Audit shows school in good shape

In the annual audit of the Winters Independent School District (WISD), Davis, Kinard and Co., accounting firm from Abilene, found the financial status of the district sound.

Adequate reserves were available to the district, according to guidelines of the Texas Education Agency. With these reserves and good accounting practices by the district, the CPA firm pronounced WISD in good standing.

In other business of the regularly scheduled meeting on Thursday, December 16, the 1993 football gate receipts were reported. The 1993 receipts were \$1,872.67 less than 1992.

This decrease in revenue was attributed to cold weather during one game and the Jim Ned game being played at Tuscola.

The 1993 total gate receipts were \$14,347.33.

Larry Weise, the CAP High School principal, requested that the CAP school be allowed to remove the basketball goals inside the Wingate gym and install them at the CAP school. The trustees granted this request unanimously.

Winters School Superintendent Tommy Lancaster reported on the progress of the baseball fields. He stated things were moving along well but a sandy clay dirt was being hunted to fill the infield.



The domestic producing industry is under serious threat to take another severe blow from current low prices, but the Clinton administration has stepped forward with the answer to our problems.

Unfortunately, the answer is not much more than a "good luck with everything" nod in our direction. Not that that is any less than what the previous administration had to offer, but the currently elected 'circus of the stars' is much more adept at portraying it as a true solution. That is where we have to be careful.

What we are discussing in a decidedly off-hand manner is the Clinton administration's energy policy. It is a document that is long on words and short on action, but what else could be expected from a large conglomeration of attorneys such as those that inhabit the beltway.

The policy is much ballyhooed by Hazel O'Leary (remember her--the independents' friend?) as the cornerstone of a plan to take this country into the 20th century. What it really is, at least from my point of view, is a pile of hot air and nothing more. It promises a lot of benefit without naming it specifically or laying the pathway to get there. It is simply a nicely packaged bit of rhetoric that means nothing for real energy independence in this country.

It says that domestic production is something that is important, but it funds everything else (feebly at that) and says nothing about loosening the bonds of regulation on the domestic industry. It says natural gas is the fuel of the future, but it mandates the purchase of ethanol at a minimum level of the market while subsidizing the marginally economical and environmentally questionable fuel from corn.

It says what everyone wants to hear. It mentions security, stability, and a great environment, but it mandates and funds initiatives that undermine each and every one of these goals. It is a political document, so much so it is totally irrelevant to the real world.

The problem I mentioned at the beginning about it being sold as the answer to the domestic oil and gas business price dilemma is very dangerous. It, first of all, provides no answers for the price dilemma. It also is not a proper response to current events (i.e., the current price free fall). Where the problem lies is in the fact that the Washington crowd is going to point at this policy and say: "Hey, we tried to help you guys out but you blew it." They might also use it against the industry in the future when some of us complain about subsidizing other types of industry but ignoring oil and gas, or when some of us complain about unwanted government intervention (because we sure sound like we are asking for the government to help now, aren't we?).

The answer is to stop looking for any of those guys north of Amarillo to help the oil business. We have to do it ourselves, and we have to get the word out to the general public about who we really are and what we have done






The girls from Brownie Troop #163 and their leaders sang carols for our residents at supper time last week. They enjoyed your visit.

I love Christmas. I love the story. Mary, Joseph, and the babe lying in a manager. I think I must have memorized that story even before I learned John 3:6 by heart. I know that the first song I learned was "Away in a Manager." I didn't know the third verse then, but I sure do now. It is a wonderful prayer:

"Be near me Lord Jesus, I ask Thee to stay Close by me forever and love me, I pray. Bless all the dear children in thy tinder care And fit us for heaven to live with thee there."

The story of the birth of Jesus birthed many songs. I can't imagine Christmas without carols, and I can't imagine Christmas without going caroling. I can still remember the time when my dad said to me, "Tomorrow, you can go caroling with us." The men of First Lutheran Church in Brookings, South Dakota had a tradition. Every Christmas Day they would gather at the church at 5 a.m. There would be coffee and sweet rolls. They would practice one or two carols, one of which was "Silent Night." There would also be at least 40 or 50 Christmas baskets, each with the fixings for a full Christmas dinner. The baskets were loaded up, and with my dad in the car, they would go all over town, distributing the baskets to the poor and caroling each one. I can remember the smiles of gratitude coming out from the kitchen door as the delivery was made and the carols were sung. Then after all the deliveries were made, the men went home to their families and then came back to sing "Silent Night" at the 11:00 service. I was so proud to be among them. It got me started.

Since that time I have been almost addicted to caroling. There is something deeply mysterious and soul touching about singing Christmas carols to people in their homes, nursing homes, or hospitals. Wherever they are. When our kids were growing up, Ramona and I would take them with us and we would carol away most of Christmas Eve. We'd start after the Christmas Eve service. There were many times we didn't get around to our presents until the day after Christmas.

There is something really special about those songs, those carols. Just the other day at the Senior Citizens Nursing Home, Ramona and I were leading some of our friends there in singing carols. As I was passing out the song sheets, one of my friends said, "Oh, I don't need a song sheet, I can't sing." But, you know what? It wasn't more than one verse into "Joy to the World" and she surely was singing! And she sang them all, all the carols and all the verses. It was like some invisible angel had turned on a switch inside of her and the carols just came pouring out. On more than one occasion, I have seen a person, an older person, who doesn't seen to be "with it anymore", sitting in a wheel chair, dozing, oblivious to the world or so it seemed, "come to" by hearing the carols sung. And actually joining in the singing. Some deep chord within their soul, struck. And new life! Hope! Joy! The presence

The other night our community was blessed by a concert of Christmas music and carols. The carolers were from many different churches. I was privileged to be among them. As we sang together, my soul was deeply moved. It was the sweetest music this side of heaven. Singing together, like that heavenly host praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth, peace, good will among men." For a few minutes, Winters became Bethlehem. And there was joy, peace, and good will among us. The mystery of the carols. They bring us into the presence of God.


I just wanted to take a moment to thank Commissioner Johnny Wilson and others that made placement of yield signs on the corner of Meeks and Reeves streets pos-

Before being reclaimed, the surface mine where the trees grew produced 300,000 tons of coal to provide electricity for the Washington metropolitan area.


