and plans were made to visit other museums in the area in order to become familiar with what could be done.

Joyce Bahlman became the first president and Prissy Dozier was elected secretary-treasurer. Events moved along and the Z.I. Hale Museum Foundation received a state charter as a non-profit, perpetual organization. The charter is dated July 24, 1979, with Homer Hodge as initial agent and Rankin Pace, Mildred Gardner, Jo Arnold and Nina Hale as trustees.

Chairmen for the several committees were named: Marvin Jones, by-laws and constitution; Roy Young, finance; Edna England, budget; Maurine Davis, renovation and Prissy Dozier, head of visits to other museums.

In September Glenda Morgan, a state museum field consultant, was in Winters for a day to work with directors and others interested in establishing and promoting the new museum.

In February Mrs. Hale deeded the office, on West Dale St., of her late husband to the city, who would in turn lease it to the museum foundation. She had been advised that the building being the property of the city would cause fewer problems in the future.

Gifts and memorials of money began to come in with the Winters State Bank financing remodeling work on the lobby of the museum. The Young Farmers also provided a substantial gift.

On April 8, a work day was declared in preparation for open house to show the public what had been accomplished and what was being planned. Walls had been paneled, woodwork painted and ceilings covered. All future meetings would be held in the museum.

Participants were all new at the job and began to feel the need of expert advice as to setting up exhibits and conducting programs. A conference was arranged with Carol Daffern, Curator of Exhibits at the Panhandle Plains Historical Museum in Canyon. She conducted a two-day workshop in November which was most profitable in continuing the work.

In November about 200 people visited the museum during the two-day open house held to coincide with the Arts and Crafts Festival. Beginning in December the museum was to be opened on the second Sunday of each month from 2 to 4 p.m.

On January 26, 1981, a work day was held for cataloging new items that had been given to the

museum. Roy Young was named curator to fill the unexpired term of Marvin Jones. Mrs. Dozier presented a complete financial report. Since opening, the museum had received a total of \$10,735.68 in contributions of which \$9,323.69 had been spent in refurbishing and upkeep, leaving a balance of \$1,397.55.

This was Prissy's last report. She died January 29 at the age of 49. Her wholehearted contribution to the community and her cheerful presence were so greatly missed that she was posthumously named Citizen of the Year for 1980 at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet. Her example gave museum members the determination to carry on. Mrs. Loyd Roberson took her place as secretary-treasurer.

In February open house featured a color slide presentation of interesting sights in Runnels County. New items were also displayed. A Prissy Dozier Memorial Day in March drew a large crowd. Floyd Sims conducted a program on coins and currency for the April open house.

New officers were elected in May: Estella Bredemeyer, President; Roy Young, Vice-President; Mary Margaret Leathers, Recording Secretary; Billie Alderman, Corresponding Secretary; and Edna England, Treasurer. Other officials were Mildred Gardner, curator; Joyce Bahlman and Dollie Airhart, exhibit directors; and Charlsie Poe, publicity. These officers were installed in June by Mrs. Charles Kruse.

The main theme of the museum is "Our Heritage," and other subjects are added as needed, such as: "Our Heritage in Agriculture" or "Our Heritage in Music," etc.

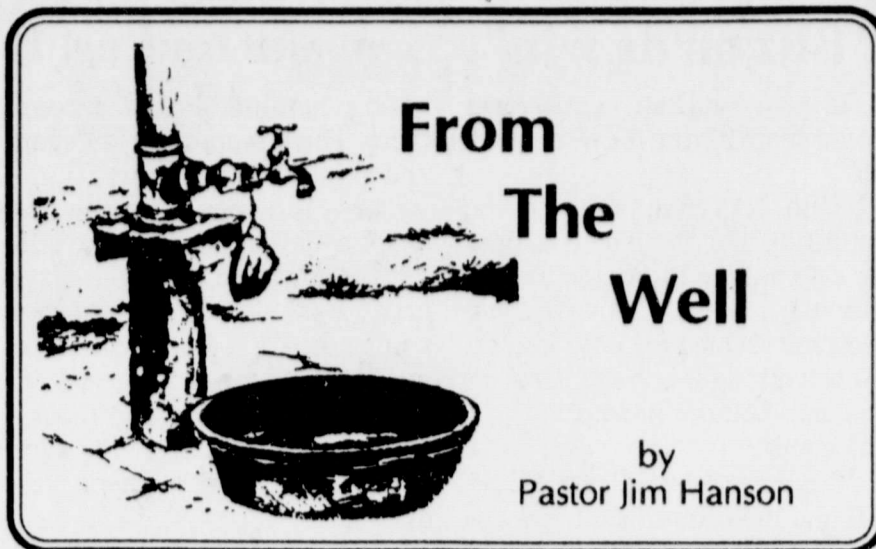

Saturday night I attended the reunion of the "Class of '43" of Winters High School. It was their 50th year. I was part of the program and ask to do something patriotic. Since I was a member of the "class of '46" of Brookings High School up in South Dakota, I really felt at home.

The evening was great! Lots of remembering, visiting, and joking. Our master of ceremonies was top notch, had a bale full of jokes and stories. Our music was a guitar picking "hill billy" type who soon had us all singing "The Red River Valley", "You Are My Sunshine", and some other classic old timers. Most everybody knew the tunes and could sing the words by heart. I wonder what the class of '93 will sing at their 50th. Now a days, a popular song has a shelf life of six months and most folks can neither hear nor sing the words. But we had a good meal and a good time. Opened and closed with prayer.

There's something special about the 40's. We hear a lot about the 50's. 50's parties, songs, clothing. To me it's the 40's. Perhaps it's because I was growing up in a small town those years. Maybe it was because as a nation, we were really united. We really did work together, work hard together. And we worshiped together. We did things as a family. And most of all, we were patriotic. We really believed in America. And whether we knew it or not at the time, we were really ready to fight for our country. A lot of it had to do with living in a small town or the country around it.

Back in 1946, Eric Sevareid, a CBS correspondent who spent much of World War II in Europe, wrote in his book "Not So Wild A Dream" about what it was like to grow up in the little North Dakota community of Vilva. He wrote, "America was involved in the world, all its little Vilvas were in the world, and the world in them, and neither the world or America would ever be the same...all that America truly meant, all that Americans perished for, would be devoid of consequence or portent unless the image of society that America showed the world was that of the little Vilvas as I had known, remembered, and cherished them."

It was from such communities, American youth went off to war carrying America's bright tools and great muscles, her giant voice and will. It was this country's destiny to "create a world in its own image, and he defined that image in terms of his small, rural, Midwestern hometown.

It was a difficult time. In many ways we weren't ready for World War II. We weren't ready to see our classmates and school mates leave before graduating to serve our country. Some members of the class of '43 never did graduate. As a country we were hardly prepared to fight on three fronts,

Africa, Asia, and Europe. But we did. And we won. How did it happen? Germany, Italy, and Japan had been preparing for years. Their war machines were fine tuned and ready for action. Ready to take the offensive. Ready to attack.

But we were much better prepared spiritually. We had grown up in tough times, in the great depression. We had learned how to work long hours for short wages. We had learned to live one day at a time, at home, at school, and at church. We valued our country, our nation, and our freedom. It was through that struggle, that adversity, that our character was formed.

Like the Apostle Paul says in Romans 5, "suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope." That's why we won. That's why the 40's were so great. Not in easiness. Not in money. Not in glitter and glamour. But in character and strength of soul. And when Katie Smith sang "God Bless America", we all joined in. We didn't have to be politically correct. We knew we were patriotically right! Spiritually right! We trusted in God. And God blessed America.

Thanks, class of '43 of Winters High, for inviting me. It brought up, from my well, remembrances and realities to stir up my soul.

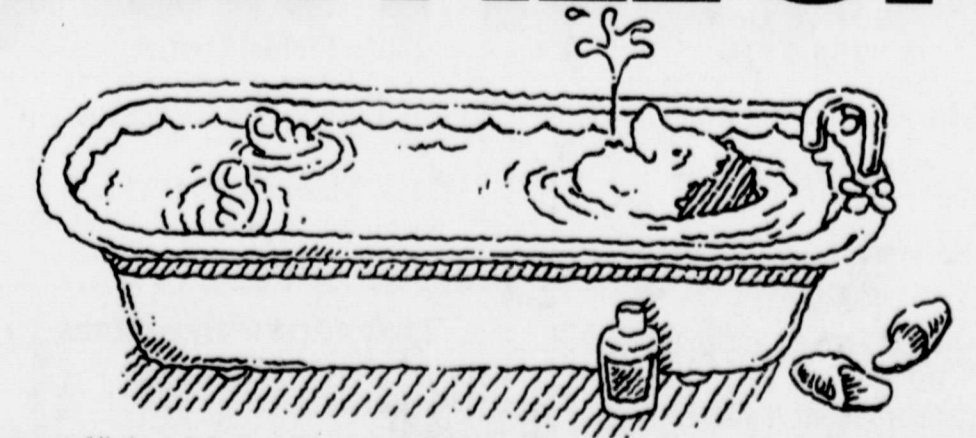

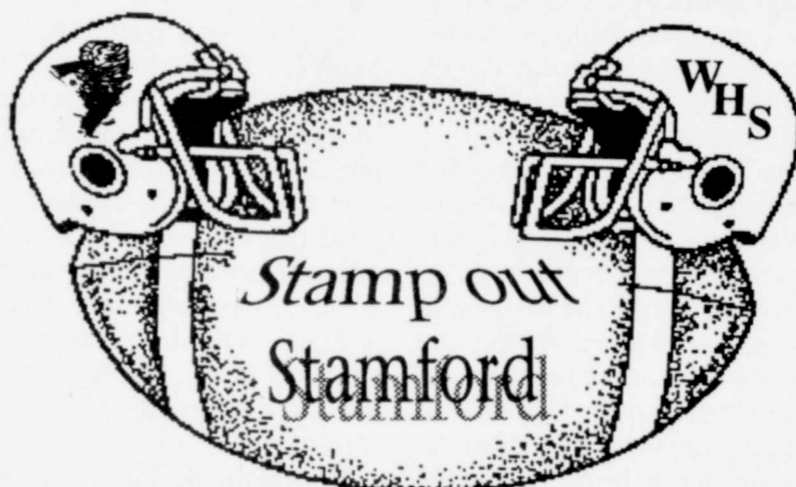

cake late in the 4th quarter by successfully attempting a 32 yard field goal. This was a big accomplishment.

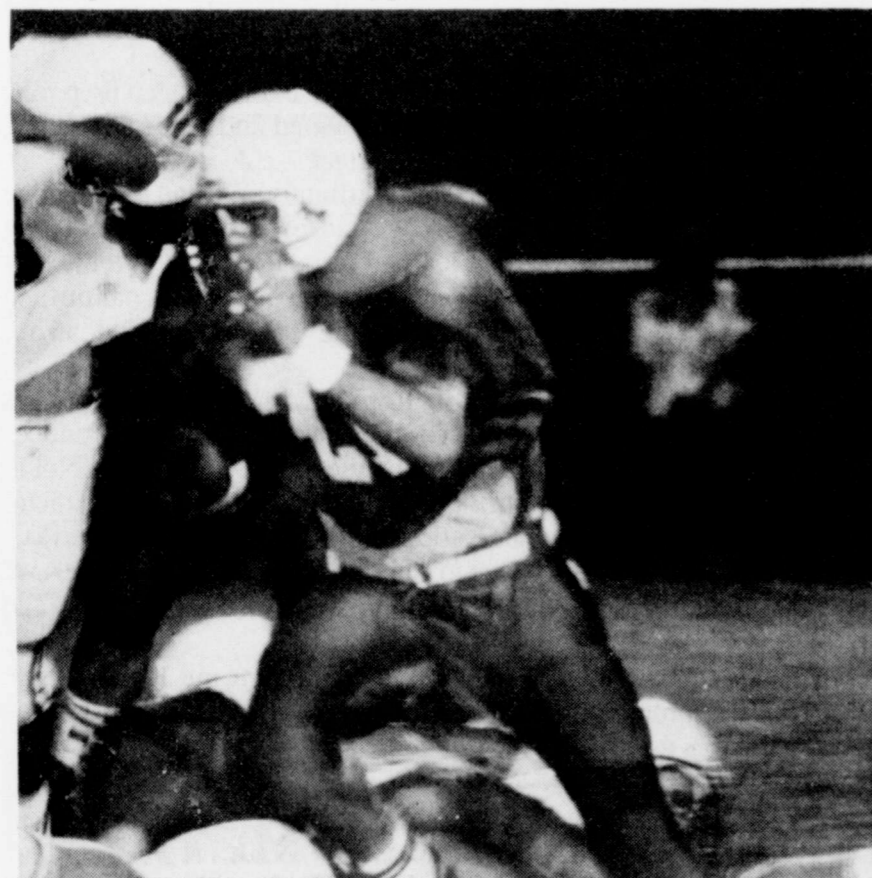

## Hunters from 17 surrounding areas eligible to participate in Big Buck Contest

The 10th annual Big Buck Contest is set and ready for another season.

Hunters from everywhere are being sought to make this year even bigger and better than ever before.

The annual event is open to all licensed hunters. And it features several categories and many prizes.

All proceeds from this year's event will benefit the West Texas Boys Ranch, West Texas Rehab, the Ballinger Livestock Show, the Winters Livestock Show, Christmas in April, and Crozier Memorial Library in Paint Rock.

Entry into this year's contest will be \$10 and deadline for entering is Nov. 1.

Some 21 prizes in six different categories will be given out this year.

Winner of the Big Buck contest will walk away with a 270 Remington BDL rifle.

Bucks will be judged one point per inch for basal circumference, length of main beam, and length of tines. Five points will be awarded for each tine over one-inch in length; five points for each inch of width from outside beam and half a point for each pound of field dressed weight. There is a six point minimum.

Spikes will earn five points for each inch of total length of both tines, and half point for each pound of field dress weight. Tines less than one inch will not disqualify the deer for a spike entry.

Does are graded half a point for each pound of field weight.

The oldest deer is determined by a point for each year of age,

and half point for field weight. The winner of the three doe category will be determined by adding the half point per field dressed pound for the total of the three does tagged with a single license.

Turkeys bagged will earn five points per inch of the length of the beard; or multiple beards. They will also earn half a point for each pound of field dressing weight.

A tie will be decided by drawing of names from a hat. Entries are not transferable, and an individual can only win one category.

All entries must be weighed in at Ballinger Wool and Mohair located at 610 Railroad Avenue in Ballinger.
