## Ballinger convenience store hit by robber

The Texaco Star Stop convenience store on Hutchings Avenue in Ballinger was the site of a robbery at about 9:30 p.m. last Sunday.

Trudy Collins, Star Stop employee, was alone in the store when Terry Scott Curtis, 29, of Brady, entered the front door and walked directly behind the counter. Collins said she first thought Curtis must be a Texaco employee because he just "sauntered in, like it was nothing," she said.

Collins described Curtis as clean cut and very "matter-of-fact". He made no eye contact with Collins as he walked directly to her with his hands hidden in his clothing and told her "give me all the money." Although no weapon was exhibited, Collins said she thought he was hiding a weapon in his clothing.

The robber forced the cashier to lie on the floor after she opened the cash register, according to Ballinger police chief Paul Boggess. The robber then took about \$280 in cash and ran out-

side to a pickup where Michael Wayne Bureson, 42, also of Brady, was waiting. Bureson was the driver, Boggess said.

Collins said she didn't say anything to the robber and was afraid he'd hurt her "to keep her quiet."

The cashier managed to get a general description of the 1975 Chevrolet pickup as it drove away, and she called 911. The Ballinger Police Department as well as the Runnels County Sheriff's Office and two Department of Public Safety troopers searched for the suspect vehicle.

Troopers Scott Warren and Tom Barkley apprehended the suspects on U.S. Highway 67 near Benoit about 30 minutes after the incident was reported. No weapon was recovered.

Curtis and Bureson were arraigned Monday before Runnels County Precinct 1 Justice of the Peace Cecil Darby, Jr. on a charge of aggravated robbery.

Both men are being held in the Runnels County jail in lieu of \$25,000 bonds for each suspect.

## OIL BUSINESS . . .

Different folks respond differently to crisis situations. But, all survivors find a way to make the best of a situation and get through it.

The recent drop in oil prices has elicited several interesting responses that are enlightening, illuminating, and even humorous.

There is the guy who is trying to buy all of the properties he can while everyone is so depressed about things. He hopes he can steal a few things while a seller is pricing based on \$14 oil. His logic is that prices are bound to be higher than \$14 over the long term, so he will be getting a discount on anything valued under a \$14 per barrel price scenario.

Even though it might seem ludicrous to some of you, there are majors who will sell properties based on the prevailing posted price on the day an offer comes in, regardless of the circumstances that may surround a temporary drop in price. This is the type of deal our friend mentioned above is looking for.

Then there are the shrewd operators who are curtailing sales of oil and storing every drop for which they can find a place. If an operator can operate without the cashflow, this is a smart move as prices will eventually go back up. For those more cash-poor, they might just sell enough to pay the bills until prices rebound.

In certain areas, storage tanks are bringing a premium, as several operators have come up with the same idea of waiting out the market.

Some folks are having to cut pay across the board at their place of business. This is in place of cutting entire jobs. I know several operators who couldn't bear to put someone completely out of work around this time of year, but they could see the worth of shared sacrifice for the same reasons of the season.

This is not easy task, as a lot of employees, especially office help and other indirect oil patch employees, have already gone several years without any raises. A cut in pay cuts deep, but most take it with gritted teeth, hoping things will get better--drawing some strength in the fact that they are helping everyone make it through the holiday season with a job and a paycheck.

And, finally there is the lady oil patch operator who is trying to make a point with our elected officials in Washington, D.C.

She is sending 100,000 oily rags to her congressman to illustrate the amount of money spent every minute on imports by this country. That's right--the U.S.

spends \$100,000 every minute on imported oil.

She then shows up at her congressman's door and offers to help clean-up. But, she will only take 20 rags out, she says. That is roughly equivalent to the amount of federal funds expended to study how to decrease imports.

So, each of us will cope in our own way with this period of low prices. Unfortunately, some of you who are good hands will leave the oil patch for good. Others will come through somehow and continue on in a business they love. Still others will even prosper by capitalizing on the situation in some way.

I'm an optimist. So, I will expect to see you all sticking with it through this time. And, for all of you who get rich, a simple thank you note (attached to a large check) will suffice for my faith in you.

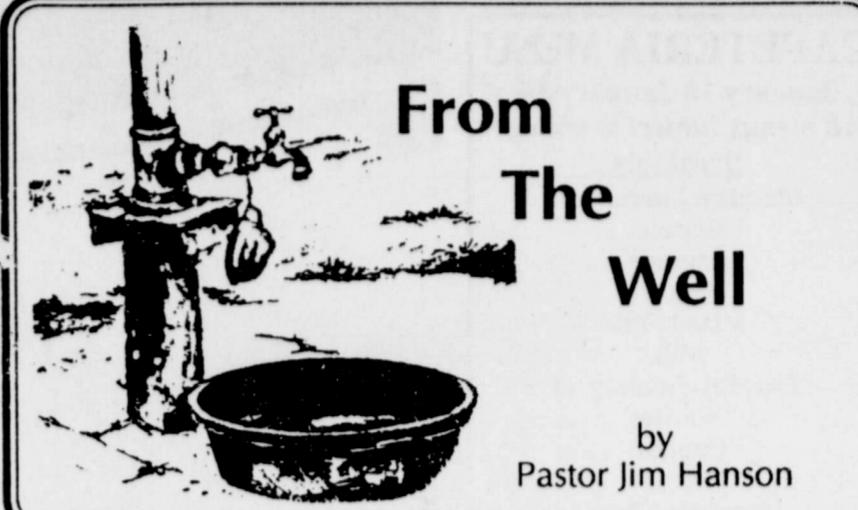

### From The Well

I have a friend. His name is Glen. He grew up fast, in the early 40's young men grew up fast. At seventeen you were playing basketball. At eighteen you were in the Navy. At nineteen you might be commanding a ship, not an aircraft carrier, but a smaller one, and Glen did!

He grew up on the Iron Range in northern Minnesota. Tough mining towns, mining for iron ore. Long hours and hard work. Nothing very soft or pleasant. The summers were short and the winters were long and bleak. Tough. The two big releases in the winter time were two sports. One for the older folks was played on the ice. It was called "curling", and is sort of like shuffle board. Only you spin a flat sided stone and direct its course by sweeping vigorously with a broom in front of it. This was for the adults. The other winter sport was played with an inflated round leather ball on hardwood surfaces. Basketball. Glen was good at basketball.

When he got out of the service, after World War II, Glen went to college and became a star basketball player. He was big, tough, and loved to run. A few years ago he was inducted into the Hall of Fame. A tribute, a well earned award for my friend.

I met him for the first time when I moved to Crookston to become pastor at Trinity Lutheran Church. Glen was in plumbing, he was a contractor. We became friends, mostly because of our wives. They had something in common, they were both Icelandic! We would get together often and talk about our kids, our community, and our churches. Once in a while we'd get into the deep stuff, deep down in the well. And I'll never forget the statement Glen made one day to us. He said something like this, "Jim, Ramona, there are really only three big questions that we need to answer in life. And we need to answer them every day! And the three big question are:

1. Where have you been?
2. Where are you at, right now?
3. Where are you going?

These three question were absolutely necessary when navigating a ship. That may be where he learned to ask them. But they are fully as relevant when navigating a relationship, like one's relationship to your spouse, or your children. And certainly are most relevant when it comes to navigating one's life! A sense of direction is needed.

For sure, they are ultimate questions. Where am I headed? Closer to God or further away from Him? Close to heaven or closer to hell? They are good questions to ask at New Year's. In many cultures New Year's is a time of reflection and meditation on the direction one's life is taking. For some it is a time of repentance and a resolution to change one's ways.

As I sit in my office on the day before New Year's Eve, I am grateful to God for many blessing. For my wife, family, for St. John's, the Christian community, for Winters, and for the privilege of living in the United States of America.

But I'm also grateful for my friend Glen, who taught me the three big questions, and because of them, helps me get and keep my bearings on my journey. For sure I am one day closer to my destination. Time on the earth is running out. My hope, my prayer, for me and all of you is that each day we are getting closer to God. The three big questions will help us to get on that track and to stay headed in the right direction. Home, to God.

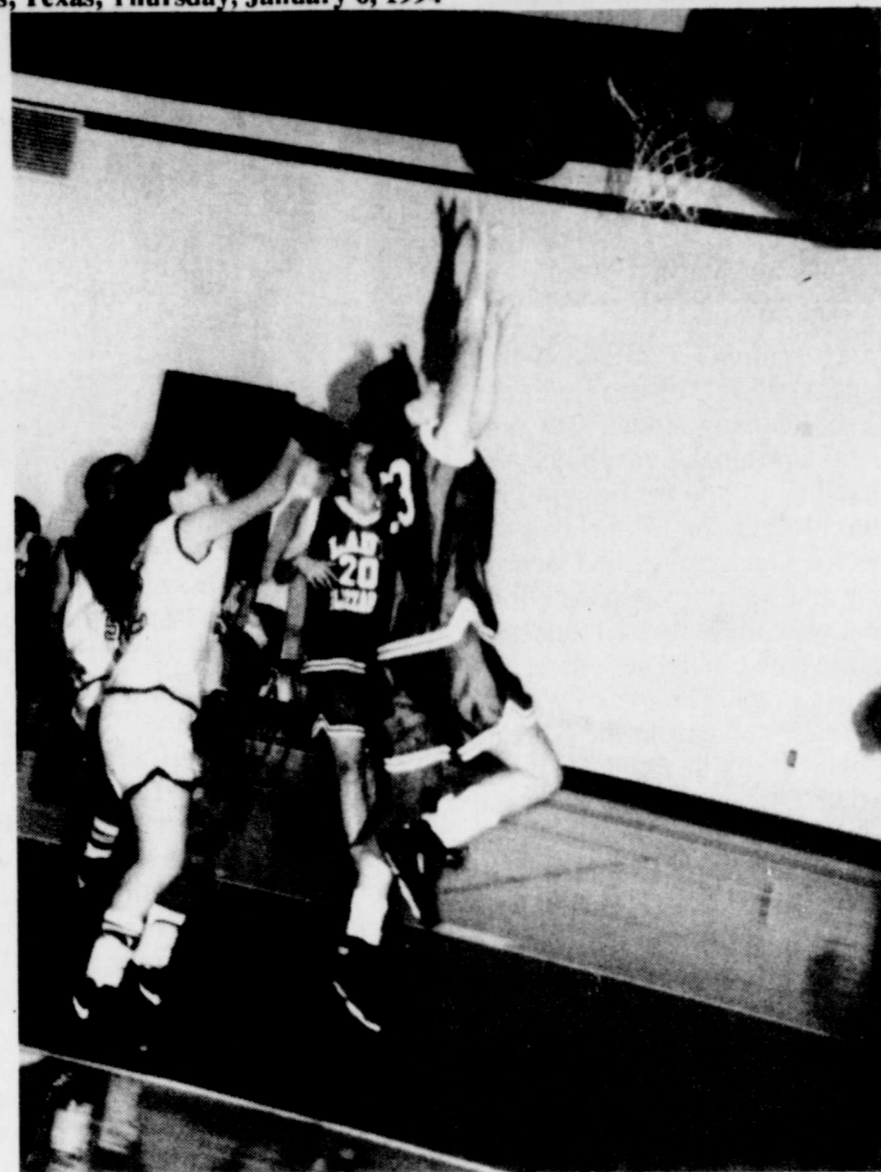

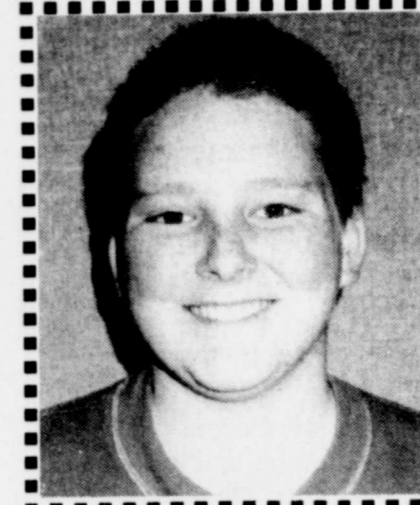

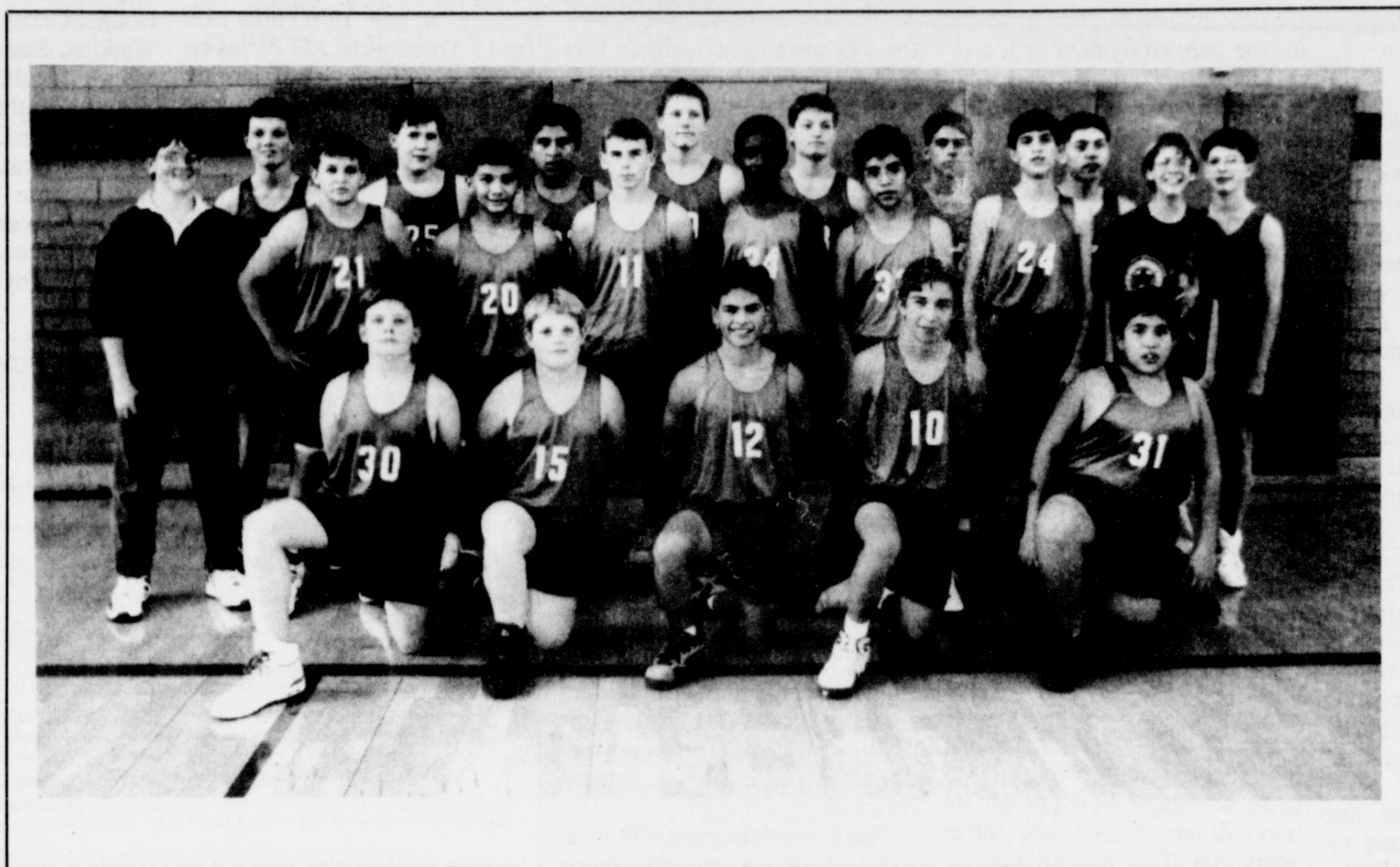

# Poe's Corner by Charlise Poe



## A Poet is He

Wendell Lee, Higginbotham manager, is also a poet. He grew up on a farm near Norton. As they plowed together, Lester Lee quoted poems to his son. Wendell recalls every word of The Boy Stood on the Burning Deck and also the words to a song called Utah Carol that his dad knew by heart.

"I memorized every song that I heard," says Wendell, "even all the church songs. I was fascinated by the old cowboy songs, like those sung by The Sons of the Pioneers."

When he was 18, Wendell wrote his first poem for a girl, but he guesses she kept it. He never saw it again. After he began dating Jeanna Denman of Bronte he wrote some poems for her, but he has no idea what happened to them, either.

His first published poem, The Cowpoke and the Rain, came out 9-21-92 in *The Winters Enterprise*. His second poem, Reflecting, was written for his two sons about happenings of the last three years.

"As I grew up, all I wanted to be was a cowboy, but I could never put my family through that uncertain life," says Wendell.

He graduated from Norton High School in 1961, and went to Tarleton one semester. "Dad said, 'You can bring those grades up or crawl back on that tractor.'"

With that advice, Wendell found a job in Ballinger at Cresy Rotary Files. He worked there until 1964 when he and Jeanna were married. They began farming Lester's land and continued until 1970.

While at Norton, Wendell began roping about twice a week, sometimes more often. He roped

for the pure enjoyment of it and still likes it today.

A roping club was organized in Bronte in 1965 and rodeos started the same year. "We borrowed everybody's pasture bulls to use in the bull riding. One rancher at Robert Lee didn't have pens to hold the stock. We took our roping horses and loaded the bulls in the pasture. The rancher let us use them for the rodeo, then we hauled them to town for him to sell after the rodeo."

After his farming days, Wendell worked for West Texas Utilities at Oak Creek for 3 years and then in the hardware store at Bronte for his father-in-law for six months. Wendell and Jeanna then bought the store, which Jeanna continues to operate. They moved to Winters about six years ago.

Jeff Gore, entertainer, picked his guitar and sang cowboy songs at the wild game dinner hosted in honor of rural people about three years ago. This excited Lee to start studying old cowboy books. He began reciting poems for programs. He always memorizes his material, and is pleased to have entertained employees of the 18 Higginbotham stores at the Christmas party in Comanche for the last two years.

A friend invited Wendell to attend a three-day meeting at Methodist Camp Butman near Merkel sometime ago. It was called the Emmans Walk. After lectures were given, those attending divided into groups to illustrate what they had heard, either by poems, skits or posters. Lee represented his group with a poem called Feed My Sheep.

When the Baptists held a Lay Revival recently, five young men did the preaching, each for one night. When it came Wendell's

time to preach, his subject was Judgement Day. Not surprisingly, he began with a cowboy poem written by Bruce Kiskaddon:

It seems the cowboy had a dream that the earth had passed away and everybody had been judged and classed except the cowboys:

"When He'd judged and classed the others by this book of rules He used

Then I heard Him tell the Angels, 'Now bring on the buckeroos.'

So they bunched and shoved them forward, some surprised but not dismayed.

Ambling up to meet the Judge-ment, came this grizzled wild brigade.

Each one pulled his hat on tighter, that they done from habits force.

Was a trick of most rough riders when you'd mount a cranky horse.

Some was young and some was older, some walked with a limping stride,

Some still had their high laced boots on they was wearing when they died.

They all stood in line to answer for the way they'd spend their day.

And they faced the Boss of Heaven with a cool and level gaze.

Then the Maker of Creation give them boys a careful look.

And He calls to a tophand Angel, 'Now bring me out that Range law book.'

So I turned and asked an Angel why the book of rules was changed.

And they judged this bunch of punchers by the law that ruled the range.

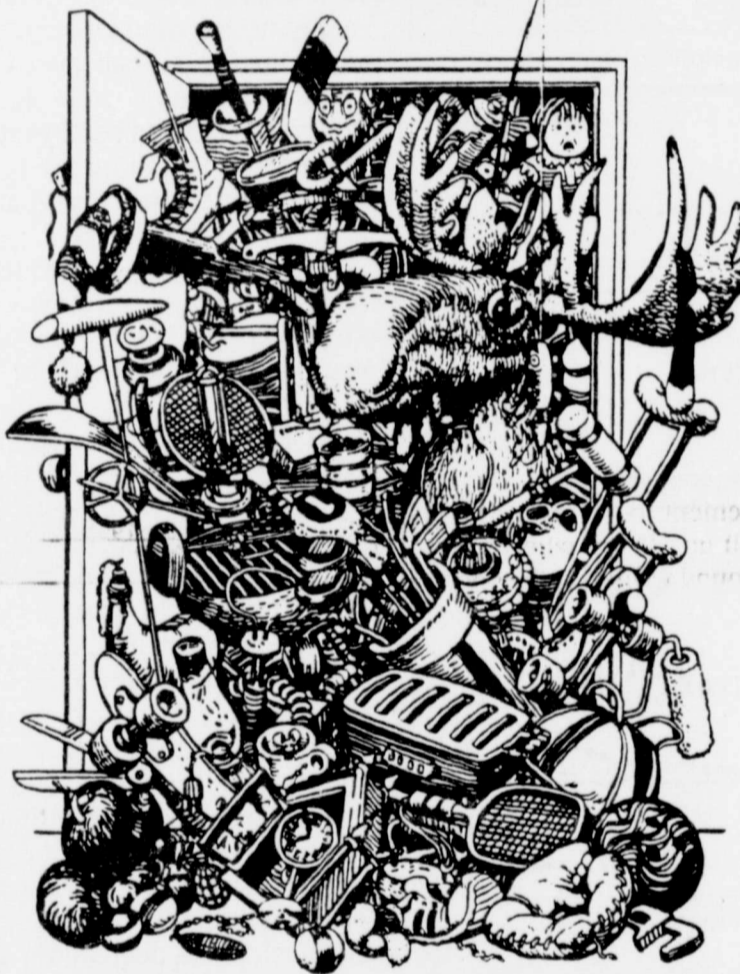

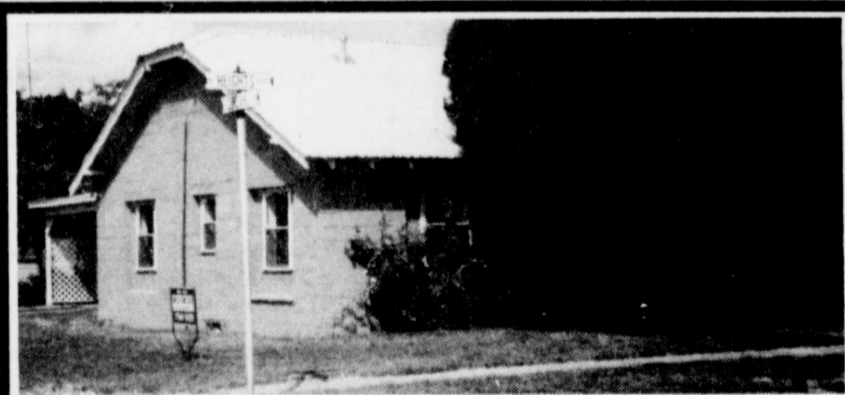
